A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO WILDFIRE PREVENTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the threat of 2 wildfires in the State has significantly increased, posing a 3 threat to public health and safety and the State's natural 4 The risk of wildfires in the State differs from the resources. 5 continental United States, as warm year-round conditions 6 supported by vast, unbroken expanses of highly fire-prone, 7 nonnative ecosystems with invasive grasses and other fireadapted plants leave native ecosystems vulnerable to wildfire 8 9 impacts. The results of wildfire destruction can be far-10 reaching, as reductions in native forests can lead to decreased water quality, increased erosion, and damage to coral reefs from 11 12 sedimentation and nutrient loading. Hawaii is also home to a 13 unique array of native plants and animals, with some species 14 found nowhere else in the world. Protecting the State's forests 15 from wildfires will protect the habitats for these native 16 species.



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1 While there is a growing concern over the risk of wildfire impacts in local communities statewide, there are limited 2 3 resources available for pre-fire mitigation and wildfire response in the State. The State has historically spent less 4 5 than other western states, such as California, Oregon, and 6 Washington, on wildfire prevention. Additionally, the State's 7 geographic isolation creates a lack of access to inter-agency 8 support for fire management available on the continental United 9 States, straining the State's limited resources. Establishing a 10 wildfire prevention plan for areas prone to wildfires such as 11 central Oahu will provide a valuable framework to ensure the 12 safety of Hawaii's people, natural resources, and native 13 species.

14 The United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service 15 Community Wildfire Defense grant program is a \$1,000,000,000, 16 five-year competitive grant program designed to assist at-risk 17 communities, including "units of local government" representing 18 communities in areas at risk of wildfire. In 2023, \$800,000,000 19 was available for the program, divided into \$200,000,000 20 increments for rounds two through five. Individual grants can 21 fund up to \$250,000 to create and update community wildfire

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protection plans and up to \$10,000,000 for a project described 2 within a community wildfire protection plan. Nonprofit 3 organizations with wildfire mitigation and prevention 4 programming such as the Hawaii Wildfire Management Organization have applied for a Community Wildfire Defense grant for central 5 6 Oahu. To ensure adequate protection of the communities 7 statewide, matching funds are needed to secure federal funding. 8 Additionally, the legislature finds that requiring the 9 university of Hawaii college of tropical agriculture and human 10 resources to develop a central Oahu wildfire protection plan is a matter of statewide concern pursuant to article X, section 6, 11 12 of the Hawaii State Constitution. 13 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate 14 funds to the university of Hawaii college of tropical 15 agriculture and human resources to develop a central Oahu 16 wildfire protection plan, in consultation with the department of 17 land and natural resources, community stakeholders, and 18 nonprofit organizations that specialize in wildfire preparedness

20 SECTION 2. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93, 21

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and mitigation programming.

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1 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the 2 appropriations contained in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, 3 and this Act will cause the state general fund expenditure 4 ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded by 5 Ś per cent. This current declaration takes or 6 into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal year 2024-2025 in Act 164, Regular Session of 2023, and this Act 7 only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund expenditure 8 9 ceiling are that: 10 The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to (1)11 serve the public interest; and 12 (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs 13 addressed by this Act. SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 14 15 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 16 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for 17 the development of a central Oahu wildfire protection plan by 18 the university of Hawaii college of tropical agriculture and 19 human resources, in consultation with the department of land and 20 natural resources, community stakeholders, and nonprofit 21 organizations that specialize in wildfire preparedness and

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1 mitigation programming; provided that no funds shall be made 2 available under this Act unless the university of Hawaii college 3 of tropical agriculture and human resources and nonprofit 4 organizations that specialize in wildfire preparedness and 5 mitigation programming provide matching funds from United States 6 Department of Agriculture Forestry Service Wildfire Defense 7 grants for the purposes of this Act. 8 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the university of 9 Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.

10 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.
