SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE OFFICE OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE DIRECTOR OF THE COURTS TO COLLECT, COMPILE, AND SHARE DATA ON THE ASSESSMENT OF FEES, COURT COSTS, FINES, AND RESTITUTION IN CASES AGAINST MINORS.

WHEREAS, research shows that charging fees, fines, costs, 1 and restitution to youth can be harmful to young people and 2 their families; and 3 4 WHEREAS, in the State, these consequences 5 disproportionately fall on Native Hawaiian, Pacific Islander, 6 and Black youth, who are more likely to be arrested, detained, 7 and unable to afford fees, fines, costs, and restitution; and 8 9 WHEREAS, although state law authorizes courts to charge 10 youth and their families a range of fees and fines, judges 11 across the state rarely impose such costs in practice; and 12 13 WHEREAS, according to data from the Office of Juvenile 14 Justice and Delinquency Prevention, fees and fines serve no 15 public safety function and may instead undermine public safety 16 by increasing the likelihood of youth recidivism; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, because youth cannot afford to pay restitution, crime survivors rarely see any compensation for harm they may 20 have experienced; and 21 22 WHEREAS, research from the Brennan Center for Justice in 23 its 2019 report "The Steep Costs of Criminal Justice Fees and 24 25 Fines" found that jurisdictions in the majority of states that assess fees, costs, fines, and restitution to youth spend more 26 money trying to collect those outstanding debts than they 27 28 receive in revenue; and 29 WHEREAS, there is a growing consensus that fees and fines 30 should not be assessed for actions taken in a person's youth, 31 regardless of the age or jurisdiction in which the person is 32



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adjudicated or sentenced, as illustrated in statements and 1 resolutions from judges, prosecutors, and the law enforcement 2 community, such as the National Council of Juvenile and Family 3 Court Judges' 2018 "Resolution Addressing Fines, Fees, and Costs 4 in Juvenile Courts", and the 2021 "Statement on Abolishing Youth 5 Fines and Fees" from Youth Correctional Leaders for Justice; and 6 7 WHEREAS, more than sixteen states throughout the country 8 have eliminated or prohibited the imposition of fees or fines, 9 or both, on young people and their families; and 10 11 WHEREAS, current data is needed to better understand the 12 statewide and county-specific imposition and impact of fees, 13 court costs, fines, and restitution on young people and their 14 families in the State; now, therefore, 15 16 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second 17 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2024, 18 that the Office of the Administrative Director of the Courts is 19 requested to collect, compile, and share data on the assessment 20 21 of fees, court costs, fines, and restitution in cases against minors; and 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the data is requested to 24 25 include: 26 The total and annual average amounts of fees, court 27 (1) costs, fines, and restitution that are assessed, 28 collected, waived, and outstanding in cases against 29 minors for each of the last five years, provided as a 30 statewide aggregate and by court circuit; and 31 32 For the circuit, family, and district courts in each 33 (2) judicial district, a description of each fee, court 34 cost, or fine that can be assessed in cases against 35 minors, and their respective amounts; and 36 37 38 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of the Administrative Director of the Courts is requested to submit a 39 report of its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no 40 later than forty days prior to the convening of the Regular 41 Session of 2025; and 42



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1 2 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of the Administrative Director of the Courts is requested to post the 3 report on the Judiciary's public website; and 4 5 6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of the 7 Administrative Director of the Courts is requested to provide a 8 copy of the report to the Judicial Council; and 9 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Judicial Council is requested to consult the report during the next Penal Code 11 12 review; and 13 14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Chief Justice of the Hawaii 15 Supreme Court and Administrative Director of the Courts. 16
