A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SEARCH AND RESCUE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii is an outdoor 2 playground world-renown for its beautiful hikes through lush green forests and mountains. However, the coronavirus pandemic 3 4 fueled a sustained surge of experienced and inexperienced hikers 5 venturing into the outdoors. Occasionally, hikers ignore posted 6 warning signs, intentionally leave a hiking trail, or enter 7 property that is closed to the public. When one of these hikers needs to be rescued, it is the State that bears the burden of 8 9 paying for the costs associated with the search or rescue.

10 The legislature further finds that in response to having to 11 pay the cost of rescuing recreational hikers who take 12 unnecessary risks, several states, including Idaho, Maine, New 13 Hampshire, Oregon, South Dakota, and Vermont, have passed 14 legislation that allows the state to offset the costs associated 15 with the search or rescue by seeking reimbursement from the 16 rescued party.

1	The purpose of this Act is to require government entities		
2	to seek reimbursement for the expenses arising from the search		
3	and rescue of persons who ignore posted warnings, leave a hiking		
4	trail to enter a prohibited area, or hike on a trail that is		
5	closed to the public.		
6	SECTION 2. Section 137-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
7	amended to read as follows:		
8	"[-[]§137-2[]] Reimbursement. (a) [Whenever] Subject to		
9	subsection (b), whenever any government entity engages in a		
10	search or rescue operation for the purpose of searching for or		
11	rescuing a person, and incurs search and rescue expenses		
12	therein, the government entity may seek reimbursement from the		
13	following:		
14	(1) The person on whose behalf search or rescue operations		
15	were conducted, including the person's estate,		
16	guardians, custodians, or other entity responsible for		
17	the person's safety;		
18	(2) A person who ultimately benefited from a search or		
19	rescue operation by being rescued; or

1	(3)	Any entity responsible for placing the person in the	
2		position of danger for which the search or rescue	
3		operation was initiated.	
4	(d)]	Reimbursement under subsection (a) shall be allowed	
5	only if t	he need for search or rescue was caused by any act or	
6	omission	by the person searched for or rescued, constituting	
7	intention	al-disregard for the person's safety, including, but	
8	not limit	ed to; intentionally disregarding a warning or notice.]	
9	(b)	A government entity shall seek reimbursement for	
10	search or rescue expenses from all applicable persons or		
11	entities	in section (a), if the need for the search or rescue	
12	was cause	d by the person searched for or rescued unreasonably	
13	disregarding their safety by:		
14	(1)	Ignoring reasonably posted warnings;	
15	(2)	Leaving a hiking trail and entering state, county, or	
16		private property that is closed to the public, and	
17		reasonable notice of the closure is posted; or	
18	(3)	Entering a hiking trail that is closed to the public	
19		and reasonable notice of the closure is posted."

SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
begun before its effective date.

4 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed5 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
