In consideration of SENATE BILL 1034 RELATING TO PUBLIC PARKING AT ALA WAI BOAT HARBOR

Senate Bill 1034 proposes to require that at least three hundred parking stalls at Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor remain at no cost for recreational ocean access and for the practice of traditional and customary Native Hawaiian rights. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) appreciates this measure's encouragement of recreational ocean access, but opposes this measure.

The free parking stalls at Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor were set aside by the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) for recreational users. Any change to the amount of paid and free parking at any small boat harbor in the State is subject to BLNR approval. The Department does not believe the number of parking stalls at any small boat harbor should be set in statute, as it would hinder the Department's ability to respond to changes or other needs in a timely manner.

Parking fees help to ensure that repair and maintenance costs are offset by those who use the parking lot, rather than by taxpayers and the boating public who do not. Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor is one of the most heavily used public facilities in the State, which results in increased repair and maintenance needs to ensure that its parking areas remain in suitable condition for safe public use.

IN OPPOSITION of Senate Bill 1034

Relating to Public Parking at Ala Wai Boat Harbor

Senate Bill 1034 proposes to require that at least three hundred parking stalls at Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor remain at no cost for recreational ocean access and for the practice of traditional and customary Native Hawaiian rights.

The Hawaii State Aha Moku (Aha Moku) opposes this measure.

Once the area that encompasses the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor was a wetland where traditional practices ensured the sustainability of natural and cultural resources both on land, and in the near shore areas. There are family stories of the abundance of fish, wana, and other marine life. These practices ended when the area was dredged to create the Ala Moana Park. Currently, the Ala Wai Boat Harbor parking area is used by surfers who are not necessarily cultural practitioners although some may be.

We believe the three hundred public parking stalls at the Ala Wai Boat Harbor which are free to recreational ocean access is enough. We worry though that if put into statute then it is pa'a (permanent). This would set a precedence for all small boat harbors in Hawaii. This takes the ability to change parking structures if needed away. It is for this reason that Aha Moku regretfully opposes this measure as it is written.

Aloha Chair Inouye, Vice-Chair Elefante, members of the Water and Land committee, Chair Shimabukuro, Vice-Chair Fevella, and members of the Hawaiian Affairs committee,

The Surfrider Foundation O'ahu Chapter strongly supports SB 1034 to ensure that this special area at the Ala Wai harbor remains freely available for all recreational users of the public trust resources in Waikīkī.

The Surfrider Foundation is a non-profit environmental organization dedicated to the protection and enjoyment of the world's oceans, waves and beaches for all people, through conservation, activism, research and education. Surfrider maintains a network of over 150 chapters and academic clubs nationwide, including 4 chapters in the Hawaiian Islands. We are fighting for ocean protection, plastic reduction, clean water, our coast & climate, and beach access.

The purpose of this bill - to require the maintenance of at least three hundred parking stalls at the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor (AWSBH) at no cost for recreational ocean access and for the practice of traditional and customary Native Hawaiian rights - aligns with our core principles to ensure free and safe beach access for all people. The harbor was originally developed with the purpose of providing local people with a means to access the coastal resources in Waikīkī.

The Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor is <u>public land</u> and the state is mandated by the Hawai'i Constitution to hold all public natural resources in trust for the benefit of the people.

Despite resistance from the local community, the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) as recommended by its Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR) had reduced the number of free parking stalls in 2008 from 545 to 300. Another attempt was made in 2020 by DOBOR to reduce the free parking by another 125 stalls, which was unsuccessful due to public opposition. The most recent attempt to monetize public ocean access was in September of 2022 when the BLNR authorized the issuance of a Request for Proposals (RFP) to find a private developer of the AWSBH. This action by a state agency does not protect the free recreational parking that was negotiated by the public in 2008 because the parking plan was "subject to change" in the RFP. This is a huge concern to Surfrider.

This bill simply requires the protection of the free 300 parking stalls to ensure free beach access for all people of Hawai'i and protect their traditional and customary Native Hawaiian rights.

SB 1034 should be passed because:

- This bill aligns with the interest of the public The local community has been opposing privatization of the harbor and a reduction of the free parking numerous times over the last two decades through grassroots movements. Most recently in January of this year over 100 ocean users came together to fight for keeping 300 parking spots free of charge and open to the public for recreational use. This bill really captures the will of the community and is supported by over 600 individuals that are part of the Surf Parking Coalition.
- The public has an inherent right to free ocean access this bill would protect free ocean access for all people. The Ala Wai harbor area is the last free parking in Waikīkī and removing free access would (1) add a financial barrier to the local community and restrict their ocean access, (2) increase the financial risk of getting towed if the parking is converted to metered parking, and (3) pose a public safety concern with people parking at Magic Island and paddling through the channel to access the surf breaks.
- The Ala Wai harbor is a community cultural gathering place for local families, surfers, sailors, paddlers, and swimmers and allows safe access to some of the most consistent and best surf breaks on the south shore. This harbor area is of significant importance to the Native Hawaiian culture and traditions, such as canoe paddling, fishing and surfing.

Under Hawai'i law, the State and its agencies are obligated to <u>preserve and protect the exercise of</u> <u>traditional and customary Native Hawaiian rights</u>. Gathering and access rights are the two most basic examples of traditional and customary practices protected under State law.

My name is Kate Thompson and I am writing as the founder of surfparking.org in **strong support of SB1034**. I am a retired State employee nurse and I have lived in Hawaii for 40 years. For recreation, I sail my 1985 O'Day 35 foot sailboat and my friends crew for me. I live in a condo in Kailua but I spend many hours a week at the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor, often sailing three times a week. I see 200 people an hour surfers at Bowls Surf spot and I realized how important this area is for surfing and ocean access in general.

I know that the Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR) tried to reduce the free recreational parking in January 2020 and I attended the Land Board hearing at that time. See Harbor Parking Plan-Map attached. I have been watching DOBOR's use of the legislative path to privatization, with 2022 bills such as HB1654, and I realized how protection of free public parking will require the help from our elected officials in the Legislature.

There is a current RFP to develop the Ala Wai Boat Harbor. I have attached a copy and highlighted the areas of concern about the wording regarding parking.

Since 1957, the Ala Wai Boat harbor was created as a non-commercial harbor. Some parking stalls were reserved for boat owners and most of the total 1,000 parking stalls were free to the public. As part of my testimony, I am including a 1957 letter from the Governor King of the Territory of Hawaii, just before Statehood who said the Harbor shall be a non-commercial recreational area, attached below.

Since the passage of Act 197 in 2011, we have had harbor privatization bills hanging over heads, ready to cut us out of boating, surfing and beach access by increasing prices and reducing the number of free parking stalls.

The privatization of the DLNR ocean access lands at Kewalo and Ko Olina harbors have been 'hyped-up' to be great examples of public-private partnership', but they are not. The public has to continue the fight for originally

promised services such as free parking, boat ramps and even 'guest yacht' access for short weekend stays. Even the paid parking stalls are dangerous with strange scan code pay systems, often leading to \$50.00 tickets at Kewalo Harbor.

In December 2019, the 'mooring fees' around the state essentially doubled, and my rate went from \$7.00 a foot to \$13.00 a foot. My current monthly harbor fee, including a shower key, is \$565.00 a month, every month. In comparison, my friend in San Francisco pays less than \$500.00 a month for the same size boat in a top-notch San Francisco Marina.

I bring up this background information because the sudden increase in the cost is prohibitive for many middle-income boaters here, given the additional expenses of maintaining a boat. The significant jump in mooring fees in 2019, throughout the state, was a clear signal that the Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR) is trying to show the profitability for a potential investor. The legislature agreed that the cost of a slip fee should be increased based on an annual cost of living but DOBOR did not do this and instead worked for a price determination based on an "appraisal". But this appraisal priced Keehi and Ala Wai at the same rate of \$13.00 a foot even though Keehi Boat Harbor mooring fees should have been far less than other harbors due to lack of amenities, noise from airplanes, and a dirt parking lot that often floods out.

How much revenue do you think the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor generates? It generates a profit of over two million dollars a year after paying expenses. The current income from the parking fees of \$1.00 an hour meters and \$25.00 a month for boat owners generates about \$130,000 dollars a month. In the current contract, Secure Parking LLC receives 20% of the revenue for 'managing' the paid stalls. The bulk of the parking revenue (80%) then goes into the Special Boating Fund which is estimated at \$100,000 dollars a month.

I'm sharing all these numbers because as far back as 2008, DOBOR's rationale for reducing the free parking from 549 to 300 was that the income from pay parking stalls is needed to cover expenses for the free recreational parking, such as the shower water, lighting, and pavement upkeep. I obtained

invoices through the UIPA for the parking revenue (attached below) August 2022, which shows the monthly income from paid parking, even at the low rate of \$1.00 an hour, easily covers the parking lot expenses.

I support SB 1034 and respectfully request that any contracts or legislation written will protect and maintain the 300 free recreational parking stalls for the public access to the ocean and cultural activities.

Facing backlash, Land Board scuttles parking plan for Ala Wai Boat Harbor

HONOLULU, Hawaii (HawaiiNewsNow) - The state Land Board on Friday shot down a controversial plan to eliminate 125 free parking stalls at the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor.

"I think the sentiment of the board is not to do this," said Christopher Yuen, a member of the state Board of Land and Natural Resources.

"Unfortunately, this is something – where you're taking away what the people have enjoyed, the free parking – that strikes a nerve."

The plan would have eliminated more than 40% of the free parking stalls at the harbor. Grassroots organizations quickly mobilized to argue against it.

"From the Ala Wai Boat Harbor, all the way to Kapiolani Park, there's no free public parking. That's the reality, said Keone Downing, of Save our Surf.

"So you've chased out the local families from Waikiki."

Added John Shockley of the Free Access Coalition: "How do people like myself, the people of Waianae, the people from Papakolea -- how do we access the beach," he said.

State boating officials said the parking is needed to serve the harbor's growing commercial activities.

"We needed more space to take care of our tenants in our harbors as well as our guests and all of the additional commercial activities," said Ed Underwood, administrator for the state's Boating Division.

Right now, there are 298 free parking stalls here, but according to the Department of Land and Natural Resources, many of those spaces are taken up by people who work in Waikiki.

"There is a lot of people who use that that work in the hotels, there is hotel guests because they don't want to pay the hotel fees," said Underwood.

Surfers and boaters agreed but they are asking for a different solution.

"I come at 5 and all of the stalls by the fence and all of the stalls by the Hilton are taken and those are not surfers," said longtime surfer Kimo Chung.

In the end, the Land Doard instructed staff to work with the harbor's stakeholders to develop a more comprehensive parking plan.

APPLICANT:

Department of Land and Natural Resources, Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR).

LEGAL REFERENCES:

Sections 171-6, 171-11, 171-13, 171-16, 171-17, 171-18, 171-19, 171-35, 171-36, 171-41, 171-53, 171-59, and other applicable sections of Chapter 171; sections 200-2.5, 200-2.6 and other applicable sections of Chapter 200; Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), as amended. Session Laws of Hawaii 2011 Act 197, Section 9, Subsection (g)

LOCATION:

Government lands situated at Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor (AWSBH), Kalia, Honolulu, Island of Oahu, identified by Tax Map Keys: (1) 2-3-037:012 (por.), :020, :024, :026, :033, :034; and (1) 2-6-010:003 (por.), :005, :016. These parcels shall collectively be referenced as the "Subject Property." Basic property information is summarized in the table shown in **Exhibit C**. The total area for development is approximately 11 acres and includes certain fast and submerged or reclaimed (filled) lands. The Subject Property is on a portion of Governor's Executive Order 4604.

Additional submerged lands may be included within the leased area subject to legislative approval to lease submerged lands.

TRUST LAND STATUS:

Section 5(a) and 5(b) lands of the Hawaii Admission Act DHHL 30% entitlement lands pursuant to the Hawaii State Constitution: No

UTILITIES: All utilities are available at the harbor.

<u>EXISTING IMPROVEMENTS:</u> Including but not limited to paved roads, parking equipment, parking stalls, potable water lines, sewer system, public restrooms, harbor office, lighting, slips, piers, ramps, wash down area and outdoor showers.

Fixed and floating docks may be included within the leased area subject to legislative approval to lease submerged lands.

<u>LEGAL ACCESS</u>: There is legal access from Ala Moana Boulevard connecting to Holo Moana Street, Hobron Lane and Kahanamoku Street.

CURRENT USE STATUS:

Within the AWSBH, there are currently 3-Leases (not included in the Subject Property), 5-Revocable Permits (RP), (an additional RP is conditioned on County permit approval) and 1 Mobile Food Concession. The Subject Property is managed by DOBOR as part of the AWSBH.

Prior to issuance of a lease, such uses that are inconsistent with the lease of the Subject Property will need to be terminated. DOBOR is requesting the Board to authorize the cancellation of revocable permits, concessions and contracts and delegate authority to the Chairperson to determine when the cancellations shall take effect.

STATUTORY AUTHORITY:

HRS Section I71-59(a) provides that a lease of public land may be disposed of through negotiation upon a finding by the Board that the public interest demands it.

The statute also provides a process under which the Board may select the lessee. The statute requires DLNR to: (i) provide public notice of its intention to lease public land

through negotiation; (ii) establish reasonable criteria for the selection of the lessee; (iii) determine the applicants who meet the criteria for selection; and (iv) select the lessee that submits the highest most responsible offer.

In the alternative, HRS Section 171-59(b) allows for disposition by negotiation if the use meets certain categorical criteria (e.g., marine, maritime, and maritime-related operations) provided that such lease encourages competition within such type of operation.

CHAPTER 343 ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT:

The selected applicant shall be required to comply with all HRS Chapter 343 and HAR Chapter 11-200 environmental requirements regarding the selected applicant's proposed use of the Subject Property during the development agreement phase of the project, and prior to any disposition by lease. The issuance of a lease shall be subject to compliance with Chapter 343, which may require the issuance of an Environmental Assessment (EA) with Finding of No Significant Impact ("FONSI") or Environmental Impact Statement ("EIS"). The Board's approval of a final EA-FONSI and/or EIS is required prior to issuance of a lease.

As a pre-condition to the issuance of a lease, the applicant selected through the RFP process shall also fulfill any and all federal, state and county governmental requirements.

The prior Lessee to Parcels B and C under State Boating Lease BO-13120, obtained a final EA/FONSI on October 8, 2010 (dated Sept. 21, 2010 as the "Waikiki Landing" project) and supplemental Final Environmental Assessment (FEA) also on October 8, 2010 (dated July 30, 2010) to account for traffic impacts. The FEA also cited a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment prepared on January 12, 2004, for the "fuel dock" site (Parcel C). These documents will be made available to all prospective applicants.

BACKGROUND:

Boating Lease No. BO-13120 was issued to Honey Bee USA, Inc. for Parcels B and C on Dec. 6, 2013 and terminated on November 15, 2015.

Parcel B was previously the site of a haul out facility. License No. 74 was issued to Ala Wai Boat Works, Ltd. on April 27, 1953, and expired on April 30, 2004. Ala Wai Marine, Ltd. was a holdover tenant to License No. 74, and had been cited by the Department of Health Clean Water Branch for discharge and permit violations. Ala Wai Marine, Ltd. held a revocable permit (RP No. B-93-39) effective August 14, 1993, for boat storage and parking purposes until it was vacated in February 2009.

Parcel C was the subject of revocable permits, including RP No. B-03-06 to Magic Island Petroleum, Inc. (MIP) to operate a fuel facility and convenience store on December 1, 2002. The facility was in poor condition and required substantial upgrades and repairs. MIP indicated it would be uneconomical to invest substantial sums of money for repairs without a long-term lease. It is currently being used for catamaran storage by HBM, LLC under a revocable permit. The Makai pier recently collapsed in January 2022.

At its meeting held on April 13, 2018, under agenda item J-4, the Board instructed DOBOR to issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) for development of public lands at AWSBH. The RFP process was completed in 2019 and did not result in a lease. A subsequent request was suspended due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 and 2021.

Vision: The Subject Property is located within AWSBH, which is the largest recreational harbor in the State and is situated at the Ewa end of Waikiki. DOBOR intends to issue an RFP to invite responsible applicants to partner with it in achieving its vision for AWSBH in the public interest. The goal is to transform the harbor into a world-class marina that meets the needs of residents and visitors who use the ocean for a myriad of activities. This transformation includes development of the fast lands to improve the aesthetics of the harbor especially since it is considered a gateway to Waikiki, improvement of the harbor and management services provided to tenants, and the development of DOBOR managed fast (and submerged/reclaimed) lands in this area to support the community and recreational activities of this legendary area. DOBOR is eager to optimize the use of AWSBH in keeping with the conservation mission of the Department. To this end, its vision includes helping mitigate environmental concerns in the area, including water guality management, and working with local and regional entities such as the Seabin Foundation, Ala Wai Watershed Coalition, Waikiki Beach Special Improvement District Association, and others. The Division seeks a partner that will help it attain Clean Marina certification or other appropriate designations. Finally, the Division wishes to partner with the Division of Aquatic Resources on the Governor's sustainability goals for Hawaii, as announced at the 2016 IUCN World Conservation Congress, specifically the 30 by 30 initiative-to effectively manage 30% of Hawaii's nearshore waters by 2030-and seeks a marina partner that will help it attain these goals.

In 2021, DOBOR requested assistance from the University of Hawaii Community Design Center (UHCDC) who prepared an Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor Vision Report. The report has been completed and DOBOR proposes that it be used to help provide guidance to potential bidders. The report can be viewed on the DLNR-DOBOR website via the following link:

Rationale for RFP: DOBOR believes a Request for Proposals (RFP) method of procurement should be used to safeguard the public trust. Elements such as experience, past performance, resources, method of approach, and other criteria will be considered when selecting the successful applicant. An auction process would simply award the contract to the highest bidder, not necessarily one that shares in partnering with DOBOR and its vision for the AWSBH. DOBOR does not possess the expertise or funding for this undertaking and believes this facility should be upgraded under a lease arrangement with a private entity. Such an arrangement has excellent potential to increase the lease rent revenues generated to support DOBOR's operations. DOBOR will review submitted proposals in accordance with the evaluation criteria set forth in the RFP.

Capital Improvements: DOBOR has been implementing a comprehensive improvement plan for the AWSBH. As part of this plan, since 2008, floating docks "B", "C", "D" and "F" have been completely rebuilt and placed into service. DOBOR has also replaced the concrete piers and revetment of the 700-row, replaced debris catchment, completed roadway and parking lot repairs, and upgraded electrical, telephone and water utilities. DOBOR is planning to upgrade the in the sewer system when CIP funds are made available. The 700-row piers were replaced in 2012 and improvements to the 600-row have begun with six new piers having been recently installed. The water lines are in the process of being replaced and is projected to be completed by the end of 2022.

To better manage public harbors in other parts of the country, private partnerships have brought more capital for much needed infrastructure development, optimized revenue to honor the public interest, and freed up these states to carry out their original mandates more effectively. This has been successfully done through leases in Keehi Lagoon with Keehi Marine, Inc. and La Mariana Sailing Club. To help it leverage CIP funds appropriated by the Legislature, DOBOR requests authorization for an RFP for a longterm lease so that the successful applicant may partner with DOBOR to bring AWSBH the improvements that it desperately needs.

Harbor Management: Management of AWSBH has consumed a disproportionate amount of staff time and financial resources. A development proposal which incorporates harbor management functions as part of redevelopment may be favored in order to promote efficiency of marina operation and allow staff to focus on ocean recreation management which has become a major priority due to the ever-increasing demands on the use of the near shore waters, and in keeping with the DLNR's mission of resource conservation and sustainable use.

Nationwide, states do not generally operate recreational harbors and marinas and where they do, they widely use third parties to manage them. Using third party harbor management, governments in other states have shown a good track record of efficiency and optimization of revenue. The City of Chicago has the largest municipal marina system in the U.S. It began using third party management of its 6,000 slips (three times the number in the entire State of Hawaii) in the early 1990s and has not looked back. Its revenues went from zero in 1995 to \$13 million per year in 2015. Similar trends can be found all over the country. Even Hawaii's own Kewalo Basin, a few blocks from AWSBH, has shown a similar trend.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS (RFP):

DOBOR's RFP process will begin with an invitation to qualified applicants to submit proposals for harbor redevelopment at AWSBH for the Subject Property. Request for Qualifications will be incorporated into the RFP and will request the requisite information from interested parties. An evaluation committee selected by the Chair and the Division will review the applications and determine which applicants meet the eligibility criteria to submit development proposals. Upon selection by the committee, the successful Applicant and its proposal must be approved by the Board at a board meeting open to the public. Should the Board approve the selected Applicant and proposal, the selected Applicant and DLNR will commence exclusive negotiations of a development agreement and proposed lease for the Subject Property with the approved Applicant.

Accommodation Requirements: The Developer shall provide office space and related utilities for harbor management staff. The square footage of the office space shall be equal to or greater than the current harbor office unless otherwise agreed to by the Department. The Developer shall provide storage space for miscellaneous harbor materials that is at least one thousand (1,000) square feet. The Developer shall provide a minimum of ten (10) parking stalls to be used by harbor management staff and associated vehicle parking at no charge. This requirement may be subject to change should the Department receive the necessary approvals from the Hawaii State Legislature to lease submerged lands that include the slips and mooring spaces within the harbor. The Developer shall follow the existing parking plan approved by the Board of Land and Natural Resources (Board) that provides for a minimum of three hundred (300) free public parking stalls, for a minimum of three hundred twelve (312) permit parking stalls for harbor tenants with valid mooring permits, and for a minimum of three hundred twenty-nine (329) paid parking stalls according to approved parking rates. The current parking plan is subject to change depending on the type and configuration of the new development project. See **Exhibit A-2** for the existing parking plan. Any changes to this parking plan shall be approved by the Board. Access for State Department of Transportation (DOT) personnel to inspect the lower footings of Ala Wai Canal bridge and State personnel to inspect waste catchment areas near the same location also needs to be accommodated.

Character of Use: The Subject Property may include any use(s) allowed under the Hawaii Revised Statutes, City and County of the Honolulu Zoning Code, Special Management Area Ordinances for the Subject Property, the Waikiki Special Design District and as provided in SLH 2011 Act 197, using the *Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor Vision Report* as guidance.

PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT:

The selected Applicant (aka Developer) may need to undertake various predevelopment activities before a lease can be issued and construction can commence i.e., due diligence; comply with HRS Chapter 343 requirements and county permitting and as provided in SLH 2011, Act 197.

The Developer will also be required to submit evidence of the applicant's financial capacity to complete the proposed development, including personal guarantees (construction bond); a lease rent proposal, a development agreement rent proposal, and a development timetable.

The Developer will be allowed to use only those submerged lands that have been approved by the Legislature subject to the Developer acquiring all required approvals.

A Development Agreement will be negotiated with the selected Developer, in which the agreement will set forth the predevelopment terms and conditions that the selected Developer must perform (including payment of development agreement rental fees) for a lease to be issued.

PROPOSED NEW LEASE:

The proposed lease shall include a survey map and descriptions of the Subject Property and easements according to State Department of Accounting and General Services standards.

<u>Lease Term</u>: Anticipated to be up to Sixty-five (65) years (as stated in HRS §200-2.5, or according to §171-59, as applicable).

<u>Minimum Annual Rent</u>: To be determined by the selected Applicant's proposal, but not less than the fair market rental, as determined by staff or independent appraisal, subject to review and approval by the Chairperson.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Land and Natural Resources:

- 1. Find that the public interest demands that a lease for the Subject Property may be disposed of through negotiation pursuant to HRS Section 171-59(a) or any applicable section of HRS Chapter 171;
- 2. Delegate the authority to the Chairperson
 - to publish a Request for Proposals ("RFP") consistent with HRS §171-59 for the selection of the lessee for redevelopment of Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor;
 - (ii) establish a selection committee.
 - (iii) establish the criteria for evaluating and selecting the lessee;
 - (iv) accept and evaluate the applications submitted by prospective lessees; and
 - (v) make a preliminary determination and recommendation to the Board of the best applicant;
- 3. Authorize and approve the Chairperson to negotiate and approve any modifications to the RFP process or requirements, if in the best interests of the State and consistent with HRS Section 171-59, and any other recommendation as discussed above, and subject to review and approval of the Department of the Attorney General.

I have finally decided to transfer this land to the Board of Harbor Commissioners for use as a boat harbor with the understanding that no commercial leases or other extraneous activities will be authorized by the Board, with the exception, however, of granting a lease of a limited area of land to the Hawaii Yacht Club for the construction and operation of a club house.

Will you get together with the Chairman of the Board of Harbor Commissioners to delineate the area to be transferred and draft an executive order for that purpose.

Aloha Chairs, Vice Chairs, and Honorable Members of the Committees,

My name is Jill Chapman and I am writing **in strong support of SB1034** to guarantee at least 300 parking stalls free of charge for the public at the Ala Wai State Boat Harbor (AWSBH). I live in Moiliili , and am a surfer that uses the area. I have been using the area for the past 16 years. I made friends here, learned to sail and surf here, and came into adulthood and had had my first date with my now fiance of 9 years here under the Friday night fireworks. Please keep this area free for the next generations to come, for them to learn, and make lifelong relationships and connect with the aina, to have the opportunity to experience what I have graciously been afforded the opportunity to do.

The parking lot of the AWSBH provides ocean access for the canoe paddlers of the Anuenue Canoe Club and surfers for the surf spots Kaisers, Rockpiles, and Ala Moana Bowls. There are 941 parking stalls with 312 stalls for permit holders who rent boat slips. In 2008, the Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR) requested that the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) reduce the remaining 549 free-of-charge stalls to 130 and implement paid parking for the rest. After huge public opposition and outcry, where the majority of the public wanted to keep all remaining stalls free, BLNR approved DOBOR's parking plan with the compromise that at least 300 stalls remain free of charge (6h time limit and no parking allowed from 10:30 pm to 4:30 am). In January 2020, DOBOR attempted to reduce the number of free parking stalls again and convert 125 free stalls to paid parking in total disregard of the compromise reached with the community in 2008 and without any prior community outreach.

Paid parking will cause surfers to park at Magic Island and paddle across an active boat channel to reach the highly popular and world-famous surf spot "Ala Moana Bowls." This causes serious safety concerns for surfers and boaters alike, especially at dusk and dawn, besides the fact that the free-of-charge parking lot at Ala Moana Beach park is already overcrowded with the influx of new developments in Kaka'ako.

Converting more or all of the free parking stalls at the AWSBH will detrimentally affect and exacerbate the financial hardship of local 'ohana and practitioners of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices such as canoe paddling, fishing, and surfing, who are already suffering the most from the exorbitant cost of living in Hawai'i. This is the last place in Waikīkī where local 'ohana can access the ocean without having to pay for parking.

In September of 2022, the BLNR approved DOBOR's recommendation that delegated BLNR's authority to the Chairperson to publish a Request for Proposal (RFP). This RFP is to find a lessee that would redevelop the AWSBH. This potential new developer is supposed to follow DOBOR's parking plan that provides for 300 free public parking stalls, but it allows DOBOR to change the parking plan to fit the type and configuration of the new development if approved by the BLNR.

It is imperative to act now and protect the last free access to the ocean for our local 'ohana and practitioners of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices in Waikīkī. Please support SB1034.

TESTIMONY OF KELLY LUCERO IN STRONG SUPPORT OF

SB1034 – RELATING TO PUBLIC PARKING AT ALA WAI BOAT HARBOR

Aloha Chairs, Vice Chairs and Honorable Members of the Committees,

My name is Kelly Lucero. I love in Kunia and I am writing in strong support of SB1034 to guarantee at least 300 parking stalls free of charge for the public at the Ala Wai State Boat Harbor (AWSBH).

The parking lot of the AWSBH provides ocean access for the canoe paddlers of the Anuenue Canoe Club and surfers for the surf spots Kaisers, Rockpiles, and Ala Moana Bowls. There are 941 parking stalls with 312 stalls for permit holders who rent boat slips. In 2008, the Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR) requested that the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) reduce the 549 free of charge stalls to 130 and implement paid parking for the rest. After huge public opposition and outcry, where the majority of the public wanted to keep all remaining stalls free, BLNR approved DOBOR's parking plan with the compromise that at least 300 stalls remain free of charge (6h time limit and no parking allowed from 10:30pm to 4:30am). In January of 2020, DOBOR attempted to reduce the number of free parking stalls again and convert 125 free stalls to paid parking in total disregard of the compromise reached with the community in 2008 and without any prior community outreach.

Paid parking will cause surfers to park at Magic Island and paddle across an active boat channel to reach the highly popular and world famous surf spot "Ala Moana Bowls." This causes serious safety concerns for surfers and boaters alike, especially at dusk and dawn, besides the fact that the free of charge parking lot at Ala Moana Beach park is already overcrowded with the influx of new developments in Kaka'ako.

Converting more or all of the free parking stalls at the AWSBH will detrimentally affect and exacerbate the financial hardship of local 'ohana and practitioners of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices such as canoe paddling, fishing, and surfing, who are already suffering the most from the exorbitant cost of living in Hawai'i. This is the last place in Waikīkī where local 'ohana can access the ocean without having to pay for parking.

In September of 2022, the BLNR approved DOBOR's recommendation that delegated BLNR's authority to the Chairperson to publish a Request for Proposal (RFP). This RFP is to find a lessee that would redevelopment the AWSBH. This potential new developer is supposed to follow DOBOR's parking plan that provides for the 300 free public parking stalls, but it allows DOBOR to change the parking plan to fit the type and configuration of the new development if approved by the BLNR.

It is imperative to act now and protect the last free access to the ocean for our local 'ohana and practitioners of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices in Waikīkī. Please support SB1034.

Aloha Chairs, Vice Chairs, and Honorable Members of the Committees,

My name is Captain Margaret Mary Hallahan and I am writing in strong support of SB1034 to guarantee at least 300 parking stalls free of charge for the public at the Ala Wai State Boat Harbor (AWSBH). I live in San Francisco California, I am the president of the Outrigger Canoe group called Na Wahine O'ke Kai Outrigger in SF Bay. I have had the opportunity to canoe from our beach site in San Francisco bay for 40 years which we call O'Hana beach. I was introduced to Outrigger Canoeing by Master Waterman Steersman Napi at Anuenue Canoe Club 43 years ago. Three years later in the SF bay, I meet a canoe builder and Master Waterman Steersman Peter Balin from Maui. We were able to seed a Hawaiian Cultural Outrigger Canoe Base in SF Bay. We were the first canoe to welcome the Hokulea sunrise entry into the San Francisco bay with the Maritime Park Boat in 1995. We hosted the Hikianalia arrival in 2019 to our canoe site SF Aquatic Park. Please see the linked videos I made of the historic crossings. If Master Waterman Steersman Napi at Anuenue Canoe Club had not let me jump onto his canoe with one of the young paddlers 43 years ago all of this might of missed. Out on the water, people fall in love, mourn people they have lost, and heal from the sometimes daunting daily grind. The Hawai'i ancestors knew they had this gift. Making it harder to practice this gift you will be cutting off the spread of this important happiness around the world.

The parking lot of the AWSBH provides ocean access for the canoe paddlers of the Anuenue Canoe Club and surfers for the surf spots Kaisers, Rockpiles, and Ala Moana Bowls. There are 941 parking stalls with 312 stalls for permit holders who rent boat slips. In 2008, the Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR) requested that the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) reduce the remaining 549 free-of-charge stalls to 130 and implement paid parking for the rest. After huge public opposition and outcry, where the majority of the public wanted to keep all remaining stalls free, BLNR approved DOBOR's parking plan with the compromise that at least 300 stalls remain free of charge (6h time limit and no parking allowed from 10:30 pm to 4:30 am). In January 2020, DOBOR attempted to reduce the number of free parking stalls again and convert 125 free stalls to paid parking in total disregard of the compromise reached with the community in 2008 and without any prior community outreach.

As a licensed Captain, I have navigated near misses of swimmers with their surfboards in the channel. I called the officer of the day at the Coast Guard Station and they shared that surfers and swimmers have the full right to cross the channel at any time no matter how dangerous the swell is. As long as the swimmer or surfer is moving forward it is the boater's responsibility to avoid a coalition. Even if you must take your vessel into the rocks to avoid a coalition you must avoid the person in the channel at costs. Paid parking will cause surfers to park at Magic Island and paddle across an active boat channel to reach the highly popular and world-famous surf spot "Ala Moana Bowls." This causes serious safety issues for surfers and boaters alike, especially at dusk and dawn, besides the fact that the free-of-charge parking lot at Ala Moana Beach park is already overcrowded with the influx of new developments in Kaka'ako. We have already lots one surfer by boat coalitions in the channel it needs to never happen again. Non-local Captains come into the channel every day and are not aware to look out for surfers swimming across.

Converting more or all of the free parking stalls at the AWSBH will detrimentally affect and exacerbate the financial hardship of local 'ohana and practitioners of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices such as canoe paddling, fishing, and surfing, who are already suffering the most from the exorbitant cost of living in Hawai'i. Aloha to our respective Senate Committees on Water and Land and Hawaiian Affairs,

I'm writing in support of SB-1034 for the maintenance of public parking at the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor. I write in support as a 25 year old surfer, voyager, avid ocean user, member of the ocean community and a native Hawaiian scientist. My experience in the ocean like many others throughout the Hawaiian Archipelago is extremely reliant on access, zoning, legislation, and community. I have spent a lot of time using this space, frequenting this space, and creating relationships within the community at the small boat harbor.

I write in support of this bill because it is a form of organized legislation representing many public stakeholder groups who recognize that removal of ocean access is important enough to voluntarily come together and enter into advocacy. This measure is aligned and congruent with Mrs. Hobron's will and vision for the use of the boat harbor coastal lands; for ocean recreation. The access that the current and previous free parking provides for the strong ocean community, generational Hawaiian families, and the opportunity for our future keiki in Hawai 'i is constantly threatened by private initiatives for the parking areas. It's time that we come together to forge something that would protect the place and people.

With respect to culture, the past and current planning initiatives DOBOR has introduced for new parking rates inevitably alters the incentives to utilize facilities and space, and thus, the demographic of users. It has been shown in other places that increase in monetary demands and privatizing ocean areas has resulted in a loss of connection for many ocean users, especially native people's (Hack, 2021) (Justine-Domingue, 2022)(Burell, 2022). The legislation here not only protects public ocean access but ethics and culture where racially-biased planning can find its way into management plans and proposals.

Over the past two decades, DOBOR has repeatedly tried to privatize the parking at the boat harbor, and recently drafted a partnered proposal with UH Manoa School of Planning Students that would commercialize the entire area. The plan includes a good amount of environmentally forward language and green-washing to justify commercialization to "solve" and fulfill the objectives they have set forth. The racial bias of climate adaptation along with a departure from acting in public interest by land owners or managers is a dynamic that has been studied in other places within coastal management with much criticism. DOBOR's stakeholder process has been criticized by the BLNR multiple times in past meetings (2020 and previously). I would suggest reading through previous BLNR recommendations to DOBOR and their previous plans, specifically the most recent proposal that was heard a few years ago. The public voices of support for maintaining free parking areas have always been well organized but seemingly not enough for the department and agency level to include in their process' to reach some form of collaboration with the public voice. This is a large reason why passing this Bill at a Senate and House level is so important for members of the public.

The issues of managing the harbor itself are long drawn out and do not go unrecognized by current harbor users. In fact, a good amount of management is through informal methods such as cleaning the beach, emergency-care and life-saving, directing first-responders, shower maintenance, and more. Much of the management is carried out by long-time recreation users themselves. While not included in the stakeholder process, many of us are still willing to collaborate for a better future in this special place we care about and SB-1034 is the first step to allowing the community to do so.

My support of SB-1034 is also grounded in legal precedent this bill can set for ocean communities and coastal areas throughout the State. I hope that the large public support for this bill speaks loudly that the public can collaborate with State and City here and throughout the islands to manage and maintain our areas fairly.

I am hoping that the Senate will agree to hear this highly organized effort to protect the public and enable a wonderful opportunity for citizens to take care of their places and work with government and agencies.

This is the second time in 3 years that ocean users must stand up for ocean access at this location- despite overwhelming public opposition to eliminating free parking for local recreational ocean users, the Administrator at DOBOR continues to disregard local voices pleading that we be allowed to practice our cultural activities without barriers to access.

I am a surfer, married to a surfer, with a son who learned to surf at this beloved spot. Many days, surfing has graced my life with a reminder of why I live in Hawaii, when the cost of living and exponential crowding via development has eroded my peace of mind.

Surfing in Waikiki is no longer accessible to locals because there is nowhere affordable or close enough to park and carry a board to the beach.

Please help us to preserve this link to our past, to a simpler time, to what makes Hawaii a beautiful and healing place to live.

The Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor has the last free parking for ocean users of these surf breaks. If it was not available, I and other surfers would likely park at Magic Island and paddle across the active boat channel, with the potential for grave injury to both surfers and boaters.

When the surf is good or there is a canoe race, there is already a need to arrive before sunrise to obtain a parking spot as the demand is great. Any reduction in the number of parking spots set aside for recreational ocean use is unjustified. Instead, DOBOR ought to improve signage, properly mark parking spaces, and tow hotel workers who park in this area daily with impunity.

Our keiki deserve this. We need our legislators to codify the 300 parking spaces for recreational ocean users into law. We cannot leave it to DOBOR and BLNR who have shown over and over that they put profits over people on public land.

Please stand for hard-working local families struggling to afford living in Hawaii who need the connection to their spirit found in the ocean. <u>Please support SB1034</u>.

TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF SB 1034

Chair Inouye, Chair Shimabukoro, Vice Chair Elefante, Vice Chair Fevella, and Committee Members

Like many other people in our community, my family and I use the Ala Wai parking area to access the beach and ocean regularly. I am writing to ask that you pass SB 1034 to protect practical public access to this treasured slice of beach.

SB 1034 is necessary and in the public interest.

The parking fronting Bowls/Rockpiles and Kahanamoku Beach is an important community resource. It is used by people and families from every walk of life, all accessing the ocean and beach together for healthy recreation. In the parking lot, you hear people talking story on every subject imaginable. And with time, you meet a cohesive and inclusive community of people who reside all over O'ahu. My own family surfs at the beach several times each week. As a baby, my son scoured the sand for interesting rocks. He learned to swim in the lagoon. He now surfs, paddles, and sails out front. He has celebrated birthdays and Thanksgivings on the beach, sharing food and happy times with people he knows from the parking lot at Bowls.

This sort of public access, and the community that it creates, should be protected against the pressures of development. Recent development concepts and a parking proposal sought to reduce the number of free parking spots and expand the paid parking areas. As a practical matter, access to the beach presently relies upon access to parking.¹ This access should not be transformed into a privilege that is contingent upon paying a fee.² This measure will simply require that any future developments must maintain the current level of unpaid public access.

SB 1034 solves a problem for DOBOR.

At a BLNR hearing on a recent paid parking proposal, DOBOR noted uncertainty about its authorization to enforce current parking signs. Those signs limit parking to ocean and recreational users. SB 1034 would provide DOBOR with the clear legal authority to designate parking for those uses.

Protecting access to public spaces for public uses is good policy. I respectfully request that you pass this measure.

Aloha for taking the time to hear me out. I am writing in support of SB1034 to keep Ala Wai Surf parking free. I have been surfing here (Ala Moana Bowls/Rockpiles) for almost a half-century. Having surfed the same place for so long, I have made friends with other surfers who share my strong connection to this place. This is why we "regulars" always surf here and it would be hard for any of us to experience this somewhere else. Why?

For most of us, once we find a spot we like, we tend to stay there and this goes beyond enjoying the waves. Surfing here helps with our physical and mental well-being. It gives us peace of mind that we all know each other and we all know the break so we can have fun but keep it safe. We also find comfort that if something does go wrong, we all have each other's back.

I cannot think of another place that can offer these things. Nor can I find one where surfers have to pay for parking to surf, but that is exactly what is going to happen if SB1034 does not pass. The averager parking rate in town is about \$4.50 an hour. I am retired on a fixed income and will find it hard to pay over \$1000 a year just to park and surf here: 1.5 hours x 3 days a week x 52 weeks a year = \$1053. Incidentally, 1.5 hours each surf session is a conservative number since that equates to only an hour of actual surf time: 30 minutes to wax the board, paddle out, paddle in, shower, dry off, and put everything away before driving off. I surf here 3 times a week but I know of other "regulars" who surf here almost, if not, every day.

I hope you consider these things before deciding on the fate of SB1034. Again, mahalo for your time and patience.

Thank you to the committee for allowing me the opportunity to submit my written testimony in support of SB1034. I also want to thank the organizers of **Save Surf Parking Coalition Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor** (*surfparking.org*), and all the passionate and talented surfers I have met out on the water over the years. I have had the privilege of using this recreational area as a surfer and would not be the same person without my experiences.

The 300 parking stalls are not free. We, the taxpayer, pay for the Hawaii Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation to steward the area rightfully, respectfully and with the public in mind. The State of Hawaii has a duty to uphold its Public Trust Doctrine as below:

"the right of the people to have the waters protected for their use [which] demands adequate provision for traditional and customary Hawaiian rights, wildlife, maintenance of ecological balance and scenic beauty, and the preservation and enhancement of the waters . . ."

"For the benefit of present and future generations, the State and its political subdivisions shall conserve and protect Hawaii's natural beauty and all natural resources, including land, water, air, minerals and energy sources, and shall promote the development and utilization of these resources in a manner consistent with their conservation and in furtherance of the self-sufficiency of the State. All public natural resources are held in trust by the State for the benefit of the people."

Having the public pay additional fees to park in these stalls will further inequity between oceangoers, deteriorate public health, not uphold the Public Trust Doctrine's duty to enter our waters safely, and will rob the opportunity for future generations to enter their "training grounds" and become a part of a lifelong surf community. Surfing is a Hawaiian spiritual practice, economy, and undeniably the substance of Hawaii's cultural image and historical significance, which distinguishes itself as such from the rest of the world. Many surfers and ocean-goers will not be able to afford extra fees, pay the (current) system of illegal cash-only towing collections, and will be shut out of their coastline. This is a painful reminder of a time in history when surfing was not allowed. Removing equitable and safely accessible access to the shoreline is a step in that direction. At a time when Honolulu is grappling with rising sea levels in its not-so-distant future (that studies show will have adverse impacts on surfing), we need to focus on protecting the shorelines. This issue is not solely about parking. Taking away this parking is a gateway to inadvertently allowing development to take precedence and remove shoreline protection. We should be doing more to uphold our Public Trust Doctrine and protect our shoreline. That starts with safe and equitable access.

My name is Ashley Fonseca and I am writing **in strong support of SB1034** to guarantee at least 300 parking stalls free of charge for the public at the Ala Wai State Boat Harbor (AWSBH). I've been surfing at bowls, rockpiles, and kaisers for years and access to free parking is already difficult in it's current state. Privatizing this harbor contributes to the detriment of recreational outdoor activities for kama'āina and hurts the local businesses surrounding the parking entrance that rely on the foot-traffic coming and going through the entry.

In 2008, the Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR) requested that the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) reduce the remaining 549 free-of-charge stalls to 130 and implement paid parking for the rest. After huge public opposition and outcry, where the majority of the public wanted to keep all remaining stalls free, BLNR approved DOBOR's parking plan with the compromise that at least 300 stalls remain free of charge (6h time limit and no parking allowed from 10:30 pm to 4:30 am). In January 2020, DOBOR attempted to reduce the number of free parking stalls again and convert 125 free stalls to paid parking in total disregard of the compromise reached with the community in 2008 and without any prior community outreach.

Paid parking will cause surfers to park at Magic Island and paddle across an active boat channel to reach the highly popular and world-famous surf spot "Ala Moana Bowls." This causes serious safety concerns for surfers and boaters alike, especially at dusk and dawn, besides the fact that the free-of-charge parking lot at Ala Moana Beach park is already overcrowded with the influx of new developments in Kaka'ako.

Converting more or all of the free parking stalls at the AWSBH will detrimentally affect and exacerbate the financial hardship of local 'ohana and practitioners of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices such as canoe paddling, fishing, and surfing, who are already suffering
the most from the exorbitant cost of living in Hawai'i. This is the last place in Waikīkī where local 'ohana can access the ocean without having to pay for parking.

In September of 2022, the BLNR approved DOBOR's recommendation that delegated BLNR's authority to the Chairperson to publish a Request for Proposal (RFP). This RFP is to find a lessee that would redevelop the AWSBH. This potential new developer is supposed to follow DOBOR's parking plan that provides for 300 free public parking stalls, but it allows DOBOR to change the parking plan to fit the type and configuration of the new development if approved by the BLNR.

It is imperative to act now and protect the last free access to the ocean for our local 'ohana and practitioners of Native Hawaiian traditional and customary practices in Waikīkī. Please support SB1034.

My name is Alexa Deike and I am writing in **strong support** of SB1034. I am recent graduate of the William S. Richardson School of Law at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa with certificates in Environmental Law and Native Hawaiian Law. Today, I am testifying not as an attorney, but as a surfer and supporter of Native Hawaiian rights.

I want to acknowledge and mahalo Senator Lorraine R. Inouye and all the Senators, who signed on to SB1034, for hearing the voices of the community and bringing this important bill to guarantee at least 300 parking stalls free of charge for the public at the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor (AWSBH).

In 2008, the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) as recommended by its Division on Boating and Ocean Recreation (DOBOR) passed a parking plan that entailed a compromise between the community stakeholders and DOBOR that guaranteed that at least 300 parking stalls remained without charge. See Minutes of BLNR Meeting 5/23/2008.¹

In 2011, Act 197 was passed to add section 200-2.6 to the Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) for the purpose of entering a into a public-private partnership for the development of portions of AWSBH facilities. Since then, DOBOR has brought requests for proposals (RFP) to develop the AWSBH that the community has opposed.

Then in January of 2020, DOBOR attempted to lower the amount of parking stalls again by converting 125 of the free stalls to paid parking. See DOBOR staff submittal from January 10, 2020.² Again, enormous public opposition occurred and the BLNR did not approve the amended parking plan but asked DOBOR to engage with community stakeholders.

The latest "endangerment" of the parking plan was hidden in DOBOR's staff submittal³ that recommended the authorization of DOBOR to issue a RFP for development of public lands at the AWSBH. Quote:

"The Developer shall follow the existing parking plan approved by the Board of Land and Natural Resources (Board) that provides for a minimum of three hundred (300) free public parking stalls, for a minimum of three hundred twelve (312) permit parking stalls for harbor tenants with valid mooring permits, and for a minimum of three hundred twenty-nine (329) paid parking stalls according to approved parking rates. The current parking plan is subject to change depending on the type and configuration of the new development project."

An average community would not be alerted that this change to the compromise is imminent by simply reading the agenda item posted by the BLNR one week prior to the hearing. Let alone can community members be expected to monitor every BLNR to see if the parking plan is up for discussion again.

Thus, securing the 300 parking stalls with an amendment to HRS section 200-2.6, will protect the compromise reached by the community and DOBOR. Section 200-2.6 regulates leases of the AWSBH and it is only appropriate to include the parking plan condition there.
