Hawai'i State Senate: 2

In 2007, the Hawai'i State Senate took action on the issues most important to our community, passing bills that touch on the most important areas of our lives, from helping our families to protecting our environment, and from increasing access to quality health care to helping to address our state's housing crisis.

Our measure of success is in how we helped you, the communities that have entrusted the Senate with your well-being.

Families

Hawai'i's families have long been, and will continue to be, among our highest priorities. From keiki to kupuna, our families will find support and increased protection in the bills we passed this session.

Keiki

The health of our children must remain a top priority. The **Keiki Care bill, HB1008**, will ensure that every child in Hawai'i is covered by health insurance.

HB1830 creates a **Newborn Safe Haven** by providing immunity from prosecution for any person who leaves a newborn at a hospital, fire station

or police station, or with emergency services personnel, within 72 hours of birth

In addition, **HB55** establishes a statewide youth suicide early intervention and prevention program to help address a concern that claims the lives of more children and young adults each year than cancer, heart disease, AIDS, birth defects, stroke, and chronic lung disease combined.

Kupuna

Elderly pedestrians, age sixty-five and older, account for the highest number of pedestrian fatalities in Hawai'i when compared to all other age groups. The legislature sought to improve pedestrian safety by passing SB1191, which will improve pedestrian safety by providing funds to the Department of Transportation to work with nonprofit organizations and the counties to take steps for immediate action to make crosswalks and roadways safer.

Many Hawai'i families shoulder the responsibility of helping care for our elders. **SB1916 strengthens the support of family caregivers** by, among other things, extending the joint legislative committee on family caregiving, and providing additional funds to expand the services of the kupuna care program.

Community

Strengthening our community often means focusing our attention on those who need our help in overcoming adversity.

Families receiving low-income housing assistance will be able to move a step closer to the dream of home ownership with the help of **HB1007**, which exempts these families' **self-sufficiency escrow accounts** from asset tests used to determine eligibility for public benefit programs administered by the Department of Human Services.

As part of an effort to combat recidivism and reintegrate former criminal offenders into the community, SB932 establishes a community reentry program to offer educational, treatment, and intervention services that are accessible during and immediately after their incarceration.

Health Care

Prescription drugs have become an increasingly important part of health care, especially among older adults. **HB1359**, known as the "Hawaii Prescription Drug Affordability Act of 2007," seeks to **reduce the cost of prescription drugs** for Hawai'i's uninsured, underinsured, low-income, elderly, and disabled residents.

The legislature has taken action to ensure that healthcare services remain available in our rural areas. HB843 and SB1260 allow the Hawai'i Health Systems Corporation to acquire Kahuku Hospital on negotiated terms. To help alleviate physician shortages in rural and other medically underserved areas, HB1477 creates a Rural Primary Healthcare Training Program, with the goal of meeting these communities' needs in a culturally sensitive and medically appropriate manner.

Tax Relief

Certain low-income residents, those who most need our support,

will receive a mandatory tax credit up to \$160 under SB148, pursuant to the requirements of the Hawai'i State Constitution. Similarly, a graduated food/excise tax credit for low- to middle-income residents provided by SB1882 will help to ensure that those with lower income will receive greater relief. New brackets and credit amounts more accurately reflect the current needs and incomes of those trying to pay for basic necessities.

Education

This session, the legislature approved nearly \$500 million to support education. Schools all over our state will benefit from an increase in funding for repair and maintenance and much needed electrical upgrades.

To help provide qualified teachers in hard-to-fill positions, **HB777** expands the **Hawai'i Educator Loan Program** to help support students and teachers who make a commitment to teaching in qualifying schools.

SB885 establishes the Career and Technical Education Program within the Department of Education, and establishes or expands numerous other programs in areas such as Agriculture Education; Excellence Through Sci-

ence and Technology; Robotics and Problem-Based, Applied Learning; and Business/Education Internship and Mentorship.

Housing

The homeless and affordable housing crises continue to be two of the State's most significant and challenging social problems. The Omnibus Housing Bill, SB1917, provides funding for homeless shelters and transitional housing programs and services.

In addition, the bill supports longterm solutions to our housing challenges by providing funding for a census, interviews, and homeless best**practice solutions** for the Waianae Coast homeless population; requiring the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation to create an affordable housing inventory registry; extending the sunset date for the allocation of the conveyance tax to the rental housing trust fund; providing funding for various affordable and public housing programs; and requiring counties to adopt rules to allow for the construction of indigenous Hawaiian structures.

Environment

We all share a responsibility to preserve our natural environment. HB226 puts Hawai'i at the forefront of our nation in reducing the emission of greenhouse gasses, by establishing limits at or below emission levels in 1990, and creating a greenhouse gas emissions task force to prepare a work plan and regulatory scheme that will help us achieve these goals.

To help reduce our dependence on petroleum-based energy and the damage it can cause to our environment, **HB1003** establishes the **Hawai'i Natural Energy Institute** at the University of Hawai'i, and creates the Energy Development Special Fund for the development of renewable energy and energy-efficient technologies.

The needs of our state are growing in complexity. The past session has allowed the Senate to touch upon many of these areas. Experience again showed that while our challenges may be many, the solutions can be as close as our commitment to listening to the voice of the people, and maintaining the legislature's focus on our common goals.

Kawai Nui Marsh

The Rebirth of an Ecological Treasure

On June 30, 2007, hundreds gathered at Kaha Park to celebrate the end of a 17 year dispute over Kawai Nui Marsh, and to offer blessings for its rebirth in the coming months and years.

Upon taking office, Senator Tokuda made it her top priority to seek a resolution to this long standing dispute. After meeting with all parties, they agreed with her approach to come together and work with a neutral third party negotiator to come to a resolution. After months of working with the parties and the negotiating team, Senator Tokuda was pleased to announce that the City and State signed an agreement over the marsh in early April.

"Thanks to Senator Tokuda, all parties felt comfortable coming together to focus on finding common ground for the good of our community. Her leadership and the good faith effort of all parties involved allowed us to succeed where we had previously failed," stated Mitch D'Olier, CEO of Kaneohe Ranch.

HB1899, HD2, SD2, CD1 codifies into law the agreement set forth by the city and the state and puts into place maintenance responsibilities and funding for the marsh and the levee system. As the conference chair for this bill, Senator Tokuda worked with the Representatives Ito and Chong on this bill and

ensured that \$920,000 was included in the biennium budget as requested by DLNR

Credit must be given to the countless community organizations that have kept the dream of Kawai Nui Marsh alive for over 30 years. Visionaries like Doc Burrows and the Kawai Nui Heritage Foundation, Ahahui Malama i ka Lokahi, the Kailua Hawaiian Civic Club, Kailua Historical Society, Hawaii's Thousand Friends, the Hawaii Audubon Society, and the Windward

Ahapuaa have all worked to maintain the marsh in the absence of an agreement. It is thanks to their dedication and perseverance that we are at this point today.

ACE INTERNSHIP

As a way to provide young leaders with valuable work experience and exposure to the legislative process, Senator Tokuda created a paid internship program in her office for Windward Oahu high school students.

"A Capitol Experience" or ACE internship gives students an opportunity to gain a first hand understanding of government and advocate on behalf of issues they care about--an opportunity Senator Tokuda had as a student intern in the legislature.

This year's interns were Beatrice "Tippe" Morlan, a senior at Castle High School and Sommerset Wong, a junior at Kamehameha Schools. Tippe focused on issues relating to education and worked on Senator Tokuda's Art Review (STAR) Program to feature work in the capitol created by Castle High School students. Sommerset focused on road safety and our Kapaa Quarry Road Safety Task Force Resolution (SCR155).
