HB 1826 HD1 – RELATING TO EDUCATION FOR MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONALS

Chair Kim, Vice Chair Kidani, and Members of the Committee:

The University of Hawai'i supports HB 1826 HD1 which expands the Mental Health Technician (MHT) certificate of competence at Windward Community College (WCC) through the hiring of a MHT certificate faculty instructor, a faculty outreach position, scholarships, and administrative costs.

WCC has coordinated with the Hawai'i State Hospital (HSH) in order to develop the Mental Health Technician (MHT) Certificate, which provides a foundation of knowledge and increase skills for those serving the mentally ill on our islands. The program falls within the purview of WCC and is offered to students at HSH and beyond. The program consists of three focused courses, available in person and online. Students learn fundamentals of psychology and psychological functioning, as well as conflict resolution and communications. This allows them to understand situations that arise at work, to more effectively deal with patients and to prevent escalation of conflict in tense situations. This leads to a safer workplace and a more supportive therapeutic environment.

This program addresses the severe shortage of mental health workers during a time when our State has dire needs for mental health support due to the impacts of the pandemic, socio-economic stressors, high job turnover, and a lack of workforce skilled in this area. It serves not only Hawai'i State Hospital, the second largest employer in Windward O'ahu, but also other mental health related employers such as Windward District Health, Hina Mauka and others. Our online asynchronous offerings allow current workers to grow their skills through course offerings maximally adaptable to their schedules and further allow for this program to be expanded statewide.

Since its inception in Spring 2022, this program has already graduated 47 students, 19 of whom were employed at Hawai'i State Hospital. In just two years, this program has had a large impact on the capacity of Windward O'ahu to care for those suffering from

mental health issues and to increase workplace satisfaction and safety in the workplace. This capacity is now being expanded with trauma-informed coursework tailored to the needs of adult corrections officers and the Honolulu Police Department, increasing workforce skills related to mental health in key professions serving vulnerable community members. WCC entered into a contract with Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation this spring to provide this training directly to adult corrections officers.

The MHT certificate creates a pathway to further training and higher education. A one year certificate currently being finalized builds on the MHT certificate by adding clinical skills and knowledge necessary to perform higher job requirements in more advanced clinical settings. These certificates are specifically designed to advance students to increasingly higher qualifications, such as degrees in psychology, social work and mental health counseling. This grows the overall capacity of our state to address mental health challenges and needs.

A Faculty Instructor will allow for curriculum development and expansion to meet the needs of employers and those we serve, implementation of the courses and certificate program, and articulation of the certificates to increasingly higher qualifications. A Faculty Outreach position amplifies the scope of this program from Windward Oʻahu to our entire state through outreach and recruitment at our sister community college as well as through the creation of partnerships with mental health related agencies and workplaces throughout the state. The provision of a scholarship program allows this training to benefit a large range of potential workers across our state, removing financial barriers to education.

This bill supports the Mental Health Tech certificate program at WCC to address an immediate, critical workforce need for preparing potential employees and upskilling existing employees. It builds the capacity of our State to implement effective, supportive care for those suffering from mental illness.

The University of Hawai'i supports the intent of HB 1826 HD1, as long as its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities as indicated in our BOR Approved Budget.

Hawai'i law, HRS §334-10, established the State Council on Mental Health ("Council") as a 21-member body to advise on the allocation of resources, statewide needs, and programs affecting more than one county as well as to advocate for adults with serious mental illness, children with serious emotional disturbances, individuals with mental illness or emotional problems, including those with co-occurring substance abuse disorders. Members are residents from diverse backgrounds representing mental health service providers and recipients, students and youth, parents, and family members. Members include representatives of state agencies on mental health, criminal justice, housing, Medicaid, social services, vocational rehabilitation, and education. Members include representatives from the Hawai'i advisory commission on drug abuse and controlled substances and county service area boards on mental health and substance abuse.

The Hawai'i State Council on Mental Health strongly supports HB1826 HD1. This bill allocates critical funding for temporary positions to expand the University of Hawaii Windward Community College's mental health technician program statewide.

This investment is essential for two key reasons:

Addressing the Mental Health Workforce Shortage: The COVID-19
pandemic has further exacerbated the existing shortage of mental health
professionals in Hawaii. By supporting the expansion of this program,
HB1826 HD1 directly addresses this critical need by training more mental
health technicians.

- The Department has coordinated with the Windward Community College (WCC) and we respectfully jointly support this measure which appropriates funds to support and expand the WCC's mental health technician (MHT) certificate program through the hiring of an MHT certificate faculty instructor and a faculty outreach position program, establishment of a scholarship program, and any other necessary administrative costs.
- The Department recognizes that education and training are important parts of building the mental health care workforce. We understand that education and training should not stop when someone is hired for employment. Ongoing opportunities to provide training and professional development can help to address staff retention concerns while also supporting

employees who want to learn additional skills through convenient learning modes that provide
work-life balance (e.g., online distance learning.)

The WCC MHT certificate program began in Spring 2022 and has a total of 47 graduates to date. This program provides introductory training to those entering the mental health service field. Courses in psychology, communication, and conflict resolution and mediation offer a range of academic study and skill-based activities to strengthen knowledge about working through difficult situations in the workplace. Of these 46 graduates thus far, 19 are employed at the Hawaii State Hospital.

In 2023, the legislature allocated one permanent position for a Mental Health Technician Certificate Program Coordinator to the Hawaii State Hospital. The coordinator position is critical to WCC's mission to develop and grow the specialized workforce needed not only for the Hawaii State Hospital (HSH) but for other entities statewide that interface with individuals with severe mental illness (SMI) conditions. The Department has yet to establish this position and respectfully recommends that this position be moved to WCC in the Supplemental Budget bill. This will allow the college to expand the program to meet the critical needs of the HSH and other statewide entities and to address the immediate and significant workforce shortage of mental health providers.

We are pleased with the interest that this program has received thus far and look forward to partnering with WCC to welcome prospective students as well as to congratulate future MHT certificate program graduates, including those who are currently employed or aspiring to be employed by the HSH.

We believe appropriating funds to establish positions to support the program, moving the MHT Certificate Coordinator position from HSH to WCC, and establishing a scholarship program will allow this program to expand and be offered statewide through community

- colleges, thereby helping to address the need for health care workforce training throughout our
- 2 state. We respectfully ask for the Legislature's support of this measure.
- 3 Offered Amendments: None. However, the Department respectfully requests that the
- 4 Permanent Mental Health Technician Certificate Program Coordinator position (Sequence
- 5 #2100-001 in HTH430 in Act 164, SLH 2023) be transferred from HSH to Windward Community
- 6 College in HB 1800.



The Hawaii Psychological Association (HPA) strongly supports HB1826 HD1 to provide funding and support for The University of Hawaii Windward Community College's (UH-WCC) mental health technician certificate of competence program.

We are deeply concerned about the critical workforce needs of mental health professionals in the State of Hawai'i. This shortage makes it difficult for people to access the care they need, and it can have a serious impact on well-being. UH-WCC's program provides a versatile training program that expands the scope of mental health services. There is a trauma-informed care pathway for the Honolulu police department and adult corrections officers that can equip officers with additional resources and skills to address a variety of challenging situations.

Additionally, Hawaii's community colleges provide an accessible and affordable pathway for many who want to serve the behavioral health needs of their community. WCC's program is flexible, offering courses online asynchronously, allowing working professionals and students from across Hawai'i to participate. In order to further increase accessibility, the bill proposes to establish a scholarship program to aid unemployed, underemployed, and low-wage earners.

HPA believes that HB1826 HD1 is an important step forward in improving mental health care in Hawaii and urges you to pass the bill.
