On behalf of the Hawaiian Humane Society, thank you for considering our support for House Concurrent Resolution 171 / House Resolution 150, which requests state and county agencies to notify animal welfare organizations of deceased cats and dogs that are picked up along state and county roadways.

As this resolution points out, pets are an integral part of many people's lives and not knowing how a pet died or if a lost pet is still alive can be traumatic. State and county agencies responsible for clearing dead animals from roadways do not routinely scan deceased animals for an identifying microchip or take other steps to determine ownership, such as inspecting a tag worn on the animal's collar for a contact phone number or address.

With an increase in the number of microchipped dogs and cats, resulting from a state law that required them as of January 1, 2022, scanning for chips would be an effective way to provide closure to worried pet owners.

If the agencies responsible for removing deceased dogs and cats from public roadways checked for microchips and other forms of identification, as the resolution urges, and shared that information with county animal services providers it would allow organizations like ours to provide closure to the owners of missing pets.

We urge you to pass this resolution. Mahalo for your consideration.

Testimony in support.

The Kaua'i Humane Society (KHS) supports House Concurrent Resolution 171 and the campaign to notify animal welfare organizations of deceased cats and dogs.

The Kaua`i Humane Society is responsible for the pickup of canine remains from the roads of Kaua`i. This responsibility allows us to bring closure and relief to canine pet owners. Pet owners face great stress and fear when their pet has gone missing. The longer the pet is missing the greater the fear grows and the worst the thoughts. Pet owners fear the pet was stolen, mistreated, poisoned, injured, or starving. These thoughts do not go away until the pet is recovered. Learning the pet is deceased is not comforting news, but there is great comfort in knowing the pet is not suffering and it brings closure to a family.

Though the Kaua'i Humane Society is responsible for canine remains, we are not responsible for feline remains, of which there is a larger quantity. Cat owners are equally as deserving of this closure and knowing what has happened to their beloved pet.

The Kaua`i Humane Society would appreciate the opportunity to contact pet owners and assist in providing closure, but we cannot do it without being notified. We urge you to pass House Concurrent Resolution 171 as it will provide closure for families. Having a pet go missing is a horrible experience, accidents happen causing pets to get loose, and responsible pet owners that have microchipped their pets and are in compliance with local and state licensing ordinances should be provided the opportunity to know what has happened to their pet. Thank you for considering our testimony.

We are informed that the House Committee on Agriculture and Food Systems will hear a resolution on March 20 that could help bring closure to pet owners whose animals have been killed on our roadways.

HCR171/HR150 requests state and county agencies to notify animal welfare organizations of deceased cats and dogs picked up along state and county roadways.

As this resolution points out, companion animals are an integral part of many people's lives and not knowing how one died, or if a lost animal is still alive, can be traumatic.

State and county agencies responsible for clearing dead animals from roadways do not routinely scan deceased animals for an identifying microchip or take other steps to determine ownership. With the welcome increase in the number of microchipped dogs and cats, resulting from a statewide law that required them, scanning for chips would be an increasingly effective way to provide closure to worried guardians.

The resolution urges state and county agencies responsible for removing deceased dogs and cats from public roadways to check for, scan, and record the microchip of the deceased dog or cat, along with the location found, descriptive information, and any contact details shown on the animal's tag or collar.

It further requests that these agencies notify county animal services or animal service contractors in a timely manner of the deceased dog or cat, including the microchip number, if any, location found, descriptive information and any contact details shown on the tag or collar.

My name is Malia Wisch, and I am actively involved in local efforts to reduce the population of free-roaming cats on Oʻahu. As part of my TNRM (Trap-Neuter-Return-Manage) volunteer efforts over the years, I have worked with the Hawaiian Humane Society (HHS), Cat Friends Hawaii, Popoki Place Oʻahu Cat Sanctuary, Greater Good Charities' Fix events, Lucky Paws Animal Foundation, KAT Charities and more. Microchipping and scanning for microchips is a critical part of this work.

I am testifying in strong support of this resolution requesting state and county agencies to scan for microchips and notify animal welfare organizations of deceased cats and dogs that are picked up along state and county roadways.

I'm thrilled that it's being introduced. I wondered if there was any protocol to scan for microchips when picking up pet animals from the street. As a pet owner, and as someone who is active on social media groups that try to reunite lost pets with their owners, it is critical to be notified whenever an animal is picked up of course for closure but also so we don't waste time and resources searching for it.

I had a cat fixed through Cat Friends charity and registered his microchip under my name. He disappeared and someone said they thought they saw he had been run over. I went to look for him, but that cat was gone and I was never notified so I'll probably never know for sure.

Please spare other pet owners and colony managers this grief.

I am writing in strong support of HCR171/HR150.

This Resolution is significant as many of our state's residents view their pets as family members. Pets build strong bonds with us, uplift our spirits when we are physically or emotionally unwell, and can be some of our children's best friends. So, when a pet goes missing and is never found, that lack of closure can be very disheartening, depressing, and even distracting.

I help to Administrate or Moderate 4 different Lost and Found Pet groups on Facebook, and I can tell you with certainty that most residents of our state think that city and state agencies are already doing what is asked in this resolution. People are surprised that, though they may have taken every step appropriate - microchipped and registered their pet, equipped it with a collar and tags with contact information, and reported it missing to the proper County level agency when it slipped away - a road sanitation worker, parks employee, DLNR officer, or Police officer who finds their deceased pet would not contact either them as owner or at least the County Animal Control agency to log that their pet was found deceased. The steps required are not excessive; a simple log of any contact information identifiable on the remains, microchip number if one is found, date, and approximate location. All of this could be transmitted to the County Animal Control to be added either to a "found pet" type report list or used to contact owners and provide much-needed closure.

Without that closure, we have local families posting and posting, looking and looking, hoping beyond hope to find their lost friend, I have seen those who post over and over to my groups, for months and years. And it is cruel to those people if their pet is deceased and was discovered by a road sanitation crew, but they were never notified.

Thank you for your time and attention to this important issue that I see affecting our local families every day. Please vote for this Resolution, and for providing needed closure to our local families in these tragic situations.

I urge you to favorably consider this forward-looking resolution allowing us to use tools already in place and supported by the State, the Humane Society, and many pet owners.
