H-I Freeway Rehabilitation Middle Street to Vicinity of Ward Avenue

From the State Department of Transportation **Goals:** Rehabilitation and resurfacing of freeway pavement across all lanes; upgrading of highway lighting, highway drainage and pavement markings, and re-striping improvements to add new through-lanes.

Schedule: Work is anticipated to begin in late summer 2013 and take one calendar year to complete. Work will be done during nighttime hours. Up to 120 nights of full closures will be necessary.
