SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE INSURANCE COMMISSIONER TO RESEARCH AND CONVENE STAKEHOLDER DISCUSSIONS TO CONSIDER THE CONCEPT OF A WILDFIRE INSURANCE COMPACT.

WHEREAS, the State is facing the increasing challenge of 1 2 wildfires, which has been exacerbated by climate change that is 3 responsible for more intense and more frequent extreme events 4 such as wildfires, storms, droughts, and floods; and 5 WHEREAS, wildfires pose significant risks to the health, 6 safety, and welfare of the State's residents, visitors, and 7 businesses; and 8 9 WHEREAS, on August 8, 2023, swift moving wildfires fueled 10 by dry grass and spread by strong winds from a passing hurricane 11 wiped out almost the entire town of Lahaina in west Maui, in the 12 nation's deadliest wildfire in more than a century; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, at least one hundred fifteen people lost their life in the fire, over two thousand two hundred buildings were 16 destroyed and another five hundred damaged, resulting in 17 property losses in the billions of dollars; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the impacts from the August 2023 Maui wildfire 20 were devastating to the west Maui community and have been felt 21 22 throughout the entire State; and 23 24 WHEREAS, the recovery is expected to be long and arduous; and 25 26 WHEREAS, the aftermath of the deadly August 2023 Maui 27 wildfire poses a significant strain on local insurance companies 28 and communities; and 29 30



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WHEREAS, there are concerns that the wildfires could 1 trigger insurance companies to reevaluate the risks associated 2 with offering coverage to homeowners in Hawaii, which has long 3 been considered a relatively stable market compared to other 4 5 states; and 6 WHEREAS, the increased risk of wildfires and the resulting 7 challenges for insurance companies means the State should 8 explore a coordinated approach to mitigate and manage these 9 risks; now, therefore, 10 11 12 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, the 13 House of Representatives concurring, that the Insurance 14 Commissioner is requested to research and convene stakeholder 15 discussions to consider the concept of a Wildfire Insurance 16 Compact with strategic partner states that have similar wildfire 17 risks or robust disaster management systems; and 18 19 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the research and discussions are requested to consider a Wildfire Insurance Compact that 21 focuses primarily on risk pooling and informational technology 22 23 sharing to mitigate and share the risks and costs associated 24 with wildfires; and 25 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Insurance Commissioner is requested to research and discuss with stakeholders any 27 28 necessary legislation that can assist in the funding of policies and programs available through a Wildfire Insurance Compact 29 30 through taxes or surcharges on existing taxes; and 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Insurance Commissioner is 32 requested to research and discuss with stakeholders policies and 33 programs offered by a Wildfire Insurance Compact that would 34 directly benefit vulnerable populations and communities; and 35 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Insurance 38 39 Commissioner.
