

# H-1 Freeway Lane Striping Demonstration Project

The Hawaii Department of Transportation (HDOT) has started lane striping modifications on the H-1 Freeway as a demonstration project in the Kaimuki area. Three left lanes were closed on September  $7^{th}$  and  $8^{th}$  between the  $2^{nd}$  Avenue Pedestrian Bridge and the  $6^{th}$  Avenue Overpass.

The striping modifications will install black lane stripes to increase contrast between the existing white lane striping and the white concrete surface, making the lane dividers more visible. If the demonstration striping proves beneficial, the black lane striping will be installed in both directions between 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue and the Waialae Viaduct at a future date. This technique is commonly used in other states to increase land divider visibility.

HDOT advises motorists to drive with caution through the area while familiarizing themselves with the new lane striping.

# Kapiolani Community College Culinary Arts School Update

The Kapiolani Community College (KCC) Culinary Institute of the Pacific at Diamond Head project will be developed in two phases. Phase I, which was hoped to be in the \$10-22 million range, came in at \$34 million. As a result, the scope of the project in Phase I has been reduced to include two teaching laboratories, one classroom complex, and one office complex. The other two teaching laboratories and a separate classroom building were eliminated.

Phase II includes the restaurant and auditorium but the administration building was eliminated. The architects have revised the bid documents to meet the reduced scope and these have been submitted to the U.S. Department of Commerce - Economic Development Administration (EDA). The EDA had some comments which required minor changes to the bid documents.

The pre-bid meeting will be held on September 29, 2014 at 1:30 p.m. in the Ohia Building, Rm. 118.

### **Diamond Head Fort Ruger Pathway Phase 2**

Construction has begun to complete the Fort Ruger Pathway from across the American Red Cross Building to the 22<sup>nd</sup> Avenue vicinity. The Pathway will be landscaped with native Hawaiian trees, and three areas along the Pathway will have "park oasis" with more landscaping clustered around picnic tables and rest areas. In addition, the Pathway will have interpretive signs to tell the story of Fort Ruger and the history of the area. The construction should last six months, from September 2014 to March 2015.

The Fort Ruger Pathway is an accessible 12 foot walkway along the exterior slope of Diamond Head State Monument. The Pathway provides a safer, more attractive alternative to the narrow sidewalk along Diamond Head Road. The funding for the Phase 2 work on the Pathway come from Capital Improvement Project (CIP) funds and from a grant from the Hawaii Tourism Authority. When completed, the Fort Ruger Pathway will encompass 12 acres, and about 2/3 of a mile in length. The Pathway begins near the entrance of the old Cannon Club site on Diamond Head Road, and ends near Diamond Head Road and  $22^{nd}$  Avenue.

### **Diamond Head Interpretive Kiosk and Gift Shop**

The Diamond Head Interpretive Kiosk and Gift Shop inside the crater, near the beginning of the trail to the Diamond Head summit, opened on July 8, 2014. The shop will be selling, t-shirts, caps, key chains, books, water bottles, and other Diamond Head State Monument – related merchandise. The Gift Shop will also sell certificates for those completing the hike to the summit. Proceeds from the sales will go to the Diamond Head Park Special Fund. The Interpretive Kiosk and Gift Shop is a collaborative project with Pacific Historic Parks, a non-profit organization that has provided interpretive services and operated a gift shop at Pearl Harbor for the National Parks Service for over 33 years.

Acceptable items to recycle include: scrap metal, bicycles, appliances, 3 propane tanks, 3 fire extinguishers, computers, printers, scanners, 1 TV per car, HI-5 beverage containers, used household cooking oil, cell phones, printer cartridges, PDAs, batteries, usable clothing and household items, used eye glasses and hearing aids. *They CANNOT ACCEPT: Tires, paint, microwave ovens, motor oil, hazardous fluids, cardboard, paper, plastics, wood, and bulky items.*
