Safe and Sound Initiative Aims to Reduce Crime in Waikiki

Last month saw the official launch of the Safe and Sound Waikiki initiative, a program led by the Office of the Prosecuting Attorney, that brings together city and state partners, law enforcement, community businesses, residents and other stakeholders to coordinate efforts to reduce crime. The goal of the program is to identify and prosecute repeat and violent offenders, possibly through geographic restrictions that keep out of the area.

A combination of public and private funds in the amount of \$300k has been also allocated to the program, which also includes a job training and mentorship component for at risk youth, and better access to services to address mental health and drug addiction. ABC Stores donated \$90 to fund a coordinator's position, and the Steering Committee for Safe and Sound Waikiki is being chaired by the Waikiki Business Improvement District Association.

GET UPDATED ON AVAILABLE VACCINES AND BOOSTERS

Last month, the FDA issued Emergency Use Authorization for the bivalent COVID-19 boosters, which are designed specifically to protect against the original Covid-19 strain as well as the Ba.4 and Ba.5 Omicron subvariants, which are the most common forms of Covid-19 in Hawaii accounting for an estimated 91% of cases. The Healer Stones of Kapaemahu
