Aloha Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Committee Members:

The Hawai'i State Ethics Commission ("Commission") offers **comments** regarding SB 149, which proposes to amend Article III of the Hawai'i State Constitution to establish a full-time legislative session.

The Hawai'i State Ethics Commission has not yet had a chance to discuss this bill and, thus, has no position on the measure at this time. The bill will be on the agenda for discussion at the next Commission meeting, which is scheduled for February 15, 2023.

Staff note this measure could address ethics concerns, such as conflict of interest issues regarding secondary employment. If the Commission takes a position on this measure, we hope to offer testimony in this regard at a later hearing.
