SENATE BILL NO. 2174 RELATING TO MEAT AND POULTRY INSPECTION

Chairs Keohokalole and Gabbard, Vice Chairs Fukunaga and Richards, and Members of the Committees:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 2174. The bill requires that the Department of Agriculture establish, implement, and administer a meat and poultry inspection program; and submit a report of its findings and recommendations relating to activities conducted pursuant to this Act, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session. The bill also appropriates money. The Department supports the intent of this bill to provide meat inspection to promote the state's livestock and game industries. The USDA-Food Safety Inspection Service (FSIS) assumed responsibility and has been performing meat inspection services statewide in Hawaii since the 1990s when Hawaii discontinued its state meat inspection program due to budget cuts reduction in force directives. FSIS maintains that they are capable of expanding inspection where needed, upon request by the processor including inspection of poultry. In addition, poultry slaughter facilities



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processing less than 20,000 birds annually can be exempted from bird-by-bird inspection and the presence of FSIS Inspectors at the facility.

The associated costs for inspectors, supervisor veterinarians, training, laboratory testing, reporting requirements, and operation must be taken into account. The Department estimates approximately one million dollars will be required, however, specifics on laboratory testing, travel, and office space/renovation costs are variables. To accomplish these expenditure levels, the Department sees a state program as supplementing the existing federal program rather than replacing it. Therefore, long term financial commitment and support by the state is necessary to restore and operate an effective program because it is not possible to combine state and federal meat inspection in a single facility.

The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council **<u>supports SB2714</u>** which requires the Department of Agriculture to establish, implement, and administer a Meat and Poultry Inspection Program and annually report to the Legislature. Appropriates funds for the establishment, implementation, and administration of the Meat and Poultry Inspection Program.

Access to inspectors to validate safety of harvest and processing of livestock is a necessary part of Hawaii's local meat supply chain. The creation of a state administered meat and poultry inspection could increase access to inspectors that facilities can utilize, which would increase the capacity of meat that could be processed. The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council supports the establishment and funding of a meat and poultry inspection program. The state program should be supplemental to the existing federal inspection, allowing for more options for processors to choose from to get the job done.
