A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DISCRIMINATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the vigilance of
2	individual citizens can keep communities safe through the
3	reporting of witnessed criminal conduct to law enforcement.
4	However, the legislature also finds that in certain
5	circumstances, individuals have misused the ability to summon
6	law enforcement officers against persons of protected classes
7	without reason to suspect a crime is being committed.
8	The purpose of this Act is to give any person injured by
9	discriminatory reporting recourse through civil action.
10	SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
11	adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read
12	as follows:
13	"CHAPTER
14	DISCRIMINATORY REPORTING TO A LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER
15	§ -1 Discriminatory reporting; law enforcement officer;
16	civil remedy. (a) Any person who knowingly causes a law
17	enforcement officer to come to a location to contact a person on

has violated subsection (a), it shall enjoin the defendant from
 a continuance thereof. It shall not be necessary that actual
 damages to the plaintiff be alleged or proved in order to obtain
 the injunction.

5 (c) If the judgment is for the plaintiff, the plaintiff
6 shall be awarded damages of not less than \$1,000 plus attorneys'
7 fees and costs."

8 SECTION 3. The department of the attorney general, in 9 consultation with the Hawaii civil rights commission, shall 10 provide guidance to the public on the civil liability and 11 remedies available for discriminatory reporting to a law 12 enforcement officer pursuant to this Act; provided that 13 effective January 1, 2024, the department of law enforcement 14 shall provide such guidance.

SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Report Title:

Discriminatory Reporting; Protected Class; Law Enforcement Officer; Civil Remedy

Description:

Establishes provisions relating to civil remedies for discriminatory reporting to a law enforcement officer. Provides that a person who contacts a law enforcement officer to come to a location to contact a person on the basis of the person's actual or perceived race, color, ancestry, ethnicity, national origin, place of birth, sex, age, religion, disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity with the specific intent to infringe upon the person's rights under the Hawaii State Constitution or United State Constitution; discriminate against the person; cause the person to feel harassed, humiliated, or embarrassed; cause the person to be expelled from a place that the person is lawfully located; damage the person's reputation or standing within the community; or damage the person's financial, economic, consumer, or business prospects or interest shall be civilly liable. Requires the Department of the Attorney General, in consultation with the Hawaii Civil Rights Commission, to provide guidance to the public on the enactment of this Act. Effective January 1, 2024, requires the Department of Law Enforcement to also provide guidance on this Act. (SD1)
