A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TOURISM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that tourism is uniquely
2 critical to the economy of the State and a significant generator
3 of government revenue. However, tourism is also a potential
4 source of intrusion onto the daily lives of residents and
5 creates strains on state and county infrastructure and services.

6 Accordingly, the legislature finds that the tourism
7 industry requires the best possible system of governance and
8 oversight, which should include coordination among state and
9 county agencies, private industry, and community stakeholders to
10 ensure a balance among visitor and resident interests, while
11 guaranteeing that there is an ultimate emphasis on protecting
12 resident prosperity and well-being. The legislature further
13 finds that coordination among these groups will ensure effective
14 and collaborative approaches to long-term planning, appropriate
15 marketing, impact mitigation and other aspects of destination
16 management, and regular analysis of tourism's costs and benefits
17 to the state and its residents.

1 The legislature recognizes that the State's economy
2 continues to experience negative impacts from the loss of
3 tourism that began with the unprecedented statewide shutdown in
4 April 2020 due to the coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic.
5 According to an October 2022 brief on tourism governance by the
6 economic research organization at the university of Hawaii,
7 "strong leadership from the incoming governor is essential".

8 Accordingly, the legislature finds that it is necessary and
9 appropriate to establish a cabinet-level position that
10 coordinates efforts among the tourism industry stakeholders,
11 executive agencies, and the community. Therefore, the purpose
12 of this Act is to establish the position of a tourism liaison
13 officer within the office of the governor.

14 SECTION 2. Chapter 26, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
15 by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to
16 read as follows:

17 "§26- Tourism liaison officer. (a) There is
18 established within the office of the governor a tourism liaison
19 officer who shall be appointed by the governor without regard to
20 section 26-34. The tourism liaison officer shall not be subject
21 to chapters 76 and 89.



- 1 (b) The duties of the tourism liaison officer shall
2 include but not be limited to:
- 3 (1) Serving as the liaison of the governor with the Hawaii
4 tourism authority; department of business, economic
5 development, and tourism; and other public and private
6 parties on matters relating to tourism;
- 7 (2) Advising the governor on matters relating to the
8 State's long-term tourism strategy;
- 9 (3) Developing the administration's legislative package on
10 measures relating to tourism;
- 11 (4) Defining and implementing performance measures for the
12 Hawaii tourism authority;
- 13 (5) Coordinating investments that serve the tourism
14 industry and the community at large;
- 15 (6) Establishing international relationships and
16 strengthening existing relationships with Asia-Pacific
17 partners; and
- 18 (7) Performing other functions to facilitate the purpose
19 of this section.
- 20 (c) In carrying out the duties of this section, the
21 tourism liaison officer:



- 1 (1) May utilize the services of the State's tourism
2 agencies, including those of the Hawaii tourism
3 authority, as appropriate; and
4 (2) Shall seek and utilize any available funding sources,
5 including grant moneys."

6 SECTION 3. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of
7 the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,
8 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the
9 appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023,
10 and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure
11 ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by
12 \$ or per cent. This current declaration takes
13 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal
14 year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act
15 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure
16 ceiling are that:

- 17 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
18 serve the public interest; and
19 (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
20 addressed by this Act.

1 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
3 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for
4 the establishment of one full-time equivalent (1.00 FTE) tourism
5 liaison officer position within the office of the governor.


6 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of the
7 governor for the purposes of this Act.

8 SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.

9 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.
