Dear Chair Lee and members of the Committee,

The State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) **STRONGLY OPPOSE** H.B. 1807 H.D.2 which amends the Works of Art Special Fund and specifies that the Works of Art Special Fund's one per cent transfer requirement shall apply only to capital improvement appropriations for the original construction of state buildings.

H.B. 1807 H.D.2 changes the intent of the percent for art law from "one per cent of all state fund appropriations for construction or renovation of state buildings" to only "original construction," effectively deleting all qualifying construction and renovation funds for existing buildings. This cut would forever change Hawaii's culture and arts landscape for the worse.

Per HRS 103-8.5, the Art in Public Places Program does more than furnish art in state buildings. Designating 1% appropriations from both construction and renovation from all projects provides a consistent funding base to carry out the intent of HRS 103-8.5 Works of Art Special Fund. Together, 1% appropriations from all qualifying construction and renovation enable SFCA to carry out the statewide program which includes acquisition and distribution of works of art, conservation of an aging exterior public art collection, interpretation of the collection, the Hawaii State Art Museum, applicable portions of the Artists in the Schools program, and recognition of student artwork.

In 1967, the purchase or commissioning of art was recognized as important with the passage of the percent for art law. Forty years later, it became clear what mattered was how people engaged with art. The Works of Art Special Fund provides for that engagement as "interpretive work." In response to the community demand, the SFCA has expanded its education programming around public art including support for Artists in the Schools and a host of other education programs with a nexus to public art. In its November 8, 2023 meeting at Kahilu Theatre, the Senate Committee on Ways and Means expressed interest in the SFCA expanding the use of the Works of Art Special Fund to more broadly support culture and the arts engagement. This House bill does exactly the opposite and reduces the capacity of the fund to support only art for the original construction. HB1807 HD2 removes the engagement and education of the people from the art.

HB1807 H.D.2 also "appropriates funds for performing arts and other initiatives in schools" while stating the "the appropriations continued in H.B. No. _____will cause the state general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2024-2025 to be exceeded..." Knowing this will exceed the state budget and is therefore unconstitutional, how can one honestly allude there will be additional funding? This appropriation also does not address the funding cut to visual arts.

Aloha, Senators -

My name is Konrad Ng and I serve as the Chair of the Board of Commissioners for the Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts.

I strongly oppose House Bill 1807 (HB1807) because of its devastating consequences on arts and culture practitioners and organizations across the state and because of the harms it will inflict on our beloved Native Hawaiian communities.

For nearly 60 years, the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) has been Hawai'i's commitment to fostering the art, culture and people that nourishes our Aloha spirit. I serve as a SFCA commissioner because of artists like Solomon Enos, a celebrated Native Hawaiian artist, illustrator and creative thinker whose innovative, multimedia work articulates new genres and visions of the Hawaiian experience. I serve as a SFCA commissioner because of artists like Kaili Chun, an award-winning Native Hawaiian sculptor whose dynamic, sophisticated installations allow us to re-envision the histories, experiences and narratives of Hawai'i. I serve as a SFCA commissioner because of artists like Mari Matsuda, an acclaimed activist and legal scholar whose large scale works imagines Hawai'i as a march towards justice, as a story of people rising and resisting. I serve on the SFCA because artists give us hope. I serve on the SFCA because arts and culture galleries, organizations and programs across the archipelago are vital sources of community for our keiki, for our people - on the Big Island, on Maui, on Kaua'i and on O'ahu.

HB1807 tells our artists, galleries, organizations and programs that the work that they do to nourish our spirit is no longer valued or valuable. HB1807 says that Hawai'i has too much of what they create and what they provide, that they are the "surplus" that HB1807 says is no longer needed or wanted. Indeed, HB1807 will deny us the opportunity to support artists and artworks that may claim "Lahaina Strong" in their rendering of urgent resiliency; HB1807 says we no longer have room for this experience.

Senators: I respectfully ask that you do not pass this bill.

Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye, and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on H.B. 1807, H.D. 2.

The Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS) offers **comments** on this bill which specifies that the works of art special fund's one per cent transfer requirement shall apply only to capital improvement appropriations for the original construction of state buildings.

The reversion of the current Section 103-8.5, subsection (a), Hawaii Revised Statutes, to apply only to original construction instead of the current designation for construction or renovation of state buildings would greatly reduce the funding provided to the works of art special fund. It is DAGS' experience that, in addition to the acquisition and distribution of mobile works of art, tremendous value to the public has H.B. 1807, H.D. 2 Page 2

been achieved through the collaborative integration of built-in works of art into both new and renovated state facilities. These works help bring culture and the arts to the masses by becoming character defining facility features that add a sense of place, culture, and history on a much larger experiential scale. The provision of both expertise and funding through the Art in Public Places Program are invaluable additions to our projects, which would otherwise lack the ability to partner with the art community to successfully integrate and properly maintain art in our facilities.

As the State's many historic facilities age and require major renovation or complete replacement, the availability of sufficient works of art special funds to achieve this collaborative benefit become increasingly tantamount to the integration of works of art for public education and enjoyment. Successful examples of such collaborative efforts with DAGS include, and are not limited to, completed and on-going major renovation, replacement, and new projects for the State Capitol, Washington Place, the Ronald T.Y. Moon Judiciary Complex in Kapolei, the Kauai Judiciary Complex, the Hawaii State Hospital New Patient Facility, Wahiawa Civic Center and the New Aloha Stadium Entertainment District, which is including integration of works of art on a district-wide scale.

The number of new, original facilities projects that are implemented each year would provide far less funding than the increasing number of replacement or renovation projects required to maintain the state's facility assets. This sharp reduction in funding for the works of art special fund would result in irreversible damage to this successful program that could not be replicated by the separate and individual efforts of the agencies now implementing capital improvements. Furthermore, agencies lack the funding and expertise to maintain and preserve

existing works of art, which would quickly fall into disrepair.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 1807 HD2. The County of Kauai Office of Economic Development **strongly opposes HB 1807 HD2**, which proposes to repeal capital improvement appropriations for renovations of state buildings as a source of funds for the works of art special fund.

This bill would cut 70% of the Art in Public Places program revenue and as such, adversely eliminate government support for many arts programs and initiatives on Kauai and statewide. While the most recent version of the bill tries to cover the bill's negative impact on education and performing arts by making an appropriation, it will not come close to matching the loss made by this change which would likely include:

- The Hawaii State Art Museum exhibitions and public programs would need to end immediately.
- Support for Native Hawaiian Local Artists, Galleries and Organizations which would be severely minimalized at a time when it is starting to take off.
- Education Programming would be minimized as well.

In a time when there is such a need for programs that support mental health and artists, I ask you to maintain, as is, the forward-thinking percent-for-art law which should include renovations of state buildings.

I am testifying in opposition to House Bill 1807 House Draft 2.

My name is Solomon Robert Nui Enos, a Native Hawaiian Artist and Illustrator and the Artist in Residence at the Capitol Modern - Hawai'i State Art Museum. In my role as the resident artist, I volunteer several hours a day in conversation with students and patrons, imparting a sense of wonder for the process of creation. When it comes to our visiting Elementary, Intermediate and High Schools, I always have a fully engaged audience, and there is never enough time to answer all their questions about what is like to be a full-time artist. The main message I have to share with them is that the Pacific is one third of the earths surface, and yet we are underrepresented when it comes to contemporary art, and that they all have a role in addressing this deficiency. Following this message, I ask them all to remember a very simple practice: for every hour they spend playing video games or watching movies, they need to spend an hour drawing or painting or even designing their own video games and movies. And as always, I get a resounding hiki nō!, can do!.

The role that the Art in Public Spaces program provides in our community is visible and invisible. The new works of art created by our many communities in Hawai'i inspired in part by the masterful works in the States collection, and to the latter, the immeasurable impact on our communities sene of identity, our ability to imagine a path towards a sustainable Hawai'i, the artistic medium as a sense of control when so many other things about life are out of our control, the ability to address the myriad mental health issues we face such as depression and anxiety, to inspire more of our communities to explore careers in the creative industries, and so much more.

It is for these reasons that I am in very strong opposition to HD 1807 HD2, and in favor of increasing the support for the Art in Public Places program. In this digital age, where technically beautiful but utterly soulless artwork can be created through A.I. in an instant, art is the last

bastion for the things that make us human. Faced with this trend towards more ways to consume media, we need to increase support to keep this balance with the ability to our own stories through the art we make. As I share with the 'ohana and haumana, the families and students who visit the museum: "One hour taking ideas, one hour making ideas". The State of Hawai'i gives tremendous support for systems that cultivate consumers, and only a fraction of the support it needs to help foster creators.

We are very proud of the Hawaii State Art Museum for the following:


- The Hawaii State Art Museum undeniably has elevated itself as a center of Hawaii's artistic and cultural life.

I am the Executive Director of Hawaii Contemporary, the organization that produces the Hawaii Triennial, the state's largest multi-site public exhibition of contemporary art. I am writing to express our strong opposition to Senate Bill 1807. This bill seeks to adjust capital improvement appropriations for renovations of state buildings as a funding source for the works of art special fund. If enacted, this legislation would severely impact the Art in Public Places program, significantly reducing government support for arts organizations, programs, and individual artists statewide.

The rationale behind SB1807 suggests that the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) currently possesses a surplus of artwork, rendering further acquisitions unnecessary. However, while there may indeed be a modest surplus of artworks in storage, this is not indicative of redundancy but rather responsible management ensuring artworks are available for replacement and rotation. It is profoundly meaningful for artists to have their work acquired by the state and displayed in public buildings, including your offices, as it not only recognizes their talent but also enriches public spaces for all to enjoy.

Moreover, artistic expression is dynamic and continually evolving. New artworks are essential for reflecting the diversity and vibrancy of our society. Restricting the acquisition of new artworks could stifle artistic innovation and deprive our communities of the opportunity to engage with contemporary artistic practices, thereby hindering cultural growth and development.

The removal of "renovation" from the percent-for-art law would significantly reduce financial support for native Hawaiian and local artists, galleries, and organizations. Passing this bill would have a devastating impact on Hawaii Contemporary(HC). The Hawai'i Triennial draws over 100,000 visitors each iteration, generating substantial economic activity both locally and from out-of-town visitors. HC has contributed hundreds of millions (as measured by DBEDT) in economic impact, generated over 300,000 attendees both from across the state and internationally, and generated 200 jobs locally. Several hundred educational programs have been provided free and open to the public and 7000 students have benefited from free transportation and exhibition passes. Without the funding which HC receives via SFCA, HC's work is at severe risk.

Investing in the arts brings significant economic benefits. Studies have consistently shown that arts investments yield substantial returns for local economies by attracting tourists, stimulating spending in local businesses, and creating employment opportunities across various sectors. Additionally, a vibrant arts scene enhances the overall desirability of a destination, attracting skilled workers, entrepreneurs, and investors, thus fostering economic growth and prosperity.

Additionally, the arts sector serves as a catalyst for innovation and entrepreneurship. Artists and creative professionals drive economic development through their innovative ideas, products, and services. By nurturing a supportive environment for the arts, we can cultivate a thriving creative economy that generates new opportunities for economic diversification and sustainable growth.

In conclusion, preserving the works of art special fund and continuing to invest in the arts are essential steps towards harnessing the economic potential of creativity and innovation, thereby building a more prosperous and resilient future for Hawaii. I urge you to reconsider SB1807 and its potential impact on our state's cultural landscape and economic well-being.

On behalf of the board of directors and staff of the Donkey Mill Art Center, our 450 members of the organization, I respectfully present this testimony.

<u>We continue to oppose bill HB1807</u>, which would repeal capital improvement appropriations for renovations of state buildings as a source of funds for the works of art special fund. This bill would cut over 50% of the agency's program revenue, adversely reducing or eliminating government support for many arts organizations, programs and individual artists statewide. This greatly affects organizations like the Donkey Mill Art Center located in rural Holualoa on Hawai'i Island.

Additionally, the bill states "the State currently possesses a surplus of artwork in storage for current and future uses", which is very degrading to our artists and the arts and culture community. If you stop acquiring artwork from this moment in time, you lose pieces of history. Artwork acts as a historical library, it tells stories, and we should be proud to have a State agency that has a robust collection of work spanning decades of our history. The statement is also incorrect as the Special Fund covers so much more than just artwork purchases for State buildings. It provides needed funds for the Artist in the Schools program and Professional Development opportunities for artists and school-teachers. The adverse effects are large and would cause a devastating ripple effect felt in our schools and communities for years to come.

This bill tries to fill the funding gap by adding restrictive appropriations, but under the same breath, we are being told there is no money in the budget due to Maui recovery efforts. Thus, there is no guarantee that funding will be equal to that of the Special Fund, nor is it appropriate to add restrictions such as funding for "performing arts initiatives" and "arts programming in schools". What about the visual arts?

In summary, we have a robust arts agency (SFCA) that participates in strategic planning, visioning, and has a Board of Commissioners for added checks and balances. Let the agency administer the money into the proper programs based on the priority areas, as they are the experts in this field.

I understand that our Legislators face many difficult decisions at this time, but I urge you to preserve the integrity of the Special Fund without altering its current structure and put an end to this bill now.

Dear Senators:

We are writing to express our strong opposition to HB1807, which repeals capital improvement appropriations for renovations of state buildings as a source of funds for the works of art special fund. This bill would cut over 50% of the Art in Public Places program revenue, adversely reducing or eliminating government support for many arts organizations, programs and individual artists statewide. The bill states that the SFCA has enough works of art and there is no need to acquire more art for the state collection.

The Arts in Public Place Fund is not just about buying artwork for the state collection. Several important arts education programs are dependent on funding from the Arts in Public Places fund and will be cut back or eliminated all together if this bill passes. Some of the programs that will be affected are:

- Artists in the Schools arts education program serving 124 public and charter schools statewide.
- Professional development for DOE Teachers
- The Hawaii State Art Museum exhibitions and programming
- Scholastic Art Exhibition and Ceremony
- Young Artists of Hawaii Exhibition and Ceremony

As the Artistic Director for Honolulu Theatre for Youth I fear that all of the positive progress we have made using the arts to improve student learning will be eliminated through such rash decisions. This is not a time to eliminate funding sources for the arts or weaken the State's commitment to arts funding. We fear such a measure would have crippling consequences in our community.

Support for the arts should not just be about using the arts to entice more visitors to Hawaii it should be about enriching the lives of all Hawaii residents especially our keiki.

According to Rodin, "Art is the most sublime mission of man, since it is the expression of thought seeking to understand the world and to make it understood". Art bridges our separateness in a language and a currency that moves laterally and universally through all divisions. This "sublime mission", purpose, and sustaining euphoria transcends all other indicators of well-being, wealth and power; the either/or futility of culture/holy wars, and other addictions. People deeply need a genuine sense of purpose, without which they become the tools of zealots and ideologues, or they may struggle with mental illness. Adolf Hitler was actually a promising artist but was denied entrance to the Art School. Perhaps uniquely, Art provides that essential sense of purpose and dedication without having to impose itself on others.

Every Sunday evening I send out an Art History related e-mail to the members and former members of our Monday Night Drawing group. There are some 900 people on that list. My favorite topics have to do with the Art programs devised under Roosevelt and the New Deal, which dramatically helped the country survive the Great Depression. The New Deal produced magnificent art and launched the careers of many prominent artists. To me, a Navy veteran of both the Vietnam and the Gulf Wars, I believe our Finest Hours may not have been just on the battlefield, but in the implementation and mobilization of these visionary programs here at home, "Waging Peace" as former President Jimmy Carter put it.

In these times, funding for the Arts has been "hard won by", and will be as or more difficult to restore. Meanwhile, such austerity measures as in HB1807 HD2 are short-sighted, reflexive and reactionary, demonstrating a fundamental lack of confidence in the true greatness of America and its proudest moments.

The Capitol Modern is a free public State art museum located in downtown Hawaii which enhances the profound combination of mixed cultures of the State of Hawaii while providing educational learning experiences to the general public & the youths. In 1967, Hawai'i became the first state in the nation to adopt a law with the enactment of the Art in State Buildings Law, which designated funds of construction costs of new buildings for the acquisition of works of art, either by commission or purchase. The purpose of the law is to elevate & humanize state buildings and to increase public access to the arts. In 1989, State Legislature of Hawai'i created the Works of Art Special Fund, expanding upon the provisions of the Art in State Buildings Law to include having works of art available to all state public places. Today, there are over 300 public art programs nationwide at the federal, state and county levels.

Since the enacting of the percent-for-art law, the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) has acquired works from local & international artists and from curated exhibits across the State. These works of art enhance the physical environment of state buildings while providing educational experiences of visual arts to the public through the Art in Public Places Program.

The SFCA partners with The Honolulu Theatre for Youth, the Hawaii Tourism Authority and The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards to inspire youths to produce quality works of art. The youth get an exciting opportunity to earn scholarships and to get their work displayed in public exhibits. These programs encourage creative excellence amongst Hawaii's youths of all levels from K-12. The works of the partners & youths further encourage a celebration of arts & culture while elevating Hawaiian culture and other heritages through displays of work representing different social groups, nations & customs. The youth art programs raises awareness about art education while creating diversity in the representation of cultures and equity for all children who want to compete.

The arts special fund does great work with students & artists to build career pathways & programming opportunities. There should be consideration to balance the budget with other priorities during this legislative season and to keep the complete funding for the Arts Special Fund. Artists, producers, musicians, fashion designers, performers, instrumentalists, filmmakers & content creators depend on the Art Special Fund to create dynamic opportunity in their artistry, to develop their talent and to showcase their profound creative expressions on a public platform.

The Chamber of Sustainable Commerce represents over 100 small businesses across the State that strive for a triple bottom line: people, planet and prosperity; we know Hawaii can strengthen its economy without hurting workers, consumers, communities or the environment.

For this reason, we oppose HB1807 HD2, which specifies that the works of art special fund's one per cent transfer requirement shall apply only to capital improvement appropriations for the original construction of state buildings, and adds two vague appropriations, lacking specific amounts or percentages, for the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) to support performing arts initiatives and the expansion of arts programming in schools.

Denying SFCA the one percent of renovation appropriated funds just puts more money in the hands of the architects, planners, construction contractors, and trades people, who are hard working but we must acknowledge they are male-dominated professions and work forces. Reserving one percent for artists is not asking for too much, especially when it helps to equalize the wide gender gap of resident workers earning public funds through public works projects. There is more gender equity among the workforce of artists compared to those working in construction renovation.

We urge you to amend this bill by reverting Section 2(a) of this HD2 back to the HD1 version that passed out of Chair Tam's Committee on Culture, Arts, & International Affairs. We also support this committee keeping in the two appropriations for performing arts and school arts programs as long as you specify that the funding would be supplemental to the SFCA budget and would not supplant funding.

I strongly oppose HB1807, both as an individual and as a representative of Arts Kauai. As a public-school teacher, I received funding to bring artists into the schools through the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts. I brought our first state poet laurate Kealoha in to do workshops with hundreds of students. All the students gained a better appreciation of poetry and valuable performance skills. They worked in small groups for exercises and gave presentations of the poetry they wrote in front of their peers, often numbering over 50 students. Many reluctant learners excelled in this program. I think it would be a huge loss for the state to reduce funding for these kinds of programs. Art in public places is equally important to our state. Please oppose HB1807. As I understand it, this bill would cut 70% of the Art in Public Places program revenue, adversely eliminating government support for many arts programs and initiatives statewide. While the most recent version of the bill tries to cover the bills negative impact on education and performing arts by making an appropriation, it will not come close to matching the loss of this cut. Please Do not make cuts to the Arts Programs in the state. Art is not only benificial to culture in the state, but is also important in terms of mental health.

Aloha, my name is Evan Fujimoto and I am a business owner of Craft Brewz Music and Echo Seven Creative. My full-time work in Craft Brewz Music involves music creation through songwriting and music production while my work with Echo Seven Creative involves video production and photography. I am one of the music producers for CROSSING RAIN as well as the director/cinematographer of 3 of CROSSING RAIN's music videos that was filmed at Capitol Modern. Thus, I am fully involved with the creative arts community through my work.

I grew up playing the trumpet in band throughout grade school, which showed me paths that really intrigued me such as music composition. But, when it was time to choose a higher education route, I did not have very many options. I was interested in composing music, but wanted to make pop songs that would be played on the radio. There were very little programs on island that specialized in this specific field within music, which led me to major in pre-med instead. After a span of seven years, I reached a full-circle moment with the arts where I couldn't resist acknowledging that was my calling. Honing my crafts through COVID then led me to diving into the arts full-time today.

I don't know where I would be if I had gotten into medical school, but I know that I would not be in the position I am in today without any of the art program that were available to me in school. From Youth Symphony to select bands and marching bands, it proved to me the importance of programs like these existing in a child's early life; And my story is only one example. The arts in Hawaii is already scarce as is. I believe defunding an already dry industry would result in more devaluation of local creativity leading people to outsource certain creative jobs out of state. It would lead to our dollars being spent with those who don't directly contribute to the local community. This already happens in the music industry.

In the states, music is valued exponentially more than it is valued here because there is an existing industry. And tt's definitely not because their music is 100x better than the music we produce. We work with a Portland-based music publishing company who licenses music to business's commercial campaigns for top dollars. We started asking ourselves why music licensing like this doesn't exist in Hawaii. Wouldn't that really benefit the starving local musician if companies paid them to license their song? We believe it is due to the fact that there are not enough resources available within the local industry. There are no programs that specialize or educate within these fields. Talent exists, but value for music does not. Thus, companies put their dollars in out of state pockets when searching for music. I fear this is what

will happen in the future to all art forms if local programs are defunded. More and more will people start to look outward for art.

Community MUST exist in order for the value of the industry to grow. Keeping art programs alive will be the investment for a higher valuation of all arts in the future. Through this we can and will keep local dollars with the local people. I hope to see this bill overturned and the arts to continue to grow. Thank you for your consideration.

Testimony Opposing House Bill 1807hd2

To: The Honorable Sen. Chris Lee, Chair The Honorable Sen. Lorraine Inoue, Vice Chair Members of the Senate Committee on Transportation, Culture, and the Arts

I am testifying today as President of the Hawaii Handweavers Hui, which was founded in 1953. We are deeply opposed to House Bill 1807, which would repeal part of Hawaii's landmark first in the nation law to provide 1% of the construction cost of public buildings <u>and their renovations</u> to support art in public places and the subsequent creation of the works of art special fund. This state-funded program that created and now operates through the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, has been an unqualified success over the past half-century. It continues to meet the modest but important need to support arts organizations throughout the state and even though this bill was amended in the House to take effect on a date far in the future, it is still harmful. The Handweavers Hui is one of the many organizations that have benefited from this legislation and through it we have been able to contribute to cultural activities in the state of Hawai'i in the following ways.

A. The Hawaii Handweavers Hui has taken great pride since the late 1960s in the two massive hand-woven tapestries that hang in the State Senate and House chambers, which were created by our late Hui member, weaver Ruthadell Anderson. When you are in your chambers, please look at the beautiful tapestry at the front of the room and remember that this remarkable law made it possible.

B. When the Hawaii Museum of Arts School at Linekona (HMAS) shut down during the COVID 19 pandemic, we were one of several arts and crafts organizations that had been using HMAS and its weaving class as an informal gathering place. During that time we regularly received small grants from the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) to support our annual workshops that bring a well-known fiber artist to Hawaii to conduct three or four day workshops for our weavers on both Oahu and the Big Island. We also invited the foundation to visit our biennial juried exhibitions, where they regularly made purchase awards of weavings by Hawaii artists for the Art in Public Places program. We supported the weaving program by regular contributions and donated our time and skills to assist WeBeWeave very special arts program at HMAS, which provided a daily weaving program to a group of residents with various disabilities. In addition to encouraging our members to take the weekly weaving class every semester, we had held our meetings and weaving workshops as well as our biennial juried exhibitions there for over three decades.

C. During the pandemic, the Handweavers Hui and several other arts and crafts group that had been using HMAS were informed that we would no longer be able to use those facilities when the Schools' renovation and reorganization of its arts instruction program was completed. By that time, the Museum of Art School at Linekona was the only place on the island of Oahu that offered handweaving instruction to adults. The University of Hawai'i's once vibrant undergraduate and graduate weaving programs had gradually declined, and only one high school, the University lab school, now a public charter school, was teaching weaving to high school students. Recognizing that our Hawaii Handweavers Hui, a 501c3 nonprofit, was the only organization that could step into the breach, we accepted HMAS' donation of the weaving looms and other specialized equipment that the weaving program had been using. Fortunately, we found a new home at the new Downtown Art Center, where we had already become charter members. In addition to holding our exhibitions in their beautifully renovated DAC gallery, we now have a thriving weaving studio at DAC, where we offer adult classes in weaving and related fiber arts to the public. The move has been an unqualified success for the Hawaii Handweavers Hui. We offer about 20 small classes each quarter, with the weaving classes taught pro bono by our members and other short craft classes taught by paid instructors. The income has covered the rent every month since the move, and the Hui's membership on Oahu has doubled. Because we walk through the DAC gallery to reach our weaving studio, we are much more connected to the other arts groups that hold their shows there and we also participate in various activities that DAC sponsors, including the public First Friday events that have enlivened the arts community in the Chinatown area.

In short, our small weaving community has benefitted from the art in public spaces program since its founding and continues to benefit from programs supported by the arts special fund. We see no reason to eliminate the application of the 1% of public construction projects to renovations, especially since more of our public built environment is now aging and urgently requires renovation or replacement. For a very modest cost that is contributed by the companies that win public construction contracts, the state of Hawaii has been able to develop and maintain a number of innovative programs that support the state's arts community. HB 1807 is based on an outdated, narrow understanding of how this law benefits the public at no direct cost to the taxpayers. We see no reason to gut arts funding by removing renovations from the current funding mechanism, which supports a wide range of activities through the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts. If the purpose of holding a hearing now for a bill that has already been amended to take effect in the year 3000, wouldn't it be simpler just to kill it completely?

I am submitting written testimony to strongly object to the proposed House Bill 1807 which "repeals capitol improvement appropriations for renovations of state buildings as a source of funds for the works of art special fund." This bland and innocuous description does not even come close to describing the damage that this bill will cause to our community. This funding is crucial.

If this bill goes through and 70% of the Art in Public Places program revenue is cut, then it will have disastrous consequence for our cultural and artistic community here in Hawaii.

All exhibitions and public programs at the Hawaii State Art Museum will end immediately. This is the people's museum. Admission is free, allowing everyone to enjoy the amazing exhibitions that they offer with out having to pay exorbitant admissions fees as is required at Bishop Museum and HOMA. Every First Friday they have live music and programming and events for the entire family, drawing the public in and breathing enthusiasm and enjoyment back into this arts oriented monthly Chinatown event.

Their educational programs will be cut as well - ending Artists in the Schools Arts Education Programming, no more Scholastic Art Exhibitions or Young Artists of Hawaii Exhibitions or professional Development for DOE teachers and teaching artists. Who will be educating and inspiring and supporting the next generation of artists here in Hawaii? These opportunities, for students from across the state, allow all strata of society to see their expressions and creations displayed in a museum. That is priceless for their intellectual growth and for the development of their unique voice and self confidence

Support would be eliminated for the Downtown Art Center - our very last venue for large juried art shows like Artists of Hawaii and Hawaii Craftsmen where all local artists can show and participate in the art scene. Support would also be eliminated for the Maui Arts and Cultural Center, Donkey Mill Arts Center, Arts at Marks Garage, Fishcake, Arts and Letters, and University of Hawaii Galleries.

Really? What would the community have left? As a professional working artist for 30 years I can tell you that compared to the mainland we already have a profound lack of opportunities here in the Islands. While the public consistently shows up to support the arts in all of its forms, the necessary upper level support here is very limited. There very few art galleries where we can show work and actually have the opportunity to sell the work that we make in an attempt to make a living.

Not to mention the loss of the support for organizations like Honolulu Printmakers, Pu'uhonua Society, Hawaii Handweavers Hui, Honolulu Theatre for Youth, and multiple others that provide creative centers and opportunities for us in the community. Funding for outreach programs will be eliminated that support human services, youth outreach, LGBTQ services, health and harm reduction centers....

We must ask - who exactly does this bill benefit? Because it certainly is not the citizens of Hawaii. This critical funding could disappear leaving much disarray in its wake, and who would benefit? I am surprised and outraged that this bill is actually being presented in a community that is already underserved in the areas of artistic and cultural programming financial assistance. HB1807 is targeting the one institution genuinely making a difference and funding so many crucial programs that will just vanish if this bill goes through.

Hawaii was the very first state in the nation to establish the 1% for the arts in 1967, and this was expanded to the Works of Art Special Fund in 1989. Let us not allow this dream to be crushed in 2024 with the passing of HB1807, much to the detriment of the people of Hawaii.

To the Senate Committee on Transportation, Culture, and the Arts:

I am writing this letter in strong opposition to House Bill 1807 (HB1807), which proposes the repeal of capital improvement appropriations for renovations of state buildings as a source of funds for the Works of Art Special Fund and the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA). I have witnessed firsthand the vital and significant impacts of SFCA's initiatives, both through my capacity as Director of Maui Arts & Cultural Center's Schaefer International Gallery and as a Maui resident and community member.

Maui Arts & Cultural Center (MACC) has worked with SFCA to coordinate Acquisition Award Selection Committee visits that nominate works of art for accession into the Art in Public Places (APP) Collection. For numerous exhibitions at MACC, we have also been able to request and display artworks on Ioan from the APP Collection, which holds immeasurable importance as a public resource. HB1807's language repealing renovations as a source for funding and replacing it with arbitrary appropriations is misleading and fails to transparently articulate the significant detrimental effects this bill would have on the SFCA, the APP Collection, and the arts in Hawai'i.

Hawai'i's enactment of the Art in State Buildings Law in 1967 and creation of the Works of Art Special Fund in 1989 distinguished the state by advocating the importance of the arts – both as a necessary element to humanize public space and as an essential experience for the betterment of society. The APP Program represents an evolving collection that is meant to grow alongside new creative voices, approaches, and issues that emerge from Hawai'i's diverse art scene. To imply that the collection has enough artwork is to close the door on including current and future movements of Hawai'i's artists as part of this public resource, a misstep that would be a drastic disservice to the vitality of our community today and our cultural longevity for future generations.

In addition to the APP Collection, the Works of Art Special Fund spans numerous initiatives that create accessible exhibition programs to the general public, enable the implementation of arts education throughout the state, and provide funding to non-profit organizations. The programs that would be at severe risk due to HB1807's slashes in funding include but are not limited to the Capitol Modern Hawai'i State Art Museum exhibitions and public programs; the Artists in the Schools program serving 124 public and charter schools; professional development for Department of Education teachers; the Scholastic Art Exhibition and Young Artists of Hawai'i Exhibition; numerous outreach programs to underserved populations; and support for Native Hawaiian and local arts organizations.

An amount of one percent of a renovation budget can make a substantial impact for artists, students, and non-profit organizations throughout the state when stewarded through the Works of Art Special Fund and SFCA's initiatives. I respectfully request that you prioritize the role of the arts as an essential facet of our cultural vitality by rejecting HB1807.

My name is Tuia'ana Scanlan, International Trustee and president of IATSE Local 665, the union representing technicians and artisans in the entertainment industry in Hawai'i. <u>Local</u> 665 opposes HB 1807 HD 2, relating to the works of art special fund.

We support education and access to the arts; we support the State Foundation for Culture and the Arts and its decades-long history as a national leader in community-based arts funding; and we support keeping the funding for this important organization intact. Through this program, schools are provided with amazingly talented teaching artists who work directly with teachers and students in the classroom. Students' thinking and learning of core subject areas and the foundation of the arts is deepened as a result of these masterful artists. The residencies from the Artist in the Schools program serve the community of each school, working with the teachers and their curicullum to make their residency relevant and responsive to each location and grade level.

I am a teacher at Hana School and have seen students who struggle with academics thrive in these alternative ways to show what they know. Students who struggle with reading, math, writing or fine motor skills, can shine when they get to use their whole bodies to communicate ideas. The children of Hawai'i need creative outlets to help make learning more meaningful. Please don't take music, art, and dance away from our students.

Hana School is fortunate to have Maggie Costigan as our teaching artist to share her extensive knowledge of music and dance with our K-5th grade students. Through her dance residency, "My Body is My Instrument" she cultivates awareness of the body as an artistic tool, while developing best practices for maintaining physical and emotional health through music & dance. During her residency, our students learn how to observe and control their bodies. Ms. Costigan helps students use their body movements to communicate meaning and feelings. Our students develop their imaginations and strengthen their creative thinking while creating dance sequences telling about our 'aina. This connection to self and place is important to our students. We love having master artists come into our school to inspire students to learn ways that are different from how we teach them. The visiting artists also instruct the classroom teachers to incorporate the types of activities introduced into our weekly practices. This is especially important for rural schools, like Hana, where we don't always have enough staff on hand, much less the staff with right training. We need this program to provide quality, talented artists to our small, rural location.

Additionally, our students learn effective reflection and assessment strategies to

improve upon their work, and important approaches for problem solving. Throughout these classes, Ms. Costigan connects the curriculum with Fine Arts Standards and the Hawai'i Department of Education's General Learner Outcomes (GLOs). Focusing on General Learner Outcomes is an important component when educating our students. These are overarching goals of standards-based learning go beyond academic achievement to ensure that students become engaged lifelong learners.

As you can see, Dance, Music, and Art are all extemely important avenues in teaching the whole child. As teachers at Hana School, we want to engage students with their whole body and mind so they become well rounded members of society. The Artists in the Schools program, funded by HSFCA, provides talented artists to help us do just that. Students learn in different ways and seeing students learning through dance, helps me see strengths in my students that I would not otherwise notice. All students deserve to have high quality art education in their schools.

Dear Chairman Lee, Vice-Chair Inouye and Members of the Committee:

I am writing from the National Assembly of State Arts Agencies. We are a national, nonpartisan clearinghouse for research on state arts agency programs and policies.

It has come to our attention that HB 1807 HD2 (pertaining to the Works of Art Special Fund) proposes to limit the state's percent for art requirement to original construction only, thus exempting renovations from the policy. We wish to offer a perspective **opposing** this change to the law.

We concur with the bill's authors that Hawai'i's Percent for Art statute and the Works of Art Special Fund have been highly successful. These policies in Hawai'i have served as models for other states and jurisdictions. <u>Such policies</u>, enacted in 27 states and territories since Hawai'i first pioneered the approach, demonstrate the power of the arts to enliven the built environment, celebrate a state's cultural heritage, enhance education and create opportunities for artists.

However, when considering public art policies enacted by legislatures nationwide, **the strong majority (85%) of those policies** *include* **major facility renovations**. This is the case in Colorado, Connecticut, District of Columbia, Guam, Hawai'i, Illinois, Louisiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Maryland, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, New Mexico, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Rhode Island, Texas, Utah, Vermont, Vermont and Washington.

Applying the policy to both new and existing sites ensures that Hawai'l citizens have access to public art in all state properties, regardless of their age. It also contributes to the maintenance and restoration of artworks and—in the case of Hawai'i—contributes to many valuable educational programs.

We respectfully encourage the Hawai'i state legislature to maintain an inclusive and comprehensive approach to public art, to the lasting benefit of all Hawai'i communities.

I am writing to express our strong opposition to HB1807 HD2, which aims to significantly reduce and ultimately eradicate the Art in Public Places Program. This proposed legislation would have far-reaching negative effects on numerous stakeholders, including DOE teachers, 13 art centers, 8 organizations offering Native Hawaiian Arts-based programs, and 124 public and charter schools across all major islands.

Extensive analysis of data from the National Educational Longitudinal Survey involving 25,000 middle and high school students over 14 years has revealed that increased involvement in the arts among disadvantaged students correlates with higher rates of college participation, employment, and volunteerism. Specifically, low-income students highly engaged in the arts were more than twice as likely to obtain a bachelor's degree compared to their peers. Furthermore, they tend to access employment opportunities offering higher pay, greater responsibility, enhanced job satisfaction, and increased prospects for career advancement. We firmly believe that access to the arts should be universal, transcending age, gender, or artistic proficiency, given its proven efficacy as a rehabilitative and transformative tool.

Based on our extensive experience, along with data and assessments gathered over the past 8 years while serving thousands of community members, particularly those in our most underserved communities in Hawai'i, we have observed a profound connection between art and culture in alleviating anxiety and stress, especially among youth put at risk. In light of the mental health crisis exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, discontinuing support for one of the few resources that contribute to their well-being and recovery would be highly detrimental.

Kumu KahuaTheatre has been presenting plays by and about the people of Hawai'i for more than 50 years. Supporting this organization through the Hawai'i State Foundation for Culture and the Arts is vital for our community.

Many artists and patrons at Kumu Kahua Theatre report the same story to us. "**This is the first theatre where I saw myself, my family, my neighborhood on the stage**". It's a very common observation that Hawaiians and other "locals" are not represented in mass media. Kumu Kahua Theatre answers that need with great attention to realism, quality in arts programming and education devoted to the Hawaiian Islands and cultures.

Though our western approach to theatre is not an artistic expression native to many in the US, including the Hawaiian culture and the many Pacific cultures that make up our population, it is a conduit to share stories and experiences - sometimes bitter, poignant, funny, frightening and/or warm - in a safe environment. Eventually, the lights come back up and our audiences have laughed, cried and clenched their way to **greater understanding** of the people sitting next to them, living around the corner and visiting from around the world.

We give artists and audiences the opportunity to interact and appreciate our stories together, we make it possible for those stories to be shared with many communities and generations to come and we partner with several local organizations and companies to multiply our positive impact within our community.

As Diep Tran wrote in the April 7, 2021 issue of American Theatre Magazine, "When the wider culture tells you that your stories, your face, your people are not worthy of attention, you make yourself smaller. You tell yourself that your feelings, your pain, your rage is not worthy of attention." We hope to help everyone in Hawai'i know that they are worthy of attention, because they are. To help assure this, we survey both our audiences and internal teams following each production. Our customer surveys tell us that our mission is important to 97% of our audiences, and they want to see more KKT shows; 99% of our internal team members wish to work with us again.

As you consider the cost effectiveness of The Works of Special Art Fund, please consider this. A calculator developed by the Americans for the Arts measures the impact of the non-profit arts and culture industry. Utilizing our budget and patron data, the calculator measures total dollars spent by an organization and its audiences; event-related spending by arts and culture audiences is estimated using the average dollars spent per person by arts event attendees in similarly populated communities.

The total industry impact of Kumu Kahua Theatre in our community as a result of expenditures made by our organization and audiences is:

- \$300,000 expenditure
- 19 Full-time jobs in our community
- \$441,722 paid to community residents
- \$66,584 received by our local and state governments

This represents \$660,300 in total expenditures of our organization and audiences (\$300,000 by our organization and \$360,300 by our audiences).

Kumu Kahua Theatre is one of many in Hawai'i that depend on support from the Hawai'i State Foundation of Culture and the Arts. We need these theatres as well as The Hawai'i State Art Museum, Native Hawaiian and other local artists and galleries, arts education in schools, professional development for art teachers, the Art Bento Museum Education Program, and other art programs and organizations to reflect and share our humanity and our community. All of these are in financial danger from HB1807 SD 2.

Please do not pass this bill for the good of all of us - our community, our children, and ourselves.

Cutting out the local voices who lead the arts will log another devastating blow on Hawaii's living culture and legacy. I represent a local firm that supports durable decisions concerning Pacific ocean resources, including culturall resources. My testimony is this: Two wrongs don't make a right. I am offering to you my observation that the development of social capital is of primary importance following Lahaina's loss. The loss is unfathomable in every dimension and not least the art capital that had linked Lahaina to its residents, county, State and to patrons and visitors around the world. Lahaina was an arts hub precisely because *artists decided it would be* and invested in it personally. Social capital is built organically and it is fragile and vulnerable to its degree of recognition in the community. You cannot achieve a vibrant, living culture by rerouting arts governance through a committee structure that is concerned with capital success most of all. You can see the disastrous effects of zero-sum thinking about arts and music in public schools - they have vanished since becoming optional budget items. The same will be true if economic development thinkers take over arts decisions, They will get it wrong and cause rifts, like HOMA has done with Linekoa, for example. Please stand back and witness that the same sorts of mobilization, led by artists, are currently underway in Honolulu and elsewhere in the State, as evidenced in just one example by the strength being invested in the Downtown Arts Center by local arts leaders and Hawaii State Art Museum (Capitol Modern). Get behind initiative and do not see arts as another place to pillage for resources for your decisions. This bill is not respectful to Lahaina.

To the Senate Committee on Transportation, Culture and the Arts,

This testimony is in strong OPPOSITION to HB1807 as it repeals capital improvement appropriations for renovations of state buildings as a source of funds for the works of art special fund.

As the Executive Director of Pu'uhonua Society, an arts and culture not-for-profit that has supported community for over 50 years, I know the importance of sustained government support for arts organizations, arts programming, and individual artists. There is a vital connection between the Art in Public Places Program and a thriving arts ecosystem in Hawai'i. While the bill states that there will be "no adverse effects on the arts in public places program," this is simply not the case.

The Art in Public Places Program provides modest but necessary economic support for local artists historically and in-real-time. Capital improvement appropriations designated for the construction and renovation of state buildings allow the state to support artists who have never received proper support and/or recognition while also communicating to up-and-coming artists that there is a place for them and their work in Hawai'i. I have personally seen how an acquisition through the Art in Public Places Program can dramatically change an artist's trajectory for the better.

Art is not about filling a quota or simply covering a wall. By continuing current appropriations for the Art in Public Places Program the state helps to ensure the continuity of Hawai'i's history as seen through Hawai'i's artists for future generations.

HB1807 also dramatically understates the negative impact that will be felt by The Art in Public Places Program outside of state acquisitions. In addition to what is acquired for state buildings, the Art in Public Places Program as it is currently funded supports DOE teachers, arts centers, public and charter schools and organizations such as Pu'uhonua Society. This bill will remove dollars behind many arts programs and statewide initiatives. Support for artists translates to support for our communities as Dr. Jill Sonke, Ph.D. and founding director of the Center for Arts in Medicine at the University Florida states, "just like exercise and good nutrition, regular arts participation and creative activity can support and enhance our health and wellbeing in measurable ways - having a real impact on conditions like hypertension, depression, dementia and more... Arts and culture resources should be available in every community." This is not the time to take *ANY* resources from The Art in Public Places Program.

Continuing the current funding streams are a vital step in honoring the legacy that was created in 1967 and investing in Hawai'i's collective wellbeing now and in the future. I stand in strong OPPOSITION to HB1807.

The Hawai'i Community Foundation (HCF) strongly opposes House Bill 1807 HD2. If enacted, HB1807 HD2 will decrease funding to the Works of Art special fund by up to 70%. This fund enables the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) to carry out essential statewide arts and culture programming including acquisition and distribution of works of art, conservation of the state's public art collection, interpretation of the collection, operations and programming for Capital Modern, and critical arts education programs.

HCF has a long history of partnering with SFCA to support arts education at public and charter schools through the Artists in the Schools program. This program is supported by this fund and a decrease in funding will greatly reduce access to arts education for keiki throughout the state. HCF is committed to increasing access to arts and culture as part of HCF's CHANGE Framework under the "A" sector focused on Arts and Culture. When moving here, I did not seek out places to sightsee, swim, or eat; I looked for organizations to help me build my art community. The established and diverse art community attracted me to Hawai'i, and now I am here today to tell you to oppose HB 1807, and here is why.

Art builds connections between people. Through access to art, individuals learn about themselves and those around them and see things from different perspectives. Art gives individuals and groups an outlet to express themselves and brings us all together.

Art is a platform for voices to be heard and connects us. It builds communities and supports Hawai'i by fueling investment in those who live here. Art helps me personally expand my knowledge through workshops and lectures and gives me a communal space to discuss projects in a safe space. I am a freelance designer, and several art organizations have contracted me to assist with web development and social media. This means I am fed by the arts, clothed by the arts, and give back to the arts of Hawai'i. Art supports my ability to live here with my family.

Many art organizations across all eight islands will be affected by funding cuts proposed in HB1807. The ramifications are devastating and will cause a catastrophic domino effect throughout Hawai'i.

Cutting arts funding hurts our Keiki by limiting or eliminating opportunities to facilitate their creative growth. That hinders their problem-solving ability, making them unable to tackle today's and tomorrow's challenges. Bringing artists into our schools allows children to look at something from different perspectives. It gives them a safe space to fail and build up confidence by trying again or trying something in a new way. It enables them to communicate and debate. It builds character, acceptance, and resilience within our youth. Art is a tool to combat the hardships of today, and when youth aren't given access to even learn about these tools, our Keiki lose out.

Artwork in public spaces elevates the areas around it. I remember walking into a state building and seeing a massive mosaic mural on the wall. Instead of looking at my phone while waiting, I was mesmerized by the detail and depth the mosaic artist elicited. It made me enjoy my time in a waiting area that otherwise would have been an echoing hall of glass and concrete. I was happy to be in that space for that moment and was reminded that life isn't just about worrying about what's next. The bill notes that the State already has an extensive collection of artworks, yet how often are they featured in State spaces? There are opportunities to generate cultural awareness, community connection, and share Aloha. If works of art are collecting dust in your archives, you should bring them out and share them with all of Hawai'i. Those works are not meant to be hidden away. Gift our community by sharing your bounty and tell us the importance behind those collected items. If you still have too many, review your deaccession policy, consider the pathway to generate funds by selling some works, and then pour those funds back into supporting the arts.

In closing, I urge you to recognize the consequences this bill represents and realize how invaluable the arts' contributions are to our community. I oppose bill HB1807 and ask for you to reject it today. Instead of stomping on the spirit of Aloha, let us continue building a vibrant, creative, and inclusive future by supporting and funding the arts. Oppose this bill and strike it down.

Aloha Chairman Lee, Vice Chairman Inouye, and Committee Members,

I am a lifelong resident of Maui County, recently retired after 42 years of service as a public school teacher. I share Pundy Yokouchi's genuine belief that exposure to art is essential in the development of an individual's awareness and sensitivity - as important and as basic as compulsory education has become in our society. And that it should be universally accessible to everyone - the "common man" as he put it, not just for the privileged few.

I am not an artist, but I love how art and design has impacted and shaped the way I see, think, feel, and act. I have spent my life working in and advocating for the arts, particularly secondary arts education. My students, like thousands of others across Maui County and throughout our state, in elementary, intermediate and high schools, have been the grateful beneficiaries of SFCA support for many years. They provided valuable opportunities for my students to meet and work with professional artists, private organizations, and numerous outreach programs through the Artists-in-the-Schools program which extended their learning far beyond the walls of the classroom and deep into the community. Many of them, now in varied careers, continue their community-mindedness in admirable ways as young adults. For some, as young parents, they express concern over their children potentially being left without the valuable humanizing experiences they fondly recall looking forward to and engaging in when they were students.

I am grateful to have maintained contact with many of them over the years and love how they have been reaping the rewards of the seeds that were planted years ago. BHS art alumni Jennifer Stephens, Caleb O'Connor, Noble Richardson, and Kirk Kurokawa are now part of the SFCA's permanent collection. In addition, Kirk has received commissions to paint official portraits for former Governors Abercrombie and Ige, and Senator Daniel K. Inouye. Julia Kimoto is an

engineer who acknowledges her arts-integrated education and field trips to exhibitions at the MACC and Hui No'eau strongly influenced and shaped her secondary education, college path, and career. They all, along with others too numerous to name individually at this time, recall the validation felt when their works received local/national recognition in the SFCA-sponsored Hawai'i Regional Scholastic Art Exhibition. These awards and competitions garner attention from the public for the arts. However, the majority of my students may not have received medals or ribbons, yet they too experienced the exhilaration of bringing an idea to life, working through challenges and disappointments, failing and restarting pieces relentlessly until finally enjoying the personal satisfaction that can only come from working really hard at something you care about.

Currently serving my first term as the Maui commissioner on the board of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, I have been impressed with what I am learning in regard to the breadth and scope of how the SFCA works tirelessly to not only "beautify state buildings and increase public access to the arts" but strives to positively impact every community member on every island through educational outreach programs to ensure that authentic arts and cultural education thrive in Hawai'i. I recently read that when the SFCA got off the ground in 1966, government support for individual arts groups was basically non-existent. Today, the SFCA gets its strength from a healthy, active, and vibrant art community. At this point in our rich history, wouldn't you agree that it is imperative that we collectively uphold the mission of the SFCA, first envisioned by Maui's own Masaru "Pundy" Yokouchi, to share a continuing responsibility to protect, perpetuate, and promote culture and arts in Hawai'i?

The passage of HB 1807 potentially affects ALL of our local communities as it cuts deeply in educational, cultural, economic, and historical layers and will ignite a damaging downward shift, stalling the current momentum of the foundation. What has taken decades to build and grow will be lost.

HB 1807 is a damaging, disappointing, and shameful bill to place into action. I hope this committee and this legislative session will not choose to support this as their legacy.

INTRODUCTION

My name is Kaia Stallings. I come to you as a lover of arts and a contributing member of Oahu's art community. I am submitting this written testimony in <u>OPPOSITION</u> of **HB 1807**. Below you will find a detailed explanation of the exact issues presented in HB 1807,

"The legislature finds that this program has been a success, with works of art enhancing the physical environment for state buildings and providing educational visual arts opportunities to the public through the art in public places program."

- Issue: the language in the bill point only to visual art and educational programming. It does not take performance and entertainment programs into consideration. It seems focused solely on the aforementioned categories. In other words; the bill is not considering what can be potentially lost.
- Issue: If the legislature finds that the program has been successful, then they must also understand this success is a direct result of the funding available for public art programs.
- Without the funding provided by Act 389, beloved art establishments on Oahu such as Capitol Modern, Arts at Marks Garage, Downtown Art Center and many more would be forced to close down. All of these establishments provide free arts and culture programming for the public to enjoy.

"The legislature notes that removing the redundancy of applying the special fund to renovations would have no adverse effects on the art in public spaces program, as the State currently possesses a surplus of artwork in storage for future use."

- Issue: The verbiage in this section of the bill is presented in a way that exhibits a blatant disregard for the value of arts. Not only this; but it treats art as if there is a deadline on creativity and creation. The answer is not to cut the funding due to a "surplus of art," the answer is to find a place for the art to go. Furthermore, to make the arduous assumption that something as arbitrary as an "art surplus" exists is naive and demonstrates a green understanding of the arts community in Hawaii.
- Issue: Art and the collection of such is historical, is cultural, and contributes greatly to the rich cultural tapestry that Hawaii is blessed to have. To halt funding would be a grave disservice to the cultures and communities across the state.

TO SPEAK TOWARDS THE AMENDMENTS:

- "Adding two appropriations for the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts to support performing arts initiatives and the expansion of arts programming in schools."
 - Issue: This verbiage is deceptive as HB 1807 will NOT appropriate funding that would make up for the loss to the Special Fund. It makes no sense to "support performing arts initiatives" when they are already being supported with the current funding.
 - Capitol Modern: Hawaii State Art Museum would still have to close despite the
 attempt at mitigating the negative impact of the bill, as the amendments do not cover

the costs needed in order to keep the establishment open and free to the pubic. As stated previously, it makes no sense to try and negative impact when it can be avoided all together.

I urge the committee to oppose this bill, there are important communities at risk.

Dear Senators, I respectfully ask you to NOT pass HB1807.

If this bill passes, it will have a long term detrimental impact on the people, and especially the children, of Hawaii.

The arts are not a luxury. They teach necessary skills we need more than ever, in order to face the multitude of challenges facing our state. Especially given that many aspects of the bill impacts how our haumana, our students, take part in the arts, the effects will reverberate in the vitality and innovation of our population.

These are a few of the benefits the arts provide:

- The arts teach us to be creative problem solvers. When you create art, you are making something that didn't exist before. We have problems that need solutions that don't yet exist. The arts often are where the seeds of innovation begin. Creative thinking and positive risk-taking trickles into the sciences and other fields, but creative thinking needs to be practiced, this muscle to be grown. The arts is where it grows. We need a population able to think creatively, to come up with and consider new solutions–not keep doing the same things that caused the system challenges we face.
- The arts teach us empathy. When we experience art, we see how others perceive the world. We experience the world as they see it. With the growing divisions and challenges in our islands, we need to practice tools of empathy. We need to see that each other's voices, emotions, and visions not only exist, but that they matter.
- The arts teach us that our own perspective is valid. It gives us a way to share how we see the world, what we feel, how we are drawn to express. As the social Dr Brené Brown says, "Unused creativity is not benign. It metastasizes. It turns into grief, rage, judgment, sorrow, shame." Especially given the traumas visited upon Maui after the fires, do not cut the arts. Allow the arts to help stitch our community back together.

I am a teaching artist on the Hawaii State Teaching Artist roster. It was a two year process to get on this list, which allows me to apply for grants to collaborate with classroom teachers to create art residencies that meet their goals with their students. Every step is designed to ensure the quality of what us teaching artists bring to the classrooms and communities we serve, and that

we are providing experiences that benefit the teachers, students, schools, and communities. We connect to the Hawaii Department of Education's Nā Hopena A'o framework, grounding our work in Hawaii. We connect to the teacher's core curriculum and standards, using the arts as a tool to give meaning to the learning. We follow the National Arts Standards. We custom design our projects to not only meet the classroom's curricular needs, but the social emotional needs of the students. For instance, this year I have an Artists In The Schools grant, funded through the State Foundation of Culture and the Arts where I visit Hanā Middle School once a month. I designed this residency in collaboration with the middle school science teacher. She expressed that the students' academic success was impacted by their low self image. (Indeed, as I've gotten to know these students, I've gained some sense of the challenges and traumas they deal with.) So, we designed a self portrait project that connects to their Science anatomy modules. In this project they are being encouraged to find what they like best in themselves, and to consider what their gift is, while also gaining skills in close observation and quality work that connects to their Science learning. These students, many of whom often seek ways to do the bare minimum, are creating beautiful expressions of themselves that not only connect to Science, but will impact how they see themselves as a student, and as a valued member of their community.

This is one project I can speak to, but the Artists In the Schools grants serve 124+ schools around Hawaii. Do not remove these opportunities for Hawaii students to work with professional artists, from teachers to learn alongside professional artists, and from our communities to be engaged and enlivened by art. While those who make a living in the arts will be directly impacted if this bill passes, when the arts are devalued, the vibrancy of our communities is diminished. When the arts are seen as for only a select few, everyone loses out. Everyone needs creativity and creative problem solving. Everyone deserves to have their visions and voice matter. Everyone prospers when we understand how others see and express the world. When these things don't happen, we lose innovation, and we lose wellbeing.

I am submitting written testimony in OPPOSITION TO HB1807 HD1.

For those that are supporters of HB1807 and believe we have enough art I ask for you to please reconsider this very drastic cut of funds as this will irreparably devastate Hawai'i's arts economy and future.

After all the Works of Art Special Fund 1% requirement for the State Foundation of Culture and The Arts is what:

1. Keeps our economy thriving.

It was SFCA funding that kept the downtown triangle of Downtown Art Center, Mark's garage and Hawaii State Art Museum/Capitol Modern alive during the two years that CoVid shuttered many of our local businesses. This funding brought people to our downtown and Chinatown areas and kept these business districts going. It is because of the arts and the art exhibitions which the SFCA supports that restaurants stayed open and sustained. People came to their offices in a limited fashion downtown because these places were open and this triangle was a relatively safe place to walk, dine and maintain their mental health during this most challenging time. Without this SFCA funding, our downtown Honolulu would not have today's vibrancy with new businesses and established ones now being sustained. The monetary return dollar for dollar of funding from the SFCA far exceeded what is typically achieved. Our city is now thriving with residents who discovered what art can do during CoVid and tourists who today seek out these art places when they come to Hawai'i.

2. Teaches students creativity and empowerment.

As a two-time commissioned Art-in Public Places/Doe Artist, I have had the privilege of working with students who were not achieving their best at an elementary school on Oahu. Many of these students spent time in detention and one even told me at the beginning of our project that they were not allowed to be in the same class with another student. At the end of our project, these students were working diligently together to meet our deadline when their artwork would be honored at the dedication for their artwork and mine. Others had failing grades or were on probation. Because of the opportunity to participate in this APP/DOE sculpture commission, these students became empowered as all the other students wanted to be doing what they were doing. As a result of this empowerment, several of the students achieved A's, while others created bonds with their so-called enemies. Still other students bonded in with their parents in new ways when they came to help. One shy student who could barely be heard when answering a question, spoke commandingly into the microphone at our dedication. It was this APP/DOE public art partnership that turned these students into creative thinkers and led them into future success in life. Today this group of students are contributing adults employed in a variety of occupations ranging from engineers to police. Their sculpture garden of literary characters outside the library remains loved as does mine that reflects the schools values. Both serve as a reminder of what is possible when creativity and the arts are supported. We can all be proud that these students are now contributing to our community in part due to the SFCA art funding that returned much social equity to Hawai'i.

3. **Creates a circular economy**. The SFCA funding does purchase artworks directly from artists showing at arts centers and galleries. This is a double circular economy as the money circulates through these two economic drivers. An artist's 50+ percent of the purchase goes to buy food, gas, rent and art supplies at art, craft and hardware stores. The 50% or less the art center/organization gets is used to support employees, insurance, rent, web/social media folks and many more. In addition, a majority of the funds an artist receives through an Art-In-Public-Places commission is returned directly to our local economy. The arts is the one economy that keeps the money flowing and flowing again, just as I wrote about in my children's book, "I Had A Dollar In Hawai'i. **It's a steady and positive flow of money that continues to benefit each island and our state.**

4. Positions Hawai'i as a Global Leader.

The world needs our creative and cultural leadership now. We have challenges of climate change in the face of a divided nation. Hawai'i shows the world how different cultures can exist together while incorporating traditional ways to care for each other and our environment in the face of climate change. The world is looking to us and it will be our creative thinking and arts that will position Hawai'i as a global leader.

I became an artist after visiting a museum. That is where I found the courage to leave my executive job and went back to study art and received my Masters in Sculpture from the University of Hawai'i in Manoa. I built a portfolio after returning to school for two years and was attended the graduate program for another four years. After completing my MFA and these is at a museum where many children and adults became inspired seeing my sculpture

installation. It was then I committed to a career to create public art. I chose to do so as public art becomes woven into the fabric of our comminity. It is a place where people become engaged with one another and magic happens.

That is what HB 1870 would take away. There is so much more we have to share. Let's work together and find ways to pair up SFCA funded creatives to solve our social problems. Together we could find ways to address homelessness such as Finland has done...and improve our physical and mental health through art. We can also foster new ideas that could bring up everyone's standard of living. Let's start by taking a tour of HiSam, and our public art and adjacent galleries to see and experience the art around the capitol and our arts district. There we will learn why we have what we have and what it does for all of us. Let's collaborate to make Hawaii a leader again. Just as we did when the 1% was passed and the nation followed. Please oppose HB1807 as I do.

These publicly funded programs allow artists, galleries to create and provide a necessary source of income for the work that they do.

This bill will eliminate numerous government supported arts program and initiatives statewide and will have a significant long lasting effect on our arts, cultural, and educational programs. We promote our island as a place filled with cultural significance, yet we take it away from our own people. You thrive off tourism and quite literally make millions off our people promoting the Hawaiian culture, yet you attempt to eradicate it. The irony is clear. My grandfather is the late Danny Kaleikini. He started his foundation, the Danny Kaleikini Foundation, to help promote the arts, particularly music, in our local communities. The main reason? Well, quite frankly, our government doesn't do enough. He has his scholarship at UH and we have made numerous donations to schools to help refurbish their dilapidated instruments.

His foundation also helped me with the POW! WOW! School of Music. I am the Director of the free music intensive program that coincided with the arts festival in Kakaako. I held auditions and brought in keiki from all over the island to work in a creative space, form bands, listen to well-known artists and their stories, and perform. I didn't make a single cent doing this for almost ten years. I knew the lack of music programs and felt an obligation to help, despite me being in my twenties trying to embark on my own musical journey. The point of all this is to highlight the much needed cultural and arts programs, particularly for our CHILDREN. We all know this arts fund is by far quite minimal in the greater scheme of things. So why would anyone consider eradicating this fund that would affect not just one, or two, but 13 art centers, 8 organizations, and 124 schools?

When the pandemic or any major catastrophe hits, what's the first thing we do? Hold music and art festivals to generate donations. I know many musicians, including my grandfather, who gave their time for the benefit of this state and this is the way you repay our craft? If that's the case, you shouldn't ask ANY artist to help promote this state to malihini or to perform pro bono for any cause. You talk about having aloha where there is none to be found. Think about the times you enjoyed a free arts and music festival or exhibition and more importantly hink about how our keiki felt and the inspiration they gained when they got to enjoy those events. We had our free event at the Capitol Modern on Friday and stopped the music mid-song to symbolize what it would be like. The children on the dance floor stopped dancing and smiling. It would be heartbreaking to take that away.

Testimony in opposition to House Bill 1807 | March 18th, 2024

Aloha Chair Tam, Vice Chair Martinez and members of the Committee,

The decline of our kama'aina population here has many causes, not the least of which are the crisis in housing and the exorbitant cost of living. Yet, despite those onerous hurdles, many of us choose to fight to stay. Again, for many reasons – family, community, meaningful work. But I would also posit that many of us stay because of the culture and quality of life that we engage with when we're not struggling to make ends meet. We stay because we want to share this sense of place, belonging and wonder with our children and perpetuate the meaning and values of our home.

That quality of life is being eroded each day. We see it literally with the avulsion of our beaches but also with the encroachment of corporations from the continent pushing out local businesses. We see it with so many of our friends and family moving away and taking their talents and our collective memories away with them.

The proposed change to the Works of Art Special Fund (the "Fund") is an acquiescence to this erosion. It is yet another diminishment in the quality of life that makes being here worth the struggle. The Fund supports the SFCA, whose mandate is to do more than just acquire works of art to be hung on walls. They provide free gathering places for the community throughout the islands. They engage, challenge and educate our keiki through a wide range of programming, giving them critical thinking skills, creative development and personal connection to history and the 'āina. They help to ensure that Native Hawaiian art is a living practice. They provide respit, joy and reflection in the recognition of the beauty and power of our unique culture, values and surroundings. They create and preserve our collective memories. They perpetuate these gifts that are righteous which, as Kamehameha III said, are the very life of the land.

Another stated mision of the SFCA is "the development and recognition of a professional artistic community." I would ask the Legislature to reflect on the most vibrant neighborhoods, here and on the continent, that were once overlooked and in disrepair. The first stakeholders in the revitalization of these neighborhoods have always been the artists, planting seeds of community. That creative energy attracts other risk takers, innovative food and beverage and retail tenants. That center of gravity then pulls in residents who desire proximity to, I'll say it again, a better quality of life. And all this vibrance brings real fiscal advantage to government and business: increased tax base, Federal funding, outside investment, development dollars. But those first stakeholders leave a legacy as well – they give the place its character. We should all be invested in supporting home grown artists who will continue to define what it means to live in Hawai'i, before the commercial interests of the continent make that decision for us.

This is my thinking as a kama'aina and business owner here on O'ahu. To divert 68% of the Fund's revenue for these purposes to gain 0.25% for the state's facilities repair and maintenance backlog seems short-sighted. Please work on our behalf to find a better way to honor the gifts we have been given.

Aloha mai kākou,

I'm Ualani Davis, a Native Hawaiian artist and art educator and I strongly oppose House Bill 1807.

Art is the pulse of a community. It tells us the health and wealth of our culture.

When a community is sick, the art reflects that. When a community is hurt, the art reflect that. And when art is supported and valued, so to is the community.

This bill and a series of other bills attacking public arts comes at an interesting time. In the past 4 years alone, there has been a barrage on our sense of community, culture, and sense of safety. COVID tested the ways we connect with those around us, but then there was also the red hill water crisis, Mauna Kea, Lahaina, and to a slightly less catastrophic degree, how many of us know friends and family who had to move away because they can no longer afford to live here?

When I was younger, I was told the only way to be successful was to move away. For my first year in college, I went to a school in NY, got severely depressed, and then transferred back home to go to UH. I felt like a failure coming home, until I realized all the opportunities that came with it. With in-state tuition, I could pursue an art degree without taking on additional student loans (and this was 2008 and the Great Recession, so that made a difference) and I could learn 'Ōlelo Hawaii. I could make art about my culture, family, and homeland, things that called to me and things that as a Native Hawaiian, I knew needed more support and representation

I am now a working artist and an art educator for the past 10 years at a local private school. But the things is, I say this not to toot my own horn, but offer a reality check: the only way I got this far was because I had support, and the only way I can continue to pursue art on a teacher's pay check here in Hawaii is because I live with my parents. And while I've loved creating for as long as I could remember, for my parents, the turning point, when *I think* they started supporting art as a possible career, was when I won a Gold Key Scholastic Art award in the 12th grade and my parents saw my artwork in the Hawaii State Art Museum alongside other artwork made by amazing, professional, local artists. They could see a future for what I was so clearly passionate about.

Support for the arts isn't just about beautifying public buildings. You invest in what you value. You are not investing into the temperature-controlled vault holding the artwork that

you've already collected. You are investing in the health and wealth of our community so that artists today and tomorrow may know they are valued. It's for people like me, and people like your kids that I teach that will be the amazing artists of our future. Kids that need safe spaces to create, spaces that they lost during Covid, the fire, spaces that may be their only safe space when the money at home is tight.

Safe spaces that allow kids to take risks, to collaborate, connect, experiment, explore, and express themselves, and they need to know that there are people like their parents, like you and me who care for, value, and invest in their future and all they have to offer as artists and creatives.

We are deserving of a Hawai'i that invests in that.

We're here. We are the community. We are the pulse. So ask yourself this: are you going to invest in keeping this pulse alive?

My name is Anastacia Narrajos and I am writing in strong opposition to Bill 1807. The capital improvement appropriations for renovations of state buildings is a large amount of funding that the State Foundation receives, that would directly impact Hawai'i's students, teachers and artists, thus interrupting the important effects of arts and culture has on a community.

This bill would ERADICATE the Art in Public Places Program. It would also end support for Professional Development for ALL DOE teachers, 13 art centers, and 8 organizations that offer Native Hawaiian Arts-based programs that impact 124 public and charter schools on all major islands, along with outreach programs. This bill would impact over 10,000 kids, our next generation, ON EVERY ISLAND. It would also take away much-needed staff fees, creating a catastrophic domino effect.

Personally, this would affect my livelihood as I am a teaching artist for Honolulu Theater for Youth. Our education program at HTY is funded in large part through the APP grants. I take great pride in my work, and I see first hand how our theater residencies support the artists within DOE students, give support to DOE Teachers, and have touch many generations of learners here on O'ahu. This funding gets students out of there seats, into their bodies and imaginations. It connects students to artwork created by local artists, which deepens their sense of Belonging and connection to Hawai'i. We provide a moment of play during the school day, challenge them to work collaboratively and creatively, encourage self expression, and support rigor and discipline in art making. Even if these students do not go on to become professional artists themselves, these skills can be used in any field of life.

Thank you for taking the time to read this and for taking my perspective and opinion into consideration. Again, I strongly oppose Bill 1807 and urge you to stop it here before we see the long term detrimental impacts to our entire Hawai'i community.

My name is Robert Pollock.

I testify before you today as the result of government funding to the Arts. So for me this is personal. In 1975, I co-founded the New York Guild of Composers. In 1980-1998, I founded and directed the Composers Guild of New Jersey. During that time a pro-Arts Governor, Thomas Kean, increased funding to the NJ State Council on the Arts from 2 million to 22 million dollars. My CGNJ was one of the beneficiaries of that enlightened policy. We presented concerts in all 21 counties of New Jersey; toured Denmark, Holland, Belgium, Poland, Russia, Boston, and South Carolina; produced 3 commercial CD's; and managed a robust education program in the public schools.

In 1999, I founded and now direct Ebb & Flow Arts in Hawai'i. Here in Hawai'i, we have been the beneficiary of biennium grants from SFCA. These have enabled dozens of free concerts throughout the state, as well as the development of a music education curriculum, *Scaling Haleakala*.

But there has been a slow, steady and disturbing whittling away of the SFCA's budget over the years.

I strongly oppose the HB1807 that would erroneously try to fix something that is not broken and thereby make it worse. This bill is a vile, mean-spirited piece of legislation. It would send SFCA into a "death spiral." In my nearly 50 years in the non-profit Arts world, I have never witnessed such a regressive and destructive proposal. It could turn back the clock to before the establishment of the SFCA in 1965!

What would the late Pundy Yokouchi think?? He invested in the Maui Arts & Cultural Center, and was the architect of SFCA. Will this legislature propose to erase Pundy's legacy? He had a vision - that an enlightened society fosters and encourages the arts through government support. These proposed draconian cuts to the Arts would be the work of unenlightened legislators who do not appreciate the supreme importance of aspiring to an enlightened culture.

HB 1807 is based on the illogical notion that SFCA has enough works of art. It is a vicious circle - a basic logical fallacy - to pose that ALL works of Art that can be possibly held by the State are completed. Our government would close its doors to new Art from its constituents. What about the next piece of Art? Art by its nature is a creative endeavor. Art is defined by the creation of new works. A piece of legislation based on a logical fallacy cannot stand.

The Arts are an economic boon to our society.

In 2022, nonprofit arts and culture organizations and their audiences generated \$151.7 billion in economic activity— \$73.3 billion in spending by the organizations, which leveraged an additional \$78.4 billion in event-related spending by their audiences. The impact of this economic activity is far reaching, supporting 2.6 million jobs, generating \$29.1 billion in tax revenue, and providing \$101 billion in personal income to residents. AEP6 (the authoritative Arts and Economic Prosperity Study - https:// www.americansforthearts.org/by-program/reports-and-data/ research-studies-publications/ arts-economic-prosperity-6) sends a strong signal that when we support the arts, we are investing in economic and community well-being.

However the Arts are essential in more profound ways than the material, economic, and bureaucratic. Imagination and creativity are uniquely human traits. Through our senses we experience colors, forms, sounds, and motion. We transform these objects of the senses into powerful, emotional, intellectual and healthily creative works. Such activity humanizes us and distinguishes us

from the rest of the animal world. Such artistic activity enlivens our spirits and nourishes our soul with its beauty and freedom. Art has always needed outside support: state, church, aristocratic, foundation, corporate, philanthropic, etc. If a market economy could alone sustain Art, then famous artists such as Dutch painter Vincent Van Gogh, German composer Franz Schubert and American author Herman Melville would have been rich men. But they made little money from their art during their lifetimes.

Art is a survival tool. There are countless stories of survivors from the Holocaust and other disasters who attended concerts or viewed exhibits, or heard a poetry reading that allowed them to enter the realm of Spirit and transcend the horrors of their subjugation. They survived because of Art. We must place the enlivenment of our spirits and nourishment of our souls as high a priority as the necessary sustenance of our bodies. Body is a function of Spirit. The experience of Art transcends and includes the experience of surviving. We must integrate Art into our lives and in all sectors of the society, private, civic and government. If we do not, then the reason for surviving disappears. Art reminds us of the priority of things - of what is most important in life. It pulls us away from the dark, destructive societal forces that create the "death spiral."

Cultures are remembered not for their fast food chains, commercial activity, apartment complexes, or consumerism. Cultures are remembered for the Art they create. Art Presupposes Peace. and stimulates the healthiest human process - creativity. Art keeps our imaginations active - a necessary component for future success and happiness. Reducing funding would cut monetary support for the following:

HISAM!! The State would actually close its marvelous museum? This is a cultural atrocity! It cannot be allowed to happen!

Testimony Regarding HB1807

Aloha kākou, My name is May Haunani Balino-Sing and I am here today to express my opposition to HB1807, repeal capital improvement appropriations for state building renovations as a source of funds for the works of art special fund.

This bill, introduced by Representative Kyle Yamashita of Maui, raises serious concerns regarding its potential impact on the arts community in Hawai'i. If passed, HB1807 would slash the funding of the Art in Public Places program by a staggering 70%. This drastic reduction in revenue would have far-reaching consequences, adversely affecting numerous art organizations, programs, and individual artists statewide. It is troubling to note that this bill, ostensibly introduced to benefit constituents, including students, teachers, and victims of the Lahaina wildfires, could inadvertently deprive them of essential relief and services, including vital art education benefits.

Should HB1807 be passed, it would have devastating implications for various aspects of the arts landscape in Hawai'i. For instance: 1. The closure of the Hawaii State Art Museum would result in the immediate end of exhibitions and public programs, depriving residents and visitors alike of access to cultural enrichment and artistic expression. 2. Native Hawaiian and local artists, galleries, and organizations would suffer a significant blow, as the reduction in funding would curtail crucial support systems and opportunities for creative expression and cultural preservation. 3. The impact on education programming cannot be understated. Initiatives such as the Artists in the Schools arts education program, professional development for Department of Education (DOE) teachers, and various exhibitions and ceremonies for students would face severe cutbacks, depriving young learners of valuable opportunities for artistic growth and enrichment.

Among the many galleries, organizations, and outreach programs that would be affected by HB1807 are:

• Donkey Mill Arts Center, Kahilu Theatre, Wailoa Arts Center and East Hawai'i Culture Center on Hawai'i Island

- Hui No'eau Visual Arts Center and Maui Arts and Culture Center on Maui
- Kaua'i Society of Artists on Kaua'i
- Downtown Art Center and University of Hawai'i Galleries on O'ahu.

Furthermore, as a cultural artist and beneficiary of the State Foundation on Culture and Arts Folk and Traditional Arts grant, the revival of 'ie'ie basketry, a traditional Hawaiian fiber art, serves as a poignant example of the transformative power of arts funding. It is imperative that alternative solutions be explored to address the state's building renovation needs without sacrificing critical funding for the arts. Art is not merely a luxury; it is a reflection of our shared humanity and a source of comfort, resilience, and empowerment. As a cultural practitioner deeply invested in the well-being of our community, I urge you to consider the profound implications of HB1807 and to prioritize the preservation and support of the arts in Hawai'i.

Testimony of Deborah Nehmad Before the Senate Committee on Transportation and Culture and the Arts in OPPOSITION TO HB 1807

March 19, 2024

Art and culture are NOT a luxury. They are a vital economic driver of our economy. Residents and visitors will be severely impacted by the evisceration of this vital part of who we are.

The SFCA receives approximately \$3 million per year from the 1% for art program. HB1807 will eliminate all but 32% of these funds.

There were 338 pages of testimony in opposition to HB 1807 in the House. CARES was the only voice in support. There is a reason for this lop-sided result. Most people in Hawaii oppose this bill because the overwhelming majority of Hawaii residents appreciate how art and culture enrich their lives as well as their keiki. Sunday's paper featured an article on the impact of the Lahaina fires on residents' mental health. Art and culture have long been known to be of comfort for those who are ailing in times of distress and loss.

Art and culture are a necessity as opposed to a luxury. HB 1807 is punitive, narrow minded, devastating and based on a misunderstanding of how the SFCA functions. IT HAS NO PUBLIC SUPPORT!

Every person in Hawaii aches and grieves for the loss encountered in Lahaina. Every artist and cultural practitioner feel their pain. Countless artists have contributed to efforts to help support the Lahaina community who have lost so much. We will continue to do so. Every person in Hawaii recognizes that we all must make sacrifices to lend our support. But such sacrifices should not come at the cost of other's livelihoods and the wellbeing of our state's keiki.

The funds that will be garnered from this bill are the lifeblood of the artists and cultural practitioners in the entire state but are a literal DROP IN THE BUCKET compared to the funds needed to revive Lahaina. Do not devastate an entire economic segment. The general budget breakdown of the 1% for art is as follows (although some years, the allocation for Education and Purchases of Work will exceed this amount as it did in FY2023:

Education - \$530,765

For the Artists in the Schools program which serves public and charter schools throughout the state of Hawaii to fill the gap that the DOE has in art, music and performing arts education.

Works of Art Transportation and Installation - \$201,600 Rotation of works of art throughout over 500 sites in the state, which includes neighbor island install and deinstalls of works of art, tools and materials, framing, casing, pedestals for artwork, and van and cart transportation on Oahu and neighbor islands. Kauai buildings will have art installed in December 2023. Air Conditioning maintenance at the distribution center.

Purchase of Works of Art - \$275,450

The purchase of relocatable works of art that are distributed throughout the state and also interpreted on by gallery guides at the museum as well as teaching artists for the artists in the schools program. Works of art are purchased at local galleries and shows on Oahu and the neighbor islands.

Conservation of Works of Art - \$378,328

Maintenance of the collection throughout the state, including relocatable works of art and commissioned works of art. This includes contracting for bronze and stone maintenance, to ensure that the work of art remains in the collection and in good shape. Contracts expand throughout the state including Molokai and Lanai where commissioned works of art are placed. This also includes the maintenance and community engagement of the King Kamehameha monuments on each island.

Commission of Site-Specific Art - \$1,052,938

Large site-specific works of art are commissioned for public buildings, such as Kapolei Veterans Home, Airports Division sites, Wahiawa Civic Center, Women's Community Correctional Center and other buildings that are being built or renovated for public use. Funds are also expended to create statues or monuments as directed by the legislature. Hawaii State Art Museum - \$1,049,724

Public Programs on evenings and weekends, contracting with Honolulu Theatre for Youth on augmented reality, communication and media on programs, art exhibitions and shows, gallery interpreters, the onsite school visits program called Art Bento, security contract for the works of art, maintenance of the space including the sculpture garden. Additionally, these funds are spent on the regional Scholastic Art and Writing exhibition and awards, and the Young Artists of Hawaii Awards which encourages 7-12 and K-6 students to enter and have their art on display at the museum. An award ceremony is also held at the museum and neighbor island award winners are flown in for that event. Contracting community organizations and curators to create exhibitions in the museum.

Special Fund Assessment - \$400,000 for Budget and Finance to assess the Works of Art Special Fund

The elimination of "renovation" from the percent for art law would eliminate monetary support for the following:

*THE HAWAII STATE ART MUSEUM - ALL EXHIBITIONS AND PUBLIC PROGRAMS WILL END IMMEDIATELY

*SUPPORT FOR NATIVE HAWAIIAN AND LOCAL ARTISTS, GALLERIES AND ORGANIZATIONS

Testimony Regarding HB1807

Aloha kākou, My name is Haunani Balino-Sing and I am here today to express my opposition to HB1807, repeal capital improvement appropriations for state building renovations as a source of funds for the works of art special fund.

This bill, introduced by Representative Kyle Yamashita of Maui, raises serious concerns regarding its potential impact on the arts community in Hawai'i. If passed, HB1807 would slash the funding of the Art in Public Places program by a staggering 70%. This drastic reduction in revenue would have far-reaching consequences, adversely affecting numerous art organizations, programs, and individual artists statewide. It is troubling to note that this bill, ostensibly introduced to benefit constituents, including students, teachers, and victims of the Lahaina wildfires, could inadvertently deprive them of essential relief and services, including vital art education benefits.

One of the arguments presented in favor of HB1807 is that the Hawai'i State Art Museum already possesses a sufficient collection of works of art, rendering further acquisitions unnecessary. However, this argument fails to acknowledge the fundamental role that art plays in our society, particularly in times of crisis. Art serves as a powerful tool for healing and expression, offering solace and inspiration to communities grappling with adversity.

Should HB1807 be enacted, it would have devastating implications for various aspects of the arts landscape in Hawai'i. For instance: 1. The closure of the Hawaii State Art Museum would result in the immediate end of exhibitions and public programs, depriving residents and visitors alike of access to cultural enrichment and artistic expression. 2. Native Hawaiian and local artists, galleries, and organizations would suffer a significant blow, as the reduction in funding would curtail crucial support systems and opportunities for creative expression and cultural preservation. 3. The impact on education programming cannot be understated. Initiatives such as the Artists in the Schools arts education program, professional development for Department of Education (DOE) teachers, and various exhibitions and ceremonies for students would face severe cutbacks, depriving young learners of valuable opportunities for artistic growth and enrichment.

Among the many galleries, organizations, and outreach programs that would be affected by HB1807 are:

• Donkey Mill Arts Center, Kahilu Theatre, Wailoa Arts Center and East Hawai'i Culture Center on Hawai'i Island

- Hui No'eau Visual Arts Center and Maui Arts and Culture Center on Maui
- Kaua'i Society of Artists on Kaua'i
- Downtown Art Center and University of Hawai'i Galleries on O'ahu.

Furthermore, as a cultural artist and beneficiary of the State Foundation on Culture and Arts Folk and Traditional Arts grant, the revival of 'ie'ie basketry, a traditional Hawaiian fiber art, serves as a poignant example of the transformative power of arts funding. It is imperative that alternative solutions be explored to address the state's building renovation needs without sacrificing critical funding for the arts. Art is not merely a luxury; it is a reflection of our shared humanity and a source of comfort, resilience, and empowerment. As a cultural practitioner deeply invested in the well-being of our community, I urge you to consider the profound implications of HB1807 and to prioritize the preservation and support of the arts in Hawai'i.

Dear Chair Lee and esteemed committee members,

As a current and former board member of several local nonprofit arts organizations, including the Hawai'i Museums Association and the Performing Arts Presenters of Hawai'i, I strongly oppose this bill. While I wholeheartedly agree that appropriations should be made to support performing arts initiatives and expanded arts programming in schools, these should be made in addition to, not at the expense of, the vital consistent funding that provides for visual arts and related programming across the state. Fiscal responsibility is important, and I'm glad our legislators always have this in mind. The amount from the Works of Art Special Fund is a miniscule portion of the state's total annual budget, at less than 0.05% in FY23.

The reality is that funding for arts and culture is commonly the first to be cut, and the last to be well funded. This is why the Works of Art Special Fund remains a brilliant concept to ensure consistent annual funding for arts and culture, and why Hawai'i's historic legislation has been copied by state and territorial governments many times over. The ongoing display, maintenance and care of artworks will continue to require funds alongside those used to aquire new artworks. The Works of Art Special Fund is an essential source of support as the state's art collection ages. As new construction of state buildings becomes less common and renovation more prevalent, the Works of Art Special Fund will only remain viable as it is currently written, applying to capital improvement appropriations that are designated for the construction **or** renovation of state buildings.

Cutting this consistent funding and replacing it partially with an annual appropriation that is inconsistent at best, and nonexistent at worst, is too great of a risk to the state's art collection and its public service mandate. Adding an **additional** appropriation for the stated performing arts and arts education goals would be wonderful - but not in exchange for damaging the integrity of the Works of Art Special Fund.

I would love to see a proposal to expand arts and culture support beyond artwork acquisition and visual arts programming, that does not include the detrimental actions proposed in this bill. This bill as written results in a net negative impact for the arts and cultural community. Constraining the future funding of the Works of Art Special Fund does not provide a pathway toward responsible, consistent, and comprehensive support for arts and culture initiatives that inspire, unite, enrich, and heal our communities across Hawai'i.

- 4. <u>Arts improve academic performance</u>. Students engaged in arts learning have higher GPAs, standardized test scores, and college-going rates as well as lower drop-out rates. These academic benefits are reaped by students across all socio-economic strata. Yet, the Department of Education reports that access to arts education for students of color is significantly lower than for their white peers. <u>91% of Americans</u> believe that arts are part of a well-rounded K-12 education.
- 5. <u>Arts spark creativity and innovation</u>. Creativity is among the top five applied skills sought by business leaders—per the Conference Board's Ready to Innovate report—with 72% saying creativity is of "high importance" when hiring. Research on creativity shows that Nobel laureates in the sciences are 17 times more likely to be actively engaged as an arts maker than other scientists.
- 6. <u>Arts have social impact</u>. University of Pennsylvania researchers have demonstrated that a high concentration of the arts in a city leads to higher civic engagement, more social cohesion, higher child welfare, and lower poverty rates.
- 7. <u>Arts improve healthcare</u>. Nearly one-half of the nation's healthcare institutions provide arts programming for patients, families, and even staff. 78% deliver these programs because of their healing benefits to patients—shorter hospital stays, better pain management, and less medication.
- 8. <u>Arts for the health and well-being of our military</u>. The arts heal the mental, physical, and moral injuries of war for military servicemembers and Veterans, who rank the creative arts therapies in the top four (out of 40) interventions and treatments. Across the military continuum, the arts promote resilience during pre-deployment, deployment, and the reintegration of military servicemembers, Veterans, their families, and caregivers into communities.
- 9. <u>Arts Strengthen Mental Health</u>. The arts are an effective resource in reducing depression and anxiety and increasing life satisfaction. Just 30 minutes of active arts activities daily can combat the ill effects of isolation and loneliness associated with COVID-19.

Summary:

The arts are fundamental to our humanity. They ennoble and inspire us—fostering creativity, empathy, and beauty. The arts also strengthen our communities socially, educationally, and economically—benefits that persist even during a pandemic that has been <u>devastating to the arts</u>. The following ten reasons show why an investment in artists and arts organizations is vital to the nation's post-pandemic healing and recovery.

I am writing to oppose HB 1807. I have been and currently live as an artist and art teacher on the west side of Kaua'i. I have worked in the arts community here for 20 years. I grew up in two worlds, one here with the beauty of the island inspiring my artistic vision and the other in North Carolina where I was able to receive an arts education that enabled me to go on to receive a Masters in Fine Arts and develop into the person that I am today.

As an adult when I came back to Kaua'i I wanted to be able to give the children here the same opportunities that I had on the mainland as a child. I began teaching at my Alma Mater, Eleele Elementary School as the art teacher with my own classroom, what a dream come true! This was in 2005 under a grant that sadly only lasted that year. Since then, in pursuit of bringing the arts to children on the west side of Kauai, I worked for various non-profit organizations (which were often funded by money that the HB 1807 would take away) Kauai Academy of Creative Arts, Circles of Light, Storybook Theatre of Hawaii, and the Queen Liliuokalani Trust. As the funding for these organizations waxed and waned I needed to find a more consistent paycheck so I became a substitute teacher for the HIDOE. Since I was known in our community as an art teacher, many of the teachers I work for leave plans for me to do art with their students, this continues today.

The schools I work for really try to incorporate the arts into their enrichment education, but it is often secondary to everything. I have yet to see an elementary art classroom since my time at Eleele School almost 20 years ago. Art teachers are left to scramble around campus toting scrounged art supplies and left with only 30-40 minutes total time with each class, once every two weeks or so. Physically and mentally this is too much for me, so I have declined positions as the art teacher at the elementary schools on the west side. I teach art during the summer enrichment program at Kekaha School where I am given a classroom and ample time to teach art to kids that want to learn. My class has been filled every summer.

I could go on to tell you the benefits I see in my students from getting an early art education, but this may take up too much space. In short, their social and emotional skills benefit, they are better problem solvers, their confidence increases, and they develop into more balanced humans with better coping skills. I see it in my community, and know that it is a benefit to have arts education. Please do not take away opportunities for our youth to grow into the people we need for our community to flourish. I hope next time I write it will be in support of a bill for the Arts. I humbly oppose HB 1807, thank you.

This testimony is to express my strong objection to HB1807. I have been an art professor at University of Hawai'i at Manoa since 1992, and am also appointed Acting Director of the John Young Museum, The Art Gallery, and the Commons Gallery at UHM from 8/23-8/85. As an educator and Acting Gallery Director, I see the positive impacts that the 1% for art makes on the community, Native Hawaiian artists, and the emerging artists. The SFCA is one of the only avenues for support for Native Hawaiian artists. Recently, the The Art Gallery at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa held the exhibition Mai Nā Kūpuna Mai, which featured works by Native Hawaiian artists. The SFCA recommended four major pieces out of this show for purchase. Three of those artists had not had work previously collected by the SFCA (Margues Hanalei Marzan, Maika'i Tubbs, Puni Jackson) The fourth artist, Sean Kekamakupa'aikapono Kaonohiokalani Lee Loy Browne, is considered a treasure of the community. While the SFCA has collected his sculpture in the past, this is the first of his paintings recommended for collection. The bill states that "the SFCA has enough works of art and there is no need to acquire more art for the state collection." That is not true. The state does not have enough work by Native Hawaiian artists and is working to address that through recommendations of purchases.

The state also does not have enough work by the upcoming generations of emerging artists. Recently the SFCA also recommended for purchase the work of three MFA students part of the current show that is up at the UH Art Gallery, Still Standing. There are currently 280 art students at UHM, who have a great deal to contribute to the community. Often the first opportunity students have professionally is funded through programs offered by the State Foundation and Culture in the Arts. The SFCA unds organizations that give young artists the opportunity to exhibit and sell their work and to work in the community doing valuable service such as Arts in the School. Compared to other states Hawai'i is sadly lacking in art education in public schools. Often the only exposure students get to the arts is through SFCA programs. Already, there is a huge brain, drain, with talented students going to other states where there is more opportunity, without the 1% for art, we would lose even more of our talented young artists. Because I work closely with these young artist, I know how passionate driven and gifted they are. I know how much they are willing to give back to the community, and it is important for them to have the cultural institutions in place that allow them to reach their full potential. In sharing their immense talents with the community they make the state a better place to live in. I have taught at UHM for 32 years, and over the years,

I have seen the great impact that my former students have made in the community because of their access to programming that is funded by the SFCA.

Most other states have private galleries that participate in the cultural discourse and support artists. Because of the high cost of real estate Hawai'i has far fewer private galleries. Artists who are making a cultural impact and furthering the pursuit of knowledge in the field of art are completely dependent on public institutions to show and sell their work. Many of the wealthiest property owners in the state live in other states or countries, and support the cultural institutions in their home cities, not here. SFCA is one of the only sources of revenue for nearly every major cultural institution. The SFCA was the first institution of its kind in the country and marks a major achievement for the State.

Tourist destinations are becoming more competitive. Many tourists look for a place that offers cultural engagement. Funding of the arts is essential in making Hawaii a desirable destination. The arts also raise the quality of life for those who live here. Thank you for considering my testimony. As a concerned citizen, longstanding supporter of arts and culture in Hawai'i, and trustee of non-profit Hawai'i Contemporary, I am writing to express strong opposition to House Bill 1807. This measure would effectively gut the ongoing work of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts and limit funding to capital improvements, performing arts initiatives and school arts programs.

While the work the bill supports is worthwhile, it is highly limited and insufficient to support the State's creative arts sector, which accounts for 4.5% of state GDP and is the fifth largest private sector source of jobs. Indeed, the State looks to growth of the Creative Sector as an important part of economic development by creating direct jobs and spawning innovations that drive job creation in other sectors.

A vital and vibrant centerpiece of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) is Capitol Modern, a center for promoting, perpetuating, and preserving culture and the arts in Hawai'i. Gutting the budget of Capitol Modern does an enormous disservice to arts and culture overall and especially that of native Hawaiians. Authentic traditions that extend deep into time are part of our identity and form the roots of our community. The perpetuation of these traditions, their expression by today's Hawaiian artists, and the public exhibition of the work provide an essential link between our history and future and bind us as a community.

Moreover, House Bill 1807 would have a devastating impact for Hawai'i Contemporary (HC), an arts and culture organization which showcases the work of contemporary artists across the state, alongside major national and international artists. Since 2017, through 3 major arts exhibitions and year-round programming, HC has contributed hundreds of millions (as measured by DBEDT) in economic impact, generated over 300,000 attendees from across the state and internationally, and generated 200 jobs locally. Several hundred educational programs have been provided free and to the public and 7000 students have benefited from free transportation and exhibition passes. Without the funding which HC receives via SFCA, HC's work is at severe risk.

Yet, the benefits to our people are far-reaching and extend to all ages. Studies show that arts and culture programs enhance academic performance of students, especially those of low income; boost mental health and well-being; help aging brains to remember; and foster community unity. Let us continue to provide this for the people of our State.

In conclusion, I urge you to oppose House Bill 1807 and its negative consequences for the State of Hawai'i. Thank you for considering my testimony.

I notice my peers, mid twenties and older, who struggled academically similarly to me but did not have the privileged access to art that I did. They had an interest in the arts, but no place to practice or expose themselves to it in a formal setting like school. Without exaggeration, many of these peers experience hardships like addiction and unemployment, which is a direct correspondence to quality of education. I do not think it is a coincidence that I was 1) exposed to and encouraged in the arts and 2) possess skills that make me a "valuable" member of society. Without art, I would have completely disengaged from school, which would have led me down an unthinkable path from the one I am on today as an artist + educator. I have seen the way art changes people's lives, old to young. I teach folks from all walks of life at Fishschool here in Honolulu. Art is not a privilege - art is a valuable component in understanding history and building empathy towards others, to open doors for people who would otherwise be left behind. These lessons cannot be understood or quantified in a dollar amount. To de-fund the SFCA is to create a society impossible to live in.

The everyday person, unknowingly, engages with art every single day. From architecture, interior design, television shows and movies, games, food, industrial design: the list goes on and on. A creative person is behind every single thing we love, and these cultural producers are beyond entitled to the support of the state. Art is the thing we turn to when we need a resting place. Art is where we go to understand each other. Art is how we feel understood. Art is an invaluable asset to the construction of a society worth engaging with.

I was recently informed that **House Bill 1807** was initially cleared by the House Finance Committee, and is now slated for hearings by both the Senate Transportation and Culture and the Arts Committee, as well as the House Culture, Arts and International Affairs Committee.

If my understanding of Bill 1807 is correct, subsequent passage (of this Bill) would lead to very significant trimming of the budget currently devoted to supporting art in Hawaii.

Before you make your final decisions regarding this bill, I would like for each of you to take a stroll through our Honolulu City Hall and Hawaii State Capitol buildings. Take a look and actually make an effort to soak in all the sights around you. Notice the paintings on the walls, 3D sculptures, other pieces of art, various architectural features, chandeliers, etc. Even better, visit our local museums. Do not just view the works of art, but actually spend the time reading the artist's statements. Every piece of art bears meaning. I would expect that each of you are aware of the significant meanings of our Hawaii State Capitol's design, individual art pieces (such as "Aquarius" by artist Tadashi Sato), and surrounding statues?

While you still have these visions within your minds, imagine stripping away all these features so that you have essentially flat, blank, featureless walls. Yes, at one point or another, each of these features were created by the ingenious imagination of artists.

While I do empathize with Hawaii's budgetary crisis, the need for disaster management with recovery and rebuilding especially in light of the Lahaina and Kula fires, and the likely permanent need towards funding the Rail project, I propose to you that all of these issues speak of an even greater need for artistic talent to be promoted within our state.

If any of you have had the opportunity to visit other states in the US, or even other countries, think back as to what you were interested in doing. Aside from the natural splendor many lands have to offer, did you also visit sites such as Disneyland, Legoland, museums, historic structures, wineries, high end restaurants, etc? It is art that helps stimulate the imagination. I am a teaching artist with the Hawai'i State Foundation and am contacting you to oppose **House Bill 1807,** which will be introduced to the Senate floor on **Tuesday, March 19.** It is very concerning to our Arts community and small organizations. It will impact DOE students and youth experiencing Homelessness, who will benefit the most from the artists-in-school programs. With this Bill, the teaching artist residencies planned for next school year will not be funded and will disappear. Many SFCA programs that contribute to all communities in need will also disappear. We remember how much Hawai'i children and adults suffered from connection losses during the pandemic. Art became a tool for rebuilding our community, healing, and helping us find common ground and reconnect.

I became a teaching artist in 2021 with the HSFCA, focusing on community art inclusive of marginalized populations like Ryse Hawai'i. The art installation on the chamber's floor of the State Capitol perfectly exemplifies our community's need for the arts. **Not All Backpacks Carry the Same Weight** has benefited HS students and youth experiencing Homelessness at Ryse. The young adults learn to trust in the shelters and engage with the Hawai'i community safely. Both groups collaborating on this project understood the importance of this art project as it concerns their demographic, offering us their perspectives and experiences.

People have responded strongly since the exhibition at **Capitol Modern** in May 2023, the conference on Homelessness, and the DOE counselors' conference. Visitors have connected, shared their own experiences of Homelessness, and felt that this art installation is necessary for our community.

As I was installing this work at the **State Capitol** last Tuesday, Staff and visitors shared their emotions about the impact of this Hawai'i Community issue.

HSFCA encourages artists like me to bridge communities and engage with marginalized groups and schools in need.

For next school year, I plan an art residency for Jarret MS in Palolo, where I will work with English and Slow Learners classes.

With one class, we will address youth vaping in Hawai'i, an essential issue in our state using the art process.

I am committed to helping marginalized groups in Hawai'i and will apply for grants **if Bill 1807 does not pass.**

I am writing to request that you oppose House Bill 1807 HD2 relating to the Works of Art Special Fund.

As you are aware that the Works of Art Special Fund goes far beyond supporting the acquisition of new works of art for the SFCA's collection, it has annually provided upwards of \$600,000 for arts education in Hawai'i public schools and communities on Maui, Moloka'i, Lāna'i, Kaua'i, O'ahu and Hawai'i island, serving tens of thousands of students and teachers.

It is my understanding that appropriations were recently made to the bill to provide continued funding for school arts programs, and I thank you for this. It is not clear, however, specifically how much money will allotted for this purpose. Will it equate to the current State budget that is supporting arts education in Hawai'i public schools?

In addition to bringing arts to Hawai'i public schools, the Works of Art Special Fund has also provided jobs for hundreds (maybe thousands) of artists across the State. I have been a teaching artist in Maui County (on Maui, Moloka'i and Lāna'i) for over 30 years, funded by grants awarded by the HSFCA. My colleagues and I have made our livelihood in designing and delivering high quality arts education residencies to Hawai'i students, and professional development training for classrooms teachers. Our dollars are earned and spent here in Hawai'i, thanks to these dedicated funds. Our careers will be in jeopardy if this funding faces large cuts.

I sincerely ask, as you move forward in making a decision with this bill to deeply consider the impact you can make (hopefully a good one) on the public education system here in Hawai'i. By maintaining a generous budget for arts education, you will be helping in enriching the lives of tens of thousands of Hawai'i public school keiki.

If you have any questions on the effects and impact of arts education, I invite you to come observe any of our in-school residencies. Come witness how the arts engage students in the learning experience, while building skills that will serve them throughout their lives*.

*The arts develop students' cognitive skills and capacities for critical thinking, problem solving, creativity, and innovation, the personal capacities for self-regulation, self-efficacy, self-

expression, and self-motivation, and the social and civic capacities for communication, collaboration and participation in changing societies.

Local artists and educators vehemently oppose HB 1807 as it seeks to repeal capital improvement appropriations for renovations of state buildings, effectively slashing around 70% of the revenue for the Art in Public Places program. This move would have dire consequences, severely impacting numerous arts organizations, arts education initiatives, outreach programs, and individual artists across the state. Despite attempts in the latest version of the bill to mitigate its negative effects on education and performing arts through appropriation, the proposed funding falls significantly short of compensating for the anticipated losses.

This includes well-known institutions such as the Donkey Mill Arts Center, Hui Noe'au, and the Maui Arts and Culture Center.
- 3. **Education Programming:** The elimination of funding would severely affect arts education programs serving 124 public and charter schools across Hawaii. By ensuring that all individuals have access to artistic experiences, regardless of their background or circumstances, we can foster a more vibrant, cohesive, and resilient society. This proposed bill amendment would diminish a portion of the revenue allocated to the Art in Public Places program, potentially harming or eliminating government assistance for numerous arts organizations, initiatives, and individual artists across the state.

With these considerations, I urge you to prioritize funding for the arts and allocate resources to support a diverse range of artistic endeavors, including visual arts, performing arts, literary arts, and cultural heritage.

However, those mistaken assumptions ignore a sizable consituency that regularly benefits from, and will be the most negatively affected by, the potential passing of this bill. Children.

Nearly half of of Hawai'i's public and charter schools receive arts programming because of the one percent allocation. Cutting back on that allocation would mean that thousands of Hawai'i's children would be deprived of direct, interactive, targeted arts experiences that are otherwise not available to them. As Kennedy points out in his quote, the arts sit at the core of who we are as a nation, as a state, and as a society, as well as culturally defining who we are as a people. The arts are about humanity. Creative work in the classroom helps each child become a more balanced, engaged individual who will grow into an impassioned community contributor. Considering the difficultied faced by many in our community due to recent disasters, the arts are needed more than ever to help heal and give us a way to reach out in direct support of each other.

The one percent allocation has provided the state with a great number of artworks and art opportunities. But diminishing the allocation will negatively affect those most vulnerable and who most benefit from the annual experiences supported by that funding. The funding isn't about the art that is in storage or already hanging on the walls in the capital. The funding is about children in rural and neighbor island spaces that benefit from the visiting of a live artist who inspires them.

Avoid relying on mistaken assumptions and instead rise to pass the test that Kennedy set us so long ago. Vote against HB1807 to demonstrate that we are a state that values the arts because we value the many, many children who benefit from artistically inspiring experiences.

I was first contracted as an art installer, then the first collections manager, and acting public art manager through the opening of the Hawai'i State Art Museum (HiSAM). I believe in the visionary concept of the original Art in State Buildings Law, or 1% for art. From SFCA website -

The works of art special fund shall be used **solely** for the following:

- 1. Costs related to the acquisition of works of art, including any consultant or staff services required to carry out the art in public places and relocatable works of art programs;
- 2. Site modifications, display, and interpretive work necessary for the exhibition of works of art;
- 3. Upkeep services, including maintenance, repair, and restoration of works of art;
- 4. Storing and transporting works of art.

Preserve and honor the intent of the 1% for art law. Over the past 10 years, 1% funds established for visual arts of permanent and lasting value have been increasingly diverted beyond the original and stated purpose to contracted curation, private management of the museum, performing arts, and unnecessary rebranding. Shift focus to rebuilding the integrity of the agency and programs through recruitment and retention of qualified staff.

New state buildings continue to be created and each major project deserves site specific commissioned art, integrated into the building fabric or given thoughtful placement. Public art should continue to be created to enhance buildings and enrich the public, visitors, and staff. The Art in Public Places portable and commissioned art require sustained funding for professional stewardship, conservation treatment and ongoing maintenance to preserve our shared cultural heritage.

Rather than cut funding for the arts, it is critical to retain visual arts funding for the Art in Public Places Program through the 1% for art and dedicate additional, **separate** and sustained funding for the performing arts in Hawai'i.

However, it is dubious to suggest that limiting the allocations of Art Special Fund is going to have a meaningful impact on the broader budgetary woes facing the Legislature. The arts are not simply a piece of low-hanging financial fruit, they are the way a people makes sense of the world around them. It is disheartening to see such a proudly Democratic state go the way of the Republican party and demand reform of art funding. I am not an accountant, and therefore I cannot provide an alternative to how to address the quite real financial concerns the legislature faces. I am simply writing as a consumer of the arts whose life, like hundreds and thousands of others, is enriched by the works that our great state patronizes and displays.

A "surplus" of art, as the bill describes yet provides no metric as to how they determined a "surplus," does not mean the state can wash its hands of art patronage. Funding for the arts is an investment in our heritage, it is not a legislative pet project. How can we, in good conscience, take away a primary source of funding for native artists when the world has already taken so much from them? Can we not leave them this single penny of state funds? It would seem in the eyes of those who drafted this bill that they would rather put a penny towards a building rather than what fills it. It would seem that they would rather take a penny away from the voices of our islands.

They are works of resistance and beauty and pain and anguish and love and liberation. They are the beating heart of our state, and this bill would cut off its oxygen. I strongly oppose HB1807 and respectfully request that the Committee not pass this bill.

The Hawai'i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) and all the programs and funding it supports, are being threatened by HB1807.

Should this bill go through, our local arts community will be seriously devastated. Many arts organizations are already on the brink of survival, and the loss of funding from the SFCA could mean their demise or could severely restrict what they can offer to the community at large.

One of these arts organizations is the Honolulu Printmakers, which is struggling to pay high rent downtown, and fees for electricity, water, and other key expenses. Even if the Honolulu Printmakers could survive the loss of grants from the SFCA, it would have to cut programs that bring mainland artists to Hawai'i or allow local artists to offer workshops. The Honolulu Printmakers has recently brought Hiroki Morinoue, a nationally known Japanese woodblock printing artist and resident of the Big Island, and another Big Island artist, Faith Stone, to Oahu to teach workshops. The Printmakers also has an annual exhibition that is open to artists from all the islands and draws valuable support from the community.

The Honolulu Printmakers, like the Downtown Art Center and the Hawai'i State Art Museum, draws visitors and members of our community downtown and makes this area safer for everyone. They help adjacent businesses to thrive, and they bring income to the state. As in New York City and elsewhere, artists and arts organizations here in Hawai'i are actively contributing to the improvement of urban areas.

The Honolulu Printmakers is only one example of many exemplary arts organizations, throughout the islands, that would be affected by SB 1807.

SB 1807 would also cut valuable funding to programs supporting educators, exhibitions for young student artists, and outreach for struggling individuals. This funding supports those who are working to make life better and more meaningful for everyone.

The arts are much more than the sale and collection of artworks. The arts are a vital expression of our humanity. Whether it is visual arts, writing, music, dance, theater or most importantly, cultural practices, the arts encourage us to unite, help, and share with each other.

Start at the beginning, the inception of the statuary authority in 1967, of the Percent for Art Law, <u>chapter 103-8.5</u>, Hawai'i Revised Statutes.

Hawai'i was the FIRST state in the nation to adopt a percent-for-art law with the enactment of the Art in State Buildings Law, which designated one percent of construction costs of new buildings for the acquisition of works of art, either by commission or purchase. In 1989, State Legislature of Hawai'i created the Works of Art Special Fund, expanding upon the provisions of the Art in State Buildings Law to include having works of art available to all state public places.¹

1) Hawaii legislators of the time should be lauded and applauded for their foresight in considering the value, not only of sharing the importance of art to our state and community, but <u>of</u> our state and community, and the historical considerations of the native Hawaiian culture and community and the educational impact on the many generations of Hawai'i residents.

2) Our legislators were the pioneers in recognizing the importance of art to the human spirit and development. Today, there are over 300 public art programs <u>nationwide</u> at the federal, state and county levels. ² This is an indication and validation of the importance and value of the concept of financial support for art in public places.

I am personally appalled at the introduction of SB 1807 by Representative Kyle Yamashita (Maui). My growth as an artist started at McKinley High School (1969 – 1971) with classes taught by Charles Higa and James Nakamoto. I attended the University of Hawaii Manoa and graduated with a BFA in Graphic Design. I studied printmaking with Charles Cohan and Allyn Bromley at UH Manoa before attending graduate school at Colorado State University where I received a master's degree in Printmaking. After returning to Hawai'i I was fortunate to join the art department at Kapi'olani Community College for the past 20 years prior to my recent retirement. While teaching at KCC and participating in various aspects of the Honolulu art community, such as the Honolulu Printmakers (founded over 93 years ago), I always included visits to the many art venues available in Honolulu such as the Hawai'i State Art Museum and the Honolulu Museum of Art (HoMA). The access to such valuable resources was and still is vital to the learning and growth experiences of student's development. While traveling around the world and in different states on the mainland I was able to see and experience different art venues and community in the whole state of Hawai'I that was part of my growth through the years.

Dear Chair Tam, Vice Chair Martinez, and members of the Committee,

I am writing to you in strong opposition of HB 1807. This bill will potentially cut 50% of the Art in Public Places program revenue, adversely reducing or eliminating government support for many arts organizations, programs, and individual artists statewide. The bill states that the SFCA has enough works of art and there is no need to acquire more art for the state collection

As a public school teacher at Wai`alae Elementary Public Charter School, through the Hawai`i State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (HSFCA), my class and school was able to participate in the Hawai'i State Art Museum's (HiSAM) Art Bento Program, which is funded by the HSFCA's Art in Public Places Program (APP).

This outreach program brought a well-trained teaching artist into our school. She conducted lessons using reproductions of artworks from the APP collection on view at HiSAM as a catalyst for engaged learning. My student stated, "I felt elated to dance because I let my body be free to move wherever I wanted to and be free to make mistakes and nobody cares." Another student stated that, "It was very calming at the same time while it also felt fun. I felt quite exhilarated while I was dancing with Ms. M. and my classmates. I felt relaxed when I was dancing and felt like I released tension from my body."

Perhaps the most special, magical experience was going to the Hawai'i State Museum. There is a bus shortage and buses are really expensive. Thanks to the funding by the HSFCA's Art in Public Places Program, students like my class got to experience this truly magical experience. My students were enthralled. One student stated, "I really liked the art in the museum because every picture has a hidden message for something by the artist for people to find out. Then that might make an impact on those people and could help the world to be a better place for other people and the aina. So if there is a picture of the 'āina or a kalo that is getting destroyed could mean to help the kalo or the aina so it can last as long as possible so if you save this program then there is a possibility that the kids who go to this program could help the world be a better place when they grow up! I liked the art museum a lot because these art pieces are very interesting and important because they have a hidden message like if there is a picture of the aina that is getting destroyed by factories or bulldozers then we know we should do something about it before it becomes a reality."

It saddens me that if this Bill goes through, the potential 50% cuts will deeply impact art programs that have benefited thousands of students throughout the islands. Our keiki may no longer have the opportunity to visit and experience the wonderful art museums we have! My student stated, "I highly suggest that the Art Bento Program continue to be funded for future generations of public schools to see these amazing art pieces. I understand how much work goes into protecting Hawai'i. On the other hand, students in public schools in Hawai'i need field trips and other experiences that take them outside of the classroom." Another stated, "I genuinely think we need to keep Art Bento for all of the other future classes in all public schools in Hawai`i to see all the amazing art that's in the museum. Others may think the art is not as important and will not fund the Art Bento Program. I do realize that there are other important needs in Hawai'i like the high cost of living in this amazing place. Despite having all this in Hawai'i, I still feel that we should fund the Art Bento Program for all the future classes of public schools in Hawai'i. Art comes in many forms like, drawing, coloring, dancing, etc. Children learn in different ways and art is one of the ways some children can learn. No matter what, art helps children to express their feelings and thoughts." This is a testament of how continued funding by HSFCA's Art in Public Places Program (APP) is vital.

To conclude, as another student stated, "In summary, I think we need to keep the funds for Art Bento so that others can experience Art Bento! I know that some people don't think art is of any importance. I understand that Hawai'i has some problems that need to be solved like violence and homelessness. However, art can be very beneficial to our society! I've seen with my own eves that art can make great changes in people. These changes include more empathy, more expression, less violence and much more good overall! I know that we can protect all the hope and beauty of Hawai'i!" I cannot say enough how important it is to continue funding. Some in our community and even Legislature, may feel that funding Art is not important. I know that budget is always an issue. We have so many needs in Hawai`i. However, I have seen the true transformational power of funding Art programs. Through the Arts, our children learn empathy, creativity, and so much more than is needed to become well-rounded and truly good people that will be change makers that we need. For so many of our youth, Art is a way to express, heal, share, and find hidden talents. Art helps our children to express their voices. I address you today with a sense of urgency regarding the proposed bill, HB 1807, HD2, which poses a significant threat to the arts and cultural landscape of our state. This bill seeks to revoke capital improvement appropriations for "state building renovations," diverting funds from the "one-percent-for-art special fund," as outlined in Session Laws of Hawaii 1967 (ACT 298).

If enacted, this bill would result in a drastic 68% reduction in revenue for the art in public places program, profoundly impacting government support for numerous arts organizations, programs, and individual artists across Hawaii. The bill argues that the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts (SFCA) "already possesses an adequate collection of artworks, rendering further acquisitions unnecessary." However, it fails to recognize the ongoing need for art acquisition and support within our communities.

Furthermore, HB 1807 aims to remove "renovations of state building" from the one percent for art law, projecting a loss of \$40 million to all state arts programs. The bill's purported appropriation of funds for "performing arts initiatives and expands arts programming in the school" is misleading. In reality, no such program exists, and these funds will not reach the performing arts and art programming currently managed by the State Foundation.

If HB 1807, HD2 is passed, all state museums (including those in the outer islands) and public art programs will face closure on July 1, 2024. This poses an existential threat to our cultural heritage and artistic expression.

As stewards of our state's future, I urge you to oppose the passage of HB 1807, HD2. The arts are not expendable—they are the soul of our communities, the expression of our identity, and the cornerstone of our cultural heritage. Let us stand together to protect and preserve them.

Chair Lee, Vice-Chair Inouye and members of the Committee, I am Sherman Warner, a resident of Hawai'i Island, and I'm thankful for this opportunity to submit testimony in OPPOSITION to HB 1807, HD2.

I have been involved in the arts professionally and as a volunteer since 1969. In my retirement, I served for 8 years as a commissioner with the Hawaii State Foundation on Culture and the Arts and for several years as a director, president of the board, and as chair of the exhibition committee that oversees the art galleries at the Kahilu Theatre.

In the 22 years since I retired and returned to Hawaii (where I was born, raised and educated), I have followed the health, the challenges, and the resiliency of Hawaii's arts and cultural sector. I have also followed legislation and policies affecting artists, arts organizations, cultural practitioners and cultural organizations. I cannot recall another bill that presented such an existential threat to the Hawaii State Foundation on Culture and the Arts having advanced this far in the legislative process. The damage that HB 1807, HD2 might cause is hard to overstate. I can't imagine what reason there might be for inflicting such damage on the essential work of the Hawaii State Foundation on Culture and the Arts as it continues its mission to promote, preserve, and perpetuate the arts and culture of Hawai'i. To undercut the pioneering funding model that inspired arts funding across the nation would be a loss to the people of Hawaii that would be akin to arbitrarily deciding to cut public library funding by 50 percent.

HRS Section 9-21 states the function of the grants this bill seeks to cut. That is:

"Support, promote, and recognize excellence of the State's diverse cultural, creative, and traditional artists; and [3] Create, display, and maintain in public places and the state art museum a collection of works of art that: [A] Represents the diversity and excellence of the State's artistic expression; and [B] Provides to all the citizens of the State the fullest possible access to the highest quality aesthetic and educational experiences available "In which there is no substantial evidence that all of these requirements have not been met.

The Hawai'i State Constitution Article IX Section 9 declares, "The State shall have the power to preserve and develop the cultural, creative and traditional arts of its various ethnic groups." Along with this, Article X Section 4 expresses that the State must promote Hawaiian culture, history, and language. The state must provide Hawaiian educational programs consisting of language, culture, and history, and several art institutions currently do this with the funding granted.

Concerning these statutes, we have reason to believe that up until now, all art centers that will be affected have upheld their purpose and function of not only beautifying the State but also serving as educational platforms about the State & Kingdom's history, therefore HB1807 remains unsupported.

With the passing of HB1807, there will be many places that will no longer be able to continue their important art programs, such as the Youth Poet Laureate program.

The Youth Poet Laureate program seeks to bring art education and cultural significance to our youth. Poetry is a form of art, it is also a form of Native Hawaiians perpetuating culture. As a former Youth Poet Laureate, granted the opportunity by funds like these given to places like Maui Arts Cultural Center, I get to travel America and carry out this function. House Bill 1807 HD2 seeks to, among other things, remove the existing requirement that one percent of construction costs for the original construction of any state building be allocated to works of art in the State Foundation on Culture and Arts' Works of Art Special Fund.

This testimony in opposition summarizes key reasons why this bill should not be passed:

Weakening of the State's Artistic Culture: The proposed bill undermines Hawaii's robust arts and culture scene. The percentage for art law was initially established to increase public access to the arts by funding the acquisition of artworks for state-owned buildings. Conflicts of Interest: Permitting state agencies to incorporate donated art raises concerns about accountability and conflicts of interest. Artwork acquired this way may not be appropriate or effective in the agency's context.

In sum, I strongly oppose House Bill 1807 HD2 because as it will weaken Hawaii's artistic culture, negatively impact local artists, decrease public access to art within state-owned buildings, and create conflicts of interest by permitting state agencies to incorporate donated art.

I am writing to OPPOSE bill 1807 HB. I am a public school elementary educator, and have seen the many benefits the special art fund has provided our public school keiki. For the past eight years, I have been one of hundreds of teachers who has been able to work with a visiting artist to secure an AITS grant for our school, allowing a working artist to come to our school and teach our students art for a ten-week session. Like many public schools, we no longer have funding for a dedicated art teacher, and so our students look forward to our visiting artist all year long. This program brings a much needed balance to the curricula, allowing students to explore and discover other strengths and talents besides math and reading, to practice quality work and refinement of process, and to have exposure to future careers and pathways.

Additionally, the very popular Young Artists of Hawaii competition is also funded by this fund. This annual competition challenges our students to reflect on their own familial culture and place in Hawai'i, and provides a fantastic opportunity for our haumāna (particularly those from our other islands) to come together with their peers on O'ahu to celebrate their art, visit exhibits, and display their work publicly. I have been lucky enough to bring several rounds of Big Island students to O'ahu for this competition, and it is a highlight of their elementary career.

Finally, the SFCA sponsored professional development provides excellent PD opportunities for public school teachers trying to fill the gaps of arts education in the classroom, allowing us to learning both art skills and art teaching practices from working artists. Like many other subjects (particularly at the elementary level), cross-curricular and project-based learning are encouraged, but many of our educators lack the artistic confidence to truly teach and include these elements in the classroom. These annual opportunities for teachers to better their teaching practices through professional development in the arts are invaluable- everything from bookmaking, printmaking, movement, dance, watercolors- these are the elements that make projects come alive for our students, and empowering our educators to include them is powerful. Of the many professional development opportunities listed for educators, the SFCA-sponsored courses are almost always the only Arts-related PD offered.

We cannot insist that our students explore their interests, practice creativity, chase quality and find balance in their lives if we continuously strip them of the opportunities to do so. These

programs directly support our Nā Hopena A'o standards (HĀ), which are supposed to be the heart of public education, and focus on the total wellbeing of our keiki. We cannot pay lip service to the importance of total wellbeing, and talk about how important our Nā Hopena A'o Standards are if we are not willing to keep the monies in place to support that wellbeing. Thousands of students benefit from these programs annually, receiving much needed opportunities for creativity, exploration, reflection and refinement of work. They speak directly to Nā Hopena A'o standard 3, A Strengthened Sense of Excellence, which asks our students to: *a. Define success in a meaningful way b. Know and apply unique gifts and abilities to a purpose c. Prioritize and manage time and energy well d. Take initiative without being asked e. Explore many areas of interests and initiate new ideas f. Utilize creativity and imagination to problemsolve and innovate g. See failure as an opportunity to learn well h. Assess and make improvements to produce quality work.*

The goal of the original charter was not to create a collection, which would some day magically be declared 'finished' but to support cultural and artist practitioners to allow them to survive and thrive here in Hawaii.

The immediate effect of this legislation would be to eviscerate the arts community in Hawaii. The SFCA reaches into every island and every community in ways that most don't appreciate. It's mere existence gives visual artists like myself hope that there is potential for engagement through its programmings and support of institutions and potential renumeration and acclaim through its Art in Public Places program. It represents a valuing of the our essence as creative individuals and our place in our local communities.

My daughter, although not having an art class in school until this, her senior year in public high school, is currently showing in the Scholastic Art Competition at Capitol Modern (a museum which would have to immediately close if this legislation is passed.) She has been nominated for Scholastic's national art award. She is contemplating a career in the arts. What this bill is saying to her is that she doesn't have a place in local society or even a chance to make living through her artistic calling on the island where she was born and raised. The SFCA has contributed valuable support for her father and I as a family through their Art in Public Places program over the years. I worry that we, too, will lose support as we enter old age after long professional lives. I imagine that there are countless artists and cultural practitioners in Hawaii in the very same boat, with varying levels of other resources to fall back on.

I understand this bill started on Maui and I find that interesting in several ways. First, perhaps Maui, hurting after the fires is simply looking for monetary resources to support their own

community. I understand this, but find this particular solution misguided. Pre-fire Maui was the #2 place for art sales in the entire country. While I'm sure most of that was focused in artcentered Lahaina, it brings up the actual monetary value of culture and the arts, both as enhancing a tourist destination and as a revenue stream in and of itself. While the SFCA primarily supports the nonprofit arts community, this is where our artists are birthed and nurtured. This is the place our cultural practitioners are supported so they can share and and keep their knowledge alive. These people keep our culture alive, but they also contribute mightily to our local economy as non-imported resources and repositories of cultural knowledge and expertise. Using the SFCA in this way is to cut off one's nose to spite one's face. Government support is a given in virtually every industry. The arts have continually earned this support and the arts continually pay it back. If we stop supporting our artists and cultural practitioners, we have wasted an invaluable resource, one that makes us civilized, loving, caring human beings.

Bill 1807 should not progress any further. This bill ignores that without culture and the arts there is no need for government, nothing to preserve or defend, nothing to share or uplift, novices to speak of who we are. My name is Dr. Marata Tamaira and I want to offer my testimony as an Art Fellow who is currently participating in the One Nation, One Project National Arts and Health Initiative, which is set to launch its annual nation-wide celebration of the arts on July 27 (for more, go to: https://www.onenationoneproject.com/). Notably, Hawai'i is one of 18 sites involved in this worthy undertaking to advance health, equity, and community connection through the arts.

It is in this capacity that I am writing in **opposition** to proposed bill HB 1807.

If HB 1807 is passed it will set Hawai'i's creative industry in the areas of the visual and performing arts back decades, impoverishing Hawai'i's people of not only aesthetic beauty in civic spaces, but even more importantly it will severely minimize the social, political, and informative discussions that creative engagement with the arts activates in people and communities. Further, the proposed cuts will severely impair what is still a developing arts economy in Hawai'i and as an extension will negatively impact the ability of artists, local and especially indigenous, to make a viable living from their craft. I argue that the proposed bill will cause that local economy to crash.

Art is the centerpiece of a healthy and strong civil society. The arts matter. By cutting funding to worthy arts initiatives and organizations across the Islands, HB 1807 sends the clear message that the arts *do not* matter. Do we want to live in a Hawai'i where that kind of message is accepted? It's a rhetorical question. The answer is a resounding "No."

In the last number of years we have seen an efflorescence of the arts in public places, most notably with the establishment of Hawai'i Contemporary, which moved Hawai'i from its marginal position as an arts backwater to a burgeoning hub that attracts the participation of high profile local and international curators and artists. Hawai'i is finally achieving its place as a serious contender on the global arts stage. Yet if HB 1807 passes, this vital momentum—not only in relation to the ongoing growth of Hawai'i Contemporary but in consideration of all the other arts organizations that stand to lose vital funding—will come to a crashing halt. It will set Hawai'i back not move it forward.

Whatever revenue the State thinks it will save through passing this bill is nothing compared to the far reaching deficit that will ensue when it comes to the health and wellbeing of Hawai'i's creative industry and the communities it serves. The cutting of funding for the arts should never

be considered a "saving" when subjected to the dispassionate appraisal of cost-benefit analysis. It will only ever always be a loss.

This bill would be devastating to the livelihood of artists and practitioners of the arts, as well as to all organizations and institutions that promote and encourage the arts for entertainment, education or therapeutic purposes. The health of the arts reflect the health of the soul of a community/culture. Now more than ever, in light of all the that is happening around the world and at home - particularly here on Maui, do we as a community need the arts to thrive! Aloha Sen. Lee, Sen. Inouye, and Committee on Transportation and Culture and the Arts,

I am writing as an individual in strong opposition to HB1807 HD2 for the following reasons.

Reason #1: The 1% Works of Special Art Fund includes moveable art and permanently installed works of art in state buildings. According to HRS 103-8.5b(3), "**Upkeep services, including maintenance, repair, and restoration of works of art**" are to be included. The 2023 Annual Report, APPENDIX A (3/3), Art in Public Places Program: Maintenance, APP Contracts on page 31 of the pdf downloaded from the SFCA website, details payments under the category of "maintenance" that do not fit the above description, e.g.,


- Roberts Hawaii School Bus, transportation services for the Art Bento museum education program for public and charter schools (\$40,319.36)
- Royal Media Network, purchase of a cargo van (\$66,800)
- Staffing Solutions of Hawai'i, interpretive guide services at the Hawai'i State Art Museum (\$199,693.92)
- Tree Concepts Hawaii, landscape maintenance of the Sculpture Garden and Courtyard (\$37,420)
- Wall-to-Wall Studios, Inc. marketing coordination for the Hawai'i State Art Museum (\$88,617.77)

How are payments to these organizations/businesses "**maintenance, repair, and restoration of works of art**"? There are no payments for conservation or artworks listed.

Take, for example, the Hawaiian Studies Building at UH Mānoa which was completed in 1997, and two permanent works of art were installed by SFCA Art in Public Places program. The artworks were created by Ipō Nihipali specifically for the Hawaiian Studies buildings (see photos below).


Ho'opulapula (to procreate) on the ground floor is a waterfall sculpture but no water is flowing as it used to and the designs on the floor surrounding the cairn are molded and discolored (see photos on next page).






The second artwork close to Dole Street is entitled *Kumulipo* which depicts kinolau in the genealogical creation chant. This work was installed in 2002 and is in very poor condition and direly needs renovation/conservation.

The tail of the eel is broken exposing the wire frame beneath the resin.



These photos are samples of the damage to a few sections of the mural. The 1% Works of Art Special Fund is required to provide "**maintenance, repair, and restoration of works of art**" installed in the builds too. The Hawaiian Studies building is only 27 years old but clearly, the artwork has not been maintained.

Why was the rebranding of HiSAM as "Capitol Modern" an expense from the 1% works of art fund and the HRS 9-22?

[§9-22] State art museum; establishment. The state art museum is established within the foundation. The operations of the state art museum shall be funded and supported by the Works of Art Special Fund, pursuant to section 103-8.5. [L 2004, c 125, pt of §2]

The HRS was not amended to change the name. Why were funds used on this initiative instead of on maintenance and conservation or permanent artworks?

Reason #2: Artwork that is permanent in a building, e.g., the murals at Kapolei Hale, have specific meanings linked to place and the function of the building. On the UHM campus, take

Sinclair Library as an example of a building being renovated. Sinclar was completed in 1956 and though the tropical climate was taken into consideration, there is no artwork because the building predates the 1% Works of Special Art Fund. I am in **OPPOSITION** to the change in purpose for Act HB1807 HD2 as stated on page 2, lines 16-20, that deletes RENOVATION of a State Building like Sinclair Library.

- 16 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 17 (1) Specify that the works of art special fund's one per
- 18 cent transfer requirement shall apply only to capital
- 19 improvement appropriations for the original
- 20 construction of state buildings; and

The UH Board of Regents approved the \$57 million renovation to transform the outdated library into a state-of-the-art student success center in the Sinclair Library (<u>https://www.hawaii.edu/news/2023/06/16/work-begins-student-success-center/</u>). Why would works of art that are in storage fit or enhance the new building and concept that the student center stands for? What permanent artwork will be commissioned for the building? What is the 1% of the building cost that has been set aside?

Reason #3: If one of the issues of HB1807 HD2 is that there are too many works of art in storage, then why not have an appraiser help SFCA determine which works of art could be sold/auctioned to fund the installation of relevant new works of art in new buildings and newly renovated buildings? Surely there are works of art that may not be so meaningful to Hawai'i (e.g., out-of-state artists) that could be sold. Can provisions for that?

Reason #4 : The 1% Works of Art Fund was NEVER the purpose nor was the Fund established to support art education in the schools or performing arts. Though I agree that both need to be funded, they should not be supported by this fund. I am in OPPOSITION to the change in purpose for Act HB1807 HD2 as stated on page 3, lines 1-2.

1 (2) Appropriate funds for performing arts and other 2 initiatives in schools.

And SECTION 4 on page 4, lines 1-5.

SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for
 the state foundation on culture and the arts to expand arts
 programming in schools.

In summary, the 1% Works of Art Special Fund is critical in a multiplicity of ways. It is an imortant part of the legacy from Alfred Preis (SFCA founder & 1st E.D.), Masaru "Pundy" Yokouchi (Maui Arts & Cultural Center (founding chairman), and Rep. Calvin Say. This forward thinking trio realized that new artwork relevant to a new building or a renovated building is critical. It is doubtful that artwork in storage will complement a state-of-the-art high-tech 21st Century Student Success Center. Conservation of existing artworks needs to be a priority for "**maintenance, repair, and restoration of works of art.**" The State, aka, the Art in Public Places Program has a moral and ethical responsibility to care for the works of art, e.g., the Ipō

Nihipali artwork at Hawaiian Studies which demonstrates severe neglect. Where artwork is removed for building renovation, it should be conserved/repaired before being re-installed and such work must be done by skilled artisans or the artist who created the work if s/he is still living. If there is too much artwork in storage, liquidate the holdings and put the money back into the 1% Works of Art Special Fund.

Last but not least, as an experienced music educator, I urge the SFCA to seek grants and other support for arts education and performing arts that will not endanger and decimate the 1% Works Fund.

The arts are vital in enriching our cultural heritage, fostering social cohesion, promoting mental well-being, and providing cognitive stimulation for individuals of all ages.

Numerous studies have demonstrated the therapeutic benefits of activities such as music therapy, dance therapy, and visual arts interventions, highlighting the importance of supporting the arts for the mental health of our citizens.

Furthermore, the arts provide important cognitive stimulation, enhancing creativity, critical thinking, and problem-solving skills. Recent peer-reviewed research has shown that exposure to

the arts can improve academic performance, boost cognitive development, and enhance brain function across the lifespan.

As I am sure you are aware Senators that public confidence in our state and government spending is at a all-time low. With enhanced focus on the lack of self-accountability in the attempts to kill the Clean Elections legislation and the extreme spending of Hart as well as the many examples of corruption in recent months. I believe it would greatly boost confidence to have our state continue to support its public programs that directly benefit its citizens in a real way.



Aloha Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye, and members of the Committee,

I am writing to you, respectfully in **opposition of HB 1807**. I am an artist In Haiku, Hawaii, represented by Viewpoints Gallery, and an instructor at Hui No'eau Visual Arts Center. Before moving to Hawaii, I worked for eight years as a division head in the economic development department and Executive Director of the Business Improvement District in the city center of Beloit, Wisconsin. In my last year as director, we won the Great American Mainstreet Award through the National Trust for Historic Preservation, a pinnacle honor for revitalization efforts in downtowns across the nation.

I state my background because I have seen how integral the arts are to a community's vitality. I have used art to create community engagement and have experienced the positive psychological and economic impact of a vibrant art scene on the community at large. Art is a powerful expression of identity and aspiration. It is a catalyst for economic and social prosperity as it opens minds and hearts toward better solutions and cohesive community action, paving the way for improvements in infrastructure, public and private partnerships, conservation, preservation, entrepreneurship and more. Art helps the community envision what the future can hold and creates ways to communicate goals. It breaks barriers and builds bridges toward better stewardship and quality of life. The arts, whether visual or performance based, contribute substantially to the economic, social and cultural strength of our communities across the state.

When government funds the arts, it's typically to the nonprofit arts and culture organizations as we have seen in Hawaii. And it's an appropriate question to ask: What's the return on investment for the public? Here are the data.

Arts and cultural engagement are critical to the educational, economic, and social wellbeing of individuals, communities, and the State of Hawai'i.

Public investment in the arts pays dividends in an increased tax base, stronger social connections and community support, reduced health risks, higher empathy, and more community pride. These things, together, pave the way for communities to progress toward common goals.

In addition to the return on investment that every dollar of public investment in the arts provides, there should be the calculation of detriment to our communities in reduced funding. You may save a dollar, but **for every dollar you remove**, you will **lose three-fold in State and local government revenue generated**, and close to **THIRTY-fold in economic**

activity annually. It is counter intuitive and short-sighted to remove a catalyst for so much good in our state.

HB1807 repeals capital improvement appropriations for renovations of state buildings as a source of funds for the works of art special fund. The removal of "renovation" from the *percent for art* law would significantly reduce financial support for native Hawaiian and local artists, galleries, and organizations. This bill would cut an estimated 68% of the Art in Public Places program, and reduce or eliminate government support for many arts organizations, programs, and individual artists statewide.

Another concrete example, this bill will cut 50% of the Art in Public Places program revenue, adversely reducing or eliminating government support for many arts organizations, programs, and individual artists statewide.

The bill states that the SFCA has enough works of art and there is no need to acquire more art for the state collection. In Hawai'i, art is not simply a commodity that reaches a threshold of "enough". It is an evolving reflection of our culture and society that gives voice to each era. To limit the "inventory" to not include current and upcoming artists and voices of our future, would stifle the impact that the program was created to achieve. There is benefit in showing that art and the reflections it offers of contemporary society does not stop because one has collected enough.

Please do not pass this bill.

"What does Rep Kyle Yamashita (Maui) have against Art & Culture? Rep Kyle drafted this terrible (bill) that would cut over 50% of the Art in Public Places program..." - Tlaloc

"I wish to support continued funding of the SFCA as it has been configured to date. As a teaching artist, I rely on several programs funded and administered through the SFCA including Donkey Mill..." - Tamara

You will noticed Tamara mentioned Donkey Mill.

Donkey Mill is a treasured educational resource for the children of West Hawai`i Island. You will also notice that Donkey Mill in particular, along with the State Foundation of Culture and the Arts, have submitted VERY STRONG TESTIMONIES against this bill. I surmise, with fairness to Tamara, she meant to oppose the bill that Donkey Mill opposes, in no uncertain terms. I also surmise all of these support testimonies are in fact in opposition to the bill at hand.

The last available testimony of five IN SUPPORT of this bill comes from CARES Hawai`i. Their written testimony states only... "CARES testifies in strong support." Indicating they will do that via Zoom.

I suggest they too will give testimony that is in oppositon to the bill and not in support of it. Or, perhaps, that they were too cowardly to state their reasons in text given the massive opposition.

Finally I echo Tlaloc when he asks - "What does Rep Kyle Yamashita (Maui) have against Art & Culture?"

Charitably, I can only guess that Rep. Yamashita does not hate art. I guess he felt that the state could save some money and this was an appropriate action to save that money. I am currently working with public school Kiapuni, or immersion students, on a project awarded by APP funds. My students are accessing ancestral knowledge through creating traditional featherwork pieces. They are creating lei hulu inspired by engaging with an artwork on their campus, that is part of the State collection & learning how design elements can create deeper meaning, while they are keeping cultural practices alive. Anyone who would support this bill is ignorant to the depths of what these funds provide to our community through experiences with lasting reverence. I am in the process of applying for the same funds, to share this project with another group of students next year.

This year, I have also proposed a very different art project for the new Museum Without Walls initiative. The project I have proposed is for two of the state's low income senior residences. This proposal would bring art making experiences that connect seniors to each other, and the state's collection, through handmade postcards, collaborative artwork for common areas, and game boards & pieces, that will bring residents together, long after the project is completed. I am writing to you in **very strong opposition** to **HB 1807 HD2** – **Relating to the Works of Art Special Fund.** I'll try to be brief as I understand you are considering numerous bills referred from the House, and sincerely hope that you will kindly let this problematic bill to die in Committee.

I agree that the housing crisis is one of the biggest problems facing our state; however, we will sell our soul if we stop supporting the arts. This small amount of funds is a life-line for the arts and museum community here in the 808. Places like Capitol Modern (formerly HiSAM) and Art at Mark's Garage and the Honolulu Printmakers keep a vibrant art scene that allows local artists to create unique works that explore things like identity and local life and find modern expressions of art informed by the host culture. These art communities attract other creatives, and are incubators for ideas in fashion, cinema, IT, and other industries.

If these non-profits and agencies were not funded, they would likely die, and cause financial hardship for many – far beyond our artist's community. This would mean the end of a space that attracts the kind of slow tourist we want to attract. These spaces also keep local people and malihini alike on island as we so truly enjoy the free space fostered by events like Art After Dark and First Friday and the exhibits.

Without this funding art would mostly be created here only as kitsch for sale to tourists. As an analogy, imagine if our image of Paris was based on the cheap paintings that are sold like postcards of historic landmarks rather than the amazing artists who introduced modern art (from impressionism and post-impressionism or surrealism to dadaism and beyond). Local artists also explore deep meanings of identity and citizenship in a state and world that is centering and challenging. As a two-decade long resident of Hawai'i, I can't overestimate the import of understanding local perspectives through the photographs of Karen Kosasa or Kapulani Landgraf and Mark Hamasaki or the sculptures of Satoru Abe of the pottery of Clayton Amemiya and Shugen Inouye or paintings of Solomon Enos.

As a proud Democrat, I would further suggest that this bill goes against many elements in our Party platform that mention helping support preservation of Native Hawaiian culture and arts. These art nonprofits also support jobs for artists, galleries, museums and curators that support a strong diverse economy. I know many of you want to bring and maintain the movie/TV industry on Island. These folks are attracted by fellow creatives, and also need professionals who can create props that help cinematographers paint alternative locales. IT people also thrive in an environment surrounded by other creatives, such as the artists who create special Art After Dark and First Friday events. I've even seen legislators equally proud of artwork on display in their offices during Art at the Capitol, and enjoyed hearing congress members and their staff sharing the meanings of the artworks in their office. That's the power of art.

Before I conclude, let me affirm that these views don't necessarily represent the view of my employer and that I'm neither an artist or art critic, but can't imagine life without art, especially the arts that HiSAM/Capitol Modern and Honolulu Printmakers and other nonprofits/agencies have shared with me. Please help the arts to survive and allow everyone to be surrounded by art that inspires and challenges all of us. HB1807 HD2 will eradicate the state's ability to provide that opportunity for any more artists going forward.

The language of the ammended bill indicates that alternate funding would be provided for arts programming in schools and performing arts initiatives but it is clear that there is insufficient funding available to replace what will be lost if HB1807 HD2 passes.

Furthermore the bill also claims that the state has enough artwork and thus does not need to aquire anymore. SFCA and it's initiatives do so much more than just putting art in buildings with the works of art special fund. To suggest otherwise is wholly ludicrous. The State Legislature's long support for art in public places through the 1% law for the construction of new buildings is truly a source of pride for all that are touched by that far-sighted initiative. So too was the expansion of the program through Act 389 which created a special fund by adding "renovations" to that statute. Beyond the purchase of artwork, that fund just as importantly supported art educational programs and events which benefited a broader audience beyond those near newly constructed or renovated buildings--from K-12 students to the general public.

Even more so than in 1989 when Act 389 was introduced, there will be very few if any new State funded buildings in the foreseeable future, so the removal of "renovations" to the current 1% statute would, in effect extinguish art educational programs and events on every island, such as the "Artists in the Schools" program, Scholastic Art Exhibition for students (grade 7-12), Young Artists of Hawaii Exhibition (grade K-6), and exhibitions and programming at the Downtown Art Center and the Hawai'i State Art Museum.

There is so much more that this proposal would hobble or terminate. Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee;

My name is Hannah Dunlop Relf and while I am an employee of the Hawaii State Senate, I am testifying in OPPOSITION to HB1807 HD2 in my personal capacity as a resident of Hawaii and a passionate supporter of both the performing and fine arts.

There are ways to address the issues raised in the measure and to increase the efficacy, efficiency, and transparency of the fund and its programs. Myopic and short-sighted slash-andburn methods never work and have unitended consequences. Arts funding is of greater importance in Hawaii because art and culture are at the root of Native and Immigrant cultural presrvation and practices, and a vital part, if not the main appeal to toursits from around the globe. While performing arts are important in these practices too, the record that is left for future generations through fine art, which include the recording through paint or photography of performing arts is of vital importance.

As a former dance and theater professional I believe that the performing arts are woefully undervalued and unsupported. That support cannot come at the expense of fine art. Inherently this is counterintuitive and illogical: Dance and theater rely heavily on fine artists and their skills for their performances, to strip one to benefit the other hurts both. This highlights the extremly negative impact on the artists and skills necessary for a successful film industry.

Given the apparent goal of the measure – reduction in government expenses lets look at the economic impact the arts have. One of my senior projects for my undergraduate degree was a statistical analysis comparing government arts funding and economic and health impacts, as well as long term rates or social cohesion and democracy between developed nations.1 The most Arts and Prosperty report2 from Americans for the Arts, the largest stastical study on the impact of the Arts on the United States also provides invaluable and evidence based insght. Both of these sources show a direct correlation between increased art funding, specifically government, and increased economic output, health both physical and mental outcomes, and Social cohesion and democratic strength.

To cut Peters funding and rob him to pay Paul all while forgetting that Peter and Paul are in business together in our own community seems honestly incredibly short sighted. This is laid bare when we consider that the arts generated \$27.5 billion in revenue to local, state, and federal governments, a yeild far beyond the collective \$5 billion in funding. Arts investment has some of the highest return on investment of any area of government funding. When combined with the social and personal beneifts on the individual and society, oen is only left asking why we are not here discussing increasing funding overall?

Specifically HB1802 highlights the amount of art in storage as a key issue. This measure does nothing to address this but in reality will most likley make the issue worse. The issue is not how much art we have in storage but the draconian process and restrictions on displaying it, HB1807 would ensure more art is hidden from the public because these drastic cuts would make staffing and managing that much harder. 31 organizations have stated that they would be significantly impacted if not have to cease services immediately, one can only imagine the broad impact on communities and existing programs this measure would have. Beyond the viewing of the art currently in the collection, these cuts would have long-term effects on the success of local artists individually and their ability to remain in the state. Again this measure takes a counterinutative and illogical approach to achieving its proported goals.

It appears that the finiancial stresses on the state placed by the Maui Wildfires is a catalyst for this measure. Arts both fine and performing will play a vital role in helping the community and economy recover. Again highlighting the shortsited and counter-intuative nature of this HB1802.

This action is myopic and ignores the reality of the situation and the proven beneifical impact of arts and its funding, to prioritize a false idea of short-term gain. Transferring something off of the one balance sheet, while appealing, will just cause problems for other departments and organizations, individual artists, students, and the state economy. This is just the definition of shooting oneself in the foot. I urge the members to vote no on HB1807.

i am writing to express my concern over hb1807 hd2 and the devastating blow it is poised to strike upon our local arts community.

i am from lahaina and i am currently an art teacher lahainaluna high school. i can say more about the importance of a healthy arts ecosystem, but i will first focus on highlighting the direct impact arts organizations have had for myself and the community i teach in in this last year.

a month after the fire, we were finally able to see our students and offer them a safe space for learning... but at a temporary location at a new school that didn't even have enough furniture on site for us, let alone any supplies for our classes.

it was a local arts organization that stepped up to provide us with art supplies (mahalo hui no'eau). in a matter of days they mobilized their network of connections and gathered boxes of art supplies to support our fine arts classes.

while at this temporary location, we often had to "make do" with what we had. so when we had to have classes out on the lawn due to space... having drawing boards and charcoals to take students outside for plein air drawing was a blessing. it meant that we weren't just surviving and making do with what we had, for that hour, we were making art. that does a lot for someone's self confidence and emotional well being.

during this time, we also had counsellors and mental health workers on site. we still do and they are a blessing. but it takes courage to visit them... and having a routine practice of art as a venue for expression is a key peice to the complicated puzzle that is our well being.

this example is just one thing that one arts organization did for us recently. i am not counting the other acts of directly donated supplies that routinely supplement our class budgets, academic support, field trips, art classes, visiting art and artist programs from across hawaii, the murals and galleries students get to visit in person and the online art resources that myself and my students have used EVERY school year. all coming from arts organizations that will be directly affected by this budget cut.

it is crucial that we have a healthy and diverse ecosystem of local arts organizations in hawaii. these organizations are already involved in our community and have a variety of avenues to disperse the good that art does. we already have the pipeline and process set up to take funds and turn it into happy and healthy keiki and adults.

being a public school teacher, i appreciate the thought behind the hd2 revision to appropriate funds for performing arts and other initiatives in our schools. we should support the performance arts in schools. however, this does not "cover" the greater loss of what this bill will effectively do to a multitude of arts organizations already working in our communities.

these arts organizations across hawaii provide the substance of the content i teach. they allow us to teach about art that is here, relevant and identifiable... and not just "art from the mainland". i am here to testify that hb1807 hd2 will in effect be a budget cut to the arts in our schools.

This bill would eliminate support for many art and culture enriching programs that benefit our keiki in a myriad of ways. As a Native Hawaiian artist myself, I understand the impact that art has on culture and people. More importantly, I have seen and experienced how art improves the lives of keiki all across the islands of Hawai'i. Art programs in the islands provide places for our keiki to learn of their culture and the cultures around them, they allow them to develop social emotional skills, and they allow them to understand themselves along with the world around them through creativity and expression.

So often do we as people of the State of Hawai'i talk about preserving and teaching culture, but if we let this bill through then our talk will not be heard by anybody and the state's cultural integrity will be damaged. The reduction of funding for arts and culture programs will eliminate events that uphold and share the aloha that our state thrives on. It is crucial, especially in this age, that the future generations of Hawai'i learn about their culture. This is because without a place to learn, there can be no understanding, and without understanding comes confusion that leads to conflict and pain in our beautiful islands.

Education in the arts gives our keiki the optimal environment for learning social emotional skills—something that the nation is in much need of. Suicide rates among youth 12-17 years old have increased by over 47.7 percent across the years 2011-2021. Our keiki are having an increase in mental health issues, and no renovated building could ever fix that. Yes, there are many other environments that allow keiki to learn social emotional skills, but art is the best environment because it beckons students not only to look outward, but inward. Over the years we have seen consistently that children across the nation are acting out in violent ways due to mental health issues, but this can be combatted through the teaching and understanding of social emotional skills. Art gives our keiki a chance to win the fight over their own minds, and without it they could lose.

In many ways, art saved my life. As a young man, I had constant suicidal thoughts. However, it was through the God given art of music that I was able to continue on. Through music I have learned so much. Music has allowed me to take a glimpse into the lives of people from all kinds of backgrounds, cultures, and opinions. Music gave me a place to express myself. It was through my high school music program that I made my best friends, and learned some of my most crucial life lessons. I am so grateful that House Bill 1807 did not exist at that time, because if it had, I do not know where I would be. Art provides so much for the keiki of Hawai'i and it would be a shame— and a mistake—to let our programs disappear and die.

So again I ask, please do not let House Bill 1807 be heard. For the future of Hawai'i, and for the keiki, please do the right thing and allow art and culture programs to continue nurturing the people of Hawai'i.

Dear Chair and members of the Committee, I respectfully OPPOSE HB1807 which repeals capital improvement appropriations for renovations of state buildings as a source of funds for the works of art special fund. While existing state buildings may have access to art, renovation funds are necessary to address the aging condition of works of art in state buildings. Renovation funds support the escalating costs associated with conservation, repair, and maintenance. As with State buildings, works of art require maintenance and repair.

Per HRS 103-8.5, the art in public places program does more than furnish art in state buildings. Removing renovations would adversely effect the art in public places program. Designating 1% appropriations from both construction and renovation provides a consistent funding base to carry out the intent of HRS 103-8.5 Works of Art special fund. Together, 1% appropriations from construction and renovation enable statewide programs which include acquisition and distribution of works of art, conservation of an aging exterior public art collection, interpretation of the collection, the Hawaii State Art Museum, applicable portions of the Artists in the Schools program, and recognition of student artwork.

I do not feel the proposed modificiation (House Bill 1807) would be beneficial, period.





A thriving arts and music culture is not only key to making our home as vibrant and expressive as it can be, it is also a support structure to the local economy. From professionals employed by museums to the businesses supplying raw materials to artists, the dollars we invest in arts and culture come back into our own community. As someone who has remained involved in the arts from a young age, I have witnessed firsthand the economic benefits of creative investment. So often we speak of diversifying our economy beyond tourism. Through investments into arts and culture, we can provide a boon to both locals and tourists alike. I urge you not to ignore the very real economic benefits at stake here.

Live concerts–like ones provided by HoMA and Capitol Modern is beneficial to mental health and community health. I have watched the much-feared brain drain settle in upon my beloved home state for each of my thirty years of life. When I and my childhood friends went off to college, nearly every one of us planned to move back. 13 years later, I am one of very few who's been able to return. It's not just the salaries and the cost of living that drive people to the mainland—it's what you get for it. Decreasing the availability of arts in public spaces will exacerbate this, not alleviate it. We

should be seeking to provide more cultural outing opportunities, not less. We should make this a place people want to live not simply due to family ties or history, but because of its unique and lively culture. Luckily for us, we already have a unique and lively culture—we just need to keep funding it, keep showing it, bolstering it.

Arts in public spaces, accessible art, art for the people, make our state more livable and lovable. They propel our communities economically and bring people together–something we desperately need now more than ever. We owe it to ourselves, so that we live in the best possible state that we can. We owe it to our kupuna, so that they can yield the social and cognitive benefits of arts engagement, and sustain their quality of life in their later years.
