RETURN TO LEARN

The Department of Education (DOE) is working with state and federal agencies to develop guidelines to safely reopen schools in the fourth quarter of SY2020-21. They have released the following learning model recommendations based on cases by island.

7-day Daily Average per 100,000 population, by Island*	Percent Positivity	Consider the Following Learning Model
0-2.0	0-0.99%	In-person learning
2.1-5.0	1.0%-2.49%	In-person learning for elementary students; blended learning for secondary students
5.1-10.3	2.5%-5.0%	Blended learning for students
10.4-15.4	5.1%-7.5%	Blended learning for elementary students; learning from home for secondary students
15.5+	>7.5%	Learn from home

- Sports/ Athletics: Starting March 8th, schools have been allowed to start athletic workouts and practices in accordance with the DOE's guidelines and four phases of activity. To be eligible, schools must either have an in-person or blended model of learning and the contact and equipment activity must align with their island's placement on DOE's learning model matrix (depicted above). This plan applies to athletic workouts and practices only, not interscholastic competitions.
- Limited, In-Person Commencement Events: On Feb. 25th, the DOE limited, released quidelines allowing for in-person commencement and transition ceremonies. Ceremonies must be held outdoors or with adequate ventilation, graduates will be allowed to bring up to two household members as guests, and large schools are encouraged to seek alternative options if unable to host a safe, inperson ceremony.



In January of 2021, COVID-19 cases were at an all-time high; however, the cases have been steadily decreasing since. As of mid-March, over 118,000,000 COVID-19 vaccines have been administered across the country. Of those doses, 518,000 were administered in the state of Hawai'i.

Maui is receiving an increasing amount of the Moderna, Pfizer, and Johnson & Johnson vaccines, and the state will continue to administer the vaccine until everyone who wants a vaccine receives it.



KEY ISSUES

HOUSING



HB1376 HD2

Relating to failure to pay rent.

Amends a landlord's remedy for a tenant's failure to pay rent by: extending the period for a notice of rental agreement termination,

specifying the notice's required contents, requiring landlords to provide the notice to mediation centers for free mediation and to enter if scheduled, delaying action filing if mediation is scheduled, and restricting when landlords may bring a summary proceeding for possession dependent on the amount of rent due.

HB79 HD1

Relating to affordable homeownership.

Provides homeownership opportunities for low-income families by establishing a revolving fund to provide loans to nonprofit community development financial institutions and nonprofit housing development organizations for the development of affordable homeownership housing projects.

EDUCATION

HB613 HD2

Relating to the Department of Education.

Ensures school-level DOE employees

remain employed through an emergency appropriation for fiscal year 2020-2021 from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSER funds) to offset budget reductions that would result in the reduction of personnel subject to a collective bargaining agreement and who are employed at the school

HB940 HD2

Relating to elders and vulnerable adults.

Requires certain securities industry professionals to report suspected financial exploitation of elders and

vulnerable adults to the Commissioner of Securities and to delay disbursement or transactions. Provides administrative and civil liability immunity for such reports and/or delays.

ENVIRONMENT

HB552 HD1

Relating to clean ground transportation goals.

Establishes staggered clean ground

transportation goals for state agencies until achieving a 100% light-duty motor vehicle clean fleet by Dec. 31, 2035. Requires agencies to, when feasible and cost-effective, purchase vehicles that reduce dependence on petroleum-based fuels and to purchase construction materials that reduce the carbon footprint.

ACT 1. RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT SECURITY

HB1278 HD1 quickly made its way through the Hawai'i State House of Representatives and State Senate and was recently signed into law as Act 1 by Governor David Ige on March 2, 2021.

This bill will bring much needed unemployment insurance relief to employers and small businesses across the state by reducing employer contribution rates. Without these protections, struggling businesses would face the highest rate, Schedule H, at a time when they can least afford it. By lowering the rate to Schedule D, the Legislature intends to help our local economy stay afloat without layoffs or other cost-cutting measures that would negatively affect workers.
