### Rep. Aquino Shares 2014 Legislative Highlights

The 2014 Legislature opened with the state's economy on the rise, tourism was strong and unemployment was down. However, lower than expected long-term revenue projections were forecasted by mid-session causing a more cautious approach in addressing the budget and planning how best to invest in current programs and projects, as well as making judicious investments in Hawaii's future.

This year I served as the Majority Policy Leader and was responsible for spearheading House Majority (Democrats) members in developing policies to be endorsed by the Democratic lawmakers. A successful partnership with the House and Senate Majority leaders resulted in a joint majority package of priorities for the 2014 legislative session.

The 2014 Democratic Majority Package focused on two key areas of statewide concern: Seniors and the Environment. The number of seniors over 60 in Hawaii grew by nearly 140 percent and seniors over 85 increased by more than 430 percent in the last 30 years. By 2035, the projection is Hawaii's seniors over 60 will make up nearly a third of the State's total population. Therefore, support for Hawaii's rapidly growing elderly population was deemed a priority. The Majority Package measures support healthy aging programs, increase public awareness of long-term care and address financial abuse of our kupuna.

Climate change and invasive species is a paramount challenge, posing both an urgent and long-term threat to the State's economy, sustainability, security, and way of life. Through the Majority Package, we passed measures to protect our environment and economy by planning for contingencies in the event of catastrophic consequences due to climate change and the eradication of invasive species.

For the first time since 2007, we raised the minimum wage to help our lowest wage earners. Lawmakers also approved a measure to assist the homeless and those at risk of becoming homeless. We increased funds allocated from the State's conveyance tax to the Rental Housing Trust Fund from 30 percent to 50 percent starting July 1 to help our young families who are struggling to make ends meet with their housing needs.

I am also pleased to announce the approval of over \$102 million in capital improvement project (CIP) funding for Waipahu (38th District), neighboring communities, statewide facilities and roadways. These projects address improvements to Waipahu schools, the Filipino Community Center, Leeward Community College, University of Hawaii's West Oahu Campus, as well as projects to address areas of public safety and transportation. #### **AGRICULTURE**

Invasive Species Council. Appropriates \$5,000,000 for Hawaii Invasive Species Council projects, including invasive species prevention, control, outreach, research, and planning. HB1716 (2014 Joint Majority Package)

### CONSUMER PROTECTION & COMMERCE

Cybersecurity; Cyber Resiliency. Establishes a Hawaii Cybersecurity Economic, Education, and Infrastructure Security Coordinator to assist with the development of methods to improve the State's cybersecurity and cyber resiliency. Appropriates \$200,000 for salary and operating expenses associated with establishing the Coordinator. HB2003 HD1 SD1 CD1

Kupuna; Financial and Investor Education. Appropriates \$50,000 for educational outreach to protect vulnerable kupuna based on the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affair's existing investor education programs, particularly in the areas of indexed annuities, life-settlement annuities, variable annuities, and Ponzi schemes. Financial Disclosure; Public Officers and Employees. Requires the financial disclosure statements of members of certain boards, commissions, and agencies to be made available for public inspection and duplication. SB2682 SD1 HD2 CD1

**State Plan; Economy; Innovation.** Incorporates the promotion and encouragement

of innovation and entrepreneurship into the policies, objectives, and priority guidelines of the Hawaii State Plan. SB2981 SD2 HD1 CD1

#### **EDUCATION**

Mandatory Kindergarten; Age Requirement. Makes kindergarten mandatory for children who will be at least five years of age on or before July 31 of the school year, beginning with the 2014-2015 school year, unless otherwise exempt. SB2768 SD2 HD2 CD1

#### ENERGY & ENVIRONMEN-TAL PROTECTION

Climate Change Adaptation; Sea Level Rise. Addresses climate change adaptation by establishing the Interagency Climate Adaptation Committee under the Department of Land and Natural Resources to develop a sea level rise vulnerability and adaptation report that addresses sea level rise impacts statewide to 2050. Tasks the Office of Planning with establishing and implementing strategic climate adaptation plans and policy recommendations using

the sea level rise vulnerability and adaptation report as a framework for addressing other statewide climate impacts identified under Act 286, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012. Appropriates a total of \$567,749 for staffing, resources, and the development of the report. HB1714 HD1 SD2 CD1 (2014 Joint Majority Package)

Advanced Grid Modernization; Renewable Energy. Amends the Public Utilities Commission's guiding principles regarding the modernization of the electric grid. HB1943 HD2 SD2 CD1

#### **HEALTH**

Executive Office on Aging; Long Term Care. Appropriates \$6,576,772 to the Department of Health for community-based services and programs for older persons. Requires the Department of Health Executive Office on Aging to conduct a public education and awareness campaign on long-term care and appropriates \$500,000 for this purpose. SB2346 SD1 HD2 CD1 (2014 Joint Majority Package)

Health Policy; Social Determinants of Health; Native Hawaiians; Pacific Islanders; Filipinos. Directs state agencies and officers to direct health-related planning activities toward achieving the elimination of health disparities by identifying and addressing social determinants of health by codifying the commitment to address health disparities in the Hawaii State Planning Act. HB1616 HD1 SD1

#### HOUSING

Conveyance Tax; Rental Housing Trust Fund. Supports Hawaii's affordable housing goals by restoring the allocation of 50% Conveyance Tax collections to the Rental Housing Trust Fund beginning July

#### **JUDICIARY**

Violation of Privacy in the First Degree; Disclosure of an Image or Video of Another with the Intent to Harm. Expands the offense of violation of privacy in the first degree to include knowingly disclosing an image or video of another identifiable person either in the nude or engaging in sexual conduct without the consent of the depicted person and with intent to harm substantially the depicted person. HB1750 HD1 SD1 CD1

**Habitual Property Crime.** Imposes a mandatory minimum term of one year

imprisonment upon conviction for the offense of habitual property crime. Author izes probation only for a first conviction of the offense of habitual property crime. HB2205 HD1 SD1 CD1

#### **HUMAN SERVICES**

Domestic Violence; Abuse of a Family or Household Member. Requires a police officer, after reasonable inquiry, to order a no-contact period of 48 hours upon the person whom the officer reasonably believes has inflicted physical abuse or harm upon a family or household member. Makes the commission of an act of physical abuse in the presence of a family or household member who is a minor under the age of fourteen a class C felony. HB1993 SD2 CD1

### LABOR & PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT

Minimum Wage. Increases the minimum wage rate to \$7.75 per hour beginning on January 1, 2015, \$8.50 per hour beginning on January 1, 2016, \$9.25 per hour beginning on January 1, 2017, and \$10.10 per hour beginning on January 1, 2018. Increases the tip credit to 50 cents per hour beginning on January 1, 2015, and 75 cents per hour beginning on January 1, 2016; provided that beginning January 1, 2015, the combined amount the employee receives in wages and tips is at least \$7 more than the applicable minimum wage. Human Trafficking Victim Services

human trafficking victims. Establishes human trafficking victim fees to be imposed upon persons convicted of labor trafficking and prostitution offenses. **HB2038 HD1 SD2 CD1** 

#### **PUBLIC SAFETY**

Temporary Fireworks Storage. Requires that permanent and temporary fireworks storage buildings or structures and buildings or facilities where redistribution activities are performed comply with currently adopted county building or fire codes or latest edition of nationally recognized standards, HB1664 HD1

Criminal History Record Checks; Volunteers. Allows qualified entities to conduct state and national fingerprintbased criminal history record checks on their applicants, employees, and volunteers who provide care for children, vulnerable adults, or individuals with disabilities, and to receive the results directly. HB2243 HD1 SD1 CD1

#### **TOURISM**

Transient Accommodations Tax; Allocation to Counties. Increases the cap on Transient Accommodations Tax revenues to \$103,000,000 to be distributed to the counties for the next two fiscal years. Establishes a working group to determine future county allocation ceiling amounts and the appropriate division of the provision of public services between the State and counties. HB1671 HD1 SD1 CD1

**Hawaii Tourism Authority.** Amends functions and requirements of the Hawaii Tourism Authority by, among other things, requiring a single-document Hawaii tourism

marketing plan; requiring the Authority to have a permanent, strong focus on Hawaii brand management; and authorizing the Authority to withhold competitively sensitive information from public disclosure.

#### **TRANSPORTATION**

Mobile Electronic Device; Operation of a Motor Vehicle. Amends the law prohibiting operation of a motor vehicle while using a mobile electronic device by adding an exemption for completely stopped drivers that have the engine off and are in a safe location out of the way of traffic, amending the definition of "operate," amending the penalties for violations, and deeming a violation to be a traffic infraction for which a flat-rate fine shall be imposed. #### **FINANCE**

**Budget**; Supplemental Appropriations. Adjusts appropriations for the operating and capital improvement costs for the Executive Branch for the 2013 – 2015 fiscal biennium. In total, this measure sets the Executive Branch budget at \$11,726,810,661 for Fiscal Year (FY) 2013-2014 and \$12,147,239,877 for FY 2014-2015. Of this total amount, \$5,944,324,439 for FY 2013-2014 and \$6,189,204,272 will come from anticipated general fund moneys. This supplemental budget measure adjusts the total appropriations for FY 2013-2014 by recapturing unexpended funds to achieve a reduction of \$92,507,527 in total appropriations, the majority of which is comprised of general funds. - \$15,000,000 in general funds for the Weighted Student Formula in School-Based Budgeting and \$3,000,000 in

general funds for early learning school readiness programs;

- \$9,191,840 general funds transfer from the Department of Health to the Department of Human Services to help consolidate and streamline payments and services between the Department of Health Adult Mental Health Division and the Department of Human Services' MedQuest Division for adults with severe and persistent mental illness;
- \$17,359,000 in special funds for the functions of State airports, including routine maintenance of baggage handling and explosives detection systems at the Honolulu International Airport and Kahului Airport, pavement-marking rehabilitation at eight airports, and Wiki Wiki bus services at the Honolulu International Airport;
- \$5,546,076 in general funds and \$2,956,860 in federal funds to adjust monthly foster rates to the three-tier age-based system and funding levels cited by the United States Department of Agriculture's Report, Expenditure on Children by Families;
- \$45,970,000 in special funds and \$9,200,000 in revolving funds for various programs at the University of Hawaii, Manoa; \$9,350,000 in special funds for various programs at the University of Hawaii, John A. Burns School of Medicine; and \$33,000,000 in capital improvement funds for the Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy facility at the University of Hawaii-Hilo; \$28,800,000 in capital improvement funds for University of Hawaii-West Oahu's Allied Health and Administration Building; and
- \$50,000,000 in special funds from Green Energy Market Securitization bond proceeds for the purposes of the Hawaii Green Infrastructure Loan Program. HB1700 HD1 SD1 CD1

### PHILIPPINES VISIT

In November 2013, the Philippines suffered a major disaster with Typhoon Haiyan (Yolanda). The city of Tacloban in the Leyte province was hit the hardest. At the invitation of the Consulate General of the Philippines Julius Torres, Rep. Aquino, as Chair of the House Committee on Public Safety, traveled to the Philippines to meet with government leaders in Metro Manila and Leyte. This visit was an opportunity to assess the recovery efforts in the typhoon-hit areas and share insight on emergency preparedness, disaster risk reduction and resiliency efforts. This initial meeting also provided the prospect for continued partnership to benefit Hawaii and the Philippines in the areas of public safety and emergency management. The Hawaii delegation also distributed first aid and hygiene kits donated by the Med-Assist Schools of Hawaii to the Tacloban community.
