Chair Tarnas, Vice Chair Takayama, and members of the House Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of H.B. No. 2802, Proposing an Amendment to Article I, Section 23, of the Hawaii Constitution Relating to Marriage. It has been over 30 years since same-sex marriage has been legal in Hawaii. It has also been over 30 years since the Hawaii Supreme Court recognized the discrimination inherent in restricting marriage to opposite-sex couples.

In 2013, the Hawaii Marriage Equality Act of 2013 recognized marriages between individuals of the same sex in our State. Throughout this time, our State has stood as a champion of fairness, justice, and human equality by valuing and respecting the dignity and diversity of individuals and their rights.

This bill would propose a constitutional amendment to repeal Article I, Section 23, of the Hawaii State Constitution to remove the Legislature's authority to reserve marriage to opposite-sex couples. The following constitutional question would be printed on the ballot for Hawaii voters to consider:

Shall the state constitution be amended to remove the legislature's authority to reserve marriage to opposite-sex couples?

H.B. No. 2802 is an essential step in enabling Hawaii voters to determine an inflexible provision of marriage in our State Constitution that is delegated to the Legislature. Three decades have passed since same-sex marriage has been legal in Hawaii. It is time to initiate change at the ballot through the proposed constitutional amendment as provided in this measure.

Chair Tarnas, Vice Chair Takayama, and Members of the Committee:

Mahalo for the opportunity to provide written testimony in **STRONG SUPPORT** of House Bill No. 2802, which proposes a constitutional amendment to remove the legislature's authority to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples.

I was on the steps of the U.S. Supreme Court when news broke that the Court intended to reverse precedent that had stood for nearly half a century and eliminate a woman's constitutional right to reproductive freedoms. I've watched as this ultraconservative court has stripped away our right to make decisions about our own bodies, rolled back the clock on voting rights, affirmative action, and the ability of states to limit gun violence.

As someone who fought to establish and protect marriage equality in Hawaii for more than a quarter of a century, I refuse to stand by and watch this Court take a hatchet to rights won that had previously been denied. If this Court follows through on its threat to revisit *Obergefell*, we could easily see nationwide rights to same-sex marriage restricted again.

Speaking on the floor and voting for the passage of the Hawai'i Marriage Equality Act of 2013, which established same-sex marriage in Hawaii, was one of the defining moments of my tenure in the Hawaii State Senate. Although this is still law in our state, Article I, Section 23 of the Hawaii State Constitution also grants our state legislature the power to limit who can marry. This discriminatory language cannot be allowed to stand.

If *Obergefell* falls and a future legislature acts to limit marriage equality in Hawaii, the rights of same-sex couples in our state could once again face limitations.

We cannot stand by and hope the U.S. Supreme Court does nothing. The right to be who you are and love who you choose are at risk. We must take action to preserve the rights that so many LGBTQ people in Hawaii have fought for and rightfully deserve, now and in the future.

Dear Chair Tarnas, Vice Chair Takayama, and Members of the Committee:

The ACLU of Hawai'i **SUPPORTS HB2802**, which proposes a constitutional amendment to remove the legislature's authority to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples.

In 1993, the Hawai'i State Supreme Court ruled in *Baehr v. Lewin*, that refusing to grant marriage licenses to same-sex couples was discriminatory under our Hawai'i Constitution. The court did not however immediately order the state to begin issuing marriage licenses to same-sex couples; rather, it remanded the case to the trial court and ordered the state to justify its position.

After the trial court judge rejected the state's justifications for limiting marriage to opposite-sex couples in 1996, the Hawai'i State Legislature passed a proposed constitutional amendment during the 1997 session that would overrule the court's ruling and allow the Legislature to ban same-sex marriage. This constitutional amendment appeared on the 1998 general election ballot as Constitutional Amendment 2.

On November 3, 1998, Hawai'i voters approved the amendment by a vote of 69.2–28.6%, and the state legislature exercised its power to ban same-sex marriage.

The ACLU of Hawai'i opposed that Constitutional Amendment which would become Section 23. Then as now, we believe the language is discriminatory and places limits on the committement between two loving adults.

While the Hawai'i Marriage Equality Act of 2013 made possible marriage for same-sex couples 15 years later, the vestigial and discriminatory language remains in Hawai'i's foundational gonverning document.

Given the U.S. Supreme Court's roll-back of abortion protections and broader civil rights and liberties, and dicta suggesting the potential over-turning of *Obergefell v. Hodges*, we believe Hawai'i must take proactive steps to defend the right to marry for same-sex couples.

Same-sex couples in Hawai'i deserve full dignity and respect and the certainty that no matter what happens in the future, whether at the U.S. Supreme Court or in our legislature, their marriages and families are protected.

It's always the right time to fight against bigotry. The repeal of Article I, Section 23 is a prime opportunity for the people of Hawai'i to do what it right.

Please pass HB2802 so we can undo a wrong done 26 years ago and ensure that marriage equality is protected in Hawai'i.

Aloha Chair Tarnas, Vice Chair Takayama, and Members of the Committee:

The Change 23 Coalition **SUPPORTS HB2802**, which proposes a constitutional amendment to remove the legislature's authority to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples. The Change 23 Coalition is a collection of civic organizations with a shared goal of restoring the broad marriage equality protections of the pre-1998 Hawai'i State Constitution. The founding members of the coalition include:

- ACLU of Hawai'i
- Council for Native Hawai'i an Advancement
- Hawai'i Health and Harm Reduction Center
- Hawai'i LGBT Legacy Foundation
- Papa Ola Lōkahi

Each of the organizations supports this bill from their own unique perspective and testimony.

It was over 30 years ago in 1994 that three members of our legal community challenged the nation in stating what is now obvious; withholding the right of same-sex couples to marry is discrimination. The 2023 Hawai'i LGBT Legacy Foundation Gala honored a judicial boomer trio of Justice Steve Levinson, Judge Dan Foley, and Judge Kevin Chang with their "Visionary Award". Their pioneering efforts in the *Baeher* decision found the right to same-sex marriage in the Hawai'i State Constitution. In1998 the foundations of this freedom would be shaken by the successful constitutional amendment that added Article1, Section 23 to the Bill of Rights that invested the legislature the authority to grant marriages.

"The legislature shall have the power to reserve marriage to opposite-sex couples."

My name is Jeff Hong, I am the Chair of the Change 23 Coalition. The 1998 fight opposing Section 23 was a personal one. I had recently returned to Hawai'i to

open Microsoft's office. I was also serving part time as a Major in the Hawai'i Army National Guard. In the era of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell", it would put a cloud of criminality over me to openly support the opposition.

I reached out to "Save Our Constitution", the organization opposing the constitutional amendment, to offer my discreet technical support. The staff was



grateful for the assistance and wanted to introduce me to their executive director. Unknown to me their executive director was former State Senator Jackie Young. I was still semi-closeted and meeting Senator Young, a long Korean Community friend of my family, and fierce civil rights advocate, was a surprise. I was inspired that she was leading the fight for our civil rights while also battling cancer.

We lost the amendment vote by 2 to 1. The people of Hawai'i were not yet ready to accept marriage equality and voted with the weight of historical prejudice. There were very few legislators that stood by their principles and voted against the amendment. Their vote would have serious political cost; many faced tight elections, hateful vocal opposition, and ultimately, some lost their seats. We are thankful for those that chose to remain or return to support civil rights in the Hawai'i legislature.



It would be a continuous battle for another 15 years before marriage would be legal in Hawai'i. Thankfully, time has changed hearts and minds. To my disappointment, I suspect in 1998 the majority in my large fifthgeneration family voted for Section 23. By 2013 many in my family and the community would rally at the legislature for statutory marriage equality. For our rushed first-day-of-legal wedding, we had the honor of

Justice Levinson officiating with the former Adjutant General of the Hawai'i National Guard and his wife as witnesses. Our reception had hundreds of friends

and family celebrating. The discrimination fever had broken. The respect, love, and aloha of the people of Hawai'i had returned.

It is a measure of success that after 10 plus years of same-sex marriages, millennials are surprised marriage equality issues exist. Many people are surprised to discover the poisonous language of Section 23 remains in our constitution, suppressed by statute and a Supreme Court decision. Unfortunately, most people were also horrified to discover a Supreme Court decision likes *Dobbs* could change your bodily autonomy rights overnight. Suppressed poisonous language can be resurrected. We must learn from this recent lesson of the past.

Military servicemembers are now free to choose who they marry, but we see a backlash hidden with discrimination to the trans community. I feel obligated to use the voice denied to me 25 years ago, liberated by the work of others, to advocate for change. I am encouraged to be working with a new generation of civil rights advocates to remove this historical stain. We urge your support of this amendment. The people of Hawai'i are ready to restore our constitution and finish the work started by a judicial boomer trio over 30 years ago.

Hawai i Health & Harm Reduction Center (HHHRC) <u>strongly supports</u> HB 2802. This bill authorizes a constitutional amendment to be placed on the November ballot to eliminate Article I, Section 23, which currently empowers the legislature to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples. Elimination of this provision removes a vestige of discrimination that has the potential to further harm if federal court precedent and law pivot toward exclusion of individual rights.

HHHRC serves many members of our state's trans and LGBQ communities, including the provision of medical case management services for people living with HIV, safer sex supplies, HIV testing and linkage to care, transgender services, services for unaccompanied youth experiencing homelessness, and smoking cessation services through "Hawaii's Last Drag."

We support measures that increase opportunities for our state's sexual and gender minorities to be free from discrimination and fully participate in civic and economic life. In this session, the legislature also has opportunities to expand access to gender-affirming care and preventative care services, including access to pre exposure prophylaxis to prevent the transmission of HIV, and to fund the state's LGBTQ+ Commission.

HHHRC's mission is to reduce harm, promote health, create wellness, and fight stigma in Hawai'i and the Pacific. We work with many individuals who are impacted by poverty, housing instability, and other social determinants of health. Many have behavioral health problems, including those relating to substance use and underlying mental health conditions. Many of our clients and participants have been deeply impacted by trauma, including histories of physical, sexual, and psychological abuse.

RE: Strong Support for HB2802 – Constitution on Marriage Rights for all

Rainbow Family 808 strongly supports HB 2802 in order to ensure that the all couples in Hawai`i have Equal Rights in keeping with all residents entering into the legal state of Marriage. Our support of this bill reflects our mission statement: Education, Advocacy and Support.

Many of the members of Rainbow Family 808 have been advocating for Civil Rights since the 1990's in many actions. Others around all islands had been advocating many years before the 1990's. Hawai'i was not the first to legalize Marriage for all. The following examples are listed to impart how important Civil Rights moves some of us into action.

My first testimony was in January 1996. Local leaders told me how important6 it was for a mother to stand up for my son. There had been another mother before me who testified but she had moved back to the continent. I was so happy that I was following in her steps. It was scary but Justice was a great motivator. Rarely does life give us opportunities to make a difference in our children's lives that toke one to this stage.

My spouse, Mike Golojuch, and I burnt a copy of our 1965 Marriage License on the steps of the Hawai'i Capitol building. It was to show that our value of our marriage didn't mean

anything if our son and friends couldn't legally marry. This was also done in hopes that the National PFLAG parents would follow suit in their hometowns to educate the public about the absence of the ability to marry was pure discrimination and prejudice against our children. Unfortunately other families didn't follow through, but we tried. We were in a new frontier. The former Star Bulletin covered us and photographed the action.

Many of us marched around the island of Oahu in support of Equal Marriage Rights. Others organized demonstration on all the other islands. Some had to take vacation time to join in demonstrations. Some people would stand on corners to Sign Wave in Support of Marriage Rights for all before work, others would Sign Wave after work.

I remember one evening, handing out small flyers with Forrest who flew in from Maui to work a few of the bars in Waikiki to educate the public of the importance of our Civil Rights action. Most of the time, I felt like the customers were just being polite and wanted to get back to their drinks. I believe we were planting seeds that our message would work on them and they would stand up for their own Civil Rights.

Forrest and I ended up a street fight with some teenagers. We knew 911 was called, the sirens were coming so we wanted them to stop fighting, get out of the street to avoid being arrested for violating curfew. There I was in a Muumuu, asking them if their mother knew they were in Waikiki on a school night? I did surprise this big, tall teen who had another teen in a choke hold. My high voice made him pay attention and in that moment, this big teen paused his hold and the smaller teen took the moment to run away, just as a couple of HPD cars squealed onto the scene. Forrest and I took off back to my car parked on a side street. It was late and I had classes in the moment. These are just a few of my memories from 1996 to 2012 when the Marriage Rights became law in Hawai`i.

We stood up to Global Churches that called our children perverts while they spent hundreds of thousands in ads that were adapted to shame us, intimidate us, threaten us with eternal damnation and more, Some of us were threatened and we called HPD to record these violations of our safety.

Here we are today, facing another challenge to Civil Rights as in Marriage Rights for all. To me, The Hawai'i Marriage Rights Act was a victory but now we see that language in our Constitution needs to be corrected in order that ARTICLE 1, SECTION 23 also matches Hawai'i Marriage Rights Act. This action is all about Justice. Justice wouldn't be allowed in Putin's Russia so we have to ensure that it is acted on in Hawai'i.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide our support for HB 2802. Rainbow Family 808
asks that you pass SB 2802 this session. All we want is Justice. Every day without these
Civil Rights toward this Humane measure is a crime to humanity

TESTIMONY FROM THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY OF HAWAI'I HOUSE COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY AND HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS

HB2802 Proposes a constitutional amendment to remove the legislature's authority to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples.

POSITION: STRONG SUPPORT

Aloha Chair Tarnas, Vice Chair Takayama and esteemed Members of the Committee.

The Democratic Party of Hawai'i <u>strongly supports</u> HB 2802, with a request to amend the language to match the language found in HB 2080, which is the constitutional amendment bill sponsored by the Equality Caucus.

While the Party strongly supports the bill, we are asking for the above referenced language, because it replaces the current bigoted language with an affirmation that states:

"The right to marriage shall not be denied or abridged by the State on account of race or sex."

This language is inclusive and forward thinking. This is needed especially since certain members of the US Supreme Court have said that the court is open to overturning other precedent setting cases. Which means cases like Obergefell v. Hodges - 2015 (equal marriage rights for same-sex couples) and Loving v. Virginia - 1967 (legalizing interracial marriage) are not safe at the Federal level.

Furthermore, the Party has identified this Bill as a top Legislative Priority for the current session, based on the SCC's approval of the Legislative Committee's top ten legislative priorities, unanimously approved in the January 13, 2024 regular SCC meeting.

Additionally, the SCC, in the same meeting, unanimously approved the attached resolution "Protecting Marriage Equality in the Aloha State".

We believe that the fundamental human right to marriage equality is under attack by far right MAGA politicians and their judiciary appointees across the continent. It is therefore our responsibility to defend human and civil rights in our island home from falling victim to politics of hate and division.

We humbly ask you for your support, and to stand with us and our LGBTQIA+ community. Together we can ensure that Hawai'i remains a beacon of hope and equality, leading the way by example.

Aloha Chair Tarnas, Vice-Chair Takayama and fellow committee members,

I am writing in support of House Bill 2802 on behalf of the Stonewall Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i, Hawai'i's oldest and largest policy and political LGBTQIA+/ MVPFAFF+ focused organization.

HB 2802 proposes a constitutional amendment to remove the legislature's authority to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples.

This past December we celebrated the 10-year anniversary of Marriage Equality coming home to the Aloha State. We say home because it was in the Aloha State that we saw the first court victories in the United States and the world in the battle for Marriage Equality. While we led the way in this struggle we also paid the price for being pioneers and one of the many prices we paid was the constitutional amendment in 1998 that wrote discrimination and bigotry into our state's constitution for the first and hopefully last time, since the historic constitutional convention of 1978.

HB 2802 looks to give Hawai'i's LGBTQIA+/ MVPFAFF+ community and our ever-growing number of allies the opportunity to undo some of the damage that was done in 1998 by removing the homophobic Section 23 from Article 1.

Why is this amendment so important and why now? Well besides the fact that the current Section 23 flies in the face of HRS \\$5-7.5 the "Aloha Spirit" law and it is not a good look for our state; until 2023 the it had been five (5) years that not ONE anti-LGBTQIA+ bill had been introduced. Since then we have seen their introduction grow. While none of them have received hearings in the overturning of Roe v. Wade taught us anything is that we all need to do everything in our power to protect the advances we have made.

This is one of the many reasons why the Stonewall Caucus has been present and every hearing for every bill that directly impacts the LGBTQIA+/ MVPFAFF+ community since our founding in 2001.

The Stonewall Caucus does actually prefer the language in House Bill 2080, the constitutional amendment bill sponsored by the Equality Caucus, because it not only removes the bigoted language it replaces with an affirmation that states:

The right to marriage shall not be denied or abridged by the State on account of race or sex.

This language is inclusive and forward thinking. This is needed especially since certain members of the US Supreme Court have said that the court is open to overturning other precedent setting cases. Which means cases like Obergefell v. Hodges - 2015 (equal marriage rights for same-sex couples) and Loving v. Virginia - 1967 (legalizing interracial marriage) are not safe at the Federal level.

We are glad we are not alone in the belief that the time has come to rectify the homophobia of our past. The Stonewall Caucus passed the attached resolution by unanimous consent at our monthly November

2023 meeting and at the same time Pride at Work – Hawai'i had introduced a similar resolution for the 2023 Hawai'i State AFL-CIO to consider at their biennial convention at the end of November. When the Hawai'i State AFL-CIO passed their version of the resolution it became the largest union endorsement in our state's history in support of Marriage Equality.

Then in January of this year the State Central Committee (SCC), the governing body of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i, passed a similar resolution by unanimous consent. While the resolution passed by the SCC is not policy for the Party, unlike those resolutions passed at the Party's State Convention, it does dove tail nicely with the resolutions that the Party has passed over the years in support of Marriage Equality, like – NAT 2012-02 Support for Marriage Equality and NAT 2016-01 Declaring June 26 as Equality Day.

The Stonewall Caucus does hope that the committee is inclined to amend HB 2802 to match the language found in HB 2080 as it will reflect the calls to action found in the three separate resolutions passed by three different bodies.

While we support this measure, we prefer the replacement language found in **S.B. 3351, S.D. 1.**, which proposes to prohibit discrimination against a person because of ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, or sex, including sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, and pregnancy outcomes.

A constitutional amendment that expressly identifies these forms of discrimination underscores Hawai'i's historical commitment to civil rights. Moreover, it protects these rights against politicized courts eager to disregard well-established precedent, as was the case in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization which overturned Roe v. Wade.


The Chamber of Sustainable Commerce represents over 100 small businesses across the State that strive for a triple bottom line: people, planet and prosperity; we know Hawaii can strengthen its economy without hurting workers, consumers, communities or the environment.

For this reason, we support HB2802, that proposes a constitutional amendment to remove the legislature's authority to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples. People in same-gender relationships own businesses, they and their families are consumers, active participants in our communities and protective stewards of our environment; they deserve same protections, benefits and responsibilities that opposite-gender couples have in ALL interactions with the State.

The Hawaii Constitution continues to contain two sections that explicitly prohibits the State from discriminating against people based on "sex": Article I, Sections 3 and 5. The section at the center of this bill, Section 23, is defective by design and construction. Section 23 is null and void because the "may" discriminate **discretion** in Section 23 **can never override** the "shall" protect & enforce **directives** in Sections 3 and 5.

In order for Section 23 to be valid, Sections 3 and 5 would have had to first be amended to remove "sex" as a protected category. Alternatively, Section 3 would have had to be amended to allow the legislature "to limit" provisions in Section 3; instead, the 1997 Legislature preserved the language in Section 3 that states, "The legislature shall have the power **to enforce**, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this section."

Targeted, unconstitutional discrimination on the basis of sex should never have been enshrined in the Hawaii Constitution in 1998. The state must repeal Section 23, not just because it is morally flawed, but because the originating ballot question given to voters in 1998 was procedurally erroneous and technically ineffective.

Dear Representatives Tarnas, Takayama, Evslin, Ganaden, Holt, Ichiyama, Ilagan, Kong, Miyake and Souza,

I write on behalf of Indivisible Hawai'i to urge that **HB2802** be recommended for passage by this committee. The language in Article 1, Section 23, "The legislature shall have the power to reserve marriage to opposite sex couples," should **not** be in our State Constitution. For one, it is in direct conflict with these other sections of our State Constitution:

Article 1, Section 1.3. Equality of rights. Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the State on account of sex.

Article 1, Section 1.5. Due process and equal protection. No person shall be . . . denied the enjoyment of the person's civil rights or be discriminated against in the exercise thereof because of . . . sex . . .

These two provisions prohibit discrimination based on sex. Denying the right to marry to same sex couples is discrimination based on sex. Justice Neil Gorsuch, a staunch conservative, made this clear in *Bostock v. Clayton County*, 590 U.S. ____, 140 S. Ct. 1731 (2020), recognizing the obvious: "... discrimination based on homosexuality... necessarily entails discrimination based on sex; the first cannot happen without the other." But in 1998, the public didn't see things that way. The two quoted provisions were *already in our State Constitution in 1998*, when Article 1, Section 23 flatly allowing discrimination against homosexuals was added by the electorate.

The individual rights we have long held under our State and Federal Constitutions and have long taken for granted are not set in stone. We have only to look at the U.S. Supreme Court's abortion decision, *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, 597 U.S. 215 (2022), to recognize this.

Let's make sure our rights are protected for all Hawai'i citizens. Please approve **HB2802** for passage.

Lewin) that the State of Hawai'is refusal to grant same-sex couples marriage licenses was discriminatory, the first such ruling in the United States and the world, and in the plurality opinion, the court ruled that while the right to privacy in the Hawai'i Constitution does not include a fundamental right to same-sex marriage, denying marriage to same-sex couples constituted discrimination based on sex in violation of the right to equal protection guaranteed by the State Constitution and the court remanded the case to the trial court, instructing that "in accordance with the 'strict scrutiny' standard, the burden will rest on Lewin to overcome the presumption that HRS § 572-1 is unconstitutional by demonstrating that it furthers compelling state interests and is narrowly drawn to avoid unnecessary abridgments of constitutional rights."; and

Whereas, In 1996, Judge Kevin S.C. Chang ruled that the state did not meet its evidentiary burden and it did not prove that the state had a compelling interest in denying marriage licenses to same-sex couples and even assuming that it had it had not proven that HRS § 572-1 was narrowly tailored to avoid unnecessary abridgement of constitutional rights, and he enjoined the state from refusing to issue marriage licenses to otherwise-qualified same-sex couples and the following day, Judge Chang stayed his ruling, acknowledging the "legally untenable" position couples would be in should the Hawai'i Supreme Court reverse him on appeal; and

Whereas, The State of Hawai'i's constitution was amended in 1998 by adding Section 23 to Article I which allows the state Legislature to reserve marriage for opposite sex couples, which ended the Baehr v. Miike case; and

Whereas, Marriage Equality became the law of the land in the state of Hawai'i on December 2, 2013 after a historic special session that lasted from October 28 to November 12, 2013 when Senate Bill 1 passed the legislature and was signed into law on November 13, 2013 by Governor Neil Abercrombie; and

Whereas, According to the Vital Statistics Branch of the State of Hawaii's Department of Health as of September 2023 there have been 11,804 same-sex couples married in the state of Hawaii since December 2, 2013, the day Marriage Equality became the law of the land in the Aloha State; and

Whereas, President Joe Biden signed the Respect for Marriage Act into law on December 13, 2022 which requires states to approve and acknowledge out-of-state marriage licenses, which was passed to protect same-sex and interracial couples should the Supreme Court overturn, Obergefell v. Hodges and/or Loving v. Virginia respectfully as they were both decided under the due process clause of the Fourteenth Amendment which was used to overturn Roe v. Wade in June 2022; now therefor be it

Resolved, That the Hawai'i State American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations (AFL-CIO) supports full marriage equality for same-sex couples; and be it further

Resolved, That the Hawai'i State AFL-CIO supports all efforts to amend the Hawai'i State Constitution to remove Section 23 of Article I, the anti-marriage equality section that was added in 1998; and be it further

Resolved, That the Hawai'i State AFL-CIO supports amending the Hawai'i State Constitution to ensure all eligible opposite and same-sex couples' right to marry is protected; and be it

Ordered, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to all the members of the Hawai'i Congressional Delegation, to the Governor and Lt. Governor of the State of Hawai'i, and all members of the Hawai'i State Legislature.

Dear Chair Tarnas, Vice Chair Takayama, and Members of the Committee,

Papa Ola Lokahi testifies **in support** of HB 2802, which proposes to remove the legislature's authority to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples as a ballot question. Papa Ola Lokahi is currently serving on the Change 23 Coalition, an effort to remove this limit to civil rights from the State Constitution.

It's time for Hawaii to repeal the constitutional amendment restricting the freedom to marry for same-sex couples. Doing so would remove any uncertainty for the many Hawaii families who could see their marriages delegitimized. Same-sex couples in Hawaii deserve full dignity and respect in our state and the certainty that no matter what happens in the future, whether at the U.S. Supreme Court or in our legislature, marriages and families are equally protected. In today's legal system, marriage provides a slew of rights, benefits, and protections from tax benefits to Medicare eligibility and health insurance. Sexual orientation cannot threaten an individual's ability to care for their spouse.

Prior listening sessions around the State of Hawai'i held by Papa Ola Lokahi found that respondents shared many social determinants as integral to the health and well-being of Native Hawaiians. These sessions also demonstrated views on gender, sex, partnership, and family that welcome relationships beyond the cisgender, heteronormative Western concepts typically protected in the current legal system.

Our ability to uplift Native Hawaiian health and self-determination includes our support of this State Constitutional amendment proposal not only from the perspective of cultural acceptance, but also as a part of civil rights for same-sex spouses. Under the current State Constitution, marriage limitation is based on sexual orientation, as Section 1, Article 23 makes no mention of opposite-sex marriages. Even if the Legislature does not choose to exercise its ability to limit marriage, as explained in Attorney General Opinion 13-1, the letter of the law means that same-sex couples currently live with a lesser right than opposite-sex couples.

Many efforts in the State of Hawai'i today choose to center and claim Native Hawaiian values, promote Native Hawaiian practices, and draw upon Native Hawaiian wisdom. Though not all

individuals or families of Native Hawaiian descent may agree today, tolerance and acceptance of same-sex relationships are concordant with our people and history. This was recorded from early records of Western settlers and can also be seen in the hua 'ōlelo Hawai'i that reflect our precontact cultural heritage, norms, and practices.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in **SUPPORT** of this critical legislation.

Papa Ola Lōkahi, the Native Hawaiian Health Board, authorized by the federal Native Hawaiian Health Care Improvement Act, is charged with raising the health status of Native Hawaiians to the highest possible level, which we achieve through strategic partnerships, programs, and public policy.

The Hawai'i Civil Rights Commission (HCRC) supports H.B. 2802. This bill proposes a constitutional amendment to remove the legislature's authority to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples by repealing Article I, section 23, of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i.

Hawai'i has a long and unique history of enshrining equality for all people in the State of Hawai'i in its constitution. The HCRC has enforcement jurisdiction over Hawai'i laws prohibiting discrimination in Chapters 368, 378, 489, and 515, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, and carries out the Hawai'i constitutional mandate that no person shall be discriminated against in the exercise of their civil rights. Art. I, Sec. 5 of Hawai'i's constitution reads:

No person shall be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law, nor be denied the equal protection of the laws, nor be denied the enjoyment of the person's civil rights or be discriminated against in the exercise thereof because of race, religion, sex or ancestry.

Hawai'i has historically sought to expand, not restrict, these rights and equal protection of its laws for all people in the state, as seen during the Constitutional Convention in 1978, which resulted in

expanded protections on the basis of sex, and where delegates were worried that the term "civil rights" could be too limiting. However, a step backwards in the expansion of rights occurred in the 1990s through a series of unfortunate legal events, and, in 1998, the Hawai'i Constitution was amended to grant the legislature the power to "reserve" or limit marriage to opposite sex couples, thus, denying same-sex couples the right to marry by statute.

After many failed attempts in the legislature, Hawaii passed its Hawai'i Marriage Equality Act in 2013 and codified the right to marry for LGBTQ+ individuals. However, Article I, Section 23 of the Hawai'i constitution continues to lurk in the background as a reminder that the legislature can limit the rights for LGBTQ+ couples and create different marriage rights from opposite-sex couples through legislative action. This ability to discriminate is unjust and is not in line with the values of Hawai'i to expand protection of rights for all individuals.

H.B. 2802 repeals Article 1, Section 23 entirely and removes the legislature's ability to restrict and deny the right to marry for LGBTQ+ couples. The HCRC supports this bill.

There was no anti-bullying law back then, no discrimination protections for sexual orientation, no benefits to same-sex partners of state employees, no recognition of gay couples, civil unions or marriage, no pride month, or official pride parades. And yet, gay people were here. They were everywhere. There were gay bars and gay restaurants, gay boutiques, and gay clubs. There were gay couples too—committed gay couples who lived their lives in the open, sheltering one another from the storms of hate, the onslaught of AIDS, waiting and fighting for the day when the rest of the country would recognize that their love was just as good.

Fortunately, a lot has changed since then and Hawaii has often led the way, honoring and protecting its people. Hawaii has the opportunity to lead once again.

If the Supreme Court were to overturn Obergefell, there would still be gay couples. There will still be gay people falling in love, committing themselves to one another, building lives together, adopting animals, fighting over the bed covers, missing each other during off-island conferences, and nursing one another back to health. The worry is that without marriage protections there could be a return to the days when husbands and wives, committed gay couples, are forbidden from seeing their loved ones in the hospital, simply because they aren't legally recognized as family. Please don't let that happen to us again. Please.

Without marriage protection it is possible that when I die, my husband will lose his say over what happens to my remains, or our shared belongings: the sofa purchase we agonized over, the bed we made love in, the oven we used to prep Friendsgiving turkey every year for our chosen family, even our beloved dogs. Imagine dealing with the death of your partner and having the rug (literally) pulled out from underneath you.

Please pass HB2802 and protect my marriage, and thousands of other, beautiful and sacred Hawaiian marriages. End the uncertainty, the worry. Let our love be.

Dear Mr. Chairman and members of the Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs Committee,

I submit this testimony in support of HB 2802, PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE I, SECTION 23, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION RELATING TO MARRIAGE.

Section 23, Article I of the Hawaii State Constitution is the only provision in our Bill of Rights adopted to take away rights rather than recognize or grant rights. It's the only provision in our state constitution designed and adopted to target and discriminate against a minority of our population, in this case, members of our LGBTQ community. And, it is directly contrary to the ruling of the United Supreme Court in Obergefell v. Hodges, 576 U.S. 644 (2015) that overturned state constitutional provisions and statutes that prohibited same-sex marriage as a violation of the equal protection clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, exactly what Section 23 was proposed and adopted to do, and did.

As you know, I was the attorney for the same-sex couples in Baehr v. Lewin, 74 Hawaii 530 (1993) where the Hawaii Supreme Court ruled it was sex discrimination under our state constitution bill of rights to deny same-sex couples marriage licenses unless the state could demonstrate a compelling state interest to justify its discrimination against the couples. I must admit that I was naïve not to have anticipated the backlash that followed the decision. It was severe, sustained and painful. Even after state circuit court Judge Kevin Chang's December 3, 1996 decision (following a two week trial with testimony from national and local experts in psychiatry, psychology, sociology and pediatrics) ruling the state failed to prove a compelling state interest to justify its sex discrimination in denying marriage licenses to same-sex couples, the backlash continued, resulting in Section 23, Article I.

Section 23 was proposed by the Legislature in its 1997 session despite the comprehensive findings of Judge Chang that the overwhelming evidence at trial in the case demonstrated that same-sex marriage would benefit the families of same-sex marriage and have no adverse impact on the families of opposite-sex marriages. Why did the Legislature do this in 1997 when it had it had previously declined to do so? Some of its members had been targeted and defeated in the 1996 primary and general elections for refusing to support a constitutional amendment banning same-sex marriage. Those that survived in 1996 were told they would be next in 1998 if they did not support the proposed amendment that polls showed was supported by a 2 to 1 margin of the voters. The cry of those opposing same-sex marriage was "Let the people vote!"

History has vindicated our Supreme Court and Judge Chang. Same-sex marriage exists in all fifty states and in over 30 countries with no adverse impact on opposite-sex marriages and families, and only positive impact on same-sex marriages and families. The United States Supreme Court has recognized this in Obergefell and the United States Congress and President have done so as well in enacting the Respect for Marriage Act in 2022 that requires federal, state and local governments to recognize and respect same-sex marriage.

The Hawaii legislature in 2013 finally enacted a law allowing same-sex couples to marry in Hawaii. Hawaii became the fifteenth state to do so. By this time, public opinion had changed from opposition to support of same-sex marriage, the United States Supreme Court had ruled in in United States v. Windsor, 570 U.S. 744 (2013) that the federal 1996 Defense of Marriage Act rejecting same-sex marriage was unconstitutional (enacted in response to Baehr v. Lewin, passed and signed into law during Hawaii's September 1996 same-sex marriage trial before Judge Chang), and President Obama and Vice-President Biden had come out in support of same-sex marriage.

It is time for the legislature to finish the job. Remove this discriminatory and unconstitutional provision from our Bill of Rights. Pass HB 2802. Let the people vote. This time <u>for</u> civil rights, as I believe they will.

My name is Sarah "Mili" Milianta-Laffin, and I'm a public school teacher at 'Ilima Intermediate School in Ewa Beach. You will hear many important reasons for supporting HB2802 today. For my testimony, I'd like to share my experience as a Hawaii public school teacher who has directly supported over 200 LGBTQ+ students as the faculty sponsor of a GSA After School Club.

GSAs in the 1990s were known as "Gay Straight Alliance" clubs and we now call them "Genders & Sexualities Alliance" clubs. These are after school clubs, for students by students, to create safe space for LGBTQ+ students on campus, and to help the entire school in efforts to fight homophobia and bullying. In 2020, out of 8,000 national GSAs, our Ilima Intermediate School GSA - the Rainbow Royales - won GLSEN's "GSA of the Year" award.

Many of my LGBTQ+ students struggle not being able to be safely "out" at home, or at school. Student mental health concerns have been exacerbated by the pandemic, and when I work with these students, I always try to focus them on a future that gets better, where they can thrive and be themselves. They can and should expect to have job protections, the ability to be their full selves in all spaces, access to family building resources, and the expectation that they can get married like anyone else in our state.

<u>Simply put, the legalization of gay marriage has saved student lives.</u> Suicide is the second leading cause of death among adolescents between the ages of 15 and 24 years. Adolescents who are sexual minorities experience elevated rates of suicide attempts.

A study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association - Pediatrics found that implementing marriage equality is associated with a 7% drop in the number of high school students who reported suicidal ideation. For LGB students, the drop in suicidal ideation was even bigger at a 14% decrease. These decreases were enough for researchers to say that having laws that allow same-sex marriage is linked with suicide rates, which props up other research that shows the more we accept people, the less depressed and likely to have suicidal thoughts they are.

By supporting this bill, you support the future protection of marriage rights, and in doing so, support my students in seeing a future where it will always be safe to be their full selves in our state.

I submit this testimony in support of HB 2802, PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE I, SECTION 23, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION RELATING TO MARRIAGE.

Section 23, Article I of the Hawaii State Constitution is the only provision in our Bill of Rights designed and adopted to *take away* rights rather than recognize or grant rights. It's the only provision in our state constitution designed and adopted to target and discriminate *against* a minority of our population, in this case, members of our LGBTQ+ community. It also stands in stark opposition to the ruling of the United Supreme Court in <u>Obergefell v. Hodges</u>, 576 U.S. 644 (2015) that overturned state constitutional provisions and statutes that prohibited same-sex marriage as a violation of the equal protection clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, exactly what Section 23 was proposed and adopted to do, and did.

I had the privilege of serving as the elected Prosecuting Attorney for the County of Kauai from 2012 until late 2021. Before that, I served as a Deputy County Attorney, and as a Deputy Prosecutor on Kauai. In all my time working in law enforcement on the Garden Island, a time I will cherish for the rest of my life, I came to believe that the strength of our community arose from its families. Kauai's families would not be so strong if its people were not free to form family units with the people they love.

I also had the good fortune to serve as Law Clerk to Judge Daniel Foley of Hawaii's Intermediate Court of Appeals from 2006-2008. One of the primary reasons I was elated when Judge Foley offered me my clerkship in 2005 was because I knew he was plaintiff's counsel in Baehr v. Lewin, a case with which you are all surely familiar. He was on the right side of history, just as you all have the chance to be on the right side of history by helping to rid Hawaii's Constitution of this dark stain.

Before I came to Hawaii I worked first as a paralegal and then as an attorney in the City of Boston's legal department. I was in my office at Boston City Hall on May 17, 2004, two months before I took my first bar exam, when the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court issued its decision in Goodridge v. Department of Public Health, which legalized same-sex marriage in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. I was proud to help (in a supporting role) the City's legal team fight back the many last-minute challenges to the ruling and it was one of the most special days in my life to be at City Hall on that day when the first same-sex marriage licenses were issued by the City Clerk. I will never forget the joy, the relief, and the satisfaction that came from seeing first hand how the long arc of the universe sometimes does indeed bend towards justice.

In looking back at the sordid history of how Section 23 became a part of Hawaii's Constitution, it is clear that it embodied the worst and most craven impulses of our politics. The Hawaii legislature took significant steps toward addressing it in 2013 when Hawaii finally enacted a law allowing same-sex couples to marry within the state. You all have the opportunity to help finish that admirable start and finally remedy that shameful remnant of the past by giving Hawaii's voters the opportunity to vote once more - this time to vote FOR civil rights.

TESTIMONY OF EVAN WOLFSON (by e-mail)

To the Chair and Members of the Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs Committee –

Aloha.

I submit this testimony in support of HB 2802, PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE I, SECTION 23, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION RELATING TO MARRIAGE. I strongly support this measure to give the people of Hawaii the opportunity to vote to remove discrimination from the state constitution.

During the 1990s, I served as co-counsel to the Honorable Daniel R. Foley in the historic *Baehr* litigation in which the Honorable Kevin Chang delivered the world's first ruling in favor of same-sex couples' freedom to marry. Subsequently, I founded and led Freedom to Marry, the successful campaign to win marriage for same-sex couples in the United States. I now lead a team under the banner of Freedom to Marry Global, advising and assisting efforts in other countries to end marriage discrimination, enact non-discrimination and decriminalization, and in general advance human rights and democratic engagement. Further biographical information can be found at http://www.freedomtomarry.org/the-team/entry/Evan-Wolfson.

Following a two-week trial in 1996 during which Judge Foley and I presented national and local expert witnesses and cross-examined those called by the state, and several rounds of briefing and argument by both sides, Judge Chang found that there is no sufficient reason for the state to exclude same-sex couples from civil marriage. The trial, findings of fact and law, and groundbreaking ruling here in Hawaii reverberated around the world – and have since been affirmed by the transformation of hearts and minds in this state and across the country, and numerous courts, including the United States Supreme Court. See *Obergefell v. Hodges*, 576 U.S. 644 (2015).

In 2013, of course, the Hawaii legislature enacted the freedom to marry here in the Aloha State. And in 2022, President Biden signed into law the Respect for Marriage Act, following a bipartisan vote of Congress that included support from many who, in the 1990s, had opposed the freedom to marry and voted for 1996's invidious, so-called Defense of Marriage Act (which the

Respect for Marriage Act repealed and repudiated). More than 1.1 million gay and lesbian Americans have married – and more than 70 percent of Americans today have come to support the freedom to marry (including 55 percent of Republicans), up from 27% at the time of our Hawaii litigation in 1996.

Today, with this week's passage of marriage legislation in Greece, same-sex couples can share in the freedom to marry in 37 countries around the world, including the US – proving, as the historic Hawaii litigation had foretold, that when marriage discrimination ends, families are helped, and no one hurt. See Wolfson, "20 Years of Marriage Equality: A Mountain of Evidence, Expertise, and Experience," E.H.R.L.R., Issue 1 (2021).

Hawaii undoubtedly played a leading role in advancing this human rights cause in the United States and around the world. But, unfortunately, in the early stages of the debate, the legislature and voters (like the 1996 Congress) also were stampeded into a misstep through the passage of an anomalous constitutional amendment restricting, rather than granting or protecting rights, and targeting a minority of the state's diverse peoples and families.

Fortunately, HB2802 will give the legislature and people another chance to get it right – drawing on the years of persuasion and reflection that have grown understanding and support here, across the country, and more and more around the world. The public's awareness is now in a very different place than it was when they were forced to cast an early vote on what was, for many, a new and unfamiliar question. As the opponents of same-sex couples' equality and love said then in promoting discrimination, it is time now to "Let the people vote." The legislature should pass the curative measure and allow the citizens of Hawaii the chance to rectify the early error and show their true values in support of justice, pluralism, democracy, love, and aloha for all.

I write in strong support of Speaker Saiki's House Bill (HB) 2802, which proposes a constitutional amendment to remove the legislature's authority to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples.

Last year, the California Legislature, with bipartisan support, passed my Assembly Constitutional Amendment (ACA) 5, which would amend the California Constitution to protect the fundamental freedom to marry as part of existing rights to enjoy life and liberty, pursue happiness and privacy, and not be denied due process or equal protection. This proposal did not receive a single "No" vote in the legislature.

I am deeply concerned about the recent shifts in judicial precedent. If the Court was willing to overturn five decades of their precedent guaranteeing the right to abortion, then we cannot take for granted that they will uphold a decade of precedent protecting marriage equality in California — or five decades of precedent protecting the rights of interracial couples to marry. I believe California should always protect fundamental civil rights for all people and fight discrimination wherever it exists. I testify in strong support of HB2802, that proposes a constitutional amendment to remove the legislature's authority to limit marriage to opposite-sex couples.

The Hawaii Constitution contains two sections that explicitly prohibits the State from discriminating against people based on "sex": Article I, Sections 3 and 5. The section at the center of this bill, Section 23, is defective by design and construction. Section 23 is null and void because the "may" discriminate **discretion** in Section 23 **can never override** the "shall" protect & enforce **directives** in Sections 3 and 5.

In order for Section 23 to be valid, Sections 3 and 5 would have had to first be amended to remove "sex" as a protected category; alternatively, Section 3 would have had to be amended to allow the legislature "to limit" provisions in Section 3. That did not happen; instead, the 1997 Legislature preserved the language in Section 3 that states, "The legislature **shall** have the power **to enforce**, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this section."

Targeted, unconstitutional discrimination on the basis of sex should never have been enshrined in the Hawaii Constitution in 1998. The state must repeal Section 23, not just because it is morally flawed, but because the originating ballot question given to voters in 1998 was procedurally erroneous and technically ineffective.

TESTIMONY on HB2802

I was involved in the marriage equality movement shortly after the case was originally filed by Dan Foley as attorney for Ninia Baehr, Genora Dancel, et al. At that time, I was active in the LGBT community. We did fundraisers for their efforts, primarily to raise money for attorney fees.

I met the Honorable Dan Foley when he was their attorney. He has a brilliant legal mind that changed the course of history. Rather than arguing that this was about same-sex marriage (and at the time the LGBT community was not consistently a protected class; we had little or no legal protection), he argued that it was **sex** discrimination, which had constitutional protection through Hawaii's State Constitution. This resulted in Justice Steve Levinson's landmark opinion on behalf of the Hawaii Supreme Court in favor of marriage equality.

I went off to law school and did not return until 2001. So, I missed the whole heartbreaking constitutional amendment phase of this struggle.

When I returned, I focused on finding Bill Woods, determining what he was up to, and joining forces. I located him. He was about to found the GLBT Caucus of the Democratic Party, and I became a founding member of the Caucus. We then set out on our adventure to improve the legal standing of the GLBT community, and we would not stop until we had same-sex marriage. (BTW, Bill died before we achieved our final goal.)

When we started, we had very little support -- even within the Democratic Party. Just a few years passed after the 1998 Constitutional Amendment had failed and several legislators lost their seats (including you, Rep. Tarnas. Thank you for your early support!). We only got their support when we reframed the motion to be about passing "civil unions as a step toward marriage".

We started with amending various statutes to include the LGBT community as a protected class by adding "sexual orientation and sexual identity" to three statutes: housing, public accommodations, and I think the third was employment.

Then we focused on civil unions. That was a multi-year battle during which our ranks of supporters really began to swell. It was like the Sorcerer's Apprentice in "Fantasia". Every time we got cut down, more of us arose out of the pieces, and we tried again.

I remember one legislator asking me why we were so determined. I responded, "We are trying to protect our families. Would you expect anything less?"

I remember when we passed civil unions. You could tell that the Legislators were proud of the work they had done that day. It was exhilarating!

Nationally, the LGBT movement was gaining traction, and just about the time we passed civil unions, *Windsor* was decided, declaring that the federal government could not discriminate against same-sex couples.

We rolled up our sleeves, and we started the call for Gov. Abercrombie to pass a marriage equality bill in special session. The special session ensued. The final day of the hearings was a PTSD experience. Opponents of the bill were in the atrium of the Capitol shouting and banging on the doors with such force that it shook the floor-to-ceiling windows. However, the State Legislature passed the bill in 2013.

In the ensuing election, NO legislators who supported the bill lost re-election. I think a few opponents may have, but I don't have a clear recollection.

Since then, all has been relatively calm and quiet. There was a little tempest around those who helped couples file for marriage licenses. They tried to pull the religion card that it was against their religion to support marriage equality. Gov. Abercrombie told them he would be happy to accept their resignations. So, that blew over quickly.

Other than that little skirmish in the beginning, all has gone well. I have not heard of any ongoing demonstrations or efforts to reverse course. I suspect it was because it was a 12-year, multi-pronged effort, and as I mentioned, like the Sorcerer's Apprentice, we were gaining increasing support in the community as a whole.

I remember during the Special Session running into Rep. McKelvey who told me excitedly that his district has flipped, from 70/30 against marriage equality to 70/30 in favor. When his constituents heard and felt the hate in the testimony of the opposition, they said to themselves, "This is not who we are."

In fact, the only complaint I received was at a political gathering when a lesbian I knew came up to me and complained that she now had to pay spousal support. (I always knew that marriage would have a more profound effect on the LGBT community than on the community as a whole.)

All seemed quiet "on the Western front" until on the "Eastern front" the Supreme Court of the United States issued the Dobbs decision. In his dissent, J. Clarence Thomas (I will refrain from a diatribe on *this* topic) stated that now that Dobbs was published they should take on other legal issues decided based on privacy, including marriage equality.

Hence the need for this current legislation.

As long as we have such illustrious judges on the Supreme Court and a national candidate who claims he will be authoritarian only on Day 1, we need to proactively position Hawaii, such as recently done by our Supreme Court on gun rights. We have a stable community that seems fine with marriage equality. There is no doubt that it is bringing in some additional revenue to the State as a destination for weddings and honeymoons. And marriage equality better reflects who we are, "the Aloha State".

Please pass this bill to repeal the amendment passed during the fevered election of 1998 and let us continue to live in the well-earned peace that we have known for the last decade.

On a personal note, my wife and I will celebrate a huge anniversary in May 2024. On May 29th we will have been together for 30 years, 9 of them legal. (We married in 2015). Mahalo nui to the legislature for giving us a stable legal foundation and to this committee for assuring that the legal foundation will remain stable.

Finally, a personal thank you to Sen. Dave Tarnas. I met you through the Hawaii Democratic Party. I am delighted that you are back in the legislature and have resumed your support of this cause. I so admire people who champion the causes of others!
