A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BRAILLE LITERACY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that literacy skills are
 fundamental to success in education, employment, and life for
 all members of society, including individuals who are blind.
 The legislature further finds that braille literacy skills are
 essential for individuals who are blind to learn, seek and
 maintain remunerative employment, and access the opportunities
 in life open to all regardless of disability.

8 The legislature also finds that it is the interest of the 9 State to make learning opportunities available to all residents. 10 Therefore, it is necessary for the State to promote braille 11 instruction and the timely access to braille instructional 12 materials for blind students, parents, teachers, and other 13 school personnel.

14 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:

15 (1) Require the individualized education programs of blind
16 students to include the instruction of braille and



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provision of braille instructional materials under 1 2 certain circumstances; 3 (2) Require the department of education to establish a braille literacy resource center; and 4 5 (3) Make an appropriation. SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 6 7 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and to read as follows: 8 9 "PART . BRAILLE INSTRUCTION 10 §302A-A Purpose. It is the policy of the State to promote braille literacy and support opportunities for blind students to 11 12 obtain reading and writing skills to the maximum extent achievable for each blind individual. 13 14 §302A-B Definitions. As used in this part, unless the 15 context otherwise requires: "Braille" has the same meaning as in section 302A-442.5. 16 "Braille instructional materials" means print instructional 17 18 materials, as defined in section 302A-442.5, that are printed in 19 braille.



"Eligible blind student" means an eligible student, as that
 term is defined in section 302A-442.5, who is blind, as that
 term is defined in section 347.2.

4 "Individualized education program" and "individualized
5 education program team" have the same meanings as in section
6 614(d) of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20
7 U.S.C. section 1414(d)), as amended.

8 §302A-C Individualized education program; eligible blind 9 students; braille instructional materials. (a) The 10 individualized education program for an eligible blind student 11 shall include instruction in braille and provision of braille 12 instructional materials unless the individualized education 13 program team determines that the instruction or materials are 14 not necessary for the student after current and future needs 15 reading and writing performance assessments have been made.

(b) When included in an eligible blind student's
individualized education program, braille literacy instruction
shall be sufficient to enable the student to achieve at least
grade level reading and writing proficiency expected of the
student's peers of comparable ability to learn and progress from

14	(c)	The department may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91

In accordance with section 9 of article VII of 4 the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93, 5 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, 6 7 and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure 8 ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by 9 per cent. This current declaration takes \$ or 10 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act 11 12 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure 13 ceiling are that: 14 The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to (1) 15 serve the public interest; and (2) 16 The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs 17 addressed by this Act. 18 There is appropriated out of the general SECTION 5. 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 20 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to 21 make grants or enter into contracts with one or more entities



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1 the department of education finds qualified to provide in-state 2 braille transcription services, or to provide financial support 3 in whole or in part for establishment of braille transcription 4 services by a qualified entity.

5 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of6 education for the purposes of this Act.

7 SECTION 6. Beginning fiscal year 2025-2026 and each fiscal
8 year thereafter, the department of education shall include in
9 its annual budget request any sums necessary for the provision
10 of braille transcription services pursuant to section 3 of this
11 Act.

SECTION 7. In codifying the new sections added by section 3 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating the new sections in this Act.

16 SECTION 8. New statutory material is underscored.

17 SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.
