SUBJECT: SCR166 SD1 REAFFIRMING THE STATE'S COMMITMENT TO PROVIDING CULTURALLY APPROPRIATE RESOURCES, SERVICES, AND PROGRAMS FOR NATIVE HAWAIIAN INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES EXPERIENCING INTELLECTUAL DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES.

The Hawai'i State Council on Developmental Disabilities is in **STRONG SUPPORT OF SCR166 SD1**, which urges the Governor and pertinent state agencies to commit to providing culturally appropriate resources, services, and programs for Native Hawaiian individuals and families experiencing intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD).

Preliminarily indicates that Native Hawaiians, along with Filipinos, may be contending with more severe levels of disability, emphasizing the urgent necessity for targeted support systems within these communities¹. Furthermore, the existing health disparities prevalent in Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander populations, highlight the potential for a disparity in healthcare provisions for Native Hawaiians with IDD, given the overarching health inequities faced by this demographic².

Moreover, while it has been observed that there are fewer individuals with DD within the Native Hawaiian population, a study suggests that this discrepancy may stem from a lack of adequate screening and education on the symptoms of DD among Native Hawaiian populations. The authors posit that cultural beliefs, alongside potentially lower awareness of DD symptoms compared to their White counterparts, may contribute to this underrepresentation.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) <u>SUPPORTS SCR166/SR140</u>, which urges the Governor and pertinent state agencies to commit to providing culturally appropriate resources, services, and programs for Native Hawaiian individuals and families experiencing intellectual and developmental disabilities.

We must acknowledge the unique challenges faced by individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities within our community. These conditions are lifelong and require specialized support that is tailored to each individual's specific needs. This resolution is not merely a matter of policy, but rather a moral imperative deeply rooted in the values of equity, inclusion, and cultural preservation. As a community, we must take action to ensure that everyone feels valued and supported. Together, we can create a better future for all by providing culturally appropriate resources, services, and programs to affirm the dignity and worth of every Native Hawaiian individual with IDD.

Accordingly, OHA urges the Committee to **PASS SCR166**. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify on this important issue.

DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) supports this resolution.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: This resolution reaffirms the State's commitment to providing culturally appropriate resources, services, and programs for Native Hawaiian individuals and families experiencing intellectual developmental disabilities (IDD).

The Committees on Hawaiian Affairs and Health and Human Services (SD1) amended the measure by making technical, nonsubstantive amendments for the purposes of clarity and consistency.

DHS supports the resolution that would affirm that providing culturally relevant care for individuals and families experiencing intellectual or developmental disabilities is a key component to improved outcomes for individuals and families. The provision of culturally

appropriate services is an important approach for system and provider-level interventions to "honor the intrinsic individuality of every person with an intellectual and developmental disability," as stated in this resolution. DHS remains committed to supporting practices that honor and build on "Native Hawaiian family-based and communal structures established systems of effective care for individuals of all ages, including the most vulnerable members of society."

By recognizing cultural strengths and approaches, this resolution articulates a positive step to address health disparities by respecting individuals' dignity and improving access to care for Native Hawaiian individuals and families experiencing intellectual and developmental disabilities.

AlohaCare appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony in **support of SCR166 SD1**. This measure urges the Governor and the Legislature to commit to providing culturally appropriate resources, services, and programs for Native Hawaiian individuals and families experiencing intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Founded in 1994 by Hawai'i's community health centers, AlohaCare is a community-rooted, non-profit health plan serving over 84,000 Medicaid and dual-eligible health plan members on all islands. Approximately 40 percent of our members are keiki. We are Hawai'i's only health plan exclusively dedicated to serving Medicaid and Medicaid-Medicare dually-eligible beneficiaries. Our mission is to serve individuals and communities in the true spirit of aloha by ensuring and advocating for access to quality, whole-person care for all.

AlohaCare is committed to improving access to high-quality care for all people regardless of disability status or ethnic and cultural background. We believe it is important to embrace the rich diversity and cultures of Hawai'i's people as resources for wellness. Culturally appropriate approaches to health are foundational to our *Ke Aloha Mau* program, supporting whole-person care through traditional, cultural, and spiritual healing methods. At no cost to our members, the program makes available Native Hawaiian healing services – (1) lomilomi: physiotherapy and massage, (2) 'ai pono: healthy food and meals, (3) hula: physical movement and dance, and (4) ho'oponopono: balancing of relationships.

The program is provided in collaboration with community health centers, the Native Hawaiian Health Care Systems, and cultural practitioners.

As part of our commitment to ensuring access to care, we support removing barriers to viable treatment modalities, especially for populations with significant health



disparities and less access to or trust in Western healthcare. We appreciate this measure and applaud the Legislature's leadership and commitment to improving the quality of life for persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities as well as to ensuring the provision of culturally appropriate resources, services, and programs for Native Hawaiian communities.
