Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this bill. The Campaign Spending Commission ("Commission") supports the intent of this bill.

This bill establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices to beginning with the 2026 general election year and appropriates funds to the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund and the Commission.

The bill establishes the maximum amount of comprehensive public funds ("CPF Max") for each office. The CPF Max is designed to provide for an amount spent in recent elections by candidates who won their offices. It ranges from a low of \$20,000 for candidates for Hawaii County Council to a high of \$2,500,000 for candidates for Governor. When implemented as proposed, the Commission notes that it is possible that the CPF Max may overshoot or undershoot the average amount spent by candidates who won in recent elections. An example of overshooting is the Hawaii County Council candidate. The average amount spent by candidates who won in these recent elections was \$15,062.42. As proposed in this bill, the CPF Max qualifies them for \$20,000 of public funding which is 133% overage of the average amount spent by these winning candidates. An example of undershooting is the Honolulu Mayor. The average amount spent by candidates who won in recent elections was \$2,647,817.52. As proposed in this bill, the CPF Max qualifies them for \$2,300,000 of public funding which is 87% underage of the average amount spent by these winning candidates. With respect to all other offices, the deviation percentage appears to be reasonable. In summary, the CPF Max may not accurately

reflect or represent the appropriate amounts spent by winning candidates in recent elections for all offices.

Th bill also specifies on how to qualify for public funding. It establishes the minimum number of qualifying contributions each candidate must receive from registered voters residing within the respective district from which the candidate seeks nomination or election to office. It appears that, as originally drafted and amended in SD2, the minimum number of qualifying contributions is equal to .25 percent of the CPF Max for each office. HD1 raised the minimum number of qualifying contributions for Senate candidates from 250 to 400 and raised the number of minimum qualifying contributions to 200 for all offices that had a lesser number required in SD2.

In contrast to the existing partial public funding program, this bill makes it easier for candidates to raise the minimum qualifying contributions and receive more in public financing in the comprehensive public financing scheme when compared to the state's partial public financing program. For example, under this bill, a candidate for the office of Governor would have to raise 6,250 \$5 qualifying contributions amounting to \$31,250 to receive a maximum amount of **\$2,500,000** in public funds. Under the state's partial public financing program, a candidate for the office of Governor would have to raise 1,000 \$100 qualifying contributions amounting to \$100,000 to receive the minimum amount of public financing and raise an additional amount of \$330,680 in qualifying contributions to receive **\$430,680**, the maximum amount of public funding for that office. A candidate for the office of Honolulu Mayor would have to raise 5,750 \$5 qualifying contributions amounting to \$28,750 to receive a maximum amount of **\$2,300,000** in public funds. Under the state's partial public financing program, a candidate for the office of Honolulu Mayor would have to raise 500 \$100 qualifying contributions amounting to \$50,000 to receive the minimum amount of public financing and raise an additional \$176,750 to receive **\$226,750**, the maximum amount of public financing for that office.

Finally, the balance in the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund is \$1,687,121.83 as of June 30, 2022. Obviously, that amount is insufficient to pay for the comprehensive public funding program, including the additional personnel the Commission will need. The appropriation sections of the bill have been blanked out and would need to be reinstated with sufficient amounts to run the comprehensive funding program.

The Commission requests that this committee pass this measure with the described amendments.

Aloha Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and Committee Members,

I am testifying in support of SB 1543 to establish a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates running for office in Hawai'i. Publicly funded elections are one of the best reforms we can make to our current election system to level the playing field for all candidates and get special interest money out of our campaigns.

I'd like to offer the following additional comments on this bill as currently worded:

- 1. Please ensure there is a way to accept electronic signatures from campaign contributors.
- 2. Verify that the Campaign Spending Commission or Office of Elections has a method for checking those signatures for accuracy.
- 3. Recalculate the funding amounts in Section 11-G to reflect the actual amounts spent in the 2022 election cycle.
- 4. When recalculating the amounts only use those races that were truly competitive to form your averages, rather than including all races with more than one candidate. This will provide a more accurate picture of the total amount spent and better accomplish the goal of equity and fairness in public financing.
- 5. Lastly, if some candidates are subject to additional rules or restrictions regarding campaign funding and spending limits while other candidates are accepting large private donations with no spending limits, there will always be an imbalance that leaves the election process open to corruption and inequities. Ideally, ALL candidates should be beholden to the same spending limits, whether they choose to qualify for public funding or not.

SB 1543 is an opportunity to lessen the influence of money in politics, give political power to the people, and restore the people's trust in elections and the legislative process. 74% of the Hawai'i voting public favors enacting public financed elections and ending the influence of corporate and private donations. Public funding for elections is an effective way to engage voters and create participation for a greater diversity of new candidates to run for office. Please pass SB 1543. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify in support of this bill.

On behalf of our 20,000 members and supporters, the Sierra Club of Hawai'i **SUPPORTS SB1543 SD2 HD1**, which will help to relieve candidates of the need to fundraise from private entities to run a viable campaign, and thereby foster more rigorous discussion and refinement of candidates' policy platforms for the betterment of our islands and communities.

By providing for more meaningful public financing of campaigns for elected office, this measure would help us take a transformative step towards enabling our candidates and elected representatives more time to engage with their grassroots constituents during the campaign season; research, debate, and refine their campaign policy platforms; and thereby come into or return to office with a stronger and more comprehensive vision for policies that will ultimately benefit the public interest, as well as the public trust in our democratic system of governance.

Accordingly, the Sierra Club of Hawai'i respectfully urges the Committee to **PASS** SB1543 SD2 HD1. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify.

Aloha,

My name is Brandee Menino and I am the CEO of Hope Services Hawai'i, which is Hawai'i Island's largest nonprofit homeless services provider. We are pleased to support SB1543, which would establish a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in the State of Hawai'i.

Our team uses evidence-based practices to help our neighbors avoid and overcome homelessness, and we achieve above-average results in helping people get housed and stay housed. However, as a non-governmental organization, we cannot change the laws that have led to the status quo.

In the United States, Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders are 39 times more likely to experience homelessness than Asians.¹

This is not the result of outsiders flying to Hawai'i to become homeless.

In Hawai'i County, 28% of people experiencing homelessness are children.²

This is not the result of failure to pull oneself up by one's bootstraps. This is the result of government policy that deprioritizes the well-being of its people, while pushing the responsibility onto individuals who cannot survive in a system that is stacked against them.

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The policies some lawmakers will support or oppose can often be predicted by looking at the major contributors to their campaigns. Lawmakers may receive pressure to keep these contributors happy if they want to keep the dollars flowing so they can win the next election. Candidates who reject this quidpro-quo support are often unable to raise enough funds to stand a chance at winning. We all know it's wrong, we all know it happens anyway, and we all know that our local people are the ones who suffer because of it.

This committee has the opportunity to ensure that leaders from communities across Hawai'i, and not just those who have the financial means, have an equitable chance to make good policies. When donors who profit by displacing local people are no longer needed to win an election, the people of Hawai'i can be more confident that legislators are acting in their best interest. This investment is worth it.

I want to share the insight of someone like you, who was elected to serve her community in 2022. Representative Ambureen Rana serves in the Maine State Legislature, and when we asked about her experience with public campaign financing, she said:

"I was publicly financed and it's the only way it was possible for me to run, as a working class person. It goes a long way in removing barriers to allow young people to run for office, and people of color. As a 28 year old, first generation American, this made it possible for me."

Please pass SB1543. Our people are worth it.

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Hawaii Holding Power Accountable

In strong support of SB1543

A reform like public financing has been due in Hawaii for many years. With last year's convictions of Senator J. Kalani English and Representative Ty Cullen for cash bribes, ethics in our state government has leapt to the front of the public's collective mind.

Some incumbents dislike public financing because they see it as a threat to their reelection. This is not necessarily the case. The 2012 Maine Policy Review found that "challengers are only more likely to win if they participate in MCEA [the 1996 Maine Clean Elections Act] and the incumbent does not. When incumbents accept public funding, they are actually more likely to win reelection" [1].

SB1543 is a fair bill. It includes every major state and county office, not singling out any one group for a trial, as some previous bills have done. After qualifying, candidates are "barred from soliciting, accepting, or using contributions from" anyone but voters in their districts. Violating the rules brings appropriate penalties, and thorough, regular reporting requirements should prevent abuse.

SB1543 is fiscally responsible. This year the state has plenty of money to fund the 2024 general election cycle. In the future, if funds are insufficient, the program will not be run for that cycle. Amounts will be adjusted with any change in the consumer price index.

Publicly-funded elections will make you and future elected officials better at your jobs. You can spend your time meeting with many constituents, not just a few large donors. Owing only your voters lets you take a principled stand on every issue. You can work on the needs of all voters, not just a few moneyed interests. And you can spend more time doing your real job.

To qualify for public financing, candidates must show a broad base of support in their community (something incumbents already have). That makes any lawmaker more effective and more respected.

Public financing will make your campaign easier. No one likes asking individuals for large sums of money. Public financing will free you from fundraisers and countless phone calls. And the steps required to qualify will help you get to know your constituents better, so you can better speak to their concerns.

It will improve the state legislature overall. Public financing has been shown to increase the diversity

of candidates, including women and people of color, and to encourage interaction between candidates and low- and moderate-income communities. Our elected officials will no longer be just career politicians or people who know the right people, but regular folks from all walks of life—nurses, veterans, small business owners, teachers. Candidates can spend more time on ideas and less time raising money that tends to commit them to special interests.

SB1543 will serve the people who elected you far better than the current system. One of the primary reasons for public funding is to avoid situations like Oahu's rail boondoggle, and the myriad more subtle ways voters' money is wasted. The role of special interests in government decision making will be greatly reduced; the voices of regular people amplified. This is one reason that rates of participation in Clean Election systems are high. They decrease real or apparent conflicts of interest for elected officials.

Public financing will restore faith in our elections and political system. After six years of questions about the integrity of our elections, Americans' confidence in voting needs a boost. Fraud in elections has always been extremely rare, but the corrupting influence of money in politics—real and perceived—continues to erode our confidence in the system.

Finally, it will improve Hawaii's political reputation. Thirteen states use some form of publicly-funded elections, as do 20 local governments [2]. Hawaii's partial public funding program is woefully out of date and underused. With Supreme Court decisions like *Citizens United* deforming our campaigns, a robust public funding system is long overdue. Following our recent passage of reforms like Vote by Mail and Automatic Voter Registration, passing public funding will arguably make Hawaii the most forward-looking state in the union in terms of elections.

SB1543 is a thorough, well-conceived bill with an array of benefits. Common Cause Hawaii strongly urges the Finance Committee to pass it. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

The purpose of this bill is to establish a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in the State, to begin with the 2026 general election year. It requires the Campaign Spending Commission to submit a progress and final report to the Legislature, and it appropriates funds.

The Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct (the "Commission") had recommended a legislative proposal for partial public financing for elections. As several of the Commission members have previously noted, however, the Final Report of the Commission also specifically noted that "the increased amount of partial public funding of elections proposed in this (partial public funding) bill are intended as a floor, or minimum level. If fiscal resources are or become available, the Commission encourage the Legislature to be bold and devote additional fiscal resources to further the purpose of this bill and to seek additional permanent funding sources for future elections. Implementation of this proposal would assist in diminishing the impact and influence resulting from *Citizens United*."¹

We believe this bill clearly furthers the intent of the Commission's work and are pleased to support it.

Dear Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa & Committee Members,

Chamber of Sustainable Commerce testifies in support of SB1543 HD1, which establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in the State of Hawaii, to begin with the 2026 general election year, requires the Campaign Spending Commission to submit a progress and final report to the Legislature and appropriates funds.

As small business owners who believe we can strengthen our economy without hurting workers, consumers or the environment, we urge this committee to vote in favor of passing SB1543 HD1, because this bill brings us one step closer towards a democracy that protects small business owners, workers, consumers and the environment – and not just large corporate campaign donors who can afford to pay to play.

Developers, defense contractors, big pharma, agri-chemical corporations and others give incumbent candidates the max allowable contributions, then they hire lobbyists who give max contributions to these same candidates; and then some of those unchallenged incumbents buy max donation tickets to fundraisers for incumbents who have contested races; all of these max contributions quickly add up to a campaign war chest for the incumbent – that is almost impossible to challenge.

Furthermore, the campaigns of many legislative leaders have already benefited from state taxpayer money being funneled through state Grant-In-Aid (GIA) recipients that were hand-picked by legislative leaders with a portion of that money ending up in their campaign accounts. For examples of "GIA campaign kickbacks" take a look at how much taxpayer money went to GIA recipients Navatek and Chamber of Commerce Military Affairs Council and compare those numbers to campaign contributions from employees, consultants, lobbyists and family members of those GIA recipients. The legislature has exempted the millions of dollars of GIA awards from the Ethics Commission's oversight.

Kim Coco Iwamoto AQuA Rentals, LLC Honolulu Publicly financing campaigns through SB1543 HD1 gives candidates who are not receiving pay-to-play contributions or GIA kickbacks, a more equitable opportunity to educate voters in their district that they are viable candidates.

CSC urges this committee to **make the following amendments** to SB1543 HD1: 1) revert commencement to the 2024 election; 2) revert effective date to July 1, 2023; and 3) make sure minimum number of qualifying contributions (QCs) are accurately proportional to size of district and maximum public funding per race. HD1 is flawed in that 400 QCs are required for a state senate candidate to get \$100K but a governor candidate needs only 6,250 QCs to get \$2.5M. Since the governor's race covers 25 times the senate district, then governor candidates should be required to get 10,000 QCs. If this committee keeps the governor QCs at 6,250 then the state senate candidate should only have to get 250 QCs.

This bill offers just one step toward clean elections; the legislature should also make the following changes: cap the max allowable contribution at \$100 per donor per candidate, prohibit candidate campaigns from making contributions to other candidate campaigns and ensure the Ethics Commission has oversight over GIA recipients as the do other recipients of state funded contracts.

I want to thank Chair Yamashita for scheduling this hearing.

HULI PAC is in full support of SB1543! *This is a pivotal voting stance for every legislative leadership to show that the people and our environment matter more than corporate funds.*

We are eager and hopeful as each island, and its residents follow this bill in numbers we have not experienced, while most of our legislative leaders have supported this bill.

The States of Maine and Connecticut *and our own Hawaii County* have successfully implemented similar public funding systems with positive results that include increased voter turnout, greater electoral competition, more women candidates, and in general more diversity.

This is one of those bills that's truly important and represents systemic change. Some call publicly funded elections "The reform that makes all other reforms possible."

Who wouldn't stand for that?

It's crucially important that this body does everything in its power to remove the influence money has on our politics. Corruption is far too rampant in Hawai'i, and the pay-to-play behavior of our politicians needs to end now. Money in politics holds back progress on all the issues important to local working families: from affordable housing to cost of living, to protecting our environment, and more.

The Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct (CISC) recommended that the legislature should boost public funding for elections to help candidates avoid relying on financial support from large donors or special interest groups. The CISC endorses this bill as a means to achieve that goal.

SB1543 would set up a system of fully publicly financed elections. It would provide participating candidates with competitive amounts of funding they need to run an effective campaign, and would ban them from receiving any private donations at all. This system worked very well for Hawai'i County Council races in 2010 and 2012 and currently works very well statewide in places like Connecticut and Maine.

The benefits of this program would be enormous compared to its relatively small cost. Connecticut's program spent less than \$14 million during the last election cycle. Even with high participation rates amongst candidates, estimated expenses for Hawai'i are less than \$10 million per year, representing less than 0.1% of the state budget.

This is an opportunity to lessen the influence of money in politics, give political power to the people, and restore the people's trust in this body and in you all. These are all necessary, given that voters rank government corruption as one of the top three issues facing Hawai'i, and 74% of the Hawai'i voting public favors enacting publicly financed elections and ending the influence of corporate and private donations.

That's because we know that it's the single biggest thing we could do to end pay-to-play corruption in our politics and start building a Hawai'i that puts kama'āina and kānaka maoli, local people, first — not big money interests. Please, do the right thing.

Aloha Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa and Members of the Committee,

We support SB1543 SD2 HD1 which establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in the State.

It's crucially important that the legislature does everything in its power to remove the influence money has on politics. Candidates work for donations that create relationships that can cause corruption or the perception of it. Money is crucial to winning, for example 91% of candidates who outspend their opponent go on to win. Many elections are uncontested because potential candidates can't afford the high price tag. Furthermore the average house winner spends \$40,000 compared to only \$16,000 for the loser. Over half of all campaign donations in 2022 came from just 980 donors who each gave at least \$6,000.

Clean Elections will create a fairer system. Publicly financed elections will allow candidates to get support from their constituents rather than wealthy donors. As a result, elections will become more competitive with a more diverse set of candidates. Legislators will be free to act on behalf of voters without being concerned about what their donors think. Candidates will also be able to spend more time with constituents rather than fundraising. Furthermore, a system of fully publicly financed elections is supported by 74% of Hawai'i voters.

In addition to being good for our local democracy, the cost of this program is very small. At less than \$25 million, the program will cost less than 0.2% of the state budget. In fact, the state's current general funds balance of \$2.6 billion could pay for over 100 years of clean elections.

Publicly funded elections are already being successfully implemented locally and in other jurisdictions. Hawai'i Island County Council races had this program in 2010 and 2012. Connecticut and Maine have clean elections statewide which are both very popular and successful. Over 70% of Democratic legislators use this program in Maine. Connecticut's program was established to get money out of politics following large corruption scandals.



SB1543 SD2 HD1 would set up a system of fully publicly financed elections, a.k.a. clean elections. Committee members,

Mahalo for the opportunity to speak before you today. On behalf of Our Hawai'i's thousands of members and supports, I stand in strong support for Senate Bill 1543, relating to public financing of candidates to elected office. Our members and supporters are local people — kama'āina and kānaka maoli, keiki and kūpuna, from Kaua'i to Kohala, Kailua to Kapolei and every place in between. They have joined our movement to fight for a Hawai'i that puts local people — not big money interests — first, because they are deeply worried about the direction of our islands and believe now is the time for change.

Our supporters are not alone. Our corruption and public trust in government crisis has reached a tipping point. After years of the FBI putting our officials in handcuffs, resignations, and scandals, Hawai'i voters as a whole in this past election ranked government corruption as their number 3 top issue, only behind inflation and affordable housing, and 74% favor the adoption of a policy like SB1543 which would provide full public financing of elections and ban corporate and private donations. With public trust at an all time low, now is not time for band-aids, it's time for real solutions. While you all have advanced a number of important pieces of reform-minded legislation this session, none of them go far enough in addressing the overriding issue of money in our politics where it begins, in our elections.

SB1543 would go as far as is legally possible under the constitution, by providing a viable alternative for campaigning from the private-money driven status quo. It's a historic opportunity to get big money out of our elections, allow every day people an equal voice with the rich and powerful, and allow candidates and legislators like you all to be beholden only to their voters, their constituents, their values, and their conscience. No longer would legislators have to look over their shoulders, worried about how their donors who will fund their next campaign might react to each and every vote. They can be fully focused on delivering for their constituents, the people. That's how democracy is supposed to work!

And, we know that programs like this work: we've seen it in places like Connecticut, Maine, and now Seattle. And we know it's popular. In addition to previously mentioned strong public support, the bill has the backing of the state Democratic Party, current and former legislators from both the Republican and Democratic Parties, support from dozens of leading organizations in Hawai'i, was introduced by a historic 40% of legislators in both chambers, and now has passed the Senate in a bipartisan manner on a nearly unanimous vote. And we know we have the resources: the program would cost less than 0.1% of the state budget and could be funded with our current surplus alone for 100-250 years or more. On that manner, I've attached a memo on the cost of the program to my testimony which was previously sent to all House members on the day of Senate passage.

We have the policy. We have the resources. We have the public desire for change. The only question is do we have the political will? That will be up to you to make it so. As you deliberate, know the public is watching.



Democracy Is Worth It, Pass Clean Elections Now

Today, SB1543 to fully fund publicly financed "clean elections" officially passed the Hawai'i Senate with a vote of 23-1. This historic and transformational legislation, which would help put an end to pay-to-play corruption as we know it in our islands, now heads over to the Hawai'i House of Representatives where House Leadership, relevant Committee Chairs, and all House members will decide its fate.

The premise of this Clean Elections legislation is simple, but its impact would be profound: allow candidates who demonstrate adequate grassroots support from their community access to competitive public funds to run their campaigns, and in exchange, prohibit them from raising or spending private dollars. Through this program, more and more candidates could be elected only being accountable to their voters, not to private donors. As a result the influence of big money in our politics would wane, as has been the case in Connecticut, Maine, and other places that have implemented similar systems.

There are many, many reasons to pass and implement a Clean Elections system. It's <u>sound</u> <u>policy</u>. It's got the backing of <u>dozens of organizations</u>, <u>current and former politicians</u>, <u>scholars</u>, <u>and advocates</u>. It's favored by <u>74% of voters</u>. As the legislation now advances to the House and its respective committees, and the potential of a change to the status quo becomes more possible, some people might ask what a program like this will cost. We want to share the facts, and highlight how inexpensive Clean Elections would be. We hope legislators will agree: *democracy is a worthy investment*.

Fact #1 — Clean Elections would not be costly: Our estimates show that this program would likely cost the state *less than \$10 million per year, less than 0.1% of the overall general budget.* With an over \$2.6 billion surplus in state coffers this year, Hawai'i could pay for over 260 years of Clean Elections. Even if the program somehow ended up costing \$25 million/year, we could pay for over 100 years of Clean Elections with this year's surplus alone. This was supported in a recent <u>UHERO brief</u> which found that a "robust system of public funding...could be supported by a relatively modest appropriation from general funds." *See our charts below for further breakdown.*

Fact #2 — We have the resources: The House "Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct states in its final report, "If fiscal resources are or become available, the Commission encourages the Legislature to be bold and devote additional fiscal resources to further the purpose of [publicly financed elections] and to seek additional permanent funding sources for

future elections." This is that moment. With a historic surplus and a number of new revenue-raising proposals such as Marijuana Legalization and the Green Fee advancing, now is the time to be bold and invest in our democracy and the public trust.

Fact #3 — Clean Elections have been cheap and effective in other states: The following are clean election costs for House and Senate races in Connecticut and Maine who have been running clean election programs for over a decade.

Connecticut Costs: Connecticut's participation has slowly grown from 1.45 participating candidates per seat to 1.73 from 2008 to 2020. Their annual cost is currently just below \$6.8 million. With a population of 3.6 million people, that is a cost of \$1.65 per person per year.

Maine Costs: Maine had strong participation with 1.68 legislative candidates per seat using clean elections in 2006. However, just over 1 candidate per open seat uses the program now. The annual cost of the program is currently just below \$2.3 million.With a population of 1.38 million people, that is a cost of \$1.65 per person per year.

SB1543 Cost Estimate Breakdown: Clean Elections for Hawai'i: The following estimates assume 2 candidates per office. This number was chosen conservatively, because it exceeds the average number of actual candidates in other states. In addition this figure is similar to or exceeds the current number of candidates in Hawai'i for most races. Costs per election are

calculated by multiplying the number of candidates by the max amount of funds available for that office. The annual cost is calculated by dividing the cost per election by how often the elections occur. Seats that have 2-year terms divide the cost per election by 2. Seats that have 4-year terms divide the cost per election by 4, except annual Senate costs are calculated based on 3 elections every 10 years. The totals for scenarios beyond 2 participants per seat are included at the bottom. 3 candidates per seat along with excluding some high cost races are provided. No matter how you cut it, this is a program we can afford. With rampant corruption at the top of voters' minds, the question should be: can legislators afford not to make this change?

I am writing in strong support of SB 1543, SD 2, HD 1.

I had the privilege of serving on the Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct (CISC) last year, which was convened by Speaker Saiki in the wake of the federal indictment of two veteran lawmakers.

The <u>CISC Final Report</u> states that, should resources become avialable, the Legislature should "be bold [and] seek additional permanent funding sources for future elections." This could include an increase in the amount that that can be "checked off" on state income tax forms under HRS Section 235-102.5(a).

The Hawai'i Election Campaign Fund (HECF) is currently under ulitized, with <u>a recent policy brief from the</u> <u>Economic Research Organization at the University of Hawai'i (UHERO)</u> observing that partial funding programs are generally "ineffective."

The UHERO report also finds that "most scholarship shows that generous public financing programs increase electoral competition, contribute to greater diversity among candidates and donors, and encourage more contact between office-seekers and voters."

Recent experiences with Hawai'i County Council elections in 2010 and 2012 indicate that implementation of a fully financed program can be successful with adequate funding.

Moving toward a full public financing of electoral contests in Hawai'i will not eliminate the influence of money so long as *Citizens United* remains in force. However, public financing can give those candidates with community support the opportunity to be competitive.

Former Gov. George Ariyoshi put it very well in his most recent volume, Hawai'i's Future (2020):

I hope that we do not give up on campaign reform.... Most people are sick of the campaign finance system. That includes business people. While the average voter may look at large campaign contributions as a means of achieving undue advantage, many a businessperson resents the inherent pressure exerted by political campaigns. [We] have a regulatory Campaign Spending Commission with all the right elements, and its role is widely accepted. We now need an enlightened discussion and a purposeful movement for more far-reaching reforms. This is a leadership challenge waiting for a group of emerging legislators to take action.

Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and Committee Members:

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii wants to thank the Committee Chairs and members for hearing this valuable and popular bill.

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly supports SB1543 SD2 HD1 which Establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in the State, to begin with the 2026 general election year; Requires the Campaign Spending Commission to submit a progress and final report to the Legislature; and appropriates funds. We also offer comments.

The League of Women Voters of the United States believes that methods of financing political campaigns should enhance political equality for all citizens; protect representative democracy from being distorted by big spending in election campaigns; ensure the public's right to know who is using money to influence elections; enable candidates to compete equitably for public office; ensure that candidates have sufficient funds to communicate their messages to the public; and combat corruption and undue influence in government.

Delegates and voters in the 1978 Constitutional Convention in Hawaii realized the importance of this concept, resulting in the creation of the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund and Hawaii's partial public funding option. Below is a quote from the Convention during the discussion of the HECF: "... if we think these tremendous sums being spent [on elections], these tremendous sums being contributed, are not sums for which we are going to ultimately pay because of poor government ... and because of undue influence ... we are fooling ourselves." -Delegate Naomi Campbell during the 1978 Constitutional Convention.

Who funds privately funded elections? Wealthy businesses and individuals. Over half of all Hawaii campaign donations in 2022 came from just 980 donors who each gave at least \$6,000^{1.} (The sources of campaign contributions changed markedly in Connecticut legislative races after implementation of full public funding. In 2018, 99% of campaign funds used by legislative candidates came from individuals, in sharp contrast to preprogram practices when less than half of the contributions made to political candidates came from individuals.²)

Why could this be a problem? **The affluent have different priorities:** 68 percent of the general public believes politicians ought to see to it that everyone who wants to work can find a job, while only 19 percent of the wealthy believe the same; the general public is twice as likely to support raising the minimum wage high enough to keep families out of poverty as affluent respondents; a majority of Americans think that wealth should be taxed at the same rate as work, but the wealthiest 20% of Americans, who are most likely to make substantial contributions to political campaigns, are those most likely to profit from low taxes on capital gains.³

The broader public is short-changed by policies which may be influenced by wealthy business interests. Publicly funded elections let the voting public have more influence on political decisions, **as is widely appreciated by voters**. A survey of Hawaii voters in 2022 showed that 74% of the Hawai'i voting public would be more likely to support a candidate who refused campaign donations from out-of-state developers, major landowners, hotel conglomerates, and energy companies; 70 percent of voters were more likely to support a candidate who refused donations from lobbyists and corporate PACs.⁴ When large contributions are made by business interests, it's likely that the **customers of those businesses indirectly pay, in higher prices, for these contributions.** Again, the **public pays for the costs of privately funded election**

campaigns. When candidates are funded by the public, politicians are free to make decisions based on the merit of ideas, not biased, consciously or not, by consideration of who gave or will give money to their election campaigns.

The costs to implement Full Public Funding of Elections are reasonable and affordable. Connecticut's program spent less than \$14 million during the last election cycle. Even with high participation rates amongst candidates, estimated expenses for Hawai'i are less than \$10 million per year, representing less than 0.1% of the state budget.⁵

Connecticut's Citizen's Elections program (CEP) shows how **full public funding can repay its cost:** "For many years, environmentalists tried to expand the bottle bill recycling program..., but the powerful beverage industry and its paid lobbyists were able to stop every effort at reform because they gave thousands of dollars to legislators. This year (2016), the legislature—with three-quarters of members having participated in the CEP—voted... to reclaim millions of dollars' worth of unclaimed bottle deposits, ... approximately \$25 million a year out of the pockets of the beverage industry and into the general fund. This alone recoups more money than the CEP costs".²

Instead of fundraising, candidates can spend more time talking to their constituents or analyzing and discussing solutions to Hawaii's problems as quoted by CT state legislators.²

SB1543 SD2 HD1 will support a more diverse field of candidates. Currently people without wealth or wealthy families and friends, who may be politically akamai and interested in running for office, often feel (probably rightly) that they will not be able to conduct winning campaigns, since 90% of races in nationally and in Hawaii are won by the candidate who spends most in an election contest.

These campaign finance objectives, which I believe are widely shared, lead directly to recommending full and realistic public financing of election campaigns and supporting SB1543 SD2 HD1.

Comments: 1) We recommend that the amounts to be appropriated in Sections 6 and 7 of SB1543 SD2 HD1 be restored to the amounts in SB1543 SD1. **2)** On page

20, lines 1-5, of SB1543 SD2 HD1, dollar amounts are (presumably inadvertently)

missing.

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly urges this Committee to pass this bill.

I am Colin Moore, a political scientist and professor at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. I am also the author of a UHERO report on public campaign financing available for download here: https://uhero.hawaii.edu/wp-content/uploads/2023/02/Public-Campaign-Financing.pdf

I strongly support SB 1543, SD2, HD1. It follows the successful model of public campaign financing currently used in the states of Arizona, Maine, and Connecticut.

There are three principal reasons why I support this bill:

1. Research shows that block grant programs can increase electoral competition and lead to more candidates running for public office. More competitive elections often lead to stronger voter mobilization and communication efforts. Arizona's public financing program has been shown to reduce ballot "roll off," which is the tendency of voters to leave ballots blank for less-visible legislative and municipal races.

2. These programs have been shows to contribute to greater diversity among candidates for public office. The advent of Connecticut's full funding program led to the election of more Latinos and women to the legislature. In Arizona, far more Native American and Latino candidates ran for office than before.

3. Perhaps most important, public financing eliminates the need to raise private Funds. This may make candidates less beholden to donors, but it also allows them to spend more time connecting with voters and discussing public policy. For example, when candidates in Maine were freed from the pressures of fund-raising, they spent more extra time canvassing and attending community events. In one survey of office-seekers, respondents frequently mentioned this benefit as a primary reason they decided to accept public funds. This bill is good for candidates and good for citizens.

Finally, I know that cost is a concern, but even if we assume very high levels of participation, this program is unlikely to cost more than \$10 million per year. In Connecticut, the program cost about \$13.5 million for the entire 2020 election; in Maine it cost \$4.5 million in 2022.

Chair Yamashita, Vice-Chair Kitagawa, and Committee Members:

I strongly support SB 1543, SD2 HD1, which would establish a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in the State of Hawaii, beginning with the 2026 general election year.

Public funding for candidates, not political parties, should be available for all State and County elective offices in both the primary and general elections. One common sense reason is that reciprocity (responding to a positive action with another positive action) is normal social behavior for people, including politicians. But research shows that while politicians may claim autonomy from the feelings of obligation associated with gifts and favors that influence everyone else, they are also susceptible.¹

This year's House "Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct (CISC) recommended that the legislature provide funds to candidates, "because public funding expands the reach of many small donors and can relieve candidates of the need to rely on the support of special interest groups or large donors." SB1543 could contribute toward these objectives while helping to restore confidence that Hawaii's elected officials are not unduly influenced by private lobbyists and campaign donors.

Some people have objected to this bill on the basis that future publicly funded candidates would not have to devote the time and energy to raising private campaign money in the same way incumbent elected officials have. While this may be true, full public campaign financing is a better approach, providing political opportunity for anyone who is not wealthy or does not have access to wealth through conventional fundraising. Since candidates are required to raise qualifying contributions sufficient to demonstrate they are viable candidates, public investment in their candidacy is warranted.

The HD1 version of this measure requires that there be a minimum of \$30 million in the Hawaii Election campaign fund before any funds are disbursed for the program described in this bill. It is impossible to know with certainty what the initial "take up rate" would be for the proposed program, and this probably explains concerns about the adequacy of

this appropriation, or whether \$30 million would be too large an appropriation. But this ignores the fact that there will be a period of evaluation following an initial public investment, and this evaluation centers around the Legislature's normal budgeting review process, where our elected representatives can weigh in on the advisability (and affordability) of the next round of campaign financing.

In addition to the initial appropriation to the fund, the original version of this bill authorized \$200 thousand from this fund for fiscal year 2023-24 and \$200 thousand for fiscal year 2024-25 to prepare for elections taking place in 2024. I defer to the Campaign Spending Commission on the adequacy of these amounts, but it is essential to provide additional staff for the Campaign Spending Commission for the new and broader mission they would carry under this bill. If the measure does not take effect until the General Election of 2026, these amounts and dates need to be adjusted accordingly.

It is my sincere hope that the spending limits for elective offices described in the bill will be accepted by potential candidates. Hawaii is searching for a "sweet spot," where candidates find the limits adequate, but taxpayers are not overly burdened. Other states like Maine have successfully taken the plunge, so Hawaii can learn from their success.

The U.S. Supreme Court in its "Citizens United," ruling has already decided that spending limits are unconstitutional unless candidates accept public funding. Let's try a different path here in Hawaii - a public financing program that helps reduce the escalating cost of campaigns, eliminating the reliance on big contributions from wealthy donors. Let's also make it likely that qualified first-time candidates without wealth or access to wealth could be more confident about paying for campaign expenses.

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair and Committee Members,

I am in STRONG SUPPORT of publicly funded elections, but I have a number of concerns about this bill as currently written that I want to express before you pass this important legislation.

1) I think the start date is a decade overdue. Since we can't go back in time, let's begin sooner, rather than later--in 2024, not 2026. I know that the CSC will need a chance to catch up with these proposed changes and there will be a learning curve, but what better way for candidates to get a chance to test it out and figure out what is working and what isn't than to jump into it and then work out the issues as they come up.

2) I disagree with the decision to move all races to a 200 minimum of qualifying contributions and believe that those running in counties with smaller population numbers should have to seek fewer qualifying contributions, potentially as few as 100 for those counties with the least population.

3) I believe requiring a signature from the contributors is perfectly reasonable, as long as the CSC is comfortable with the added requirements of verifying signatures. Also is there some mechanism available to accept electronic signatures? Some candidates fundraise using social media/websites/email and to limit them to only accept "wet" signatures and paper money/checks is a significant limitation. I am reading wording that suggests that an electronic form of payment made in accordance with procedures approved by the commission will allow for electronic signatures as well and am just looking for verification that is something that feels doable for the CSC to keep track of, and that an electronic option can be utilized.

4) Last, but possibly MOST importantly, if the amounts in Section 11-G, specifically for County Council races in counties with populations between 195,000 and 499,999 aren't raised for races that are contested it will not really be providing support for a fair and competitive race between those who choose to use public funds and those who don't. I would advise that when taking averages of prior spending amounts in races that ONLY races that had competitive challengers be factored in. Also the amounts from the 2022 races should be included for the most accurate picture of what it currently costs to run a competitive race in both the primary and general election in that category. I have not evaluated all of the funds proposed in all of the races, but this is one I am familiar with and can attest that the proposed maximum of \$20,000 is less than

half that would be needed to truly run a competitive race in the current political climate in our County.

Chair Yamashita, Vice-Chair Kitagawa and Members of the Finance Committee:

It's crucially important that we remove the impact money has on our elections. Just like other positions within government, elected officials should not be dependent upon private donations to stay in their seat. We now need a robust full public financing of elections system as in SB1543.

We Need Money Out Of Politics Now

The influence that money has on our elections needs to end. If we want our government officials to act on behalf of its residents rather than those who fund their campaigns, we need to end the current system. The potential for corruptive behavior is too large when people are giving thousands of dollars every year to help get legislators elected.

Money is incredibly crucial in our elections, as candidates who outspend their opponents win at a 91% rate. Of all campaign donations candidates received in the 2022 election cycle, over half of the money was given by just 980 donors who gave at least \$6,000 each. This massive political power by a small group is not democratic.

Too many candidates are reliant on their donors to stay in office and an even larger number of potential candidates don't have the wealthy donor connections that are needed to win. This is a formula for uncompetitive elections and elected officials that respond to a few private interests rather than the public at large.

Reasonable Cost

Hawai'i County Council races had a very successful public funding program in 2010 and 2012. Both Connecticut and Maine have statewide public funding programs that are hugely popular. Over 60% of all legislators in Maine and 80% in Connecticut participate in their program and receive no private donations.

This amazing policy can be implemented for a reasonable price. Connecticut's system was established as a response to their huge corruption scandals and with more than twice our population still costs them less than \$14 million per election cycle. The charts below show that even with high participation rates the cost for Hawai'i should average less than \$10 million per year. This would be less than 0.1% of the state budget or less than \$7 per person.

The following cost estimates assume 2 candidates per office. This number was chosen because it exceeds the number of eligible candidates in other states with full public financing of elections. In addition this figure is similar to or exceeds the current number of candidates in Hawai'i for most races. Costs per election are calculated by multiplying the number of candidates by the max amount of funds available for that office. The annual cost is calculated by dividing the cost per election by how often the elections occur. Seats that have 2-year terms divide the cost per election by 2. Seats that have 4-year terms divide the cost per election by 4, except annual Senate costs are calculated based on 3 elections every 10 years. The totals for scenarios beyond 2 participants per seat are included at the bottom. 3 candidates per seat along with excluding some high cost races are provided.

Good Afternoon, my name is David McCluskey, a former 6 term Connecticut State Representative and one of the members of then-Governor Rell's Campaign Finance Reform Working Group.

I am honored to testify in support of Senate Bill 1543 concerning Public Financing For Candidates To Elected Office. I am excited that the legislation passed the Senate and hope your Committee and the full House will give it your strongest consideration with any needed revisions. Of course, the House is always more democratic - small D - and in touch with residents than the "upper" chamber!

In 2005, Connecticut became the first state in the nation where legislative incumbents passed a full public financing law that applies to their own political campaigns. Every state has unique legislative and political environments and I am not here to tell you to simply adopt Connecticut's Public Financing law which has been modified, for both good and for bad, since its inception. However, I am testifying that our system works. It has significantly reduced the influence of large moneyed interests in our legislative deliberations and it has made our elections more democratic by having more competition in our primaries and elections. Earlier this year, CT's State Elections Enforcement Commission (SEEC)'s Executive Director Michael J. Brandi recently submitted testimony in our Government Administration and Elections Committee that candidates have strongly embraced public financing with: "participation rates nearing 90 or 100% for many offices."

Since the 1800s, Connecticut has been called the land of steady habits. Change continues to be very hard in my state and asking legislators who know how to get reelected under the existing rules to adopt new campaign financing rules was particularly tough. But we were successful after a lot of struggle both inside and outside our State Capitol. Hawai'i can and should enact public financing of elections to improve the credibility of the legislative process for your state residents and to free legislators from the increasingly chaotic and escalating rules to raise funds.

In Connecticut, candidates must raise small to moderate amounts from residents in the towns they represent. Once they reach the necessary number of in-district contributions and the necessary dollar amount, the state provides them with a reasonable amount to campaign. This process is heavily regulated by SEEC to prevent fraud and abuse. Asking your family, friends and neighbors for reasonable contributions is actually very liberating. I am not burdening them multiple times in a campaign for more and more money. Instead of spending an enormous amount of time raising dollars, I can spend it talking to voters.

Since Public Financing has been adopted, there has not been wholescale ouster of incumbents as was feared. Yes, some incumbents do lose in primaries and general elections, but mostly because they are no longer in touch with their voters, a policy issue or an economic situation, NOT because their opponent was publically funded. Yes, our system can punish incumbent complacency, but their opponent is equally funded, no more, no less. Incumbents still have the advantage in elections if they are doing their job and are talking to their constituents.

In terms of legislative deliberations, incumbents can now vote their convictions and without having to worry as much about being punished in re-election campaigns by well-healed lobbyists and interest groups who used to provide the lion's share of campaign dollars. Again, this is very liberating to most incumbents and has, in my opinion, significantly improved policy outcomes for Connecticut residents.

In conclusion, I strongly urge the House to adopt public financing for Hawai'i's state legislative races. I would be happy to answer your questions.

Honorable Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa and House Finance Committee members, I am Dr. Joe Ritter and am testifying as a private citizen with comments on SB1543.

If this committee in its wisdom decides to pass this bill, I respectfully request an amendment.

A premise of this bill is that candidates who opt in must collect many small donations. In a typical local district House race for example on Maui, the bill would require knocking on doors for a large fraction of the required 200 donations. I point out that 14% of our society is mobility disabled and that number is growing. Indeed many of us here will experience this in our lifetime. I myself had a broken spine. I stand here today for those unable to stand.

In Hawai'i, much campaigning is done by door knocking. Many mobility disabled candidates may be unable to walk up long or steep driveways in my district, <u>or walk at all</u> to solicit donations.

Thus this bill as written imposes a disparate, uneven challenge on those with a mobility disability. In an enlightened society this is not acceptable. I therefore respectfully suggest there may need to be an amendment, to use the legal term from the 1990 Federal ADA law, for "Reasonable Accommodation" of mobility disabled candidates.

I don't need to remind the committee of invaluable contributions to our society of smart mobility disabled people like Democratic President Franklin Roosevelt who served from his wheelchair, Physicist Dr. Stephen Hawking, or heroes like Democratic Senator Tammy Duckworth.

I respectfully suggest that to make this bill compliant with the principle of equality, and possibly with federal law, that if the chair and committee in their wisdom pass it, that it be amended to fairly adjust for mobility disabilities.

For the mobility disabled (1 out of 7 in our aging population) door knocking may be 10x as hard. As a compromise for legal reasonable accommodation I would suggest that the \$5 donation number requirement be reduced by 66% for those with a certified mobility disability, and for that, verification and certification be required by Hawai'i licensed M.D. or by a federal agency in order to maintain the absolute integrity of the process.

I thank you for considering this amendment, and the fundamental principle of equality and equity in our unique and outstanding democratic system which we are all here to support.

that voters rank government corruption as one of the top three issues facing Hawai'i, and 74% of the Hawai'i voting public favors enacting public financed elections and ending the influence of corporate and private donations.

I am aware of the major argument against this kind of bill is that it 'limits free speech', which makes a moral equivalency of bribes with people doing with their money what they wish to do with their money. As there are people who wish to make bribes with their money, I believe this 'free speech' argument is a hollow one. It also has nothing to do with 'socializing' election campaigns, as people can choose to donate to public financing or not, as they see fit. I believe the 'free speech' argument is mostly conducted by those who are afraid they will lose their easy access to candidates to push forth agendas without any concern of democratic principles, for at the very least, every person's vote should only count as one vote, not each dollar spent equals one dollar, hence a donation of a million dollars from one actually is a million times more powerful. This does not sound like democracy, this sounds like oligarchy.

The single biggest thing we can do to end pay-to-play corruption in our politics and start building a Hawai'i that puts kama'āina and kānaka maoli, local people, first — not big money interests.

My only major caveat is that I would like to see this bill enforced in the 2024 election, and not passed on to the election three years from now.

Considering the rampant corruption that is taking place nationally with coffers being lined up with dark money on both sides of the aisle, this kind of reform needs to be done now, not down the line sometime. If this addendum were included I would consider this to be a perfect bill.

However, this bill's referrendum is better than what we have at the moment and I believe this is important to implement even as is.

Please, do the right thing and pass SB 1543 SD2 HD1.
