Purpose of Bill: Establishes a five-year magnet school pilot program at Waiahole and Ka'a'awa elementary schools. Establishes eight full-time equivalent (8.0 FTE) positions. Appropriates funds. Effective 6/30/3000. (HD1)

Department's Position:

The Hawaii State Department of Education (Department) provides comments on HB 464, HD 1, which establishes magnet school pilot programs and positions.

The Department appreciates the need for specialized agricultural education at Waiahole and Ka'a'awa Elementary schools. Increased agricultural education opportunities can help bring awareness to food issues in Hawaii and lead towards greater food self-sufficiency over the long run.

Currently, the Department provides a funding allocation to each school based upon a formulaic funding amount established by the Committee on Weights. This structure is designed to distribute the Department's finite resources to the schools based on equity and need.

The Department appreciates this proposal and the inclusion of funding but asks that any additional funding does not affect the priorities identified in the Department's Hawaii State Board of Education approved budget request.

Chair Yamashita and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii State Teachers Association <u>supports HB 464, HD1</u>, relating to magnet schools. The bill establishes a five-year magnet school pilot program at Waiahole and Ka'a'awa elementary schools. It also establishes eight full-time equivalent positions and appropriates funds.

Magnet schools are public elementary and secondary schools that focus on specific areas of interest, such as such as performing arts, world languages, leadership, STEM programs, and more.
