A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the single greatest 2 recent factor contributing to the increasing cost of living in 3 Hawaii is the rising cost of transportation. Due to 4 increasingly expensive fossil fuels and a lack of cheaper transit options, Hawaii residents already pay among the highest 5 6 cost to commute in the country. In January 2022, the United 7 States Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that auto-related 8 costs were astonishing twenty-three per cent higher than the 9 year before. In Hawaii, a recent analysis studied how much all the direct and indirect costs of car ownership and use cost in 10 11 2020 and found that local taxpaying families pay about \$24,400 12 per year, even if they don't own a car. These costs are only 13 fifty per cent covered by user fees. In addition, personal vehicle costs add another \$16,200 per year to those household 14 15 expenditures.

16 The legislature further finds that climate change caused by 17 carbon emissions from burning fossil fuels poses a serious



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1 threat to the economic well-being, public health, natural 2 resources, and environment of Hawaii. The State has committed 3 to eliminating fossil fuels from the electricity and transportation sectors and achieving negative carbon emissions 4 5 for Hawaii by 2045. The legislature finds that meeting the 6 State's lower cost of living and clean energy goals necessitates 7 the rapid transition to electric vehicles that utilize local, 8 renewable energy sources. The recently released report by the 9 Hawaii state energy office on Hawaii's pathways to 10 decarbonization noted that on its current path, the State will 11 only achieve a fifty-four per cent reduction in carbon emissions 12 by 2045, well short of the one hundred per cent reduction needed 13 for carbon neutrality.

14 The legislature also finds that electric bicycles are significantly more cost effective for local families and better 15 16 for the environment than gas powered motor vehicles and can 17 effectively get many Hawaii residents to locations as 18 conveniently as gas powered motor vehicles. The current 19 electric bicycle and moped rebate program, even with minimal 20 promotion and low subsidy, has helped almost three hundred 21 people access electric bikes since its inception. However, its

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reach has been limited by age restrictions that currently
 possible for a fifteen year old student to drive a sports car,
 but not acquire a bicycle through this program.

4 In 2022, Denver's electric bike rebate program providing 5 families with cheaper transit options led to considerable cost 6 savings for Denver families, helped reduce vehicular traffic on 7 crowded roads, and ultimately replaced many trips by car with 8 trips by bike. This meant twenty-two miles a week on average 9 per user, collectively displacing one hundred thousand miles 10 weekly. Ninety-six per cent of respondents said the 11 availability of the rebate made the difference when deciding to 12 buy an electric bike.

13 The purpose of this Act is to:

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14 (1) Help reduce the cost of transportation, reduce the
15 cost of living, and reduce traffic on Hawaii's roads
16 by improving the existing electric bicycle and moped
17 rebate program to further encourage the purchase and
18 use of electric bicycles, electric mopeds, and other
19 electric mobility devices; and



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1	(2) Update electric mobility device and electric bicycle
2	definitions to align with federal and state policies
3	and programs.
4	SECTION 2. Section 196-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5	amended by adding two new definitions to be appropriately
6	inserted and to read as follows:
7	""Electric micro-mobility device" means any ground
8	transportation device such as a standing scooter, skateboard,
9	board riding on a single or double wheels, or similar device
10	which is powered either exclusively by electricity from a
11	battery charged from an external source, or by electricity from
12	a battery charged from an external source in addition to human
13	power, which is designed to transport a single person, with a
14	range exceeding not less than twelve miles and maximum speed of
15	twenty-eight miles per hour, on which a person may reasonably
16	commute to and from regular destinations.
17	"Electric bicycle" means a bicycle equipped with fully
18	operable pedals, a saddle or seat for the rider, and an electric
19	motor of seven hundred fifty watts or less that meets the
20	requirements of one of the following three classes:



1	(1)	Class 1 electric bicycle, which is an electric bicycle
2		equipped with a motor that provides assistance only
3		when the rider is pedaling, and that ceases to provide
4		assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of
5		twenty miles per hour;
6	(2)	Class 2 electric bicycle, which is an electric bicycle
7		equipped with a motor that may be used exclusively to
8		propel the bicycle, and that is not capable of
9		providing assistance when the bicycle reaches the
10		speed of twenty miles per hour; and
11	(3)	Class 3 electric bicycle, which is an electric bicycle
12		equipped with a motor that provides assistance only
13		when the rider is pedaling, and that ceases to provide
14		assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of
15		twenty-eight miles per hour."
16	SECT	ION 3. Section 196-7.8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17	amended t	o read as follows:
18	"[+];	<pre>§196-7.8[+] Electric [bicycle and electric moped]</pre>
19	mobility	rebate program; third-party administrator; special
20	fund. (a) The department of transportation shall administer a
21	rebate pr	ogram that incentivizes the purchase of new electric



1	[bicycles and new electric mopeds] mobility devices and may
2	contract with a third-party administrator pursuant to subsection
3	(i) to operate and manage the rebate program.
4	(b) Each eligible purchase of a new electric bicycle, [or]
5	new electric moped, or new electric micro-mobility device shall
6	receive a rebate of [either twenty per cent of the retail cost
7	or \$500, whichever amount is lower;] \$750; provided that no
8	individual shall receive more than $[\$500]$ $\$750$ in total rebates
9	each fiscal year $[-,]$ unless also qualifying for the additional
10	assistance rebate as outlined in (i), in which case the eligible
11	purchase shall receive not more than \$1,500 in total rebates
12	each fiscal year. No non-profit organization shall receive more
13	than \$10,000 in total rebates each fiscal year.
14	(c) The department of transportation shall not issue more
15	than \$700,000 in total rebates under this section each fiscal
16	year; provided that the electric [bicycle_and_electric_moped]
17	mobility subaccount within the highway development special fund
18	pursuant to section 264-122(d) contains sufficient funds to pay
19	the rebates. The department of transportation shall not be
20	liable to pay any refund if sufficient funds are unavailable.
21	The department of transportation shall allow valid claims filed



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1	by eligib	le applicants for whom sufficient funds may not be	
2	immediately available to receive a rebate as funds may be		
3	available in a subsequent year.		
4	(d)	The department of transportation shall:	
5	(1)	Prepare any forms that may be necessary for an	
6		applicant to claim a rebate pursuant to this section;	
7		[and]	
8	(2)	Require each applicant to furnish reasonable	
9		information to ascertain the validity of the claim,	
10		including but not limited to the signature of the	
11		buyer and individual responsible for the sale on	
12		behalf of a retail store at the time of sale, a copy	
13		of valid government issued photo identification of the	
14		buyer at the time of the sale, receipt of purchase,	
15		name and address of the retail store, verification of	
16		eligibility, and any other documentation necessary to	
17		demonstrate the legitimate purchase of a new electric	
18		[bicycle or new electric moped.] mobility device; and	
19	(3)	Prepare a retailer application and portal to provide	
20		rebates directly at the point of sale to expedite the	
21		rebate process.	



1	(e)	This section shall apply to new:
2	(1)	Electric bicycles [capable of speeds of no more than
3		twenty-eight miles per hour; and];
4	(2)	Electric mopeds $[\tau]$; and
5	(3)	Electric micro-mobility devices capable of speeds of
6		not more than twenty-eight miles per hour,
7	purchased	at a retail store after July 1, 2022.
8	(f)	Applicants shall submit an application to the
9	department	t of transportation within twelve months of the date of
10	purchase	to claim a rebate from the electric [bicycle and
11	electric 	moped] mobility rebate program. Failure to apply
12	within two	elve months of the date of purchase shall constitute a
13	waiver of	the right to claim the rebate.
14	(g)	Nothing in this section shall alter taxes due on the
15	original]	purchase. Any rebate received pursuant to this section
16	shall not	be considered income for the purposes of state or
17	county tax	xes.
18	(h)	In administering the electric mobility rebate program,
19	the depar	tment of transportation shall provide rebates to:
20	(1)	Persons who are residents of the State and fifteen
21		years or older, who purchase a new qualifying electric

3	(2)	Non-p	profit organizations who are registered in the

11	additiona	l assi	istance rebate shall be \$750 or the full retail
12	amount, w	hichey	ver amount is lower, to persons [eighteen] <u>fifteen</u>
13	years or	older	who:
14	(1)	Are e	eligible for:
15		(A)	The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program;
16		(B)	The free and reduced price lunch program;

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1	(2)	Do not own a registered motor vehicle with four or
2		more wheels, as demonstrated by an affidavit signed by
3		the applicant at the time of sale of the new electric
4		bicycle [or], electric moped, <u>or electric micro-</u>
5		mobility device, which may be audited by the
6		department of transportation; or
7	(3)	Are enrolled in school, community college, or
8		university.
9	[(i)] (j) The department of transportation may contract
10	with a th	ird-party administrator to operate and manage the
11	electric	[bicycle and electric moped] mobility rebate program.
12	The third	-party administrator shall not be deemed to be a
13	"governme	ntal body" as defined in section 103D-104; provided
14	that all	moneys transferred to the third-party administrator
15	shall hav	e been appropriated by the legislature or shall be from
16	moneys pr	ovided by the federal government or private funding
17	sources.	The third-party administrator shall not expend more
18	than ten	per cent of the amounts appropriated for the rebate
19	program,	or any other reasonable percentage determined by the
20	departmen	t of transportation, for administration, promotion, and



1	reporting of the electric [bicycle and electric moped] mobility
2	rebate program.
3	(k) The department of transportation shall provide an
4	annual report which shall detail the rebates provided by zip
5	code, amount received, and type of rebate."
6	SECTION 4. Section 264-122, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
8	"(d) There is established within the highway development
9	special fund an electric [bicycle_and_clectric_moped] mobility
10	subaccount. The department shall expend moneys in the
11	subaccount for the purposes of funding the electric bicycle and
12	electric moped rebate program established pursuant to section
13	196-7.8."
14	SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
15	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
16	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
