## University of Hawaii-West Oahu Town Hall Meeting

On September 21, area residents attended a community meeting sponsored by myself and other area legislators with the University of Hawaii-West Oahu. The new Kapolei campus

for UH-West Oahu will be a very important part of our area. As the population on Oahu continues shifting westward, it is critical that our area has world-class educational opportunities that will lead to high-income jobs for our young people, and that is exactly what UH-West Oahu represents. As a center of innovation and education, UH-West Oahu also promises to be an economic driver for our region.

The September 21 meeting provided an opportunity for UH-West Oahu administrators to present information directly to the community. UH-West Oahu Chancellor Gene Awakuni gave a presentation, which is posted on my

Web site, <u>capitol.hawaii.gov/session2011/members/house/memberpage.aspx?member=har</u>. The new campus is scheduled to be open to students for the fall 2012 semester, and will begin accepting applications for the fall 2012 class by December.

UH-West Oahu, which currently enrolls about 1,600 students, will be able to accommodate up to 3,800 students in the new campus's first phase, and has plans to expand in the next five to ten years to up to 7,600 students and 600 faculty and staff. UH-West Oahu offers more than 20 degree programs and six certificate programs, including disaster preparedness/emergency management, Hawaiian-Pacific studies, elementary education, culinary management, health care administration and accounting. ### **Revised Redistricting Maps Approved**

After weeks of public hearings, the state reapportionment commission has approved a final set of redistricting maps for the Hawaii State House and Senate districts, viewable at <a href="hawaii.gov/elections/reapportionment/2011">hawaii.gov/elections/reapportionment/2011</a> legislative plan. Residents of the Villages of Kapolei, Kapolei Knolls, Kanehili and the west side of Makakilo Drive will stay in the district I currently represent, which will be renumbered as District 42. Those who reside to the east of Makakilo Drive will become part of District 41, currently represented by Rep. Ty Cullen. Royal Kunia will be part of District 36, along with areas currently represented by Rep. Ryan Yamane. Residents of Kalaeloa will become part of District 44, currently represented by Rep. Karen Awana. Keep in mind, however, that the maps may shift somewhat if any legal challenges are successful. It has been a privilege to serve all of my constituents, and I look forward to continuing to advocate for all of West Oahu, should I be elected in 2012 to serve the newly drawn 42nd District.

## **Innovative Biorefinery Facility Breaks Ground in Kapolei**

On August 30, I was honored to attend the groundbreaking for UOP Honeywell's integrated biorefinery in Kapolei. As our state continues to move towards a goal of 70 percent renewable energy sources by the year 2030, we are constantly looking for innovative technologies that will help us achieve that goal and reduce our dependence on imported oil, and this new facility has the potential to help us make great strides toward that goal. This demonstration unit will

use biomass feedstocks from forestry, agricultural and algae residuals to produce green transportation fuels that reduce greenhouse gas emissions by more than 60 percent.

The Honeywell UOP facility was funded in part by a grant from the U.S. Department of Energy, and demonstrates the importance of private-public partnerships to help solve some of the most pressing issues facing our state and our nation. Moreover, 85 jobs will be created during peak construction, with 40 jobs sustained for the duration of the pilot project. I look forward to the critical role this facility will play in our domestic biofuels industry and the creation of new green jobs in Kapolei, our state, and our country.
