Comments:

Money has dominated Hawaii's political system for too long, leading to bad policies being passed and good ones being killed. SB2381 can break the link between private money and winning elections by freeing candidates from the need to fundraise from wealthy donors and special interests. This can lead to a more ethical and representative government that prioritizes the needs of constituents. Connecticut, Maine, and Hawaii County Council have proven that full publicly financed elections can be successful and cost-effective. These examples haven't resulted in incumbents losing at higher rates or the majority parties losing seat, but it has resulted in shifts in how the sitting legislators are influenced. We can easily afford this program's low cost of less than \$10 million per year. If we are serious about ending corruption and creating a system that works for all residents and not just the wealthy few, we need to pass SB2381 now.

Testimony of James Gashel Joint hearing: Committee on Judiciary (JDC), and Committee on Health and Human Services (HHS) Hawaii State Senate Thirty-second Legislature, regular session of 2024 February 8, 2024, 10:00 AM, hearing on SB2752

Good morning chairs, vice chairs, and members. I am James Gashel, Vice Chair of the Statewide Voters with Accessibility Needs Advisory Committee, proudly supporting SB2752. Thank you for scheduling this hearing.

The purpose of SB2752 is to appropriate funds to the Office of Elections to be used by the Statewide Voters with Accessibility Needs Advisory Committee in carrying out its duties. The legislature created the Statewide Voters with Accessibility Needs Advisory Committee and comparable county committees as enacted in sections 11-10.5 and 11-10.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, passed in 2021.

These committees are to advise election offices on barriers to access for persons with disabilities and ways to remove them. The goal is to promote greater participation in voting by persons with access needs who may otherwise be overlooked.

Federal law, called the Help America Vote Act, says voters with disabilities, such as blindness, have the right to vote privately and independently. Hawaii is a vote by mail state, so ballots are sent out in standard print to everyone. Being blind, how can I vote privately and independently if I just get a ballot in standard print? It's questions like this that our statewide committee helps the Office of Elections to understand and address.

Our statewide accessibility needs advisory committee has the challenge of being in touch with voters with disabilities in all parts of the state, including on the neighbor islands, where voter service centers, what used to be called polling places, are few and far between. This lack of polling places presents unique challenges to some voters with access needs.

Therefore, the Statewide Committee is really the voice of voters with disabilities, expected to play a crucial role in ensuring that persons with accessibility needs have equal access to participate fully in the voting process. To support this work, SB2752 seeks a modest appropriation for information gathering, outreach, and voter education activities conducted by the statewide committee.

The Committee recommends \$10,000 to be appropriated in fiscal year 2024-2025 for this purpose. This appropriation will serve as a critical step towards achieving greater inclusivity for citizens with voting accessibility needs in the electoral process, aligning with the principles of equal representation and access to the democratic rights of all citizens.

If approved, the appropriation made in SB2752 will be dedicated for exclusive use by the accessibility needs advisory committee, not intended to be a general increase in the Office of Elections baseline budget. Information gathering, outreach, and voter education activities, focusing on accessibility needs will have particular importance as we prepare for the 2024 fall election and find better ways to meet accessibility needs in the future.

Please move this bill forward to affirm the value of this statewide committee's work. Mahalo for your consideration.

Chairmen Rhoads and Gabbard, and Committee Members:

I very strongly support SB 2752. The purpose of SB 2752 is to establish a specific appropriation for the Statewide Elections Accessibility Needs Advisory Committee. This Committee is administratively housed under the State Office of Elections. However, there are no funds specifically designated for use or control by the Statewide Elections Accessibility Needs Advisory Committee. If we had designated funding, we could proactively engage in increasing the accessibility for voters with disabilities to the entire voting process, from registration through casting ballots. With the exception of one online survey of voters with disabilities conducted in 2023, which I financed personally, the Committee has not undertaken any activities requiring expenditure of funds. With targeted funding we would be able to assist County Elections

Accessibility Advisory Committees with information gathering, outreach, and voter education. My colleagues and I recommend an appropriation of \$10,000 for fiscal year 2024-2025.

According to the CDC, 20 percent of the voting population in Hawaii has a disability. We do not have specific data about how many of this percentage voted in past elections. But from the survey we conducted last year, even with the mail-in ballot option, voters with disabilities in Hawaii still faced challenges. The Statewide Elections Accessibility Needs Advisory Committee invested substantial time last year in learning about and advising the State Office of Elections on simplification of a verification process related to electronic ballot submission. This year we would like to spend time educating voters with disabilities about the entire process connected to voting; providing advice on drafting charter amendments to make them easy to understand; and providing training to staff at voting centers on procedures and policies that ensure that voting in person is not a challenge for a person with a disability.

I wish to especially thank Chairman Rhoads for introducing legislation that created the Elections Accessibility Needs Advisory Committee. I am pleased that the companion legislation in the House for an appropriation for this committee is moving quickly with broad support. I greatly appreciate everyone's interest, attention, support, and timely action.
