

In addition to the improvement of highways and airports on Hawai'i Island, the following funds have been allocated towards projects in local school districts, in result of Sen Kahele's contributed efforts. The following districts received the following funds; Hilo with \$3,635,000, Kaumana with \$288,000, Ha'aheo with \$343,000, Waiakea with \$1,608,000, and Keaukaha with \$67,000.

- Enter your bill number in the "Bill Status/Measure Status" box, located on the upper left side.



3. Below is an example of a status sheet from last year's legislative session. The status sheet provides a wealth of information about each bill.



- 4. By clicking on the bill number on the very top, you will be able to view the most current version of the bill.
- 5. Below the bill number will be a brief summary of the bill, followed by the progress of the bill.
- 6. On the right hand column, you will be able to view all versions of the bill, committee reports, testimonies submitted, as well as the hearing notices.
- 7. When a bill is scheduled for hearing, a "Submit Testimony" button will appear to the right of the bill number. By clicking on this button, you will be able to submit your testimony.

Ohia Lehua Forests Epidemic | Stop the Dengue Outbreak!

We need to share the sad news of the Ohia Lehua forest decline on Hawai'i Island to bring awareness to a few key issues. As many of you know the Lehua's beauty is irresistible and irreplaceable, any negligent behavior to Ohia tress is considered unacceptable. This encompasses breaking branches, hitting trees, picking Lehua flowers recklessly. We all need to recognize the mission of perpetuating the growth of the Ohia Lehua forests that provides a wealth of positive impacts for the island.

Without Ohia Lehua Forests we may face many arising issues. The County of Hawai'i Department of Water Supply is concerned about the quality and quantity of water flowing from the mountains. Another resulting issue is the rapid decline of bird species and total bird populations within dead forests or dying areas. The contributing culprit, known as shoestring root rot, is a fungus. This particular fungus is wind-borne, but cannot infect healthy trees.

FIGHT THE BITE PREVENATIVE STEPS:

- ⇒ Use mosquito netting over beds, and screens on windows and doorways.
- Use mosquito repellents and wear appropriate clothing such as long-sleeved shirts and long pants that reduce exposure to mosquito bites.
- Eliminate standing water in buckets, old tires, puddles, or fix leaky faucets.
- Repair broken screens and windows to keep mosquitoes out.

IMPORTANT UPDATE:

⇒ While many healthcare providers do not provide free dengue testing, the Department of Health (DOH) does offer free testing.
