Hawai'i Department of Health will hold weekly Dengue Fever informational sessions in Kona and Hilo

HSPAN's New On-Demand Channel

The Hawai'i State Legislature and 'Ōlelo Community Media unveiled a new statewide on-demand channel called HSPAN, dramatically increasing the coverage to the public. The new statewide on-demand channel is in addition to the live coverage by Capitol TV that airs on 'Ōlelo's Na Leo TV channel 49 and 54 on Hawai'i Island.

HSPAN's new on-demand channel will be a great way for rural communities to be involved in the inner workings of the Hawai'i State Legislature. HSPAN will help alleviate frustration by providing the residents of Hawai'i to watch all the meetings live and on-demand.

"It will increase the openness of the legislature as we move along," said House Speaker Joseph Souki.

To access the HSPAN on-demand go to channel 50. Select either the House or the Senate, and from here you may choose a committee and the hearing in the selected committee.

HSPAN is the first step towards the future of televising the government, with more updates to follow, including meetings with the Governor.

Office of Language Access (OLA)

People with Limited English Proficiency (LEP) are those that do not speak English as their primary language, and have a limited ability to read, write, and understand English. LEP persons may have difficulty obtaining services from state agencies or covered entities (organizations that receive state funding) because of their limited ability to read, write, speak, and understand the English language.

It's Hawai'i law that all residents have access to their agency's essential government services, programs, and activities.

The **Office of Language Access** (OLA) helps to ensure that LEP residents in Hawai'i are not denied reasonable access to essential government services, programs, and activities, such as social service programs, job training, employment assistance, or fair and impartial hearing.

On January 25, 2016, Governor Ige delivered his second State of the State address at the Hawai'i State Capitol. The governor addressed plans for redeveloping Kahili, the future of O'ahu Community Correctional Center, air conditioning in Hawai'i's public schools, affordable housing, and homelessness across the state. Governor Ige also spoke on the future of Hawai'i's State Hospital, agriculture, the environment, and innovation economy.
