Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this bill. The Campaign Spending Commission ("Commission") supports this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to prohibit a person convicted of certain felony offenses against public administration from becoming a candidate for or holding public office for twenty years from the date of the person's final discharge. The Commission supports the enhancement of criminal penalties for offenses involving public corruption. If enforced, the Commission believes that criminal penalties are the most effective remedies to deter public corruption.

The Commission requests that this Committee pass this bill.
