UNITED NATIONS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME TAPS SEN. ENGLISH TO TRAIN NEW MARSHALL ISLANDS GOVERNMENT

In late January, Senator English was invited to speak and share his knowledge at an Induction Seminar for Senators of the new Nitijela (Parliament) for the Republic of the Marshall Islands. The Induction Seminar was intended to support the newly elected legislature by identifying how to better use parliamentary procedures to support improved delivery of Government services.

The workshop was organized by the Nitijela Secretariat, with support from the United Nations Development Programme, (UNDP) Pacific Centre. Sen. English and Charmaine Rodrigues, Pacific Regional Governance Advisor for UNDP, facilitated the Induction Seminar. The UNDP is the United Nations' global development network, an organization advocating for change and connecting countries to knowledge, experience and resources to help people build a better life. The UNDP exists in 177 countries working with them on their own solutions to global and national development challenges.

The Republic of the Marshall Islands' Induction Seminar provided opportunities for Nitijela Members to share knowledge, experiences and ideas on how to effectively use the parliamentary process to move the national development goals

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LONG AWAITED FIBER OPTIC CABLE COMING TO HANA

After hearing numerous complaints about cable and internet disruptions in Hana, Senator English met with Bob Barlow, President of Oceanic Time Warner Cable earlier this month to find out what exactly was going on.

Mr. Barlow explained there was an intermittent technical problem which was extremely difficult to identify that impacted both video and internet connections. He believes the issue has now been resolved and was happy to include that Hana may soon get increased internet speeds as Oceanic has begun the initial engineering plans to replace their current microwave system and install fiber optic cable.

"At the time Oceanic began servicing the Hana area, the difficulty of the terrain coupled with Hana's remote location made microwave the only viable option. Unfortunately this technology limits the broadband speeds and services Oceanic can deliver," says Bob Barlow, "The Broadband Opportunities Technology Program stimulus money the State of Hawaii recently received has made it possible to finally bring fiber optic cable to Hana."

Mr. Barlow also noted that the improvements accompanying the installation of the new cable will mean that Oceanic will not only be able to significantly improve the reliability of their system

serving Hana, but will also be able to deliver all the services that other areas of Maui have been able to receive. Additional video channels including more High Definition services and Digital Phone service will be available. More importantly, Oceanic's Road Runner broadband service will replace microwave.

After meeting with Mr. Barlow, Sen. English invited Mr. Barlow to visit Hana to ensure that he is aware of how much of an impact the installation of the fiber optic cable will have on the community. Mr. Barlow said he looks forward to visiting Hana in the near future and is excited about getting this project completed as soon as possible. Preliminary engineering has begun on the fiber route and the project is projected to be completed in the first half of 2013.

Senator Speaks at Forum on Micronesian Issues in Hawai'i

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SEN. ENGLISH CONGRATULATES HAWAIIAN AIRLINES AT AWARD CEREMONY



Senate Committee on Transportation and International Affairs Chair, J. Kalani English applauded Hawaiian Airlines for earning the first-ever aviation based carbon credits. Hawaiian Airlines reduced its carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions by nearly 22,000 metric tons over the past six years using an innovative, eco-friendly engine washing technology developed by Pratt & Whitney.

"I congratulate Hawaiian Airlines for being a leader in the aviation industry through this significant achievement in being environmentally friendly," said Sen. English, "Hawaiian has demonstrated great efforts in being progressive in its green initiatives."

A carbon credit is a verified means of measuring the reduction of industrial CO2 emissions from the environment, with one credit equal to the removal of one ton of CO2. Hawaiian Airlines' earning of carbon credits has been quantified and certified under the Verified Carbon Standard, the world's leading independent standard for the measurement and verification of greenhouse gas emissions and the creation of carbon credits.

The engine washing technology has saved the company more than 2.5 million gallons of fuel, along with an estimated 26,000 gallons of water that would have been used with traditional washing methods. Hawaiian Airlines' engine washing program is part of a broader continuous effort to mitigate high fuel costs and their impact on its customers.

Hawaiian Airlines implements green initiatives, including recycling of waste materials and use of renewable and biodegradable resources in onboard meal packaging and utensils.

"Future generations will definitely benefit from what Hawaiian Airlines is doing today to be earth-friendly," said Sen. English.
