A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO REPORTING PERIODS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to amend portions of
3	chapters 84 and 97 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes to provide
4	greater uniformity, efficiency, and effectiveness in the
5	administration and enforcement of the state ethics code and
6	state lobbyists law by:
7	(1) Adjusting the reporting period for gift disclosures
8	filed with the state ethics commission to conform with
9	the state fiscal year; and
10	(2) Establishing a phased process for transitioning to a
11	fiscal year-based reporting period.

13	SECTION 2. Section 84-11.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended to read as follows:
15	"§84-11.5 Reporting of gifts. (a) Every legislator and
16	employee shall file a gifts disclosure statement with the state
