District 40 Schools Receive More Than \$2 Million in Repair Funding

As part of \$65.5 million released to the Department of Education for repair and maintenance projects to nearly 250 public schools and DOE facilities across the state, Kapoleiarea schools will receive more than \$2 million in funds for repair projects.

Funding these projects will improve the safety and comfort of our keiki, teachers and school staff, allowing them to better focus on instruction and learning – which is why I have advocated for these funds for our schools. I am very pleased that schools in the Kapolei area will have the funding needed to address some of their repair and maintenance needs. Moreover, these projects will also create jobs and opportunities for our residents in the construction industry.

Planned projects include sidewalk repairs, reroofing, ventilation and ceiling fan improvements, sprinkler system upgrades, replacing light fixtures, air conditioning improvements, repairs to plumbing and other various structural improvements. Total funding released for Kapolei-area schools is \$2,026,000:

- Barbers Point Elementary (\$646,000)
- Kalei`opu`u Elementary (\$97,000)
- Kapolei Elementary (\$285,000)
- Kapolei Middle School (\$332,000)
- Makakilo Elementary (\$364,000)
- Mauka Lani Elementary (\$302,000)

Kapolei Judiciary Complex Renamed the Ronald T.Y. Moon Judiciary Complex

On August 27, 2010, the new Kapolei Judiciary Complex was formally renamed in honor of retiring Hawaii Supreme Court Chief Justice Ronald T.Y. Moon.

Chief Justice Moon served as Hawaii's Supreme Court Chief Justice from March 31, 1993 until August 31, 2010, when he left the court, due to the state's constitutional mandate that judges retire at age 70.

I was honored to attend the renaming ceremony, along with many members of the judiciary, community leaders and elected officials, including U.S. Senator Daniel Inouye and U.S. Senator Daniel Akaka. As a Korean-American attorney, it has been a wonderful privilege to have Chief Justice Moon, the nation's first state supreme court chief justice of Korean descent, as a mentor and friend. His work at a national level to bring equality and diversity to our state courts has made him an inspiration to the Korean-American community and many others.

The \$5 registration fee will be waived for those who donate five canned goods to the Project Daily Bread food drive. Yu-gi-oh tournament registration starts at 8 a.m., and games begin at 9 a.m.

state Supreme Court, Chief Justice Moon worked tirelessly to bring about the construction of a judiciary center in the "Second City," not only to alleviate overcrowding in Honolulu facilities, but to bring better access to the courts for the residents of West Oahu. In particular, he felt strongly that bringing the Family Court to West Oahu would bring improved judicial access to the growing number of families in our area who need it most. The Kapolei Judiciary Complex will be one of Chief Justice Moon's greatest legacies, and that is why the legislature, believing that renaming the complex was an appropriate honor, passed a resolution this session recommending that change.

The judiciary complex opened earlier this year and was officially dedicated in May. The Ronald T.Y. Moon Judiciary Complex houses the Family Court of the First Circuit, the Waianae District Court and a juvenile detention facility. The courthouse features one courtroom capable of jury trials and 12 non-jury courtrooms.
