

SENIORS - FIVE TIPS TO PROTECT YOUR MONEY

- 1. Check the registration and background of the individual selling the investment by contacting the DCCA Securities Compliance Branch at 586-2722. Anyone selling a security must be registered. Remember no registration, no sale.
- Do your homework ask questions and do your research about the investment. Don't rely on reputation or word of mouth alone.
- 3. Beware of promises that promote high or unrealistic returns in a short period of time.
- 4. Beware of investments promoting no downside or risk. All investments have some degree of risk.
- 5. Beware of vague or over complicated explanations of how the business runs and how money is made. If you don't understand how it works, do not buy it.

APRIL 2014 LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The following is an all too short list of bills still alive as of early April:

HB 1678: Exempting some residences from historic preservation review. Currently, about half of all residences in the 19th district are older than 50 years and need historic preservation review prior to getting a building permit, even if the residence has been rebuilt and would not qualify as a historic property. This bill would provide exemptions and reduce the State and City and County permitting workload.

HB 1866 and SB3122: These two Kakaako development bills are still alive. HB 1866 would reduce powers of the State's Kakaako Authority and building heights. SB 3122 would allow the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) to develop residential high-rises in Kakaako Makai (makai of Ala Moana Blvd). The House and Senate have big differences in Kakaako development.

<u>Kupuna [senior] care: Still alive.</u> Bert is most interested in home-based care to keep seniors living at home for as long as possible and avoid going to nursing homes. [Bert wrote the "nursing homes without walls" law in 1982, Hawaii's first home-based care program.]

Reducing invasive species like fire ants and coqui frogs: Still alive. Especially important with recent discovery of fire ants and coqui frogs on Oahu.
