Chair Ichiyama, Vice-Chair Poepoe, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Taxation ("Department") offers the following <u>comments</u> regarding H.B. 2693 for your consideration.

H.B. 2693 would create a new chapter in the Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) to establish a Cultural Corridor Authority and Cultural Corridor Districts to promote recovery, remediation, and redevelopment in areas of the State affected by disaster. The Authority would be exempt from state taxes and authorized to issue bonds to finance public facilities within designated districts.

H.B. 2693 would also amend chapter 235, HRS, which governs income tax, to create a new nonrefundable income tax credit for taxpayers who voluntarily relinquish real property located in an area affected by a disaster to the county within which the real property is located. The new nonrefundable credit amount would be equal to the value of the relinquished real property, as assessed by county officials. The new credit provision defines "disaster" to mean "any emergency that results in loss of life, property, or environment and requires, or may require, assistance from other counties, states, the federal government, or from private agencies." "Emergency" is defined as "any occurrence that results in substantial injury or harm to the population or substantial damage to or loss of property or substantial damage to or loss of the environment." This new credit would apply to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2023.

The Department notes that the definitions of "disaster" and "emergency" in Part II of the bill are quite broad and are not predicated on a Presidential or Gubernatorial disaster declaration. Without guidance, the Department cannot determine whether a "disaster" or "emergency" has truly occurred or has concluded. The Department therefore recommends that the terms "disaster" and "emergency" be amended by requiring a proclamation by the Governor or President.

The Department also suggests that a definition be added for the term "relinquished." The bill, as currently drafted, is unclear as to what would constitute a relinquishment and whether a taxpayer who is compensated for the relinquishment would qualify for the tax credit.

Further, the Department notes that the bill does not specify the taxable year for which the credit may be claimed. The Department recommends amending subsection (e) in part II of the bill to specify that the credit must be claimed before the end of the twelfth month following the close of the taxable year during which the real property was relinquished by the taxpayer to the county. The Department also recommends amending subsection (b) of this new credit to replace the phrase "the tax credit allowable is for the assessed value of real property relinquished by the entity for the taxable year" with "the tax credit allowable is for the assessed value of real property relinquished by the entity to the county during the taxable year."

Furthermore, the Department notes that the bill would not preclude multiple owners of a single parcel of property from each claiming a credit for the full amount of the assessed value of the property, notwithstanding each owner's fractional interest. The Department suggests amending the bill to limit the amount of credit that may be claimed by each owner.

#### RELATING TO HISTORIC AND CULTURAL PRESERVATION

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

House Bill (H.B.) No. 2693: 1) establishes the Cultural Corridor (CC) Authority (CCA) within the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism to develop plans to redevelop areas affected by disaster while maintaining historic and cultural preservation; 2) requires CCA to create a redevelopment plan for designated CC Districts (CCD); 3) establishes the Lahaina CCD (LCCD); 4) establishes the CC Special Fund (CCSF) for the purposes of CCA; 5) establishes a new income tax credit to incentivize the voluntary relinquishment of real property located in areas affected by disaster; 6) requires the Department of the Attorney General to initiate eminent domain proceedings for privately-owned properties in disaster affected areas for which the owner has expressed interest in disposing the property; 7) appropriates an unspecified amount of general funds for FY 25 for the creation of a redevelopment plan for LCCD; and 8) appropriates an unspecified amount of general funds for FY 25 for eminent domain proceedings under CCA.

As a matter of general policy, B&F does not support the creation of any special fund which does not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, HRS. Special funds should:

1) serve a need as demonstrated by the purpose, scope of work, and an explanation why the program cannot be implemented successfully under the general fund appropriation process; 2) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries or a clear link between the program and the sources of revenue;

3) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and

4) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. Regarding H.B. No. 2693, it is difficult to determine whether the proposed CCSF would be self-sustaining.

Chair Ichiyama and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments on this bill.

Part I of this bill establishes the Cultural Corridor Authority (Authority) within the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism for administrative purposes. The Authority will have certain planning, development, financing, and condemnation powers over designated cultural corridor districts, which are areas in the State that have been affected by disasters. This bill also establishes the Lahaina cultural corridor district and a two-year transition period beginning on July 1, 2025, for the Authority to develop a plan to redevelop the Lahaina cultural corridor district. For each cultural corridor district, the Authority is required to develop a redevelopment plan, establish a community board, develop a district-wide improvement program, and establish cultural corridor district redevelopment rules on health, safety, building, planning, zoning, and land use, which, upon final adoption of a redevelopment plan, shall supersede all inconsistent ordinances and rules relating to the use, zoning, planning, and development of land and construction thereon.

Part II of this bill provides an income tax credit for the voluntary relinquishment of real property affected by disasters.

Part III of this bill requires the Attorney General to commence eminent domain proceedings to acquire privately owned real property located in areas affected by

disaster for purposes of redevelopment and historic and cultural preservation, so long as the private owner has expressed an interest in disposing of the property.

Section -7 of the new chapter proposed to be added to the Hawaii Revised Statutes by section 1 of this bill, beginning on page 17, line 6, requires the Authority to "establish a community board for each cultural corridor district." However, pursuant to section 6 of article V of the Hawaii Constitution, executive and administrative instrumentalities shall be "allocated by law among and within" the principal departments. To remedy this, we recommend replacing lines 6-8 on page 17 with the following: "§ -7 Community boards; establishment. (a) There is established a community board for each cultural corridor district and placed within the department of business, economic development, and tourism for administrative purposes . . . ."

Section -8 of the new chapter on page 18, lines 3-21, proposes that the Authority develop a district-wide improvement program to identify public facilities to be funded by assessing real property in the districts specially benefiting from the public facilities. Because the express provisions of this bill appear to assess the real property benefitting from the public facilities, it may be subject to challenge as violating article VIII, section 3, of the Hawaii Constitution.

Article VIII, section 3, of the Hawaii Constitution provides, in relevant part, that "all functions, powers and duties relating to the taxation of real property shall be exercised exclusively by the counties, with the exception of the county of Kalawao." The 1978 constitutional convention made clear that the "purpose of the amendment was to place the burden of the real property taxation system at the county level." *Gardens at West Maui Vacation Club v. Cnty. of Maui*, 90 Hawai'i 334, 341 (1999). The Hawaii Supreme Court acknowledged that "[a]rticle VIII, section 3 was expressly and manifestly designed to transfer to the counties broad powers of real property taxation[.]" *Kaheawa Wind Power v. Cnty. of Maui*, 146 Hawai'i 76, 88 (2020). A "tax" is defined as "burdens or charges imposed by legislative authority on persons or property to raise money for public purposes." *Hawaii Insurers Council v. Lingle*, 120 Hawai'i 51, 59, 201 P.3d 564, 572 (2008). In amending the Hawaii Constitution to transfer the power of property taxation to the counties, the transfer "covered the whole subject [of real property

taxation] and embraced the entire law in that regard." *Kaheawa Wind Power*, 146 Hawaii at 89, 456 P.3d at 162, citing *Gardens at West Maui*, 90 Hawaii at 341, 978 P.2d at 779.

Additionally, the special assessments may be subject to challenge under the Equal Protection Clause that forbids arbitrary classification. "[T]he classification 'must rest upon some ground of difference having a fair and substantial relation to the object of the legislation." *Hasegawa v. Maui Pineapple Co.*, 52 Haw. 327, 329-330 (1970) (quoting *Allied Stores of Ohio v. Bowers*, 358 U.S. 522, 527 (1959)). Here, the public facilities that specially benefit real property include things like parks, sidewalks, and highways, which are generally and widely available to all. Imposing the burden of assessment only on properties in the cultural corridor district may result in charging the cost of a state function for the public benefit to a particular class. *Hasegawa*, 52 Haw. at 333 ("The cost of a proper state function conducted for the public benefit cannot be arbitrarily charged to one class in the society.")

To address these concerns, we suggest as one alternative that the wording of section -8(b), on page 18, lines 7-21, be amended to read as follows:

(b) Whenever the authority shall determine to undertake, or cause to be undertaken, any public facility as part of the district-wide improvement program, the authority may issue and sell bonds in amounts authorized by the legislature to provide funds to finance the public facilities.

We also recommend that the remainder of subsection (b) page 19, lines 1-5; the new subsection (d) on page 19, line 19, through page 20, line 9; and any other provisions to the extent they may have been intended to apply to this assessment, also be deleted.

Section 3 of this bill, on page 33, lines 8-15, requires the Attorney General to commence eminent domain proceedings. Because the circumstances may vary for the various parcels of property, there may be need for clarification before eminent domain proceedings may be commenced under chapter 101, HRS, and there may be situations where commencing eminent domain proceedings would not be in the public interest. The requirement to commence eminent domain proceedings would also appear to apply

to situations in which a private owner desires to sell its property to a person or entity other than the State. To address this concern, we recommend replacing the term "shall" with "may" in line 8 on page 33.

Chair Ichiyama, Vice Chair Poepoe, and members of the House Committee on **House**Committee on Land & Water:

The Office of the Governor offers the following comments on S.B. No. 2693, Relating to Historic and Cultural Preservation.

The Maui wildfire resulted in loss of life, homes, property, infrastructure, businesses, and natural and cultural resources. This tragic incident compels the State of Hawai'i to plan effectively for recovery and expand our resiliency capacity and capability. Innovative solutions are essential to supporting these efforts.

This bill establishes the cultural corridor authority, a public entity that shall determine a shared vision of a path forward for areas of the State affected by disaster and includes a shared vision focusing on community, historic, and cultural preservation, with cooperation among members of the affected community, private enterprise, and the various components of federal, state, and county governments in bringing mutually agreed upon redevelopment plans to fruition.

The State of Hawai'i State Disaster Recovery Coordinator has the role of coordinating and planning for recovery and resiliency efforts for the Maui Wildfire impacts in support of the County of Maui this is in contrast to emergency response which is led by HI-EMA under Emergency Support Functions.

Last fall the Governor identified seven Recovery Support Functions (RSFs) and their corresponding State Leads. The RSFs include: Natural Resources & Cultural Resources RSF coordinated by Hawai'i Department of Land and Natural Resources; Community Planning and Capacity Building RSF coordinated by Office of Planning and Sustainable Development; Housing RSF coordinated by Hawai'i Housing Finance and Development Corporation Infrastructure RSF coordinated by Hawai'i Department of Transportation; Economic RSF

coordinated Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism; Public Health & Healthcare Services RSF coordinated by Hawai'i State Department of Health; and Social Services RSF coordinated by Hawai'i Department of Human Services. These RSFs and their state leads have been working closely with County of Maui, federal partners, and private organizations.

This approach—a State Coordinator coupled with RSFs—is consistent with the National Disaster Recovery Framework, a FEMA structure and process developed from the collective experience of disaster recovery managers nationwide. While the Office of the Governor is open to this concept identified in this potential legislation, we would ask the Chair to include the roles of the State Disaster Recovery Coordinator and RSFs in any new structure established to support the Maui Fires Recovery and Resiliency Efforts.

The potential legislation could be considered as long as there is no negative fiscal impact on the executive budget package.

If you have any questions on the role of State Disaster Recovery Coordinator or the State RSFs, we ask that you contact Luke Meyers, State Disaster Recovery Coordinator for further information and a dialog on this proposal during the legislative session.

#### In consideration of HOUSE BILL 2693 RELATING TO HISTORIC AND CULTURAL PRESERVATION

House Bill 2693 establishes the Cultural Corridor Authority (CCA) to determine a shared vision of a path forward for areas of the State affected by disaster. The CCA will be attached to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism for administrative purposes. **The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) acknowledges the intent of this measure and offers comments.** 

House Bill 2693 establishes the CCA, which is empowered to facilitate redevelopment of affected areas after a declared natural disaster. The CCA has very broad powers, which supersede the powers of State and county agencies, to plan and implement recovery activities within a cultural corridor. Cultural corridors must be designated by statute. The Department fully supports the principle that cultural and historic preservation be given full consideration in designing and implementing disaster recovery programs. However, the Department recommends rather than establishing the CCA as a regulatory authority it be the formal body that gathers information from the relevant community related to historic and cultural preservation for disaster areas. More importantly the regulatory agencies must consult with before rendering decisions related to the preservation and protection of cultural and historic properties.

The requirement that a cultural corridor be designated by statute, however, could be problematic especially from a cultural standpoint which is not always bound by physical boundaries. The CCA could not exercise its authorities to facilitate recovery efforts for many months after the disaster. Federal,

State, and county agencies begin planning efforts for the recovery while still responding to the disaster itself, many months before the Legislature could designate a cultural corridor and the CCA could begin its work. Lahaina provides a concrete example of this. Even though the disaster response is still ongoing and at a time when the Legislature is just beginning to hold hearings on measures, the Department, other State agencies, the Office of the Governor, the Mayor and Maui County Council, and county agencies, together with federal agencies, relying on existing legal authority and the Governor's emergency powers, have been actively involved in planning and coordination for the recovery since December. Planning and coordination can always improve; and resources to implement both disaster response and recovery activities can always improve, but the necessary State, county, and federal institutional framework already exists.

The Department believes that the proposed powers of the CCA are overly broad. Existing statutory and regulatory provisions cover most, if not all, of the authority to be exercised by the CCA. Furthermore, the CCA's authority supersedes that of the respective county mayors and county councils in which the corridor is designated.

Section 31 of House Bill 2693 sets forth the purposes of the Lahaina Cultural Corridor. The Department supports those purposes but notes that Lahaina has significant cultural and historic resources from the post-contact period. Lahaina was the capitol of the Kingdom of Hawaii until 1845. Some of the buildings in the Lahaina National Historic Landmark District, although badly damaged by the wildfire, can probably be restored. The Department believes that this section should reflect the broader history and cultures of Lahaina.

Section 31 of House Bill 2693 establishes the Lahaina Cultural Corridor. The boundary is simply left to the discretion of the CCA. The Department believes delegation of the boundary designation should not be delegated to the CCA, especially since at this point in time the area affected by the wildfire is well known.

Finally, the Department notes that the requirements of Hawai'i Administrative Rules 13-275, -284, & -300, section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, and 36 CFR Pat 800, which implements it, and *Ka Pa'akai* analysis all require and provide frameworks for facilitating consultation on identification, evaluation, and discussions regarding appropriate consideration of cultural concerns.

The Department believes the intent of the bill to have an independent body provide oversight and implement recovery efforts is noble but very difficult to establish and manage, while ensuring that it does not result in slower response and less community and local control is very difficult, at best.

Aloha e Chair Ichiyama, Vice-Chair Poepoe, and honorable committee members,


Mahalo for this opportunity to testify in <u>opposition</u> of HB2693, which would establish the framework for future cultural corridor authorities to redevelop areas affected by disaster, and establish a Lahaina Cultural Corridor District. I oppose the passage of this measure for the following reasons:

- 1) it seems to create unnecessary layers of bureaucracy,
- 2) doesn't include benchmarks to measure success or a timeline for dissolution,
- 3) is duplicative of the Maui County's Office of Recovery, and
- 4) its creation in statute will make it difficult to make changes as needed.

While the stated purpose is well intended, this process negates home rule. This bill is reminiscent of the Urban Renewal Law, in HRS 53-5, with similar powers, duties, and functions, except that instead of the County filling the seats of the decision-making board, the governor would have that power. It is not clear at what point the purpose of this envisioned authority would be completed and would then be dissolved, or if it would continue on indefinitely, like the Maui Redevelopment Agency.

Immediately after the fire, Mayor Bissen initiated the creation of an office to work with the community on recovery and redevelopment. From the MauiRecovers.org website: "The Maui County's Office of Recovery stands as a centralized hub orchestrating and overseeing recovery operations. It's positioned not just to facilitate physical reconstruction, but also to revitalize the community, ensuring that the socioeconomic fabric is restored, and strengthened."

It states that it follows a Recovery Framework that operates under seven guiding principles: "Community Led, Government Supported; Individual and Family; Leadership and Local Primacy; Engaged Partnerships and Inclusiveness; Unity of Effort; Resilience and Sustainability; and Psychological and Emotional Recovery."



Similar to that of our tourism authority, there is concern that the board appointment process could be politically driven, resulting in decisions removed from the grassroots community level and against their interest. Having a redevelopment agency created in State statute also makes it difficult to amend and harder from grassroots Lahaina folks from truly having the weight their voice deserves.

Furthermore, the community spent over two years in an extensive process updating West Maui Community Plan that was adopted in 2022. The community is looking forward to using that as an initial guide.

The bill would establish the Cultural Corridor Authority to develop plans to redevelop areas affected by disaster while maintaining historic and cultural preservation; establish an income tax credit to incentivize the voluntary relinquishment of real property located in areas affected by disaster; directs the Attorney General to commence eminent domain proceedings for certain purposes; appropriate moneys and declare. that the appropriation exceeds the state general fund expenditure ceiling for 2024-2025.

Historic Hawai'i Foundation appreciates the intent of the bill and offers comments:

#### § - 3 (b) Members of the Cultural Corridor Authority:

In addition to the chairperson of the department of land and natural resources, HHF recommends that the Authority should include the administrator of the State historic preservation division or the administrator's designee.

This would provide a subject matter expert for matters related to historic and cultural preservation, which will be needed to meet the purpose of the Authority.

#### § - 31 Lahaina cultural corridor district; finding and purposes:

HHF recommends that the purposes include the preservation, rehabilitation, restoration or reconstruction of buildings, structures, objects and sites that contribute to the significance of the Lahaina National Historic Landmark District and/or the County of Maui Lahaina Historic District(s).

#### § - 235 Income tax credit:

HHF recommends that an income tax credit be provided for property owners that preserve, rehabilitate, or restore buildings, structures, objects and sites that contribute to the significance of the Lahaina National Historic Landmark District and/or the County of Maui Lahaina Historic District(s) in accordance with Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties (36 CFR Part 68) and with the prior review and concurrence of the State Historic Preservation Division.

My name is Carlos Lamas, a resident of Lahaina, and I oppose HB2693. This bill, which seeks to establish a Cultural Corridor Authority for the purpose of preserving and remediating historically and culturally significant areas, unfortunately, threatens the very fabric of our local autonomy and self-determination. Specifically, my concerns revolve around the proposed composition and appointment process of this Authority, as well as its potential impact on the voices of Lahaina's residents in the redevelopment process.

The composition of the Authority, as currently outlined in the bill, is heavily weighted towards government officials and appointees, significantly limiting the representation and influence of the local community directly affected by the Authority's decisions. The proposed structure does not ensure that the voice and concerns of the Lahaina community will be heard. The inclusion of only two representatives from each cultural corridor district—comprising a resident and a business or nonprofit leader—seems grossly insufficient to capture the breadth of perspectives necessary for genuinely inclusive decision-making.

Moreover, the centralized appointment process, which grants the Governor significant power in selecting members, with additional roles filled based on recommendations from the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House, heightens my concerns. This approach could allow political considerations to overshadow the real needs and qualifications that should guide the Authority's formation and actions. Such a configuration could lead to a lack of balance and diversity in the perspectives represented on the Authority, rendering it less effective and less reflective of the communities it aims to serve.

Furthermore, the bill's provisions for including business owners and nonprofit directors as district representatives, while intended to introduce varied perspectives, could instead pave the way for conflicts of interest. This is particularly troubling if these individuals' business or organizational interests stand to benefit from the Authority's decisions. The potential for such conflicts underscores the necessity of establishing stringent guidelines to prevent them, ensuring that all decisions are made in the best interest of cultural and historical preservation.

The Authority's structure, as proposed, is not representative enough of our community in Lahaina. It allows for disproportionate influence from non-residents and state officials, which could significantly diminish the local residents' voices in the redevelopment process. Lahaina's

unique cultural identity and history must be preserved, and redevelopment efforts should be driven by those who live and work within the community, ensuring that our voices are heard and our interests are protected.

Diversifying the appointment process to involve community organizations, cultural groups, and other stakeholders based in Lahaina could mitigate potential biases and enhance the Authority's legitimacy and effectiveness. Establishing clear conflict of interest guidelines is also essential to maintaining the integrity of the Authority's decisions.

In conclusion, while the intention behind the creation of the Cultural Corridor Authority may be commendable, its current structure and governance mechanisms fall short of ensuring that it will serve as a true steward of the rich heritage. By revisiting the composition and appointment process, we can strengthen the foundation of the Authority, ensuring it is more, transparent, and representative of the communities it aims to protect and serve.

There are a multitude of stories available for our consideration that reveal solutions to the challenges we face in the aftermath of the Maui fires.

House Bill 2693, in its current form, undermines the principle of "let Lahaina lead" and silences their stories by placing excessive power in the hands of Oahu and the state of Hawaii to dictate the redevelopment of Lahaina. The proposed cultural corridor authority, with its composition and decision-making structure, risks sidelining the very people who call Lahaina home and understand its unique needs and challenges.

Solutions to our most pressing problems draw from a memory missing the most important lessons that can heal and change lives. We must harvest lessons from our beautiful, brilliant, life-affirming stories. We also need lessons that can be distilled from the dark stories of our past, stories that can help everyone to understand the consequences of our short-sighted actions.

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, members of the committee,

I stand in opposition to this bill as it is written. I strongly disagree with a few aspects of this bill.

First, if this Authority will possibly establish additional Cultural Corridor Districts in the future, there is no clear separation of authority between the representatives appointed for each Cultural Corridor District. Thus, as currently written, representatives for the Lahaina Cultural Corridor District (the first district) would seem to be involved in the decisions being made for future Cultural Corridor Districts. As we have heard from the voices of Lahaina residents who have spoken publicly, Lahaina's redevelopment and recovery should be led by Lahaina. With the current form of this bill, outsiders are systemically put into positions that would impede or interfere with the redevelopment of future Cultural Corridor Districts.

Second, having 2 representatives from each Cultural Corridor District as part of the Authority is insufficient. With all the powers and decisions that the Authority will have to make, relying on the judgment of 2 representatives from the community to provide the insight of a whole community is unrealistic. Also, having 2 representatives from the each Cultural Corridor District, while having 3 other members appointed by the Governor (Cultural Specialist, At-large from the President of the Senate, At-large from the Speaker of the House), systemically creates the same issue, a minority say from residents on the future of the area. Outside of the 5 appointed positions, there are still 5 more seats provided to outsiders of the area (Dept of Finance, Transportation, DEBDT, BLNR, P&P), which leaves a mere 20% of the Authority actually belonging to the area impacted. This is insufficient.

Third, the descriptions of the 2 representatives from each Cultural Corridor District is insufficient as well. In the Hawaiian language, we use the phrase "No \_\_\_\_\_ mai au," to say "we belong to \_\_\_\_ " (with the blank being the geographic area you are from). Translated, the "No" means, to belong to, and not simply a location a subject is/was at. In this Hawaiian worldview, there is a difference between belonging to a place (having a deep connection and responsibility/obligation to the place) vs. being from a place (simply living there without a deep connection and responsibility/obligation to the place). I point this out because those who represent a community in an affected Cultural Corridor District should belong to the affected area, having deep connection, responsibility, and obligation. Those who belong to a place have ancestry and family times that have been there for generations, and their responsibility/obligation to the area is deep rooted in their identity, and these are the ones who should be representing the affected areas in the development of a Cultural Corridor District. Those who have been living as a resident in an area for decades may feel some sort of connection, but it is undeniable that their connection is not as deep as one who has family ancestry connecting them to the area over generations.

Thus, the appointment of a resident of the affected area and a small business owner or nonprofit organization officer or director to the Authority is appalling. Deeper connections need to be required to ensure that the affected areas are represented by someone who is truly connected to the area.

Fourth, the Authority is to develop the plan for the Lahaina Cultural Corridor District, which should be finalized by the end of the transition period, yet there is no mention or requirement of substantive community involvement. A (re)development of this scale needs to have pathways in which the community is able to play a major role in the planning of the Cultural Corridor District. In § -6, the bill does mention that a public hearing be held on the proposed plan, and after consideration of comments and revisions, they can submit the plan to the Governor for approval, but this is insufficient as well. This bill needs to require a process to involve those belonging to the affected area to collaboratively create the Cultural Corridor District plan, prior to the public hearing.

In summary, this bill lacks the community connection that the community has called out for and rightfully deserves in being part of the process of redeveloping an affected area. For Lahaina today, for other areas tomorrow. Thus, I stand in opposition to this bill.

You have likely received a lot of opposition to this bill and the current way that it is written. With that, I agree. I understand that time is of the essence, as we have less than three months left before this legislative session closes. Our community is on high alert about the number of bills that have been brought forward about Lahaina, and the easiest way to deal with these is to support or oppose them. 4-or the overall executive power recognized in this bill given to the governor (by manner of appointment, suspension, and/or removal of membership), in a manner that has the potential for abuse and the formulation of a jilted, bias body possibly more inclined to operate in conjunction with political positions and agendas (as opposed to the unadulterated perspective of Lāhainā herself!)

The inevitable state involvement will always be prevalent and overwhelming, and only further remove our voice from the equation. Furthermore, as it is, no amount of amendments will rectify this simple fact.

My name is Archie Kalepa and I am testifying today as a 9th generation Lahaina resident, in favor of HB 2693. This measure is a result of difficult conversations by Lahaina residents who are wrestling with the reality that everything has changed and we cannot return to where we were the day before the fire as if nothing has happened. As a community, we need to plan for a new piko that centers the place and people and to restore cultural stewardship. I support the part of the bill that leaves the boundaries of the cultural corridor to be determined in the future. Meeting and talking about the size and location of this corridor, allowable uses, restoration and improvements, what kinds of activities will occur in this place, and how we honor the people who died, the people who survived, and the people who are still working to this day to fill urgent needs – meeting and talking about these things in relationship to plans that will create a piko for the new Lahaina will give us tangible hope. If will make a difference if the streets are not as narrow and there is less density that make living and escaping more dangerous. It will make a difference if Lahaina is a place not only for tourists but also a place for Lahaina residents and Maui residents to gather, learn, go to restaurants and shops. If the natural water flow is restored at Moku'ula and other places, the land would not be as ready to burn. If we are able to move inland ahead of sea level rise, then we will be the shoreline community for the future shoreline and not the people who rebuilt in a place that will be soon threatened. In between the urgent meetings about FEMA and emergency housing and where our children will go to school next year, these other wishes and hopes are being expressed. Having a structured, locally directed, multi-government supported effort to make these wishes and hopes a reality would go a long way to having us be more ready when the last of the ash has been scraped away. It will make a difference. This type of planning and restoration would be very difficult under existing laws and county ordinances.
