A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CAREGIVERS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the coronavirus
disease 2019 pandemic strained the health care workforce
pipeline. While important initiatives to recruit and train new
professionals are underway, investment in programs that support
existing professional caregivers is needed. Support for unpaid
caregivers, such as family and friends, whose caregiving enables
people to live at home, is also needed.

8 The legislature also finds that several factors, including 9 burnout, an aging workforce and population, rising costs of 10 living, and greater demand for both institutional and at-home 11 patient care, have increased pressure on paid and unpaid 12 careqivers. The per cent of Hawaii's population seventy-five 13 years old and above is expected to double by 2045, from eight 14 per cent of the population to fifteen per cent. Supporting and 15 retaining existing formal and informal caregivers will be more important than ever as Hawaii's population continues to age. 16



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1 The legislature further finds that supporting caregivers in 2 both home and long-term care settings will ensure that people 3 receive appropriate, timely care. While there has been strong 4 investment in training new employees, there must also be an 5 investment in the existing workforce. It is imperative that new 6 candidates who believe in the mission of health care, and 7 especially in providing services for older adults in post-acute 8 care settings, are recruited and retained.

9 The legislature further finds that health care employers 10 and educators are competing with other industries to attract 11 residents to health care programs. A concerted effort to 12 maximize federal dollars to address the health care workforce 13 shortage by creating a robust workforce pipeline is a smart 14 investment that will attract more local students interested in a 15 self-sufficient career.

16 The purpose of this Act is to establish a caregiver 17 workforce support and development center to develop and expand 18 the State's long-term and home- and community-based caregiver 19 workforce to effectively care for Hawaii's aging population.



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1	SECTION 2. There is established within the executive	
2	office on	aging a caregiver workforce support and development
3	center. The center may:	
4	(1)	In consultation with members of the education and
5		health care industries, develop a comprehensive
6		statewide recruitment and retention campaign to
7		encourage more residents to enter the health care
8		workforce;
9	(2)	In consultation with appropriate organizations,
10		develop programs to educate and train informal
11		caregivers, including familial caregivers, to best
12		practice informal caregiving;
13	(3)	Provide professional development courses, including
14		relating to interviewing, management, and leadership,
15		for current employers and employees; and
16	(4)	Develop an active aging strategy to keep kupuna and
17		kupuna caregivers as healthy as possible.
18	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general	
19	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much	
20	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the	
21	same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year	



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2024-2025 for the establishment of a caregiver workforce support
and development center within the executive office on aging.
The sums appropriated shall be expended by the executive
office on aging for the purposes of this Act.

5 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
