A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FIREWORKS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. To address the problem of illegal fireworks, 2 Act 170, Session Laws of Hawaii 2010, established the illegal 3 fireworks task force to develop strategies and make 4 recommendations to the legislature to address the illegal 5 importation and use of fireworks in the State. Among other 6 recommendations, the task force recommended increasing random 7 inspections for illegal fireworks by expanding inspection 8 authority and focusing cargo inspections to make the inspections 9 more manageable.

10 Subsequently, pursuant to Act 184, Session Laws of Hawaii 11 2019, the legislative reference bureau updated the findings and 12 recommendations of the Report of the Illegal Fireworks Task 13 Force to the Legislature for the Regular Session of 2011. The 14 2019 legislative reference bureau report, Blast From the Past: 15 An Update to the Report of the Illegal Fireworks Task Force to 16 the Legislature for the Regular Session of 2011, indicated that 17 the "majority of respondents to the [Legislative Reference]



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Bureau's Survey appeared to agree that the issues and challenges
 presented by the Task Force in its 2011 report remain relevant
 today."

4 The purpose of this Act is to address the illegal5 importation and use of fireworks in the State by:

6 (1) Establishing a shipping container inspection program
7 to randomly inspect shipping containers arriving in
8 the State for illegal fireworks and explosives,
9 including the use of explosive-sniffing dogs to
10 inspect the containers;

11 (2) Creating the shipping container inspection program
12 special fund to collect shipping container import fees
13 established under this Act and appropriating funds for
14 the shipping container inspection program;

15 (3) Amending the definitions of "aerial devices" and
16 "fireworks" within state fireworks law; and

17 (4) Appropriating moneys.

18 SECTION 2. Chapter 266, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19 amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately
20 designated and to read as follows:

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1	"§266-A Shipping container inspection program. (a)	The
2	department of public safety, or after December 31, 2023, th	e
3	department of law enforcement, in collaboration with the	
4	departments of defense and transportation; any federal agen	cies,
5	including any of the United States armed services, state	
6	agencies; and private organizations involved with shipping	cargo
7	into the State, shall develop and implement a program to	
8	randomly inspect shipping containers arriving in Honolulu f	or
9	illegal fireworks and explosives smuggled into the State.	The
10	program shall begin no later than October 1, 2023.	
11	(b) The shipping container inspection program shall:	
12	(1) Include the use of explosive-sniffing dogs to ins	pect
13	incoming shipping containers to the greatest externation	nt
14	<pre>reasonable;</pre>	
15	(2) Prioritize resources toward high-risk containers	over
16	low-risk containers. For the purposes of this	
17	paragraph, "low-risk container" means any shippin	ğ
18	container containing goods to be delivered to the	
19	military, state or county agencies, or businesses	
20	registered to do business in the State that are i	n
21	good standing;	



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1	(3)	Inspect all shipping containers containing legal
2		fireworks using personnel who are able to distinguish
3		legal fireworks from illegal fireworks; and
4	(4)	Balance safety concerns with commercial interests to
5		avoid increases in consumer costs.
6	(C)	Beginning July 1, 2023, the department of
7	transport	ation shall assess a fee of \$1 for each shipping
8	container	arriving in the State. All fees received by the
9	departmen	t of transportation pursuant to this subsection shall
10	be deposi	ted into the shipping container inspection program
11	special f	und established under section 266-B.
12	<u>(d)</u>	The department of public safety, or after December 31,
13	2023, the	department of law enforcement, shall coordinate and
14	<u>conduct t</u>	he random inspection of shipping containers pursuant to
15	this sect	ion. The Hawaii national guard may be requested to
16	<u>assist in</u>	this effort.
17	<u>(e)</u>	Any additional inspections shall be conducted by
18	<u>members o</u>	f an appropriate bargaining unit who are subject to
19	chapter 8	9, and not by individuals contracted or subcontracted
20	by the de	partment of public safety or department of law
21	enforceme	nt, as the case may be.





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1	(f) Any inspections conducted offsite shall be conducted
2	within twenty-four hours of initial arrival at the final
3	container drop-off location or in a non-active harbor area,
4	subject to the director of transportation's discretion.
5	(g) Any contraband discovered during a shipping container
6	inspection shall be investigated by a law enforcement agency.
7	(h) Any person who tampers with secure container seals
8	shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$.
9	(i) The department of public safety, or after December 31,
10	2023, the department of law enforcement, may request funding
11	from the federal government for homeland security and port
12	security measures and work with the military to secure other
13	funding sources for the purposes of the program.
14	(j) The department of public safety, or after December 31,
15	2023, the department of law enforcement, shall adopt rules in
16	accordance with chapter 91 for the purposes of this section.
17	§266-B Shipping container inspection program special fund.
18	(a) There is established in the state treasury the shipping
19	container inspection program special fund, into which shall be
20	deposited:
21	(1) Appropriations by the legislature to the special fund;



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1	(2) Gifts, donations, and grants from public agencies and
2	private persons; and
3	(3) All proceeds collected by the department of
4	transportation from shipping container import fees
5	under section 266-A(c).
6	(b) All moneys in the special fund shall be used for
7	support and administration of the shipping container inspection
8	program established under section 266-A."
9	SECTION 3. Section 132D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended as follows:
11	1. By amending the definition of "aerial device" to read:
12	""Aerial device" means any fireworks [containing one
13	hundred thirty milligrams or less of explosive materials] that
14	produces an audible or visible effect and is designed to rise
15	into the air and explode or detonate in the air $[\frac{\partial r}{d}]_{t}$ to fly
16	about above the ground, [and that is prohibited for use by any
17	person who does not have a permit for display issued by a count
18	under section 132D-16.] or to emit flaming fireballs. "Aerial
19	devices" includes devices classified as fireworks under UN0336
20	and UN0337 by the United States Department of Transportation, a
21	set forth in Title 49 Code of Federal Regulations [include

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1 firework items], as containing one hundred thirty milligrams or 2 less of explosive materials, and that are commonly known as 3 bottle rockets, sky rockets, missile-type rockets, helicopters, 4 torpedoes, daygo bombs, roman candles, flying pigs, and jumping 5 jacks that move about the ground farther than a circle with a 6 radius of twelve feet as measured from the point where the item 7 was placed and ignited, aerial shells, and mines." 8 2. By amending the definition of "fireworks" to read: 9 ""Fireworks" means any combustible or explosive 10 composition, or any substance or combination of substances, [or article prepared for the purpose of producing] designed to 11 12 produce a visible or audible effect by combustion, explosion, 13 deflagration, or detonation, and meets the definition of aerial 14 device or consumer or display fireworks as defined by this 15 section. "Fireworks includes any composition or device that 16 meets the definition of aerial device or consumer or display 17 fireworks as defined by this section and contained in the 18 regulations of the United States Department of Transportation as 19 set forth in Title 49 Code of Federal Regulations. The term 20 "fireworks" shall not include any explosives or pyrotechnics 21 regulated under chapter 396 or automotive safety flares, nor



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1 shall the term be construed to include toy pistols, toy cannons, 2 toy guns, party poppers, pop-its, or [other] similar devices 3 [which contain twenty-five hundredths of a grain or less of 4 explosive substance]."

SECTION 4. No later than twenty days prior to the 5 6 convening of the regular sessions of 2024 and 2025, the department of public safety or the department of law enforcement 7 8 shall submit to the legislature reports on the implementation of 9 the shipping container inspection program established pursuant 10 to this Act. The reports shall include findings and recommendations, including costs expended to date, the estimated 11 12 cost of operating the program, and any proposed legislation. 13 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 14 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 15 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 16 2024-2025 for costs to establish and administer the shipping 17 container inspection program, including the purchase, care, and 18 19 handling of at least two explosive-sniffing dogs.

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The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 1 of public safety or the department of law enforcement for the 2 3 purposes of this Act. 4 SECTION 6. In codifying the new sections added by section 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute 5 6 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating the new sections in this Act. 7 8 SECTION 7. New statutory material is underscored. SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050; 9 provided that section 5 of this Act shall take effect on July 1, 10
