

Aloha Chair DeCoite, Vice Chair Wakai, and Members of the Committee:

Mahalo for the opportunity to testify. Vibrant Hawai'i supports SB3048, which would establish the digital equity grant program to award grants to applicants to deploy digital equity projects to covered populations in the State.

Vibrant Hawai'i is committed to advancing digital equity and is a proud member of the Hawai'i Island Digital Equity Collaborative (HIDEC), led by the County of Hawai'i. At Vibrant Hawai'i, one part of our mission is to shift deficit narratives, systems, and policy that perpetuate poverty and inequity. We value flexibility and learning that lead to transformation, and we demonstrate this by practicing makawalu and acknowledging that we each hold one piece that is part of something bigger. That is the basis of our support for this bill.

In January 2022, Vibrant Hawai'i engaged community-based instructors to distribute refurbished laptops, facilitate computer skills workshops in rural communities, and connect residents with the Emergency Broadband Benefit. We were able to reach 300 participants in a 90-day project period where upon completion of the program, 91% of participants either strongly agreed or agreed to being more confident using email, 78% were willing to use a computer for online health appointments, 55% shared they would use a computer to seek employment and submit an employment application online, and 84% were willing to participate in future online learning opportunities.

The outcomes of this project are an example of how Vibrant Hawai'i and other organizations can work in collaboration with the State to leverage government resources by deploying digital equity projects to covered populations across all islands. We look forward to future opportunities to partner with State agencies to reach even more communities on Hawai'i Island.

Recognizing that this bill does not provide an appropriation, Vibrant Hawai'i suggests an amendment to the bill to add an appropriation that would help support the launch and success of the proposed digital equity grants.

Vibrant Hawai'i supports SB3048 for the reasons above and we kindly request that you pass this measure. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify.

#### Re: Testimony providing support for SB 3048

Aloha Honorable Chair, Vice-Chair, and Committee Members:

Thank you for this opportunity to submit support for Senate Bill 3048 to establish a Digital Equity Grant Program within the Hawaii Broadband and Digital Equity Office. If established, this fund would endeavor to leverage the work of community and non-profit groups to provide digital literacy training for individuals to participate in the fast-growing digital world.

Having a high-speed fiber internet connection and services to address the digital equity needs of all households opens up a world of opportunity. Broadband is essential for business and government operations, delivering telemedicine, education, remote work, staying in touch with family and friends, and so much more. Fiber-optic cables carry 10,000 times more bandwidth than traditional copper cables, enabling fast upload speeds and a superior experience with services such as video calls and security cameras. Fiber technology is also more energy-efficient, more durable, and less susceptible to elements such as water and electromagnetic interference. Hawaiian Telcom is the only Hawai'i internet service provider that has invested more than \$1 billion over the last ten years to expand and support its fiber optic network and serve its customers.

In 2023, Hawaiian Telcom awarded \$140,000 to community organizations working to address digital equity and empower communities across the state. In addition, Hawaiian Telcom expanded its fiber-optics network to 65,000 new locations and is on track to build 60,000 new locations in 2024.

Hawaiian Telcom is also bridging digital divide as a participating service provider in the federal Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP). ACP provides internet service discounts of up to \$30 per month for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for residents on Hawaiian Home Lands. Hawaiian Telcom continues to offer federal Lifeline discounts for internet or telephone services to qualified residents.

Since the FCC launched ACP on December 31, 2021, the depletion of \$14 billion Congress appropriated for this federal program has been swifter than originally anticipated. The Federal Communication Commission (FCC) recently ordered all participating service providers to take steps to wind down their programs because the ACP will run out of funding around April 2024. This wrinkle should give us all pause to consider that while the State will see a temporary infusion of approximately \$14 million toward digital equity services, there is no additional federal funding for continued operations or services beyond the initial investment. Ostensibly, it is in the State's interest to fully commit to investing its digital equity award to support the work of community and non-profit organizations to deliver digital literacy and access services to those in need.
