Legislature is at 2/3rd mark

The Legislature is at its 2/3rd mark, called 'second crossing' where House bills were agreed upon or amended by the Senate, and vise versa for Senate bills. Here are a few of the items which are still alive:

- ***Tax rebate** \$300 per person for people with incomes under \$100,000/year and \$100 per person for those over \$100,000/year.
- *Retirement saving plan A payroll deduction retirement saving plan [like a 401-K] is moving with a \$500 incentive to the first 50,000 people who join this saving plan. The State of Hawaii will create the saving plan structure and hence private employers will not have the financial and administrative burden of creating a company saving plan. Investment options managed by private sector financial advisors will be chosen by each enrollee.
- * \$600 million for Hawaiian Home Lands is still alive.
- * **Red Hill** A \$1.5 million emergency appropriation to Department of Health is moving, along with House Resolutions asking the U.S. Navy to decommission the Red Hill fuel tanks, to store the fuel away from the acquirer and to pay for all costs incurred by the State and the Board of Water Supply associated with this matter.
- * **Minimum wage** The House and Senate have agreed upon \$18/hour as the goal for a multi-year minimum wage increase, but disagree on the speed and size of incremental increases. The House position is to reach \$18 by 2028; the Senate position is to reach \$18 by 2026.
- * Adult dental services for Medicaid Currently, adults under Medicaid do not have dental services. The Governor proposed adding minimal dental cleaning; the House is aiming for a higher level of dental services. With Medicaid, state funds are matched more than 1-to-1 by federal funds.
- *Mauna Kea The House proposal to transfer management of Mauna Kea from the University of Hawaii to a new entity is still alive. This proposal could have dire impacts of astronomy, which has a \$110 million impact in Hawaii, bigger than both the coffee and macadamia nut industries combined. [I voted against this transfer.]
- *Leahi land transfer to DHHL-Transfer of UH parcel between Leahi Hospital and Diamond Head Theatre to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands.
