In consideration of SENATE BILL 2145 RELATING TO THE FIRE CODE

Senate Bill 2145 proposes to require the counties to submit annual reports on fire code enforcement updates and fire mitigation planning to the Legislature, declares that the general fund expenditure ceiling is exceeded, and makes an appropriation. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure.

The Department supports the collaborative role it is assigned in this bill to develop guidelines to assist counties in strengthening their zoning and development plans to address wildfire prevention and mitigation given that the appropriation in the bill funds a position within the Department's Division of Forestry and Wildlife to perform these duties.

SUPPORT SB2145 RELATING TO FIRE CODE

The Maui Chamber of Commerce **SUPPORTS SB2145** which requires the counties to submit annual reports on fire code enforcement updates and fire mitigation planning to the Legislature.

The Chamber notes that there is a necessity for comprehensive and proactive measures at both the state and county level to address the threat of wildfires and that the state is committed to fostering resilient and fire-safe communities. We recognize that effective county-planning is integral in preventing catastrophic wildfires in the future.

We feel that there is an inherent responsibility of each county to enforce fire codes and implement mitigation planning strategies to reduce the likelihood and impact of wildfires. We believe it is essential to establish a framework for enhanced collaboration and accountability between the State and its counties to ensure that county zoning and development plans prioritize fire safety.

In order to provide accountability, we believe counties should have their own long-range plans with action items and submit annual reports on fire code enforcement, fire mitigation efforts, and the degree to which they have met the timing and goals of the annual plan.

For these reasons we support SB2145.
