SENATE BILL 1129 SD1 RELATING TO PROCUREMENT

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on Senate Bill 1129 SD1. The State Procurement Office (SPO) opposes the bill due to Section 2, page 3, line 9 to 12:

"(c) Procurement of [\$25,000] \$50,000 to less than \$250,000 shall be made in accordance with small purchase procedures, provided that such small purchase procurements through an electronic system shall be required."

Comments: Public procurement's primary objective is to provide everyone equal opportunity to compete for government contracts, prevent favoritism, collusion, or fraud in awarding of contracts. Increasing the small purchase threshold to \$50,000 for electronic procurement would result in less transparency, reduced competition, and higher risk of parceling, which is the artificial division of purchase of same, like, or related items of goods, services, or construction into several small purchases or smaller quantities, in order evade the statutory competitive requirements.

Additionally, obtaining quotes without an electronic procurement (eProcurement) system may lead to the agency only going to the same vendors repeatedly, which would be in violation of HRS 103D-101(a)(6)(A) Encourage economic competition by:

"(A) Ensuring that all persons are afforded an equal opportunity to compete in a fair and open environment."

As of February 21, 2023, there were approximately 1769 awards, between \$25,000 and \$50,000, posted on the Hawaii Awards & Notices Data System (HANDS); a total value of approximately \$68,000,000. If the bill passes, approximately 550 awards, valued at approximately \$21,000,000 each year, would lack transparency and fail to give vendors equal opportunity to compete for government contracts.

Chapter 103D, Hawaii Revised Statues, Hawaii Public Procurement Code (Code), is the State's single source of public procurement policy to be applied equally and uniformly, while providing fairness, open competition, a level playing field, government disclosure, and transparency in the procurement and contracting process vital to good government. As stated in the National Association of State Procurement Officials (NASPO) white paper on "Ethics and Accountability," "Maintaining the integrity of public procurement is one of the most important pillars of government."

Recommendation: The State Procurement Office recommends leaving 103D-305(c) untouched to read:

(c) Procurements of <u>\$25</u>,000 to less than \$250,000 shall be made in accordance with small purchase procedures; provided that such small purchase procurements through an electronic system be required.

The Department of Transportation (DOT) **supports** this bill with its provisions to increase the dollar threshold in HRS §103-53(e)(1) from \$25,000 to \$50,000 for the requirement to obtain a contractor's tax clearance documentation prior to execution of a contract with state or county agencies, and to increase the dollar threshold in HRS §103D-305(c) from \$25,000 to \$50,000 as the minimum required for procurements to be made in accordance with small purchase procedures through an electronic system.
