
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that American Sign
2 Language (ASL) interpreters provide a critical service to deaf,
3 hard of hearing, deaf-blind, and hearing individuals, and public
4 agencies in the State, who wish to effectively communicate with
5 each other in a variety of settings and circumstances. Despite
6 the increase in requests for ASL interpreting services, there
7 has been increased difficulty in the recruitment of individuals
8 who are qualified to serve as ASL interpreters.

9 The legislature further finds that there remains a critical
10 need to develop an ASL interpreter workforce and acquiring
11 additional information on the current condition of ASL in Hawaii
12 will help provide a firm foundation to address other current and
13 future issues relating to this critical service.

14 Accordingly, to ensure greater access for individuals to
15 receive ASL interpretation services in the State during
16 emergencies and daily life activities, the purpose of this Act
17 is to require the disability and communication access board to



1 convene a working group to study the state of American Sign
2 Language in Hawaii.

3 SECTION 2. (a) The disability and communication access
4 board shall convene a working group to:

5 (1) Study the state of American Sign Language in Hawaii;
6 and

7 (2) Investigate and study any means, methods, processes,
8 or systems that might improve the provision of
9 American Sign Language services in the State.

10 (b) The working group shall consist of the following
11 members:

12 (1) A representative from the disability and communication
13 access board, who shall serve as chairperson of the
14 working group;

15 (2) A representative from the department of human services
16 division of vocational rehabilitation;

17 (3) A representative from the department of education;

18 (4) A member of the deaf and blind taskforce;

19 (5) A professor from the university of Hawaii who teaches
20 American Sign Language;



1 (6) An individual who currently serves as an American Sign
2 Language interpreter, who shall be invited by the co-
3 chairpersons of the working group; and

4 (7) Additional representatives invited by the co-
5 chairpersons of the working group.

6 (c) The working group, with the assistance of the
7 department of health, shall submit a report of its findings and
8 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the
9 legislature no later than December 31, 2024.

10 (d) The working group shall be dissolved on June 30, 2025.

11 (e) The members of the working group shall serve without
12 compensation, but shall be reimbursed for reasonable expenses
13 incurred, including travel expenses. No member of the working
14 group shall be made subject to chapter 84, Hawaii Revised
15 Statutes, solely because of that member's participation as a
16 member of the working group.

17 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
