Important Legislation Introduced by Rep. Onishi

HB 2532 (Invasive Species)	HB 2577 (Ranch Leases)
Appropriates funds to the Department of Agriculture for its efforts to mitigate and control two-line spittlebug infestations in the State.	Clarifies that agriculture activities in non-agriculture park lands may include the care and production of pasture lands. Requires the transfer of certain lands from the DLNR to the DOA. Requires reports to the Legislature on compliance with the land transfers.
HB 2578 (Banyan Drive)	HB 2534 (Prosecutors Office)
Authorizes the designation of areas or regions of public lands classified as commercial, industrial, resort and hotel, and the establishment and implementation of guidelines for the redevelopment of the areas and regions. Designates the public lands on the Waiakea Peninsula on the island of Hawai'i as the Waiakea Peninsula Redevelopment District.	Making an appropriation to the office of the prosecuting attorney for the County of Hawaii. Appropriates funds for the career criminal prosecution unit of the office of the prosecuting attorney of the county of Hawaii.

Waiakea Uka Community Center Funding:

For many years Rep. Onishi has been advocating to get funding to improve the Waiakea Uka Gymnasium and parking lot. His most recent Capital Improvement Project request for this legislative session would cover costs, at a 3:1 ratio of State funding to County funding, for a new parking lot and plans, designs and construction of a new community center, and the relocation of the lower ballfield with a new parking lot. All these improvements will help to create a safe surrounding environment for those who enjoy the use of the gymnasium and park.

2020 Legislative Session: Postponed

The Legislature plans to recess indefinitely beginning March 17th, 2020 with concerns that public gatherings could spread the Covid-19 virus. The resolution (SCR 242) introduced by the Speaker of the House Scott Saiki and the Senate President Ronald Kouchi allows for legislators to decide when it is safe to begin the session again. The resolution cites the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's restriction of public gatherings of 50 or more people and at President Trump's press conference urging to limit gatherings to no more than 10 people. Saiki and Kouchi also announced that Governor Ige has enough reserve funds for all emergencies Covid-19 related. Being the Tourism Committee Chair, I have been appointed to the Covid-19 Economic and Financial Preparedness Committee that will continue to meet, discuss, and address all issues with this global pandemic. To all my loyal constituents and residents of the Big Island please be safe and do your best to practice social distancing.
