Chairs Keohokalole and Dela Cruz and Members of the Committees:

The Department of the Attorney General (Department) opposes this bill and offers the following comments.

The purpose of this bill is to allow for the personal use of small amounts of cannabis, and establish regulations regarding the cultivation, sale, and use of cannabis. The Department has serious law-enforcement concerns regarding preventing unlicensed activity and notes that the bill has several provisions that could present confusion.

Further Preparation Is Needed to Develop Adequate Regulations

This bill creates a new regulatory body called the Hawaii Cannabis Regulatory Authority (HCRA) to oversee the regulation and licensing of cannabis in the State (page 13, lines 4-13). The HCRA has the power of the Department of Health (DOH) and appears to be comprised solely of DOH personnel. It does not appear to have criminal law-enforcement authority or personnel equipped to prevent unlicensed or unauthorized activity. Challenges with unlicensed medical-cannabis operators in Hawaii illustrate that regulating licensed entities without enforcing unauthorized actions is not enough to ensure a well-regulated program. Further, while the Act 169, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, Dual Use of Cannabis Task Force submitted a report to the Legislature in December 2022, the report did not address the potential costs of adequately regulating Testimony of the Department of the Attorney General Thirty-Second Legislature, 2023 Page 2 of 4

an adult-use market. The report focused on impacts to medical-cannabis patients and did not identify or study issues relating to community safety, protection of minors, and enforcing laws against unlicensed cannabis operators. The Department respectfully requests that this bill be deferred to allow for further study and discussion of these issues.

Should the Committees be inclined to recommend passage of this bill, the Department offers the following additional concerns.

Expungement of Criminal Records Will Require Time and Resources

The bill adds a new section to chapter 706, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), to establish a criminal-record expungement program to be run by the Department. *See* page 27, line 7, through page 32, line 4. The program would require the Attorney General, by January 1, 2026, to "order the automatic expungement of the records relating to the arrest, criminal charge, or conviction, as appropriate" (page 28, lines 8-10). The term "automatic" is misleading and can be construed to mean the expungement process takes a minimal amount of time to complete. The current expungement process is not automated—it is a manual process undertaken by one full-time employee. To research one expungement application to determine if a complete expungement or a partial expungement is granted can take anywhere from two hours to multiple days.

If this bill were to pass, approximately 288,000 charges would need to be reviewed. Of that number, 236,000 would need additional research outside of the Department to determine the type of drug involved in each charge as this information is not specified in the criminal history record information system. Therefore, significant resources would be necessary to create and run this expungement program. Additionally, creating a computerized process is estimated to require at least two years and a minimum of one-thousand hours to develop.

We recommend that the expungement process not be changed or altered, requiring the individuals who qualify under this proposed bill to apply for an expungement, either to the Department or courts, in order to seal the expungement record. provision, the Department requests an additional appropriation be made to cover the expenses of developing a computerized system for a more automated expungement process.

Specific Penalties for Unlicensed Activity are Needed

The bill gives broad authority to the HCRA to adopt rules that include "[c]ivil penalties for the failure to comply with the rules" (page 25, lines 1-3) and "[s]pecific penalties such as the imposition of fines or suspension or revocation of a license" (page 25, lines 1-2). However, there are no provisions regarding penalties for unlicensed activities. We recommend including civil penalties for unlicensed activity in statute to enable the HCRA to better deal with unlicensed cannabis cultivation that exceeds the allowed personal use, as well as unlicensed processing and sale of cannabis and cannabis products. The Department would be happy to work with the Legislature to draft provisions that would accomplish this.

Land Use and Property Rights Need Clarification

It is unclear whether land-use laws or county ordinances can prohibit or otherwise regulate certain activities done by cannabis licensees. The bill permits "[I]easing or otherwise allowing the use of property owned, occupied, or controlled by any person, corporation, or other entity for any of the activities conducted lawfully in accordance with this section" (page 12, lines 4-7). While the bill specifies that this wording shall not interfere with private-property owners' rights to regulate or prohibit cannabis activity on their property (page 26, line 18 through page 27, line 6), there is no mention of public land-use regulations. This could present an issue if a cultivation licensee wants to grow cannabis in a residential neighborhood, or if a licensee wants to process cannabis products using chemicals that would otherwise be prohibited by zoning ordinances. If the intent is to clarify that licensed activities cannot be prohibited by regulations or ordinances based solely on the fact that they relate to cannabis, the Department stands ready to work with the Legislature to draft provisions that would accomplish this. The Effective Date Should Be Delayed To Allow Time For Rules To Be Created For The Pilot Period

The bill proposes a pilot period of at least two years where the current medical dispensaries operate as "dual-use" dispensaries (page 21, line 8, through page 23, line 4). The HCRA may "prescribe forms, procedures and requirements as necessary to facilitate the operation of medical cannabis dispensaries as dual use cannabis dispensaries" (page 22, lines 11-15). These forms, procedures, and requirements would need to be in rules. While this bill allows for the "forms, procedures and requirements" to be exempt from chapter 91, HRS, it will still take time to draft these rules. In order to ensure cannabis consumers have a safe and regulated supply of cannabis that does not come from illicit sources, the HCRA will need adequate time to promulgate the requirements for dual-use dispensaries. Furthermore, the dual-use dispensaries will need adequate time to locate cultivation and retail space, cultivate an adequate supply of cannabis, and open retail locations that are separate from the current medical locations. For these reasons, we recommend delaying the effective date of the bill for at least one year from the date of passage.

Clerical error

Finally, we note than on page 51, line 13, of the bill, the words "of hearing" may have inadvertently been used instead of "or hearing." The Department recommends the section read as follows:

§B-13 Investigations; contempt; fees. The director of taxation, and any representative of the director duly authorized by the director, shall have the authority to conduct any civil audit or criminal investigation, investigation, <u>or</u> hearing relating to the taxes in this section in the manner provided in section 231-7.

The Department opposes the passage of this bill for the law enforcement concerns stated above and respectfully requests that this bill be held. Thank you for the opportunity to testify and provide comments.

Chairs Keohokalole and Dela Cruz and Members of the Committees:

My name is Iris Ikeda, and I am the Commissioner of Financial Institutions, Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (Department), Division of Financial Institutions (DFI). The Department is providing comments on this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to establishes regulations for the cultivation, sale, and personal use of small amounts of cannabis; decriminalizes and regulates small amounts of cannabis for personal use; and establishes taxes for cannabis sales.

The Department does not take a position on whether cannabis should be allowed for adult use, but is providing comments on access to banking products and services for businesses and consumers should Hawaii move to expand the cannabis laws. As the use of cannabis expands, access to banking products may become more problematic.

Since the medical cannabis law was enacted in 2016, we have been in discussion with banks and credit unions about how to offer banking services to cannabis

related businesses. In 2016, banks were closing or threatening to close accounts for related service providers. We worked with banks individually to request they monitor consumer accounts for federal illegal activity. To mitigate some of the inflow of cash, Governor Ige offered a suggested mobile phone app for safe use by consumers and medical cannabis companies. This phone app is still used by some consumers.

For DFI, if the services provided for the medical cannabis business is just ONE of the many business clients, banks have allowed the continued banking relationship to these service providers. Today, banking services are available for related cannabis service providers like accountants, construction, plumbers, electricians, lawyers, etc. There is no banking services available for the medical dispensaries. All of the medical dispensaries have banking services provided by an out-of-state financial institution.

The reason banks in Hawaii have not provided banking services is because several federal laws prohibit banks from engaging in activity with businesses deemed illegal by federal banking laws such as the Bank Secrecy Act / Anti Money Laundering Act, and the Controlled Substances Act. In the banking industry the laws using the federal payment system for illegal activity, prohibits banking services for illegal activity and provides for personal liability and incarceration.

Although we were able to work with other states to have a federal budget bill proviso that does not allow federal money to be allocated to prevent any state from implementing its own medical marijuana law, this proviso must be included with every federal budget act. It's impermanency does not provide banks the needed reliance to provide banking services.

Other alternatives have been explored. A State bank charter was explored; however, it is difficult to get a state bank charter for two main reasons. First, Hawaii laws require FDIC insurance before a bank can get chartered. Second, the bank also needs a master account / certificate to use the federal payment system for debit cards, ACH, and deposits into an account. Two companies have applied to get a bank charter for cannabis related businesses, but no financial institution has been granted a master account by the federal reserve and the FDIC has not granted insurance to the companies. The digital currency option was explored to facilitate payments. A couple of states allow digital currency payments for cannabis. However, digital currency's inherent volatility and high transaction costs make it a poor substitute for cash. Converting the digital currency units to fiat may expose the cannabis business to capital-gains tax or lose value when it comes time to "cash in" to pay rent or other expenses. As we have recently seen, digital currency companies have shut down suddenly.

In conclusion, without banking services in Hawaii for cannabis companies, the use of cash will be more prolific. Banking services are available for service providers and consumers. Banks and financial institutions are waiting for action by Congress to allow banking services for cannabis related businesses.

1 Fiscal Implications: This measure will require additional resources and may impact the

2 priorities identified in the Governor's Executive Budget Request for the Department of Health's

3 appropriations and personnel priorities. As currently drafted, the Department will require

4 additional resources for: (1) increased regulatory oversight of the dispensary licensing system;

5 (2) implementation of a pre-legalization public education campaign; (3) implementation of data

6 collection and surveillance activities to establish a baseline of cannabis-related health impacts

7 prior to adult-use legalization; and (4) administrative support. These are estimated at an annual

8 cost of \$5,305,163 for FY24 and \$709,786 for FY25, and include five (5) new permanent, full-

9 time dispensary surveyor ("Investigator V") positions; one (1) new permanent, full-time Chemist

10 V position; one (1) new permanent, full-time Microbiologist V position; one (1) new permanent,

11 full-time Planner V position; one (1) new permanent, full-time Office Assistant IV position;

12 supplemental mileage, interisland travel, training; an electronic licensing system to augment the

existing seed-to-sale tracking system; a comprehensive pre-legalization public education

14 campaign; establishment of a surveillance system for monitoring health impacts; and office space

15 and furniture to accommodate the increased staffing.

16 **Department Testimony:** The Department of Health (DOH) provides comments on S.B. 669

17 SD1 which proposes to: (1) establish regulations for the cultivation, sale, and personal use of

small amounts of cannabis; (2) decriminalize and regulate small amounts of cannabis for

personal use; (3) establish taxes for cannabis sales; and (4) reduce unregulated and illicit sales of
 cannabis by unlicensed entities.

DOH appreciates the SD1 amendments to prevent exposure to secondhand smoke and the 3 renormalization of smoking which remain strong public health concerns because of the 4 substantial evidence that cannabis smoke contains many of the same cancer-causing chemicals as 5 tobacco smoke.^{1,2,3,4,5} These SD1 amendments include: specifying that the personal use of 6 cannabis by vaping or smoking shall be regulated in accordance with the State's smoking laws 7 under chapter 328J, HRS; specifying that personal use of cannabis shall be prohibited on any 8 9 location where smoking is prohibited; and adding language that allows condominiums to restrict 10 or prohibit the smoking of cannabis in the same manner they may restrict or prohibit the smoking of tobacco on the property. 11

DOH also appreciates the SD1 amendment to clarify that during the pilot period, the necessary forms, procedures, and requirements shall be exempt from chapter 91, HRS. This will facilitate the implementation of any new procedures that may be required to allow licensed medical cannabis dispensaries to cultivate, process, manufacture, transport, and sell cannabis and manufactured cannabis products as a dual use cannabis dispensary during the pilot period.

DOH also appreciates the SD1 amendment requiring the Hawaii Cannabis Regulatory Authority
to track the cultivation, processing, and sale of cannabis and cannabis products. This will assure
that no cannabis is diverted from the system in alignment with federal priorities.

DOH greatly appreciates that the SD1 version retains the prohibition against "flavored e-liquids
and juices containing cannabis for vaporizing devices." While many flavorings and additives
may be safe for oral ingestion, few, if any have been demonstrated as safe for inhalation as was
highlighted by the outbreak of e-cigarette, or vaping, product use-associated lung injury
(EVALI), which caused 2,807 hospitalized cases among all 50 states, the District of Columbia,
and two U.S. territories and 68 confirmed deaths.⁶ EVALI cases rapidly declined after vitamin E
acetate, a common dietary supplement was removed from products.

DOH also greatly appreciates that the SD1 version retains the requirement for "generic
packaging that uses only black lettering and contains no colors, pictures, cartoons, or images that
may appeal to children and youth," the prohibitions on where advertising may occur, and
mandatory testing requirements. These will contribute to preventing youth exposure to cannabis
and cannabis products. And, the department appreciates retention of the broad authority vested in
the "Hawaii Cannabis Regulatory Authority" under section A-8.

DOH emphasizes that in addition to a strong regulatory structure, which the SD1 version 7 provides, robust and ongoing health messaging and a comprehensive surveillance program to 8 9 monitor cannabis use and associated impacts in Hawaii as recommended by the Act 169 Dual 10 Use of Cannabis Task Force, Public Health and Safety Working Group should be implemented before, and maintained after, adult-use legalization.⁷ These will be essential to protecting 11 12 vulnerable populations including youth and young adults, pregnant and breast-feeding women, 13 and individuals at-risk for cannabis-related disorders and mental health issues, and to help mitigate the impacts from the increased accessibility of cannabis that legalized adult use will 14 bring. Even adults without health risks will need accurate information to make informed 15 decisions about personal use of cannabis. 16

Although legalized adult use will be restricted to those aged 21 and older, the human brain continues to develop into the mid-20s and remains vulnerable to the effects of addictive substances.^{8,9} According to the 2021 Monitoring the Future Panel Study Annual Report, in 2021 cannabis use in the past 12 months and past 30 days among young adults aged 19-30 reached the highest levels ever recorded since 1988.¹⁰ Protecting young adults who are legally allowed to use cannabis but still very vulnerable to its detrimental effects will be challenging.

The use of child-resistant packaging reduces unintentional pediatric poisonings from a wide range of products.^{11,12,13} However, the measures still rely on the user to properly employ and maintain the packaging. A recent retrospective analysis of National Poison Data System data for pediatric exposures to edible cannabis products in children younger than age 6 years found an increase of 1,375% from 2017-2021 with a significant increase in both ICU and non-ICU admissions and there is substantial evidence that more unintentional exposures for children occur
in states with increased legal access to cannabis.^{14,15,16,17,18,19,20,21,22,23,24} Similar trends are being
noted among veterinary practices for animal intoxications. Cannabis consumers will need to be
educated on the need for safe storage, especially around children and pets.

5 Mental health, substance use, and youth suicide have been identified as high priorities this 6 legislative session and there is substantial evidence that adolescents and young adults who use cannabis daily or near-daily are more likely than non-users to develop future psychotic disorders 7 such as schizophrenia and for daily or near-daily adult users to be diagnosed with a psychotic 8 disorder such as schizophrenia.^{25,26,27,28,29,30,31,32,33,34,35,36} There is also substantial evidence that 9 10 adolescent and young adult cannabis users are more likely than non-users to increase their use and to develop cannabis use disorder and that increases in cannabis use frequency is generally 11 associated with progression to developing cannabis use disorder.^{37,38,39,40,41,42,43,44,45} Additionally, 12 there is moderate evidence that adolescents and young adults who use cannabis are more likely 13 than non-users to have suicidal thoughts or attempt suicide, and have an increased incidence of 14 suicide completion.^{46,47,48,49,50,51,52,53,54,55,56,57,58,59,60,61,62} Data on cannabis use disorder trends and 15 treatment service data will need to be monitored to allow timely intervention. 16

Fetus and newborn exposure to cannabis is also a growing concern, with national estimates show 17 that between 3-7% of pregnant women report using cannabis while pregnant.^{63,64} Biological 18 evidence shows that tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) is passed through the placenta of women who 19 use cannabis, is present in breast milk, and that the fetus and infant absorbs and metabolizes the 20 THC.^{65,66,67,68,69,70,71,72,73,74} There is substantial evidence of association between maternal 21 cannabis smoking and lower birth weight of offspring^{75,76} and moderate evidence that maternal 22 use of cannabis during pregnancy is associated with decreased academic ability, attention 23 problems, reduced cognitive function, and decreased IQ scores in exposed 24 offspring.^{77,78,79,80,81,82,83,84,85,86,87,88,89,90} Despite this, cannabis use among pregnant women has 25 26 continued to increase amidst the perceived lack of risk from the increasing acceptance and accessibility of cannabis.^{91,92,93,94,95,96,97,98,99,100} Education of women of child-bearing age, 27 28 medical providers is needed as well as monitoring of use trends in this population.

1 Finally, DOH comments that the 30 day time frame from receipt of an application to issuing a

Chair Keohokalole, Chair Dela Cruz, Vice-Chair Fukunaga, Vice-Chair Keith-Agaran, members of the Senate Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection, and members of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu ("Department") submits the following testimony in <u>strong opposition</u> to S.B. 669, S.D. 1.

The purpose of S.B. 669, S.D. 1, is to legalize the use of cannabis for adults, to create a new revenue source for the State. Although well-intentioned, the Department firmly believes that S.B. 669, S.D. 1, does not provide sufficient preparation for—nor sufficient data collection provisions to gauge—the public health, public safety, and societal impacts of cannabis legalization. Most notably, S.B. 669, S.D. 1, would establish a new agency to oversee and implement the entire cannabis legalization process; and would give the agency free reign to establish all of its own rules and regulations pertaining to an application process and selection process for licensees, compliance and enforcement, inspections, adjudications, record-keeping, self-governance, hiring, salaries, and other matters; with virtually no standards, limitations, guidance, or minimum requirements from the Legislature.¹ The agency's duties would include creating and overseeing the entire application and awards process for cultivation facilities, retail stores, testing facilities and dual use licenses. The proposed agency would even be authorized to "[i]ssue temporary emergency orders, directives, or instructions...without prior notice or hearing."

Rather than following the recommendations of the Legislature's own Dual Use Cannabis Task Force (established by Act 169 (2021))—whose report was just issued in December 2022—S.B. 669, S.D. 1, would seek to rush-in to legalization without even attempting to establish any of the report's task force or working group recommendations, thereby foregoing all of the difficult and labor-intensive multi-disciplinary discussions, groundwork, and further proposed legislation that is presumably needed to formulate a safe path towards legalization. "Given the *broad scope and complexity* of potential considerations and the *critical role of social equity* in the legalization of cannabis,"² the Dual Use Legal Cannabis Task Force unanimously recommended further study on a number of matters, rather than immediately adopting any recommendations immediately, stating that:

Without integrated social equity policies, the experience of other states, as well as a variety of scholarly research sources, have shown that *these inequities only increase in emerging cannabis industries*.

In lieu of approving specific recommendations made by the Social Equity Working Group, the Dual Use *Task Force requests legislators convene a new properly resourced Working Group* to research Social Equity while considering a legal adult-use cannabis industry.

Per the Report, the Legalized Cannabis Social Equity Task Force is needed to provide recommendations on...

the level of legalization; resentencing and record clearance; remediation; funding the identification and processing of applicable records; removal of law enforcement oversight...civil asset forfeiture equity...equity in employment; custody; housing; insurance; real estate; banking; professional services; and community reinvestment...[as well as] social equity licensing; state support for social equity license applications; transition period; social equity license product sales during the transition; state support for social equity licensee businesses; affirmative action type protections; and qualifying for social equity designation.³

Clearly, there are a large number of issues that still need to be worked through, if the Legislature wishes to guide Hawaii wisely—rather than rashly—towards the legalization of cannabis.

To the extent that some of these policy matters are aimed at <u>not</u> wanting "big marijuana" to dictate the agenda nor the landscape for this potential future industry in Hawaii, the Department shares that concern. Having seen the level of influence that "big tobacco" had on America for so many generations—to the extent that, at times, actual science has been drowned out by the tune of commercial profits—the Department is deeply concerned that other states (that have legalized cannabis) are reportedly seeing a steady consolidation of ownership, despite any incentives or safeguards put in place to support small and/or disenfranchised business owners.

With regards to emerging science, the Department is <u>very concerned that potency levels</u> <u>are not addressed</u> in this bill, whether in terms of limits, regulations, oversight, or data collection. For public health and safety purposes, potency is emerging as a primary concern in other states (that have legalized cannabis), and it is our understanding that commercially-produced items are now

reaching historically high levels of Delta-9 THC. As published in the Journal of the Missouri State Medical Association, and featured on the National Institute for Health website:

The primary problem with the current available cannabis in dispensaries in Colorado is that the THC content is not like it used to be. Prior to the 1990s it was less than 2%. In the 1990s it grew to 4%, and between 1995 and 2015 there has been a 212% increase in THC content in the marijuana flower. In 2017 the most popular strains found in dispensaries in Colorado had a range of THC content from 17–28% such as found in the popular strain named "Girl Scout Cookie.

The flower or leaves that are generally smoked or vaped are only one formulation. We now have concentrated THC products such as oil, shatter, dab, and edibles that have been able to get the THC concentration upwards of 95%.⁴

By "including cannabis concentrates" into the overall definition of "cannabis," (*see* pg. 5, ln. 13), and exempting cannabis from the offense of Promoting a harmful drug in every degree (*see* pgs. 33-37), this bill would essentially encourage the production and sale of the highest possible concentrations, which is a significant risk to public health and safety. This also ties-in to the Department's **concerns about cannabis infused edible products**, particularly given the dramatic increase in exposure to children—see the Report's reference to "pediatric poisoning"⁵—and potential effects on the future health and development of children.⁶

From 2017 to 2021, reported cannabis exposure to children rose from 207 to 3054, which represents a 1375% increase within 5 years.⁷ More generally, among all emergency room visits attributed to specific drugs in 2021, cannabis was the fourth most commonly cited drug, seen only 0.10% less frequently than methamphetamine use.⁸ Interestingly, cannabis accounted for more emergency room visits than heroin and fentanyl combined.⁹ For this and many other reasons, the American Medical Association expressly "continues to oppose legalization of cannabis. Legalization of cannabis *for adult use* is associated with increased traffic fatalities, exposures reported to poison control (*including infants and children*), emergency department visits, and cannabis-related hospitalizations."¹⁰

Given the notable health risks associated with using cannabis at a young age, and the limited time that our Family Courts have to get troubled youth back on-track, the Department believes it

heightened penalties should be imposed on those who would wrongfully transfer cannabis to minors. While selling or bartering marijuana to minors (pg. 40, lines 8-9) and distributing marijuana concentrate to minors (pg. 34, lines 10-11) are still prohibited, it is unclear what the penalty would be for simply transferring cannabis to a minor. Moreover, so long as the possession of three grams or less of marijuana continues to be a "violation" for adults,¹¹ this severely limits our Family Courts' ability to require that juvenile offenders attend treatment, as they no longer qualify as "law violators" for this type of offense. (*See* HRS § 571-11(1) and 571-2, where the definition of "status offender" contains more information about "law violators.") The Department would strongly urge this Committee to take this opportunity to provide juveniles with early intervention, community-based treatment, and counseling that could steer them away from this harmful behavior.

Another area of great concern is the correlation between the legalization of adult-use cannabis and a <u>4.8% increase in traffic fatalities, and 5.8% increase in traffic injuries</u>. Reportedly, cannabis use by a driver increases the odds of being in a traffic collision by 32%.¹²

Given the many ways in which the legalization of cannabis would have both direct and indirect effects on public safety and welfare, the Department strongly recommends that any future task forces—particularly those aimed at social equity and other legal reforms—<u>include</u> <u>representatives from the Judiciary, the Department of the Attorney General, and the various criminal justice and corrections agencies</u> (e.g. probation, parole, Public Defender, county prosecuting attorneys, police). By involving people from these various fields, who understand the way things work now, the laws behind the system, and the way things could most effectively be changed, that will provide the best-informed outcomes.

In 2019, the Legislature did create the Marijuana Evaluation Task Force (Act 273), with a goal of examining other states' laws, penalties, and outcomes pertaining to cannabis use, in order to make recommendations on amending cannabis use penalties and outcomes in Hawaii. <u>That</u> task force was comprised of numerous stakeholders, including but not limited to the Department of the Attorney General, a Prosecuting Attorney selected by the co-chairs of the task force, and the Public Defender's Office. Due to the intervening COVID pandemic, that task force was not able to complete its report in 2020, and thereafter, requested more time in 2021 (S.B. 1010) to issue its report. To date, it does not appear that any report was ever issued, yet these recommendations would be critical to any well-reasoned transition to legalizing cannabis in Hawaii. As such, the Department <u>strongly recommends awaiting and/or prompting the task force's final report and recommendations on these matters</u>.

If one of the goals of legalizing cannabis is for the state to profit from tax revenues collected from the sale of cannabis, it seems highly unlikely that future cannabis users would be inclined to purchase their cannabis from established, regulated sources, when they can still obtain cannabis more cheaply or more easily from other sources, or potentially even grow their own. In 2022, the Hawaii Cannabis Industry Association enlisted the help of well-known economist Paul Brewbaker, who estimated that Hawaii's existing, licensed medical dispensaries only control about 31% of the registered patient market share, indicating that 69% of authorized cannabis patients are obtaining their cannabis from other, unregulated sources (e.g. black market or homegrown). To date, there is

no indication that the Department of Health has been able to identify or control the existing black market cannabis industry, and no reason to think this would change under the provisions of S.B. 669, S.D. 1. Notably, in other states that have legalized cannabis, legalization actually prompted the *growth* of the black market cannabis industry, rather than reducing it.¹³

In closing, the Department reiterates our serious concerns that SB. 669, S.D. 1, would give primary responsibility for and oversight of the cannabis legalization process to an <u>entirely new</u> <u>agency</u>, <u>which would be authorized to establish all of its own rules</u>, regulations, standards, and <u>procedures</u>, for everything from establishing licensing applications and awards processes, to data-tracking and enforcement, to setting their own personnel needs and salaries, <u>with essentially no</u> guidelines, limitations, or base requirements from the Legislature.

Before any changes are made to legalize the use of cannabis in Hawaii, the Department believes a concerted, multi-disciplinary effort is needed, to develop a comprehensive system that orchestrates recommendations from all of the proposed tasks forces and working groups. In addition to developing our own ideas, Hawaii must take advantage of the opportunity to watch and learn from other states that legalized cannabis before us; additional data is still needed before we can determine whether any of the negative developments in those states are in fact due to "causation" or merely "correlation." Given the strong potential for widespread abuse and negative effects on the community, the Department urges this Committee to give stakeholders more time to plan, discuss, and "get it right," rather than just "get it fast."

For all of the foregoing reasons, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu <u>strongly opposes</u> S.B. 669, S.D. 1. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this matter.

The Department of Taxation ("Department") offers the following <u>comments</u> regarding S.B. 669, S.D. 1, for your consideration.

S.B. 669, S.D.1, adds new chapters to the Hawaii Revised Statutes, (HRS), establishing regulations for the cultivation, sale, and personal use of cannabis; decriminalizing and regulating cannabis for personal use; and establishing taxes for cannabis sales, all to reduce unregulated and illicit sales of cannabis by unlicensed entities. The bill has a defective effective date of March 22, 2075.

Section 2 of the bill creates a new chapter A, HRS, entitled "Legalization of Cannabis for Personal Use," and establishes the Hawaii Cannabis Regulatory Authority ("Agency"), which will provide regulations, and oversight of the newly legalized cannabis industry and the duties associated with entity licensing. This section further transfers all powers, duties, and responsibilities of the Department of Health, including the medical cannabis control and regulation, to the Agency.

Section 5 of the bill, beginning on page 32, amends section 235-2.4(v), HRS, to allow deductions for expenses incurred in the production and sale of medical cannabis and manufactured cannabis products by dispensaries licensed under chapter 329D and their subcontractors, and any activity authorized by the new chapter A.

Part IV, Section 14 of the bill, beginning on page 40, creates a new chapter B, HRS, entitled "Cannabis Tax Law." Under section B-2 of the Cannabis Tax Law, retail cannabis stores and dual use cannabis dispensaries are required to obtain a permit from the Department for the sale of cannabis to consumers for personal use. Section B-4 imposes a tax at the rate of 10 percent on the sales price of cannabis sold in the State. The tax shall be paid only once upon the same cannabis sold for medical use by a medical cannabis dispensary under chapter 329D, HRS. All moneys collected pursuant to this chapter shall be paid into the state treasury as state realizations. Administration of this chapter is vested in the Director of Taxation.

The Department appreciates that the Senate Committee on Judiciary amended section B-2, on pages 42 to 43, by setting the annual permit fee at \$25.00 and duplicate permit fee at \$5.00, as requested by the Department to cover the administrative costs of processing the applications. The Department requests that these changes be maintained.

Further, the Department suggests that the provision in section B-9, on page 50, lines 5 to 10, which provides that the Agency shall have the authority of a "duly accredited tax official of the State pursuant to section 231-18" to inspect tax returns, be deleted, as the Agency is already provided with the authority to inspect returns pursuant to the provision on page 49, lines 16, to page 50, lines 1 to 5, and equating the Agency to a tax official of the State may cause confusion.

Assuming an effective date of January 1, 2024, the Department estimates a revenue gain to the general fund as follows (\$ millions):

Finally, the Department notes that implementation of an initiative of this size will require additional resources and ample time to define the requirements, forms, and processes. Accordingly, the Department requests an effective date of no earlier than January 1, 2025.

Testimony of the Office of the Public Defender, State of Hawai'i to the Senate Committee on Commerce and Consumer Protection and Senate Committee on Ways and Means

S.B. No. 669 SD1: RELATING TO CANNABIS

Chair Keohokalole, Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Fukunaga, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and Members of the Committees:

The Office of the Public Defender supports S.B. No. 669 SD1, which would legalize, regulate, and tax cannabis and manufactured cannabis products for responsible, adult use.

The legalization of cannabis and manufactured cannabis products will not create or normalize the commercial marijuana market. Nor will legalization drive consumer demand. *The marijuana market already exists.* This market, however, remains underground, and those involved in it largely remains unaccountable. Unregulated sellers do not pay taxes; they do not check identification to ensure that buyers are 21 years old or older; and they do not test the purity of their product. Moreover, any disputes that arise in the illicit marketplace are not adjudicated in the courts of law.

By contrast, legalization and regulation will allow the State of Hawai'i to establish legal parameters regarding where, when, and how the cannabis market may operate, similar to the rules and regulations established in the medical marijuana industry. Authorities will actually know who is selling marijuana, where it is being sold, when, and to whom. Cannabis will be produced and sold by legitimate, taxpaying businesses instead of drug cartels and criminals. These businesses will be required to test their products and adhere to strict labeling and packaging requirements that ensure cannabis is identifiable and consumers know what they are getting. Legalizing and regulating cannabis will disrupt the illegal marijuana market, end low-level marijuana citations and arrests, and create jobs and new revenue. It will further promote public health and safety by taking the marijuana trade away from unregulated operators and placing it in the hands of licensed businesses. Recent data provided by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports a decrease¹ in lifetime marijuana use by young people over the better part of the past decade. Scientists believe that cannabis regulation is partly responsible for spurring this decline. Specifically, a 2019 study² published in JAMA (Journal of American Medical Association) Pediatrics concluded: "[M]arijuana use among youth may actually decline after legalization for recreational purposes. This latter result is consistent ... with the argument that it is more difficult for teenagers to obtain marijuana as drug dealers are replaced by licensed dispensaries that require proof of age."

To be clear, the OPD does not support this bill out of a belief that marijuana is harmless. In fact, it is precisely because cannabis is not altogether harmless that reform advocates opine that it should be legalized and regulated accordingly – with restrictions on who can purchase and consume it, when and where they can do so, and at what age.

Ultimately, the establishment of a regulatory framework allowing for the legal, licensed commercial production and retail sale of cannabis and manufactured cannabis products to adults best reduces the risks associated with the marijuana's use or abuse and acknowledges the reality that consumers' demand for marijuana is here to stay. By contrast, advocating for marijuana's continued criminalization denies this reality and compounds the public safety risks posed by the unregulated market.

Finally, the Office of the Public Defender respectfully requests that this measure be amended to include the authorization of the expungement of records relating to the arrest, criminal charge, or conviction of a person for marijuana offenses similar to the language set forth in PART IV, SECTION 11 of S.B. No. 375 SD1, Relating to Cannabis [*see* S.B. No. 375, page 21, line 20 to page 26, line 12].

Dear Chairs, Vice-Chairs and Members of the Joint Committee:

Aloha Green Apothecary is a state licensed medical cannabis dispensary licensee operating on Oahu since 2016. Aloha Green Apothecary STRONGLY SUPPORTS SB669 SD1's intent to establish a program to allow for the responsible adult-use of cannabis. We look forward to the day when adults 21 years and older can use cannabis without stigma and persecution. We hope this day comes as soon as possible and urge the Committee to consider the fastest, most effective, and lowest cost path to a successful adult-use program made in Hawaii for Hawaii.

SB669 SD1 builds an adult-use cannabis program upon the existing success of the 329 medical cannabis program by providing for the sale of highly regulated cannabis products without the need for a 329 medical cannabis card. The same strict product standards coupled with an experienced regulator's oversight.

Aloha Green Apothecary submits that SB669 presents the most cost-effective administration and oversight by building upon the experience gained from the highly regulated medical 329 cannabis dispensary program. Further, a governor-appointed cannabis manager provides greater flexibility through rule making powers and program transparency through timely reporting. The existing regulatory office will be nimble and able to respond to law or rule changes effectively. Strictly enforced regulations based on an existing medical program ensure safeguards for the community and the continued benefit to the State.

The proposed 10% excise tax rate plus GET would generate over \$81 million new tax revenue based on an estimated \$423 million annual adult-use cannabis sales. State liquor and tobacco taxes generated a combined \$67 million in 2022 according to DoTAX annual reporting. Cannabis taxes will be more than enough to support regulation efforts with excess for fund education, mental health and other State initiatives. The Department of Health budgets approximately \$2.7 million for the Department of Health's Office of Medical Cannabis Control and Regulation which administers both the Patient Registry Program and the Medical Cannabis Dispensary Program.

Finally, the transition pilot period provides for a phased and balanced approach which allows legislators and regulators to generate tax revenue quickly with a highly regulated program while allowing flexibility to make future program changes tailored for Hawaii.

The State does not have to allow existing medical dispensaries the right to sell right away, but there does need to be legal sales as soon as adult-use legalization is passed to ensure the illicit market does not fill the sales vacuum. See link to recent New York Times' February 24, 2023 article: <u>Kids Buying Weed From Bodegas Wasn't in the 'Legal Weed' Plan</u>, reporting how preventable licensing and sales delays in New York lead to a burgeoning illicit market. But the medical dispensaries have shown they can operate in the highly regulated Hawaiian market and should be afforded an opportunity to play a role in both medical and adult-use cannabis programs.

SB669 SD1 is an uncomplicated legalization bill which contains requested amendments from the Office of the Attorney General; the Department of Taxation and the Department of Health. We submit that SB669 SD1 represents the best vehicle for additional stakeholder and House amendments.

Aloha Chairs, Vice-Chairs, and Members of the Committees:

Big Island Grown Dispensaries is one of eight medical cannabis dispensary licensees in the State. We operate a production facility and 3 retail locations on the Big Island of Hawaii. In addition, our medical cannabis operation currently employs and contracts with over 80 Big Island residents.

Mahalo for the opportunity to provide testimony in **SUPPORT of SB669.** This important measure would establish a regulatory framework for the legalization of adult cannabis use in the islands.

Recently, the Hawaii Cannabis Industry Association (HICIA) released the results of a public opinion poll that showed <u>86% of Hawaii residents support legalizing cannabis</u>. Even with this popularity, however, most residents are clear that regulations must be established to ensure both users and the public are safeguarded and that the State fiscally benefits from legalization.

SB669 would achieve these policy objectives of ensuring safety and maximizing fiscal impacts to the State.

Transition Period to Maximize Safety, Enable Thoughtful Regulations and Reduce Black Market Risk

SB669 provides for a "transition period" before issuance of new licenses to ensure the State can study and analyze the marketplace to develop thoughtful regulations. Additionally, the measure would discourage the proliferation of illicit activities by allowing initial legal sales to begin through highly regulated medical dispensaries.



Reducing State's Cost for Administration and Oversight

SB669 would establish a cannabis "Authority" that would utilize the existing expertise, resources and staff of the Department of Health's Office of Cannabis Control and Regulation. By doing so, SB669 eliminates the need for the State to appropriate funding to establish a new agency at the outset of legalization. Moreover, given the tax revenue projections, this State program can expand as the industry grows and would be financially sustainable from the start.

Legal Market Opportunities and Licenses

SB669 would establish three license types – Cultivation, Retail, and Dual Use. These license types would create market opportunities for varied operations to participate in the cannabis industry and help to grow our local economy.

New Cannabis Tax

SB669 would establish a new 10% cannabis tax that is expected to help generate over \$81 million in taxes for the state when combined with GET, wholesale, corporate and income taxes (see HICIA adult use cannabis report). This would create a substantial revenue stream to support a number of State programs and projects in addition to the administration of the program to regulate the industry.

For the reasons above, we respectfully urge the Committee to pass SB669 to fulfill the desires of the community for cannabis legalization and generate revenue for the state while ensuring safety in the industry.

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee,

My name is Kai Luke, a representative of Cannabis Society of Hawai'i a diverse group of Community members made up of Native Hawaiians, People of Hawai'i, 329 Patients, Health Care Professionals, Dispensary workers, Previous Dispensary workers, Industry Professionals, Concerned Citizens, and Advocates in Health and Wellness.

According to previous testimony on this matter by Gary Yabuta the Executive Director of the Hawaii High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)--a grant-funded program of the Office of National Drug Control Policy, Executive Office of the President, "SB 669 if enacted would prove to be difficult to implement, regulate and enforce."

This is why more time is needed to develop a better bill that has better language and isn't rushed.

The Attorney General has testimony on this matter highlighting a "Conflict with Federal Laws" and that "Further Preparation is Needed to Develop Adequate Regulations".

Without integrating Social Equity / Expungement written in, we cannot support this bill. There needs to be more conversation on how we should be doing better for the Community instead of taking away rights.

Aloha, my name is Greg Tjapkes, and I am the Executive Director of the Coalition for a Drug-Free Hawaii (CDFH), as a drug abuse prevention youth-serving agency we STRONGLY OPPOSE SB669 SD1.

Legalizing recreational marijuana is a bad idea for Hawaii

THC potency has increased from 3% in the 1970s, to over 25% today. THC concentrates can reach 90-95% potency.¹ Legalizing cannabis without THC limits would pose a danger to our keiki. Calling cannabis 'natural' and 'just a plant', would be analogous to legalizing the poppy or coca leaves and all of their potential by-products and derivatives.

1. Costs will outweigh underwhelming Revenue Projections

- Cannabis tax revenues are expected to range from \$36-\$51 million in year five, which represents approximately 0.5% of total tax collections.
 - Isaac Choy, Director, Department of Taxation²
- In Colorado, for every \$1 of tax revenue, the state spends \$4.50 counteracting legalization's effects.³
- <u>What are the projected costs?</u> We should not proceed without a cost/benefit analysis.

2. Harms to Mothers and Children

- **Pregnancy:** "No amount of marijuana use during pregnancy or adolescence is known to be safe." Dr. Jerome Adams, U.S. Surgeon General, 2019
- Pediatric poisonings: Calls to poison control centers about kids 5 and under consuming edibles containing THC rose 1375% from 2017 to 2021.⁴

3. Youth Use, Mental Health, and Suicide

- Cannabis Use Disorder: Marijuana is the #1 drug in Hawaii (64.7%) for adolescent substance abuse treatment⁵
- Psychosis and Suicidal ideation: Frequency and higher THC potency are associated with psychosis, suicidality, reshaping of brain matter, and addiction ⁶
- Vaping Marijuana: 12.5% of Hawaii teens report vaping marijuana ⁷

4. Increased Drugged Driving Deaths

SENATE BILL 669, SD1, RELATING TO CANNABIS

MARCH 1, 2023 · SENATE CONSUMER PROTECTION AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES · CHAIRS SEN. JARRETT KEOHOKALOLE AND SEN. DONOVAN DELA CRUZ

POSITION: Support with amendments.

RATIONALE: The Democratic Party of Hawai'i Education Caucus <u>supports and suggests</u> <u>amendments</u> for SB 669, SD1, relating to cannabis, which establishes regulations for the cultivation, sale, and personal use of small amounts of cannabis, decriminalizes and regulates small amounts of cannabis for personal use, and establishes taxes for cannabis sales.

It is high time that Hawai'i stopped criminalizing people for smoking small amounts of a plant. While cannabis remains illegal under federal law, where it is classified as a Schedule I substance, the facts about cannabis consumption are clear. To begin, cannabis has a lower organic toxicity and addictive risk than alcohol, along with fewer correlating incidents of influence-related accidents and violence. More than half of all traffic fatalities in Hawai'i involve alcohol, yet no one seriously discusses the possibility of prohibition because of path dependence. In other words, alcohol is ingrained in our culture in a way that cannabis consumption is not, despite the former being more dangerous, statistically speaking, than the latter.

Similarly, cannabis abuse and dependence afflict approximately 1.7 percent of the U.S. population, while alcohol abuse afflicts roughly 7.5 percent—over four times as many individuals.

Cannabis is also not conclusively linked to an increase in violent behavior. Rather, reports supposedly linking cannabis to violent crimes typically rely on information gathered by the Office of National Drug Control Policy, which, in turn, relies on source material that a) does not account for drug-trafficking and dispositional or psychological disorders; and b) fails to account for levels of deviancy (increased usage beyond average consumption rates). A more stark statistical correlation exists between increased alcohol consumption and violent crime, including child and intimate partner abuse, yet, again, no one is introducing, much less considering the merits of, limiting the personal consumption of alcohol. Additionally, only 30 percent of frequent (every other day or more) cannabis users report symptoms suggesting dependence, in contrast to nearly 70 percent for nicotine and 88 percent for harder drugs, like cocaine, calling into question legal opinions asserting that cannabis and hard drugs can be readily correlated to one another. If we do not criminalize overconsumption of the more dangerous drug of alcohol, in and of itself, why, once more, do we unduly criminalize cannabis consumption, particularly in small amounts?

Furthermore, legalizing recreational cannabis usage is an issue of restorative justice. As the visitor industry reaps record profits and supports expansion of the local prison-industrial complex, people of Native Hawaiian ancestry, who comprise approximately 25 percent of the state's population, suffer the pangs of a biased criminal (in)justice system. Approximately 39 percent of incarcerated detainees are Hawaiian, according to a comprehensive study by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, with the proportionality gap being even greater for Hawaiian women, who comprise 19.8 percent of the state's female population, but 44 percent of the state's female inmate population. Researchers also found that, on average, Hawaiians receive longer sentences, more parole revocations, and, importantly for this measure, **harsher drug-related punishments than other ethnic groups**, including for cannabis possession. Therefore, passage this measure is a step toward reforming and preventing more people from becoming victims of our unjust and racially coded prison system.

<u>Legalizing recreational cannabis could generate at least \$81.7 million in tax revenue</u> <u>annually for our state</u> according to a study published by the Hawai'i Cannabis Industry Association in January and would produce substantial additional criminal justice savings that could be spent delivering a quality education to our keiki, building basic infrastructure, expanding access to healthcare, and constructing truly affordable housing. Even the more conservative \$50
million revenue estimate produced by the Hawai'i Department of Taxation last year is enough to "stand up" a local cannabis industry. Many states have established well-regulated recreational cannabis industries that include restorative justice components for less than \$5 million.

Yet, we have concerns about the inadequacy of this measure as it currently stands. To begin, this measure does not include any provisions regarding social equity. As we struggle to fix our state's overcrowded prisons, we must enact systemic solutions that promote social justice and help to alleviate Hawai'i's mass incarceration problem. If implemented sensibly, cannabis legalization could lead to the most comprehensive mass expungement program ever seen on our shores, with people who have been incarcerated for cannabis infractions having their criminal records expunged and being released from the legal constraints that have unjustly impeded their ability to attain financial security and, in many cases, stolen their basic freedom. Social equity must form the heart of any forward-thinking cannabis legalization program. Our society's most marginalized people should be first in line to participate in the cannabis industry that we are seeking to grow. Agricultural and business practices should be based on regenerative, sustainable, and indigenous cultivation methods to ensure that cannabis operations uplift the needs and values of Hawai'i residents, not the profits of multistate corporations. Yet, again, SB 669 lacks any reference to social equity, which would only exacerbate the harm endured by those who have been prosecuted for cannabis and their families.

Accordingly, we urge your committee to pass language found in the original draft of SB 375 regarding social equity. We also encourage you to look at the fee and tax structure that was originally proposed in SB 375, which would guarantee that everyone pays their fair share to participate in the cannabis marketplace, including current medical dispensaries. Finally, we invite you to consider inserting additional protections for local cannabis operations into the bill to prevent multistate corporations–the so-called "Walmarts of cannabis"–from controlling our islands' cannabis industry, including the adoption of language that would allow a Hawai'i Cannabis Authority to set fees for non-local operators that far exceed those charged to local businesses (which should cost no more than a contractors' license), and provisions that would give people of Native Hawaiian ancestry preference in obtaining cannabis licenses.

Green Aloha is the sole Medical Cannabis Dispensary License for the Island of Kauai. Green Aloha **strongly supports SB669** as an important bill for cannabis reform in the State of Hawai'i.

SB 669 addresses many concerns raised in the past about the implementation of an Adult-use of cannabis program in the State of Hawai'i. As written this bill creates a program that is **cost effective** to administer coupled with some of the **strongest and highest standards** of oversight in the nation.

SB 669's proposed 10% cannabis excise tax and 4.5% GET tax on legal cannabis sales are estimated to generate **\$81 million in revenue surplus** for the state annually. The State of Hawai'i already has this economic activity occurring but it takes place in the illicit market which is untaxed, unregulated and in many cases unsafe.

This bill also sets very high safeguards to protect the community, especially individuals under the age of 21. The current status quo in regards to cannabis laws in Hawai'i do not keep our communities or children safe due to the unknown nature of the cannabis that exists on the streets. Not taking action to bring illicit cannabis activity into the light where it can be taxed, regulated, and the public can be educated, continues to put our communities at risk.

Lastly, SB 669 ensures that the Adult-Use of cannabis in Hawai'i is a phased in balanced approach to legalization specific to Hawai'i. Hawai'i benefits from learning from all the mistakes other states have made in the implementation of an Adult-use programs and this bill carefully takes into consideration language to avoid those missteps. This bill creates efficient and effective implementation while minimizing the potential risks of illicit criminal activity and other unintended consequences. This bill will also strengthen the medical cannabis program as it will result in additional access points and wider varieties of products for patients. Passing this measure will create economic opportunity in the state while also taking the necessary actions to make our communities even safer.

ALOHA CHAIR, VICE CHAIR AND DISTINGUISHED COMMITTEE MEMBERS. My name is Alan Johnson. I am the current chair of the Hawaii Substance Abuse Coalition (HSAC), a statewide organization for substance use disorder and co-occurring mental health disorder treatment and prevention agencies and recovery services.

Opposition - Recommendation

We **strongly urge that significant prevention funds** be added to this bill because a growing number of youth are having problems with cannabis as well as significant data indicates cannabis is harmful to youth's developing brain

Moreover, we **strongly urge Hawaii to follow other states who developed a short-term media campaign** to inform kids about the dangers of using before adulthood.

As cannabis use increases, so will the **need for treatment for cannabis use disorders.** Please include funding for much needed treatment.

<u>Data</u>

In Hawaii, substance use disorder treatment agencies report that 63.5% of kids presenting for treatment do so because of problems stemming from overuse of cannabis. (Department of Health: Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division 2015)

In 2019, 37% of US high school students reported lifetime use of marijuana and 22% reported use in the past 30 days.¹

The **teen brain is actively developing** and continues to develop until around age 25. Marijuana use during adolescence and young adulthood may harm the developing brain.²

Negative effects of teen marijuana use include³:

- Difficulty thinking and problem-solving,
- Problems with memory and learning,
- Reduced coordination.
- Difficulty maintaining attention,
- Problems with school and social life.

How marijuana can impact a teen's life:

- **Increased risk of mental health issues.** Marijuana use has been linked to a range of mental health problems, such as depression and social anxiety. People who use marijuana are more likely to develop temporary psychosis (not knowing what is real, hallucinations, and paranoia) and long-lasting mental disorders, including schizophrenia (a type of mental illness where people might see or hear things that aren't there). The association between marijuana and schizophrenia is stronger in people who start using marijuana at an earlier age and use marijuana more frequently.
- **Impaired driving.** Driving while impaired by any substance, including marijuana, is dangerous and illegal. Marijuana negatively affects several skills required for safe driving, such as reaction time, coordination, and concentration.
- **Potential for addiction.** Approximately 3 in 10 people who use marijuana have marijuana use disorder.⁷ Some signs and symptoms of marijuana use disorder include trying but failing to quit using marijuana or giving up important activities with friends and family in favor of using marijuana. The risk of developing marijuana use disorder is stronger in people who start using marijuana during youth or adolescence and who use marijuana more frequently.

While adults experience short term effects, youth can also experience long term effects:³

Long-Term Effects

Marijuana also affects brain development. When people begin using marijuana as **teenagers**, the drug **may impair thinking, memory, and learning functions and affect how the brain builds connections** between the areas necessary for

these functions. Researchers are still studying how long marijuana's effects last and whether some changes may be permanent.

A study by researchers at Duke University showed that people who started smoking marijuana heavily in their **teens** and had an ongoing marijuana use disorder **lost an average of 8 IQ points** between ages 13 and 38. The lost mental abilities didn't fully return in those who quit marijuana as adults. Those who started smoking marijuana as adults didn't show notable IQ declines.⁴

We recommend the bill identifies significant resources for prevention funding as well as funding for treatment and clearly describes the state's role and responsibilities for a communication/media campaign to inform youth.

The Hawai'i Public Health Institute takes no position on the legalization of cannabis. However, we **oppose SB669 SD1** because of its lack of public health regulations to ensure the health and safety of the state. Below are more specific reasons for our opposition and <u>amendment</u> <u>recommendations</u>, should the committees desire to pass this measure.

Place the Regulatory Authority within the Department of Health

The regulatory system proposed in this bill needs to be clarified to protect our state's health and safety. The Hawaii Cannabis Regulatory Authority, the lead body tasked with regulating non-medical cannabis, lacks any definitive, expert qualifications that would ensure that policies created are science-based and protect the health and safety of the community. We recommend placing the regulatory authority within the Department of Health (DOH). The DOH already has structure, experience, and staff expertise in regulating cannabis through its Office of Medical Cannabis Control and Regulation. While staffing will likely need to be expanded to provide the proper oversight of non-medical cannabis, placing the authority within the DOH prioritizes public health protections. It will better ensure the safety and health of our communities.

We believe that the committee must, at minimum, restructure the Hawaii Cannabis Regulatory Authority if we are to protect our community's health and safety successfully. We respectfully oppose SB669 SD1 for its lack of specificity related to public health measures and request you consider our amendments should the committee pass this measure.

Hawaii Family Forum is a non-profit, pro-family education organization committed to preserving and strengthening families in Hawaii. As such, we have serious concerns about this bill and its ultimate ramifications on the wider community – especially with regards to our keiki. Although we leave the discussion as to the regulatory functions and applicability of its passage to the experts, establishing legal recreational marijuana is a serious and major policy change for our community.

Let's fix the vaping problem in Hawaii before we create a situation that may very well be exacerbated by legalized recreational marijuana. On February 16, 2021, Governor David Ige presented a report on the Hawaii Student Health Behaviors. Although some positive results were mentioned, he also expressed great concern regarding "the high number of youth who have tried electronic smoking devices, with 31% (or almost 1 in 3) of high school students using electronic vapor products"ⁱ News stories at that time referred to an effort by the State Department of Health to reduce that number,ⁱⁱ but it continues to grow.

If the youth in Hawai'i are already dabbling in an illegal substance at such high rates, even with the attempt to provide deeper restrictions, do we really believe that marijuana will somehow escape their attention and use? Marijuana concentrates are being used in vaping devices and even the DEA has recognizedⁱⁱⁱ that the marijuana used in vaping contains a higher concentrate. Because marijuana is a performance-degrading drug, school aged keiki who access it will most certainly be put at a disadvantage.

The use of edible products is another way that our youth could access marijuana and that could be a huge unintended consequence. According to Smart Approaches to Marijuana^{iv}, youth drug use has risen in every state that has legalized recreational marijuana.^v We must do everything in our power to ensure that does not happen Hawaii.

According to Jonathan P. Caulkins, "The Real Dangers of Marijuana," (2019) "[o]ne could speculate that legalization might make marijuana abuse and dependence less common, because generally healthy people will start to use occasionally, and that influx could dilute the proportion who abuse or are dependent. But one could just as easily speculate that legalization will bring more marketing, more potent products (like "dabs"), or products that are more pleasant to use (like "vaping" pens), any of which could increase the risk that experimenting could progress to problematic use. This is all speculation, of course. But what can be said empirically is that, within the context of aggregate use in the United States at this time, the best available data suggest that marijuana creates abuse and dependence at higher rates than does alcohol."^{vi}



SB 669 SD1 Relating to Cannabis Page Two

Legalization and the perceived societal acceptance are detrimental to the overall safety and wellbeing of our keiki. Family factors can serve both protective and risk functions in adolescents' substance use. We hear stories of access to illegal substances because of an adult in their own family network. These same individuals have been the connection for their ability to gain easy access to marijuana purchased by adults for "medicinal" use. Legalization of recreational marijuana will make this worse.

Marijuana may impair judgment, motor function, and reaction time. Studies have found a direct relationship between blood THC concentration and impaired driving abilities. According to the Conference of National State Legislatures, "[t]esting for drug impairment is problematic due to the limitations of drug-detecting technology and the lack of an agreed-upon limit to determine impairment. The nationally recognized level of impairment for drunken driving is .08 g/mL blood alcohol concentration. But there is no similar national standard for drugged driving." ^{vii}

The bottom line is that by legalizing the recreational use of marijuana, we believe it will affect adolescents' use by increasing its availability through social connections, by creating a message within social norms that show marijuana use as a normal thing, and by reinforcing beliefs that marijuana use is not harmful. If marijuana possession and use is no longer a punishable offense it will be more readily available, as users of marijuana will no longer be deterred by fear of punishment. Surely Hawai'i deserves better than that!

Honorable members of the Senate Health & Human Services and Consumer Protection Committees, I am Eva Andrade, representing the Hawaii Catholic Conference, the public policy voice for the Roman Catholic Church in the State of Hawaii. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in opposition to SB 669 SD1.

While the Catholic Church does not teach that the use of marijuana specifically is inherently sinful, paragraph 2291 of the Catechism describes the use of drugs in general, describing it as a "grave offense" when used apart from strictly therapeutic reasons. It also states in paragraph 2211 that the political community has a duty to protect the security and health of families, especially with respect to drugs.

Legalizing marijuana for recreational usage will adversely affect families, communities, workers, and health outcomes. In fact, the American Medical Association (AMA) believes that cannabis is a "dangerous drug and...is a serious public health concern" and that the sale of cannabis for adult recreational use should not be legalized.¹

Once you go this route, you will ultimately send a message to children that drug use is socially and morally acceptable. We have witnessed the rise of vaping among our youth, and thereby we remain strongly concerned that this attempt to raise revenue will ultimately come at a social cost that will permanently harm our community. As people of faith, we must speak out against this effort and the damaging effects its passage would have on children and families.

Please do not pass this bill. Mahalo for the opportunity to submit written testimony in opposition.

Dear Chairs, Vice-Chairs and Members of the Committees:

The Hawai'i Cannabis Industry Association is the trade association for 5 of the state's 8 licensed medical cannabis dispensaries. HICIA **strongly supports SB669** as an important bill for cannabis reform in the State of Hawai'i.

SB 669 addresses many concerns raised in the past about implementing an Adult-use of cannabis program in the State of Hawai'i. As written this bill creates a program that is **cost effective** to administer coupled with some of the **strongest and highest standards** of oversight in the nation.

SB 669 accounts for, and mitigates, many of the failures of other states who have implemented Adult Use programs. For example, ensuring there are legal and regulated Adult Use sales directly after passage into law ensures that the illicit market does not gain a foothold and plunder chances of having a regulated market to serve the majority of participants. As seen in states such as New York, which legalized cannabis on March 31st 2021, they only started issuing licenses for Adult Use sales on November 21st 2022¹ and the first sale of Adult Use cannabis was on December 29th 2022². Thus, the illicit market has flourished in this interim time between legalization and first Adult Use

sale drastically³. It has so much that New York City's Mayor and the D.A. have formed a task force to combat illegal dispensaries from operating⁴.

This is a problem we can avoid in Hawai'i by allowing day one sales of Adult Use cannabis while building out the rest of the program. Allowing adult use sales immediately upon passage of legalization is imperative to minimize the risk of illicit market activity as seen in other jurisdictions. While the state doesn't have to grant that privilege to licensed medical dispensaries, it must somehow allow regulated legal sales from someone to avoid the risks of criminal illicit market sales from occurring.

SB 669's proposed 10% cannabis excise tax and 4.5% GET tax on legal cannabis sales are estimated to generate **\$81 million in revenue surplus** for the state annually⁵. The State of Hawai'i already has this economic activity occurring but it takes place in the illicit market which is untaxed and unregulated.

This bill also sets very high safeguards to protect the community, especially individuals under the age of 21. The current status quo in regards to cannabis laws in Hawai'i do not keep our communities or children safe due to the unknown nature of the cannabis that exists on the streets. Not taking action to bring illicit cannabis activity into the light where it can be taxed, regulated, and educated continues to put our communities at risk. SB 669 keeps the same standards as our current medical program plus additional measures to protect our communities.

Additionally, SB 669 ensures that the Adult-Use of cannabis in Hawai'i is a phased in balanced approach to legalization specific to Hawai'i. Hawai'i benefits from learning from all the mistakes other states have made in the implementation of an Adult-use programs and this bill carefully takes into consideration language to avoid those missteps. This bill creates efficient and effective implementation while minimizing the potential risks of illicit criminal activity and other unintended consequences. Passing this measure will create economic opportunity in the state while also taking the necessary actions to make our communities even safer.

Lastly, It has recently come to our attention that employer protections should be strengthened under proposed cannabis adult-use legalization measures. The following amendment can help address this issue and protect local businesses.

SA-10 Effect on employers This chapter shall not be construed to:

(1) Require an employer to permit or accommodate the use, consumption, possession, transfer, display, transport, sale, or growing of cannabis in the workplace; or

(2) Affect the ability of an employer to have policies restricting the use of cannabis by employees; or

(3) Prevent an employer from refusing to hire, discharging, disciplining, or otherwise taking an adverse employment action against a person with respect to hire, tenure, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment because of that person's violation of policies restricting the use of cannabis or working while under the influence of cannabis.

Thank you for considering this extremely important and timely piece of legislation.

SB 669 (OPPOSING)

Honorable Members of the Committee,

THE development of SB 669 is following the same path as the establishment of dispensaries in 2015. After 6 years into the dispensary program development, less than 30% of medical patients are going to dispensaries and many dispensaries publicly stating they are going out of business with the burdensome regulations. The problem is very simple. Legislation is split on any type of legal cannabis program moving forward. Many legislators represent communities that resist any type of cannabis legalization whether medical or recreational. The mood is "lets pass what we can pass even if it is a bad bill". This type of bill making is detrimental to the community and to the medical patients of Hawaii.

SB 669 has no data driving the bill, and on the contrary, there is a lot of data available to legislation to properly build a successful state dual use program. American for Safe Access released a 2021 report "An Analysis of Medical Cannabis Across the United States".

It is obvious that Senate bill 375 was drafted by proponents of marijuana legalization with heavy input from the existing cannabis industry. SB 669 if enacted would prove to be difficult to implement, regulate and enforce.

Hawaii 's cannabis authority board will be comprised of individuals that will lack objectivity due to the composition of this board. What we see in about every instance is the authority bested by statute in a governance board is dominated by members whose vested interest is the success of the program with little regard to the actual events that are occurring because of legalization of commercial adult use.

This is reinforced throughout SB669 as very little language is devoted did collecting data so that informed decisions can be made in the following areas public health and public safety.

SB 669 attempts to correct or at least incentivize disenfranchised community members who are actively seeking licenses to manufacture distribute or sell commercial adult use marijuana. However laudable this may seem; it seldom produces tangible results.

Historically what we have seen in the states that have legalize commercial adult use marijuana, initially disenfranchised community members enter the marketplace but if you have sustainable resources to survive and thrive, we have seen a consolidation of ownership and each instance with larger corporate entities that have the fiscal resources and the ability to price competition out of business. According to the recent Colorado business statistics approximately 70% of Colorado 's commercial adult use industry is controlled by 8 individuals/ entities. We continue to see a consolidation within the marketplace in the state of Illinois and most recently in the state of New Jersey.

SUBJECT: MISCELLANEOUS, Legalization and Taxation of Marijuana for Personal Use

BILL NUMBER: SB 669 SD 1

INTRODUCED BY: Senate Committee on Judiciary

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Establishes regulations for the cultivation, sale, and personal use of small amounts of cannabis. Decriminalizes and regulates small amounts of cannabis for personal use. Establishes taxes for cannabis sales.

SYNOPSIS: Adds a new chapter to the HRS legalizing cannabis for personal use.

Adds a section to chapter 706, HRS, and amends to several sections in chapter 712, HRS, to decriminalize use in conformity with the new chapter added.

Adds a new chapter to the HRS imposing a 10% tax on the retail sale of cannabis. This tax is in addition to any other tax that would apply. The tax would not apply to: (1) Cannabis sold by one licensee (under the new chapter added by this bill) to another licensee; and (2) Cannabis sold for medical use by a medical cannabis dispensary under chapter 329D, HRS.

EFFECTIVE DATE: March 22, 2075.

STAFF COMMENTS: The question that should be asked is the purpose of this new tax. If the goal is to make people stop using cannabis by making it cost-prohibitive, then why are we legalizing it?

Certainly, the same can be said of other "sin taxes" that we impose on tobacco, liquor, and fossil fuel use.

As the Foundation's previous President, Lowell Kalapa, wrote in the Tax Foundation of Hawaii's weekly commentary on October 28, 2012:

Lawmakers seem to have a simplistic reaction to solving problems the solution to which plagues their constituents – tax it.

Probably the best example is what people like to call sin taxes, those excise taxes that are levied on tobacco and alcohol products. After all, smoking causes cancer and alcohol causes all sorts of problems including driving under the influence. Lawmakers and community advocates shake their heads and push for higher tax rates, arguing that making these products more expensive will deter folks from using these products.

The problem is that lawmakers also like the revenues that are generated from the sales of these products and, in some cases, they have tried to link the use and sale of these products with noble causes such as the funding of the Cancer Research Center that is currently being built. Again, the argument is that smokers should pay for programs and projects which seek to cure the related ill which in this case is cancer caused by smoking.

The irony is that arguments to increase the tax on tobacco and, more specifically, cigarettes, is a goal of getting smokers to quit while depending on the revenues from tobacco and cigarette taxes to fund an ongoing program, in this case the Cancer Research Center. So, which is it folks, stop smokers from smoking and if successful, there won't be any revenues to fund the Cancer Research Center?

he fact of the matter is that it appears that both locally and nationally, higher taxes on cigarettes are influencing smokers as tax collections on the sale of cigarettes have fallen. Certainly some of the decline is due to smokers actually quitting, but to some degree one has to suspect that some purchases were made via mail order from exempt Indian reservation outlets while others may be what is called gray market purchases, that is from sources outside the country.

What should come as a surprise is that most of the folks who have quit are of some means as they are more likely to recognize the health hazard caused by use of this product. That means most of those who are still smoking are among the lower-income members of our community. Thus, the tax is regressive, generating less and less collections from middle and higher-income individuals.

SB 669, SD1, RELATING TO CANNABIS

MARCH 1, 2023 · SENATE CONSUMER PROTECTION AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES · CHAIRS SEN. JARRETT KEOHOKALOLE AND SEN. DONOVAN DELA CRUZ

POSITION: Support with amendments.

RATIONALE: Imua Alliance <u>supports and suggests amendments</u> for SB 669, SD1, relating to cannabis, which establishes regulations for the cultivation, sale, and personal use of small amounts of cannabis, decriminalizes and regulates small amounts of cannabis for personal use, and establishes taxes for cannabis sales.

It is high time that Hawai'i stopped criminalizing people for smoking small amounts of a plant. While cannabis remains illegal under federal law, where it is classified as a Schedule I substance, the facts about cannabis consumption are clear. To begin, cannabis has a lower organic toxicity and addictive risk than alcohol, along with fewer correlating incidents of influence-related accidents and violence. More than half of all traffic fatalities in Hawai'i involve alcohol, yet no one seriously discusses the possibility of prohibition because of path dependence. In other words, alcohol is ingrained in our culture in a way that cannabis consumption is not, despite the former being more dangerous, statistically speaking, than the latter.

Similarly, cannabis abuse and dependence afflicts approximately 1.7 percent of the U.S. population, while alcohol abuse afflicts roughly 7.5 percent—over four times as many individuals. Cannabis is also not conclusively linked to an increase in violent behavior. Rather, reports

supposedly linking cannabis to violent crimes typically rely on information gathered by the Office of National Drug Control Policy, which, in turn, relies on source material that a) does not account for drug-trafficking and dispositional or psychological disorders; and b) fails to account for levels of deviancy (increased usage beyond average consumption rates). A more stark statistical correlation exists between increased alcohol consumption and violent crime, including child and intimate partner abuse, yet, again, no one is introducing, much less considering the merits of, limiting the personal consumption of alcohol. Additionally, only 30 percent of frequent (every other day or more) cannabis users report symptoms suggesting dependence, in contrast to nearly 70 percent for nicotine and 88 percent for harder drugs, like cocaine, calling into question legal opinions asserting that cannabis and hard drugs can be readily correlated to one another. If we do not criminalize overconsumption of the more dangerous drug of alcohol, in and of itself, why, once more, do we unduly criminalize cannabis consumption, particularly in small amounts?

Furthermore, legalizing recreational cannabis usage is an issue of restorative justice. As the visitor industry reaps record profits and supports expansion of the local prison-industrial complex, people of Native Hawaiian ancestry, who comprise approximately 25 percent of the state's population, suffer the pangs of a biased criminal (in)justice system. Approximately 39 percent of incarcerated detainees are Hawaiian, according to a comprehensive study by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, with the proportionality gap being even greater for Hawaiian women, who comprise 19.8 percent of the state's female population, but 44 percent of the state's female inmate population. Researchers also found that, on average, Hawaiians receive longer sentences, more parole revocations, and, importantly for this measure, harsher drug-related punishments than other ethnic groups, including for cannabis possession. Therefore, passage this measure is a step toward reforming and preventing more people from becoming victims of our unjust and racially coded prison system.

<u>Legalizing recreational cannabis could generate at least \$81.7 million in tax revenue</u> <u>annually for our state</u> according to a study published by the Hawai'i Cannabis Industry Association in January and would produce substantial additional criminal justice savings that could be spent delivering a quality education to our keiki, building basic infrastructure, expanding access to healthcare, and constructing truly affordable housing. Even the more conservative \$50 million revenue estimate produced by the Hawai'i Department of Taxation last year is enough to "stand up" a local cannabis industry. Many states have established well-regulated recreational cannabis industries that include restorative justice components for less than \$5 million.

Yet, we have concerns about the inadequacy of this measure as it currently stands. <u>To begin</u>, <u>this measure does not include any provisions regarding social equity</u>. As we struggle to fix our state's overcrowded prisons, we must enact systemic solutions that promote social justice and help to alleviate Hawai'i's mass incarceration problem. If implemented sensibly, cannabis legalization could lead to the most comprehensive mass expungement program ever seen on our shores, with people who have been incarcerated for cannabis infractions having their criminal records expunged and being released from the legal constraints that have unjustly impeded their ability to attain financial security and, in many cases, stolen their basic freedom.

Social equity must form the heart of any forward-thinking cannabis legalization program.

Our society's most marginalized people should be first in line to participate in the cannabis industry that we are seeking to grow. Agricultural and business practices should be based on regenerative, sustainable, and indigenous cultivation methods to ensure that cannabis operations uplift the needs and values of Hawai'i residents, not the profits of multistate corporations. <u>Yet, again, SB</u> 669 lacks any reference to social equity, which would only exacerbate the harm endured by those who have been prosecuted for cannabis and their families.

Accordingly, we urge your committee to pass language found in the original draft of SB 375 regarding social equity. We also encourage you to look at the fee and tax structure that was originally proposed in SB 375, which would guarantee that everyone pays their fair share to participate in the cannabis marketplace, including current medical dispensaries. Finally, we invite you to consider inserting additional protections for local cannabis operations into the bill to prevent multistate corporations—the so-called "Walmarts of cannabis"—from controlling our islands' cannabis industry, including the adoption of language that would allow a Hawai'i Cannabis Authority to set fees for non-local operators that far exceed those charged to local businesses (which should cost no more than a contractors' license), and provisions that would give people of Native Hawaiian ancestry preference in obtaining cannabis licenses.

Aloha e State of Hawaii Senators,

No law should limit how much food and medicine you can legally grow for your own community.

There is a very clear difference between LEGALIZING Recreational/Adult-Use cannabis and DECRIMINALIZING cannabis period.

Legalizing cannabis under SB669 essentially means that ONLY licensed dispensaries are allowed by the State of Hawaii to legally make retail sales to ANYONE 21+ years old. It is very apparent that the clear intent of the writers of SB669 was to ensure that legalizing cannabis equals **profits for corporate dispensaries** and **tax revenue for the State of Hawaii**. What SB669 does is **corporatize** and **commodify** a natural plant medicine and community catalyst **for corporate and government greed**. Everything else included in SB669 was written as an afterthought. This is apparent when comparing the social equity details from SB669 to SB375.

The fact that SB669 is being pushed along with HB1217 by the HICIA, makes it very clear that the agenda of the Hawaii Cannabis Industry Association (HICIA) and the State of Hawaii legislators who co-authored these bills are colluding to simultaneously take away growing and cultivation freedoms and rights from the existing qualified medical cannabis patients, growers, and caregivers under the 329 law, while concurrently legalizing the Hawaii adult retail cannabis market with clear stipulations that the ONLY legal means of accessing manufactured cannabis products will be through the corporate dispensaries. Access to manufactured cannabis products through any other means would therefore be criminal, and illegal. This is a clear infringement on rights to affordable medical access, rights to cultivation, and rights to medical self determination for Hawaii's qualified medical patients under the 329 law.

It is obvious that the concerted motive behind SB669 and HB1217 is to forcibly convert existing medical patients into dispensary customers by prohibiting their caregivers (starting 12/31/2023 under current law) and limiting the number of patients/plants that can be growing on a single property, no matter the size and acreage or zoning of the property. In effect, SB669 would legally push medical patients into the recreational market, without the patients' consent. It will effectively turn today's qualified medical patients and caregivers into criminals. This is government and corporate coercion. This is also a blatant disregard of Hawaii's antitrust laws (**Title 26. Trade Regulation and Practice 480. Monopolies; Restraint of Trade 480-2**). The

money-hungry motivation behind the justification and touted boon for legalizing dispensary recreational sales via SB669 as the opportunity for the State of Hawaii to make MILLIONS of dollars in tax revenue off of cannabis sales is very sad and short-sighted. The fact that they, the dispensaries and legislators who authored SB669, intend to take profits and tax revenue from their own constituents'/community's pockets is even sadder. And the fact that they are attempting to take profits and tax revenue from the pockets of Hawaii's qualified medical patients and kupuna is absolutely shameful.

It should be noted that NONE of the existing dispensaries affiliated with HICIA are owned by Native Hawaiians. NONE of the dispensaries are genuinely "locally-owned" by an individual or individuals who can trace their family history and lineage in Hawaii back more than 4 or 5 generations. And NONE of the dispensaries are owned by any "legacy growers" from the previously stigmatized, wrongfully incarcerated, prohibition era cannabis community.

It should be noted that despite the half-hearted attempt to "go through the motions" and complete a State-mandated "Social Equity Working Group" prior to the introduction of this year's adultuse/recreational cannabis legalization bills, there are no real or tangible social equity protections and assurances in SB669. It should be noted that NONE of the "Social Equity Working Group" members were Native Hawaiian. NONE of the members represented leaders from the qualified medical patients' community. NONE of the members represented leaders from the qualified medical caregivers' community. And NONE of the members represented leaders from the "legacy growers" community. There was literally NO SOCIAL EQUITY REPRESENTATION AMONG THE SOCIAL EQUITY WORKING GROUP MEMBERS. This is WRONG, MISGUIDED, and arguably UNETHICAL.

Please ask Senator Maile Shimabukuro if this was what she intended when she originally introduced this idea to mandate this Social Equity Working Group in the first place: ZERO Native Hawaiian representation, ZERO representation of the existing medical cannabis community, and ZERO ethnic and socioeconomic diversity.

SB669 makes a clear attempt to LEGALIZE Recreational cannabis for the sole financial benefit of tightening the dispensaries' grip on monopolizing the commercial cannabis market in Hawaii. These existing medical dispensaries have been chomping at the bit to start retail sales to ANYONE above the age of 21 years. It is especially disconcerting that the vast majority of the written testimonies in the previous hearings for this bill, SB669, by the JDC committee were in OPPOSITION, and nearly all of the testimonies in SUPPORT were submitted by the dispensaries affiliated with HICIA.

This bill is clearly pushing an agenda for ONLY corporate cannabis to profit off of an emerging industry, and is flagrantly forcing all local residents and tourists to buy from the dispensaries. There will be no "Trickle down effect" from the profits these corporate cannabis companies in Hawaii will be raking in. The very thought that the tax revenue generated from cannabis sales by the State of Hawaii will make it back into the community in any effective and meaningful way is an insult to the community and to Hawaii's tax paying residents. It is better if all that money just stays in the community's hands in the first place.

DECRIMINALIZATION of medical cannabis will financially empower Hawaii's socioeconomic bottom line. It will help local and Hawaiian families become caregivers and inspirational catalysts for their respective communities. It will allow local and Hawaiian families the opportunity to grow medicine for their kupuna, friends, and family members with chronic and terminal illnesses, and debilitating injuries. SB669 must be STOPPED because it does NOT legalize cannabis in Hawaii that produces social equity or community cohesion and healing. The existing dispensaries feel very haole, they function and operate in a very haole way, and this is evidenced in the fact that these corporate dispensaries have not successfully developed their own active medical patient-caregiver communities centered around their retail stores.

If this committee votes to pass SB669, it will be an act of conscious defiance and blatant disregard of the medical cannabis community and all of the constituents' whose personal testimonies represent the people of Hawaii. Passing SB669 will be a very public display of our State legislators placing the interests of cannabis corporations above the socionomic and medical interests of the people of Hawaii.

The better alternative is DECRIMINALIZATION. The State of Hawaii needs to make greater efforts to protect and improve the existing medical cannabis system and medical cannabis research industry, both inside and outside of the corporate dispensaries. Qualified medical growers and caregivers must be protected and preserved in perpetuity. It is ridiculous and cruel to expect elderly kupuna and patients with terminal diseases, chronic illness, and debilitating injuries to farm and cultivate their own medical cannabis. It is unreasonable and inefficient to expect every patient (who is unable or cannot grow their own medical cannabis) to have their own personal grower, while the law also PROHIBITS caregivers from growing for more than one patient. THIS NEEDS TO BE FIXED.

Cannabis should not be politically touted as a recreational drug or just another profitable economic good or commodity. It is medicine. Natural plant medicine that should be freely grown by anyone for the purposes of medical and spiritual healing. Treating it any other way is blatantly irresponsible, and by legalizing recreational adult use, the State of Hawaii will become liable for all the negative consequences that will affect the general population and the people of Hawaii, not to mention the anticipated number of tourists who will be caught using dispensary-purchased cannabis irresponsibly in public and/or in their vacation accommodations. As medical patients and caregivers, we are expected to learn the 329 law and follow it accordingly. We are also expected to learn and understand the science and chemistry behind the cannabis plant and products in order to properly gauge accurate dosage and proper use. Will the same expectations and mandatory education be required of all the tourists and residents who will be casually shopping at the recreational dispensaries?

We the people can clearly see what you are doing. And it is very apparent that if you legalize cannabis in this way, you are not making it fair and accessible for ALL, for pono reasons. You are rigging the market and cuckolding your constituents' rights to medical self determination and access to a plant and natural remedy. You will be taking away a medicinal plant from the community and handing the sole ownership of its cultivation and sales to the haole-owned, corporate dispensaries.

TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF SB 669 SD 1 – RELATING TO CANNABIS

Dear Chairs, Vice Chairs, and members of the Consumer Protection and Commerce and Ways and Means committee:

Aloha, my name is DeVaughn Ward and I am the senior legislative counsel at the Marijuana Policy Project ("MPP") — the largest marijuana policy reform organization in the United States. As you may know, MPP has been working to improve marijuana policy for more than 25 years.

I am here today to testify in support of **SB 669 SD 1 – Relating to Cannabis**. However, MPP has significant concerns on SB 669 SD 1 which is why we're urging you to amend and then pass it.

I. Cannabis legalization and regulation is far better approach than prohibition

More than eight decades of marijuana prohibition has not worked. Instead, it has derailed lives, torn families apart, wasted vast sums of taxpayer dollars, and put consumers and those selling cannabis at risk of arrest and violence.

Only legalization allows for regulation and control. Potency testing and labeling, child-resistant packaging, consumer education, and rules to prohibit hazardous pesticides and contaminants are only possible in a legal, regulated market. Environmental and worker protections are only possible in a legal, regulated industry.

II. MPP has several recommendations for amendments to SB 669 SD 1

While MPP supports the core purpose of SB 669 SD 1, we have several recommendations — including to prioritize patients during the transition, to create an equitable industry, to include reparative justice such as expungement and release, and to clarify several provisions.

First, the definition of "personal use" does not include an equivalency for cannabis concentrates and cannabis-infused products. Without specific possession limits for these cannabis preparations in SB 669 SD1, adults and law enforcement will not know how much cannabis products are legal to

possess. We suggest amending the language to use a defined term for possession and purchase limits and to define it as: "*Personal use amount*" means: (1) one ounce of cannabis plant material; (A) 10 grams of cannabis concentrate; and (B) any other cannabis products with up to eight hundred milligrams of THC."

The bill also prohibits cannabis related advertising "near" youth-centered areas. The word near is vague and subjective. We strongly suggest amending this language to add a specific distance so cannabis companies and regulatory enforcement officials will have clear guidelines on permissible and impermissible advertising. We suggest amending the language to state: *"Cannabis advertising shall be prohibited within one thousand feet of a youth-centered area..."*

The bill does not allow for cultivation licensees to transport cannabis products. We suggest giving cultivation licensees the ability to transport their products to other cannabis businesses.

SB 669 SD 1 allows regulators to create additional license types but does not start with a separate license for product manufacturers, unlike most cannabis legalization states. As is the case in most industries, those who grow cannabis will often not want to also make infused products or extractions — which require expensive equipment — and vice versa. There is also no strong policy reason to limit the number of product manufacturers. Having a single license for both types of cannabis businesses may require costly regulatory requirements of farmers who only want to grow. Separating these two businesses — but allowing dual licenses— will allow for more success in different aspects this new industry.

SB 669 SD 1 also prohibits an individual from having an interest in more than one license type. We believe this limit is overly restrictive. Moreover, this restriction is not required of the current medical cannabis licensees in Hawaii's medical cannabis or if the current medical licensees converted to dual use cannabis dispensaries as envisioned in SB 669. Some of Hawaii medical cannabis licenses have up to three cannabis cultivation/production centers and as many as three cannabis retail dispensaries under one license. We suggest amending this language to state: *"No person shall be granted or have any interest in a license as a cannabis testing facility license that also has a license as another type of cannabis business." It could also cap the number of retailers any one facility could have a controlling interest in, to prevent excessive market concentration.*

Section A-7 of the bill would allow Hawaii's eight current medical cannabis businesses to sell cannabis products to adults 21 and over when the bill takes effect. Missing are proper safeguards to ensure medical cannabis patients will have adequate access when the eight medical businesses convert to also sell to adults over 21. In New Jersey and Connecticut, medical licensees were required to inform regulators of medical patient preservation plans or meet production thresholds to ensure the licensees had adequate supply before they could start adult use sales. We strongly recommend adding the following language to ensure medical cannabis patients' access is not adversely affected by a dual use cannabis model. For example, it could provide, "*The license conversion application shall, at minimum, require a medical cannabis dispensary to submit to, and obtain approval from the department for a detailed medical preservation plan for how it will prioritize sales and access to medical marijuana products for qualifying patients, and to avoid price increases, including, but not limited to, managing customer traffic flow, preventing supply shortages and price increases on patients, and ensuring appropriate staffing levels."*

Notably, Section A-7 of the bill does not include a licensing fee for the eight current medical licenses to exclusively serve the adult-use market access for least two years, perhaps more depending on when final rules are adopted. There should be a significant licensing fee that would be used to set up regulatory infrastructure and to support training and technical assistance for new market entrants — including those hardest hit by prohibition.

Several other states, including Connecticut and Illinois, take this approach to foster equitable licensing. In Connecticut, medical licensees paid fees between \$750,000 and \$1 million dollars for the ability to convert to hybrid or dual use cannabis establishments and service consumers over the age of 21. In Illinois, medical cannabis businesses paid a fee of approximately \$750,000 to convert to dual use or hybrid cannabis businesses. We strongly recommend amending the language as follows: "(a) The license conversion fee for a medical cannabis dispensary to become a dual use cannabis dispensary shall be two hundred fifty thousand dollars for medical cannabis dispensaries that owns and operates three or more retail dispensing locations. (b) The license conversion fee for a medical cannabis dispensary shall be one hundred fifty thousand dollars for a medical cannabis dispensary to become a dual use cannabis dispensary to become a dual use cannabis dispensary shall be one hundred fifty thousand dollars for a medical cannabis dispensary to become a dual use cannabis dispensary to become a dual use cannabis dispensary shall be one hundred fifty thousand dollars for a medical cannabis dispensary that owns and operates two or fewer retail dispensing location."

Additionally, SB 669 SD 1 was amended to include restorative justice for individuals most impacted by cannabis prohibition in Hawaii. Restorative justice is concept that has been supported by the Judiciary Committee this session in its recent approval of SB 903. It is sound cannabis policy to adopt restorative justice measures in legalization models. Illinois' 2019 legalization law resulted in the expungement of over 800,000 cannabis convictions. Connecticut's 2021 legalization law automatically expunged over 40,000 cannabis convictions. As Hawaii considers cannabis legalization it's important that we use this opportunity not just for economic development, but also to remove the scarlet letter of cannabis convictions that for decades have denied many Hawaii residents chances for upward mobility.

However, we suggest adopting automatic release and expungement provisions similar to SB 1043, such as: "Each person arrested or convicted for an offense under chapter 329, Hawaii Revised Statutes, or under part IV of chapter 712, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for possession or cultivation of marijuana, shall be entitled to: (1) Release from the custody of law enforcement or incarceration no later than 90 days after the effective date of this Act, unless the person is also in custody or incarcerated for an offense that is not permitted by the new chapter of the Hawaii Revised Statutes; and 2) An expungement order, issued within days after the effective date of this Act, from the court in which the person was arraigned or convicted, that annuls, cancels, and rescinds the record of arrest and record of conviction, as applicable, for the relevant offense; provided that an expungement order shall not be issued for a person if the State, the department of the attorney general, or the applicable prosecuting attorney demonstrates good cause against the issuance of the order for that person." And:

"Any person convicted or arrested for distribution of marijuana may petition at any time for: (1) Release from the custody of law enforcement or incarceration; and 2) an expungement order; and relief shall be granted unless the prosecutor objects within 14 days and proves that relief would not be in the interests of justice.

Furthermore, we recommend including a provision that requires the state's lead actor in the record clearing process to issue a report on a regular basis (yearly, quarterly, etc.) on key metrics related to the fulfillment of automatic expungement for qualifying cannabis offenses. In shifting the process of record clearance away from the individual to the agencies that hold the criminal record, Hawaii should establish transparency requirements that allow lawmakers and citizens to monitor the state's progress towards implementation.

Lastly, SB 669 SD 1 lacks explicit market opportunities for individuals most harmed by cannabis prohibition. Most of the recent legalized states — Illinois, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, and Rhode Island — have adopted social equity measures to center individuals from communities hard hit by the war on drugs and with cannabis convictions by prioritizing these individuals in issuing new cannabis businesses licenses. Indeed, the Dual Use Cannabis Taskforce that convened this summer stated in their final report "The history of cannabis enforcement in Hawaii has engendered a diverse set of inequities across racial, economic, and geographic spectrums, and as the rest of the country is discovering as well, explicit policies must be put in place to redress these harms. Without integrated social equity policies, the experience of other states, as well as a variety of scholarly research sources, have shown that these inequities only increase in emerging cannabis industries."

With that in mind, we urge the committee to adopt the social equity language like those included in SB 375 as follows:

"(1) Disproportionately impacted area" means a census tract or comparable geographic area that has a poverty rate of at least twenty per cent according to the latest federal decennial census. (2) Social equity applicant" means an applicant that is a resident of the State that meets one or more of the following criteria: (a) An applicant with at least fifty—one per cent ownership and control by one or more individuals who have resided for at least five of the preceding ten years in a disproportionately impacted area; (b) An applicant with at least fifty—one per cent ownership and control by one or more individuals who: Have been convicted of, or adjudicated delinquent for any marijuana related offense under Hawaii Revised Statutes; (c) An applicant with at least fifty—one per cent ownership and control by one or more individuals who are "Native Hawaiian" as defined in section 10H-3 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes.

(3) The authority and department shall establish grant and loan programs for the purposes of providing financial assistance, loans, grants, and technical assistance to social equity applicants. (4) For social equity applicants, the authority shall waive fifty per cent of any nonrefundable license application fees; any nonrefundable fees associated with purchasing a license to operate a business licensed under this chapter; and any surety bond or other financial requirements for the first five years of the applicant's operations; provided that the social equity applicant meets the following qualifications at the time the payment is due: (a) The applicant, including all individuals and entities with ten per cent or greater ownership and all parent companies, subsidiaries, and affiliates, has less

than a total of \$750,000 of income in the previous calendar year; and (b) The applicant, including all individuals and entities with ten per cent or greater ownership and all parent companies, subsidiaries, and affiliates, has no more than two other licenses under this chapter.
(5) For a social equity applicant, the authority shall designate at least fifty per cent of the maximum number of applications that shall be for each license type exclusively for social equity applicants.

Revenue Allocations

We strongly urge the committees to set aside a percent of the tax revenue for each of the following, as is common in other legalization states: 1) community reinvestment, in disproportionately impacted communities; and 2) substance abuse treatment, education, and prevention, and for education about responsible use. Governor Green has identified the latter two as priorities he'd like to see in any legalization proposal that makes it to his desk.

In conclusion, we strongly support the legalization of cannabis possession and cultivation rights for adults over 21. However, SB 669 SD 1 can be strengthened to meet cannabis policy best practices. We urge you to amend SB 669 SD 1 to include a significant fee for medical operators to convert to adult use, patient protections, and prioritization of social equity licensing and then pass it.

Dear Chairs, Vice-Chairs and Members of the Committees:

Manoa Botanicals, LLC is one of eight licensees that operates on the island of Oahu, **strongly supports SB669** as an important bill for cannabis reform in the State of Hawai'i.

SB 669 addresses many concerns raised in the past about implementing an Adult-use of cannabis program in the State of Hawai'i. The bill provides steps to help control adult-use expansion using cost-effective methods that support strong regulatory measures. SB 669 accounts for, and mitigates, many of the failures of other states who have implemented Adult Use programs. Markets such as California, Oregon, and Washington have all suffered from uncontrolled expansion of their cannabis production and both licensed and unlicensed dispensaries. Hawaii already has seen illegal dispensary operations like, "Pinky's" as well as large scale illicit commercial production facilities posing as modest farms selling unregulated highly potent cannabis products.

SB 669 also prevents the further proliferation of unlicensed illicit operators by calling for sales on day one by licensed operators. In New York cannabis use was legalized in March 2021 however licenses were not issued until 8 months later, in November of 2021. This allowed the illicit market the opportunity to grow unchecked and has negatively impacted the program. Hawaii legalized the medicinal cannabis program in 2000 but did not stand-up licensed dispensaries until 15-years later and we have seen the impacts of illicit operators that originated during that time.

Hawai'i can control the transition to legalization by allowing day one sales of Adult Use cannabis while building out the rest of the program. Allowing adult use sales immediately upon passage of legalization is imperative to minimize the risk of black-market activity as seen in other jurisdictions. While the state doesn't have to grant that privilege to licensed medical dispensaries, the current medical program is already operating in a regulatory climate and can test adult-use demand and engagement using the controls and regulatory body already in place.



SB 669's proposed 10% cannabis excise tax and 4.5% GET tax on legal cannabis sales are estimated to generate **\$81 million in revenue surplus** for the state annually^[1]. This bill will generate tax revenue while diminishing illicit market sales that are untaxed and unregulated. There will be claims from opponents that this bill creates no new local jobs. That statement is patently false. In fact, the legal medical cannabis industry has already created hundreds of jobs, and adult-use legalization will create hundreds more. In the case of Noa, every single employee employed by Noa, lives and works in Hawai'i and our plans call for us to double our local employee base within three years of adult-use legalization.

This bill also sets very high safeguards to protect the community, especially individuals under the age of 21. SB 669 keeps the same standards as our current medical program plus additional measures to protect our communities. Without regulated testing or dosing, individuals will be unable to confirm whether the dosing or potency of products are accurate, consistent, or safe to consume. Certain products being sold by a large-scale illicit operator on Oahu are 25x's higher than the safe dosage allowed by the Department of Health Regulatory Rules for current licensed dispensaries. Not taking action to bring illicit cannabis activity into the light where it can be taxed, regulated, and made safe continues to put our communities at risk and is a serious public health hazard.

In conclusion, SB 669 provides a roadmap to ensure that the Adult-Use of cannabis in Hawai'i happens in a safe and controlled manner that is specific to Hawaii. The bill takes into consideration all the learnings offered by other states that have already implemented Adult-use programs to ensure that we avoid those missteps. The bill minimizes risks, creates efficient and effective policy, and will create economic opportunity while keeping our community safe.

Honorable Members of the Committee,

After meeting with legislators, Dept. of Health, and dispensary representatives, the development of SB 669 is following the same path as the establishment of dispensaries in 2015. After 6 years into the dispensary program development, less than 30% of medical patients are going to dispensaries and many dispensaries publicly stating they are going out of business with the burdensome regulations. The problem is very simple in my opinion. Legislation is split on any type of legal cannabis program moving forward. Many legislators represent communities that resist any type of cannabis legalization whether medical or recreational. The mood is "lets pass what we can pass even if it is a bad bill". This type of bill making is detrimental to the community and to the medical patients of Hawaii.

SB 669 has no data driving the bill, and on the contrary, there is a lot of data available to legislation to properly build a successful state dual use program. American for Safe Access released a 2021 report "An Analysis of Medical Cannabis Across the United States".

It is obvious that Senate bill 375 was drafted by proponents of marijuana legalization with heavy input from the existing cannabis industry. SB 669 if enacted would prove to be difficult to implement, regulate and enforce.

Hawaii 's cannabis authority board will be comprised of individuals that will lack objectivity due to the composition of this board. What we see in about every instance is the authority bested by statute in a governance board is dominated by members whose vested interest is the success of the program with little regard to the actual events that are occurring because of legalization of commercial adult use. This is reinforced throughout SB669 as very little language is devoted did collecting data so that informed decisions can be made in the following areas public health and public safety.

SB 669 attempts to correct or at least incentivize disenfranchised community members who are actively seeking licenses to manufacture distribute or sell commercial adult use marijuana. However laudable this may seem; it seldom produces tangible results.

Historically what we have seen in the states that have legalize commercial adult use marijuana, initially disenfranchised community members enter the marketplace but if you have sustainable resources to survive and thrive, we have seen a consolidation of ownership and each instance with larger corporate entities that have the fiscal resources and the ability to price competition out of business. According to the recent Colorado business statistics approximately 70% of Colorado 's commercial adult use industry is controlled by 8 individuals/ entities. We continue to see a consolidation within the marketplace in the state of Illinois and most recently in the state of New Jersey.

Senate Bill 669 Imposes Excessive Restrictions on Cannabis Licensing

Dear Chairmen Keohokalole and Dela Cruz and Members of the Committees:

On behalf of the Reason Foundation, I thank you for accepting these comments and making them part of the public record. Among other things, the Reason Foundation is committed to ensuring that state-regulated cannabis markets are designed in such a way that they remain dynamic and offer genuine economic opportunity to individuals from a range of backgrounds. We are concerned that key provisions in Senate Bill 669 impose unnecessary restrictions on licensing that will raise barriers to entry, limit entrepreneurial opportunities, and inhibit the transition of legacy cannabis suppliers into the regulated marketplace.

Specifically, Section A-8(a)(8) requires the proposed cannabis regulatory authority to place "restrictions on the number of licenses that may be issued." Similarly, Section A-5 (11) charges the agency to determine a maximum number of cannabis licenses that may be issued. This determination is not subject to further legislative review. The proposed agency is supposed to make this determination based on a review of market data to ensure the supply of regulated cannabis inventory does not exceed demand. The agency is instructed to make this determination prior to issuing rules that would implement the cannabis program. In other words, the agency would make calculations based on unreported transactions that occur in an illicit market. This is an impossible task given the illusiveness of illicit market data.

Moreover, this state-directed planning of supply would be misguided even if the information were readily available. Sponsors are concerned that an excess of supply relative to demand could result in the unauthorized distribution of regulated cannabis inventory. However, Sec. A-8(a)(5) already instructs the agency to adopt rules "to prevent the sale or diversion of cannabis and cannabis products" to unauthorized persons. To the extent this provision requires implementation of a statewide track-and-trace system granting regulators visibility into the location of all units of regulated marketplace. To the contrary, these limits raise barriers to entry that will impede the orderly transition of legacy cannabis suppliers into the regulated marketplace. Jurisdictions that have imposed limits on licenses have witnessed numerous instances of public corruption as officials have demanded or accepted bribes from aspiring licensees.¹ Lack of availability of licenses has led to vibrant activity among unlicensed

sellers from California to New York.

Exclusivity in licensing is only the first barrier to entry into the regulated marketplace that limits entrepreneurial opportunities and impedes transition of legacy suppliers into the regulated marketplace. High licensing fees are a second barrier. Sec. A-5(13) places no limit on the licensing fees that can be charged by the proposed cannabis regulatory authority. Section A-8(a)(2) nominally limits application fees to \$10,000, but allows the agency to go above this figure at its discretion. By comparison, application fees for most license types are \$1,000 or less in Alaska, California, Colorado, Maine, Massachusetts, Oregon and Washington.²

Finally, key provisions that should be included within a cannabis legalization measure appear to be missing from Senate Bill 669. There is no provision expressly stating that contracts between cannabis licensees are enforceable under Hawaiian law. Without this provision, parties may break contractual commitments on the basis of illegality. There is no provision protecting holders of occupational licenses from censure by regulatory authorities on the basis of providing services to a cannabis licensee. There is no provision protecting the parental rights of lawful, adult users of cannabis. Finally, the bill is silent on the role that local governments will play in regulating cannabis licensees.

There are many promising aspects of Senate Bill 669, including a competitive tax rate assessed on retail transactions only. We hope lawmakers resolve the problematic provisions so that Hawaii can launch a successful and dynamic adult-use program that avoids complications seen in other jurisdictions. We are happy to provide further recommendations toward this objective.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in opposition to *SB669 SD1*– Relating to Cannabis, which establishes regulations for the cultivation, sale, and personal use of cannabis. Decriminalizes and regulates small amounts of cannabis for personal use and establishes taxes for cannabis sales.

SB669 SD1 attempts to provide multiple venues for the use of recreational marijuana making it confusing and unworkable. Not only would there be dual use production, distribution and sales outlets for medical and recreational marijuana, but individuals for example could cultivate up to six plant and transfer small amounts of pot for personal use. A new independent *Hawaii Cannabis Regulatory Authority* would be created to regulate and license dispensaries. No rational is provided for eliminating DOH as the regulatory and licensing agent for medical and recreational cannabis dispensaries. DOH has been the regulatory entity for the past six years for medical use of marijuana operations. No mention made in the bill about safeguards for recreational pot use such as: health warnings against use by pregnant women, warnings against the use of marijuana by persons with a history of mental illness or substance use disorder (American Society for Addiction Medicine's 2021 Public Policy Statement on Cannabis).

Regarding taxes for cannabis sales, it is questionable whether dual use cannabis operations can be profitable enough to generate sufficient tax revenues. According to the 2022 Dual Use Cannabis Task Force, in six years of operations by medical use marijuana dispensaries only resulted in tax revenues of only \$2.5 million. In addition, surveys conducted by the Task Force indicated that three out of five marijuana users purchased product from illegal sources verses licensed dispensaries because of the cost differences. Further, it was estimated that it will take at least six years to generate profits on recreational marijuana sales. This is hardly a robust market for profitable recreational marijuana operations.

It is unclear how the new regulatory authority would regulate the personal cultivation and use of marijuana. No clear strategy is laid out on how to curb the illegal and well-established underground industry that now grows, sells, and distributes pot In summary, *SB669 SD1* lacks a strong regulatory structure for the management of dual use cannabis operations. Also, it is unclear how it will regulate personal use of marijuana and provide safeguards that will protect vulnerable users. The cannabis operations model does not appear to be able to generate sufficient tax revenues that would benefit the state.

Reported rates of marijuana use have more than doubled in the past decade. Medical marijuana is now legal in nearly half of US states and is increasing access to the drug for current and potential future users. *Although it is often portrayed as harmless, and sometimes even therapeutic, there has not been nearly enough studies done to prove this.* In fact, marijuana is often prescribed for issues like <u>anxiety</u>, though studies cannot comprehensively show this to be true. *The current available information of the impact marijuana has on the neurophysiology of the brain show, predominantly, depressive effects.*

In a recent study using PET imaging to demonstrate the release of dopamine in the striatum, a region of the brain that is involved in working memory, impulsive behavior, and attention, *results showed that heavy marijuana use has similar dopamine releasing behaviors as <u>cocaine</u> <u>and heroin with addiction</u>. Several studies in chronic cannabis users show structural changes to the hippocampus persist, even after six months of abstinence.*

U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy has already warned that we're too quick to legalize the popular drug when research still hasn't shown whether or not it's truly safe. With Amen's new research, there is proof that Dr. Murthy's concerns are well warranted.

Just published in the most recent <u>Journal of Alzheimer's Disease</u>, the research finds that, *after studying imaging of 1,000 cannabis users' brains, there were signs of noticeable deficiencies of blood flow*. The study, which included 25,168 non-cannabis users, and 100 healthy controls, shows a scary and obvious difference in blood flow levels for those that used cannabis. Additionally, *those that used marijuana showed a significant lack of blood flow in the right*

hippocampus, the area of the brain that helps with memory formation. This part of the brain is severely affected with those that suffer from Alzheimer's disease.

Our research has proven that marijuana users have lower cerebral blood flow than non-users. The most predictive region separating these two groups is low blood flow in the hippocampus on concentration <u>brain SPECT imaging</u>. This work *suggests that marijuana use has damaging influences in the brain – particularly regions important in <u>memory and learning</u> and known to be affected by Alzheimer's. Our research demonstrates that marijuana can have significant negative effects on brain function. The media has given a general impression that marijuana is a safe recreational drug, this research directly challenges that notion.*

Several studies of perfusion imaging in marijuana users have shown similar results compared to ours. A small O15 PET study in a sample of 12 marijuana users used a randomized clinical trial design to examine brain perfusion before and after marijuana use. The study results found frontal, temporal and occipital lobe hypo-perfusion – all findings concordant with our study.

As of 2022, 37 states and four U.S. territories allow the use of cannabis for either or both medical and personal purposes. Hawaii enacted Chapter 329, part IX, Hawai'i Revised Statutes to create a medical use of cannabis exemption from criminal sanctions and chapter 329D, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, was enacted to authorize medical cannabis dispensaries to operate beginning July 2016.

In addition to medical cannabis laws, some states and jurisdictions have legalized or decriminalized cannabis. In each state, cannabis users no longer face jail time for the possession or use of cannabis in the amount permitted by statute. As of 2020, 21 states and three United States territories have legalized recreational cannabis.

Colorado was the first state to remove the prohibition on commercial production of cannabis for general use. During the first year of legal cannabis sales in 2014, Colorado collected \$67,594,323 in taxes and fees from medical and retail cannabis. As of November 2020, Colorado has collected \$1,563,063,859 in total revenue from cannabis taxes and fees.

The federal government has also signaled its approval of decriminalization at the federal level. On December 4, 2020, the United States House of Representatives passed the Marijuana Opportunity Reinvestment and Expungement Act, or MORE Act, which removes cannabis from the list of federally controlled substances and facilitates cancelling low-level federal convictions and arrests related to cannabis. This was the first time Congress has acted on the issue of decriminalizing cannabis.

Legalization of cannabis for personal or recreational use is a natural, logical, and reasonable outgrowth of the current science of cannabis and attitude toward cannabis. Cannabis cultivation and sales hold potential for economic development, increased tax revenues, and reduction in crime. Please pass SB669 SD1.

The entire patient community that is involved in the ongoing BOYCOTT of dispensaries is served and supplied by existing law. Altering laws governing patient cultivation before the period of community participation proposed in the cannabis control council portion of related legislation will lead DIRECTLY to patients being prevented from accessing the medical care they choose.

The option to pay commercial proces at a dispensary cannot substitute for the FREE medical cannabis patients are currently able to grow. Any alterations to existing hard won patient cultivation rights prevents effective and appropriate use by a large portion of the patient community.

The free exchange of cannabis seeds without fear of criminal penalties is an established and hard won, indispensable aspect of medical cannabis in Hawaii. The existing patient breeder community preserves heirloom and landrace cultivars of cannabis that require outdoor growth in sun shine. Such varietals are incapable of growing in meaningful quantities in any reasonable indoor environment. The genepools of cannabis in question cannot be preserved without the cooperative efforts of the patient community, as the current practices legally allow, through the legal sharing of seeds and plants. Any aspect of commerce or renumeration can be addressed through currently existing laws.

Including seeds in the definition of 'cannabis, to be regulated and criminalised, violates existing patient rights. The production of medical cannabis seeds for patients, by patients, IS PROTECTED under current law; the requirements that male plants must be tagged and will count in the ten plant limit per patient, even though the males produce no usable flowers, acknowledges that seed production by the patients THEMSELVES is an indispensable part of producing effective medical cannabis.

Any legislation altering accepted and legal patient cultivation regulations based on data that misrepresents the patient community as criminals is an unforgivable abuse of the legislative process.

Rec legal cannabis is inevitable. Patient needs supercede the interests of any commercial enterprise, dispensary permit holders or national lobbyist groups.

My husband and daughter both died in 2022, I am crippled, left with only a memory, and the ashes of those I loved MOST in this life. We were all medical cannabis patients. Jenny had six months to live, but we made it stretch out for almost three years. My husband died in my arms, at home. He was the love of my life. Every single day we were together, we grew our flowers, together in the sun. It was part of the hope and the healing that kept us alive, and those moments in the sun, playing in the dirt are the happiest memories of my life.

The HICIA report calls Don and Jenny criminals, lumps us all in a "black market" created by HICIA mis-representing data to Paul Brewbaker of TZeconomics, and then to the state legislature.

If I cannot submit video testimony, how can you see my tears? How can you hear my sobs.

I STRONGLY oppose SB669 that establishes regulations for the cultivation, sale, and personal use of small amounts of cannabis, decriminalizes and regulates small amounts of cannabis for personal use, and establishes taxes for cannabis sales.

"Recreational" cannabis, unlike "medical" cannabis, does not contain CBD to modulate the adverse effects of THC. Some in the general public, without doing research, may not understand the difference. Recreational cannabis is just another way to get high.

The THC in cannabis is known to affect the heart, lungs, and mental health of individuals.

This will cause a rise in crime that is already out of control.

There will be an increase of impaired drivers and vehicle accidents.

I'd like to comment on the need to reform and improve the system to support small farmers that are currently excluded from the cannabis industry.

I am also here to argue for a more fair and accessible path to adult use cannabis in Hawai'i that doesn't represent only the commercial interests of the existing dispensary licensees and doesn't doom our state to unresponsive and entrenched monopolies in cannabis. I think there are some elements of SB 669 that could move us in this direction, but as the language is currently written, this bill will sadly lead to yet another captured market, artificially high prices for customers, no competition in the marketplace and therefore low diversification and quality of products, and a continued high rate of participation in the 'legacy' market for both farmers and consumers who will simply seek their products elsewhere. The passage of the business regulation parts of this bill could be worse than the status quo as it would create truly entrenched companies with a two-year lead on every other small farmer and a guarantee that literally all businesses in the Adult Use market flow through their licenses.

WHAT I SUPPORT

-Immediate decriminalization in Part II Section A 2 and Part III. We would also like to see expungements and clearing of cannabis convictions be a part of this to ensure the damage we have already unjustly done to many innocent cannabis users doesn't continue to harm them.

WHAT I OPPOSE

-Part II Section 6 & 7, which would represent a massive payout to only the nine existing dispensary owners and create an unworkable program that they completely control. A two-year

window to exclusively profiteer is an inexcusable injustice to the many talented and hardworking cannabis entrepreneurs who could create a local, sustainable economy but would be locked out simply to feed these companies' profits. There can be no justifying a carveout like this for companies who already control so much of the state medical cannabis marketplace, who enjoy explicit state favoritism that I and others can personally attest to in the enforcement actions of the police and Department of Health, and who engage in potentially illegal and prohibited activity because of that favoritism.

I believe that from the start the application and licensing process should be open to anyone who can meet reasonable standards of preparedness and who is willing to take on the risk and challenge of starting a business in this field. How else can we easily monitor and analyze the scope of cannabis usage in Hawai'i if we don't let folks who know how to grow and provide these products participate in the market? How could someone new compete with a licensee who not only has two years to build brand and customers and real estate but that they also have to distribute all of their products through and have to rely on for manufacturing services? That is completely messed up and unacceptable to believers in free markets and in the greater good. We want a larger number of small, hyper-local businesses whose earnings and jobs will stay right here at home no matter what happens in the future. Let's build that local and sustainable economy together.

This model is broken before it even launches, and I can't support it without first seeing serious decriminalization and major competitive reforms in the medical program to provide a legal path for small farm entrepreneurs.

Drug Policy Forum of Hawai'i (DPFH) <u>strongly supports</u> SB 669, SD 1, which would legalize, regulate, and tax cannabis and manufactured cannabis products for responsible adult use. It is welcome to see that Hawai'i now has a governor who supports adult-use legalization, which also has longstanding bipartisan support.

This bill could be strengthened by increasing the threshold of personal cannabis possession, transfer, and transport to at least 4 ounces. Existing rights under current laws pertaining to medical cannabis should be grandfathered into a dual-use system. Meaningful employment protections for registered medical cannabis patients and prospective adult-use cannabis consumers would be another salutary amendment.

The blanket prohibition against vaporized cannabis products is unwarranted and precludes a key delivery mechanism for those who are not inclined to smoke cannabis flower or ingest manufactured products like tinctures and edibles. At minimum, vaporized cannabis products through authorized manufacturers could be subject to stricter labeling requirements. Product labeling should also not summarily restrict the usage of color, including shades of green, red, blue, and yellow.

The proposed Hawai'i Cannabis Regulatory Authority (HCRA) would likely be better attached to the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA) for administrative purposes. DCCA is better situated to promulagate business regulations and taxation policies to facilitate investment in Hawai'i's emerging adult-use cannabis economic sector.

The Department of Health can continue to play a key role in the state's emerging cannabis economy by (1) ensuring that cannabis flower and manufactured cannabis products for the adult-use market are in compliance with regulations related to testing and labeling, and (2) overseeing the ongoing medical cannabis program and prospective research into the therapeutic potentialities of specific cannabis cultivars.

The prospective HCRA should also provide for adequate representation by those who can provide needed perspectives, including formal representation of patient advocates and Native Hawaiian groups that may include the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and county-specific producer huis that can support the emergence of a thriving craft cannabis sector.

As the Legislature moves forward in its deliberations, it should continue to carefully consider how best to forward social justice measures that ensure meaningful levels of participation in every segment of the emerging adult-use cannabis economy for those who have been marginalized and criminalized through cannabis prohibition and the larger drug war. This may include language directing the HCRA to develop goals and timetables for equitable participation in every segment of the adult-use cannabis sector.

<u>The current regime of cannabis prohibition deepens the already extensive impact of the</u> <u>criminal legal system on Native Hawaiians</u> and residents from under-resourced communities, including those who are unhoused. Cannabis prohibition lengthens terms of probation or parole apart from a more calibrated determination of increased safety risks to the community. Prolonged periods of probation or parole increase the likelihood of a return to jail or prison at great cost to state taxpayers. <u>A 2020 report from the Pew Charitable Trusts found that this</u> <u>state has the longest average term of probation at almost five years</u>.

Meaningful social equity centers impacted communities in every stage of production and distribution, from the growth of cannabis plants to the distribution and delivery of cannabis flower and manufactured cannabis products, as well as licensing and the provision of technical assistance. Employment opportunities should be made available to formerly incarcerated persons and those otherwise involved in the criminal legal system. Businesses should be required to develop social responsibility programs that include equity initiatives.

Related to equity concerns, those with retail licenses should be encouraged to formally engage growers and producers in the current legacy market for supplies of cannabis flower and manufactured cannabis products.

The participation of <u>craft cannabis growers</u>—and businesses owned and operated by Native Hawaiians, women, and other groups underrepresented in other commercial sectors—is a vital way to promote social equity and help Hawai'i develop products that will command a premimum in prospective national and international markets. <u>Interstate cannabis commerce</u> <u>may soon be on the horizon</u>. Craft cannabis growers can be supported by prospective authorization to provide direct-to-consumer on site and delivery sales. Craft cannabis can also serve as a centerpiece of cannabis tourism in our state. Last year, *Forbes* valued the cananbis tourism sector at \$17 billion. The availability of legal cannabis products will be attractive to many visitors from domestic and international jurisdictions that do not permit legal adult use. This is currently the case with Hawai'i residents who visit Nevada, every other state with a Pacific coastline, and other states that now include Montana and Missouri.

Social equity also includes baseline statutory provisions providing for the expungement of cannabis-related offenses on a person's criminal records. Long term arrest data indicate that Native Hawaiians are disproportionately impacted by overcriminalization of cannabis in every county. A misdemeanor conviction features many "collateral consequences" that impact an individual's ability to obtain employment, housing, and education. Adult-use cannabis legalization will curb the negative impact of our state's drug law enforcement on those from Native Hawaiian and under resourced communities.

Recent domestic and international developments in the cannabis industry indicate that a system of workable regulations can provide new opportunities for prospective investors and local business owners to facilitate well-paid regular employment for kama`aina in the production and distribution of a range of quality consumer products. Once established, these businesses can attract an increased level of capital investment that might not otherwise be available to Hawai'i's economy. Even a smaller state like Alaska, which has a modest adult-use cannabis sector that has been online for three years, now sees \$25 million in excise tax revenue.

While cannabis use is not entirely devoid of individual health risks, its use does not produce the injury, illness, and death resulting from regular or problematic use of alcohol or tobacco, two widely used licit substances that are not included in the federal Controlled Substances Act.

As a general matter, DPFH supports evidence-based education for all persons, from students to seniors, that includes science-based information on alcohol and other drugs and the promotion of resilience through harm reduction.

DPFH also supports policies that would move toward expeditious treatment upon request for those with diagnosed substance use disorders, including alcohol and other drugs, mental health issues, and sufficient numbers of stabilizaiton beds in every county to facilitate a person's engagement in treatment. As noted by the American Public Health Association (APHA):

Public health approaches offer effective, evidence-based responses, but some of the most effective interventions are not currently allowed in the United States

owing to outdated drug laws, attitudes, and stigma. Substance misuse treatment is too often unavailable or unaffordable for the people who want it. A criminal justice response, including requiring arrest to access health services, is ineffective and leads to other public health problems. (Policy Statement, "Defining and Implementing a Public Health Response to Drug Use and Misuse.")

DPFH also supports APHA in "ending the criminalization of drugs and drug consumers, prioritizing proven treatment and harm reduction strategies, and expanding (and removing barriers to) treatment and harm reduction services." (*Id.*)

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of this timely reform. Hawai'i can uniquely position itself to participate in an emerging industry that will likely experience protracted growth on a domestic and international basis in the coming years.

Aloha,

Below are some comments that I believe can help strengthen this bill, but I'd like to make it clear from the outset that I strongly support SB669. Sensible drug policy, criminal justice and policing reform, promoting business and entrepreneurship, a revenue-generating tax in exchange for something people actually want — these are all solid reasons to support legalization of recreational and responsible cannabis use by adults.

In terms of strengthening this bill, I would first amend the proposed Section A-8, subsection (2) of the proposed Chapter, "Regulation of cannabis; rules." In keeping with the well-intentioned spirit of making cannabis business opportunities accessible, I believe the \$10,000 application fee cap should be lowered. Since the proposal already provides for the ability to raise the fee in case of administrative needs, I propose the cap be lowered significantly, perhaps to \$2,500.

When it comes to employers and the workplace, I suggest amending the proposed §A-10, Effect on employers, specifically subsection (2). If this bill is to make any sense and follow the same logic as its justification, we should not permit unfair discrimination against responsible adults who use cannabis during their time at home. While I understand it may take more specific language and that certain jobs may still mandate a zero-use policy, there are models in other states for legislation that accommodates off-the-job cannabis use, much like laws regarding alcohol consumption.

On a similar note, while separate legislation may be required to fully cover this, §A-11, Effect on intoxicated driving laws, notwithstanding chapter 291E, may be improved if language is included that differentiates between noticeable, current intoxication as opposed to any blood or similar tests. This is a difficult subject to tackle, both legally and scientifically, but it is simply bad policy to allow for persecution based on numbers that may not reflect intoxication at the time of driving and arrest. Such a policy can be easily abused by law enforcement and prosecutors, similar to the way current law enables incursions on privacy based on the pretense of officers simply saying they smell cannabis. This Legislature can look to other jurisdictions that have already addressed such "per se laws" on intoxication.

Lastly, regarding Section 15 of SB669, I hope this language does not preclude steps toward restorative justice such as those admirably laid out in Section 3, which proposes to amend Ch. 706, HRS. The introduction of this bill specifically points to the federal MORE Act, and I think

it would be shameful if Hawai'i's legalization process makes a nod to expungement yet doesn't include efforts to reverse consequences of the failed War on Drugs. Separate orders and proper case prioritization by prosecutors can make a big difference, but our legislative branch, if legalizing cannabis, should make clear that non-violent and low-level crime purely related to cannabis charges are no longer persecuted.

Aloha chair Rhoads and Vice-chair Gabbard and members of the Committee,

Thank you for hearing testimony on this important bill. This bill will legalize the personal use of cannabis by allowing patients to possess 30 grams or less, grow six plants, create a regulatory authority, and define the types of licenses.

I live in Honolulu and am in your district, senator Rhoads. I am writing this in strong **opposition** for the following reasons.

I do support the decriminalization of cannabis, and I agree with having retail locations where adults can purchase cannabis.

I do not support the framework that this bill presents.

I am starting with the creation of the Hawaii Cannabis Regulatory Authority. This body is given immense power, and very little oversight from the community is dangerous and will lead to corruption.

I instead recommend the language from Senator Lee's bill. This revision will prevent cronyism. One Person from the public health sector is to be appointed by the DOH, The director of consumer affairs will appoint one Person from the cannabis industry, and One Person to be appointed by the chairperson of the civil rights commission.

One Person to be appointed by the chairperson of the commission on the status of women; One Person to be appointed by the chairperson of the board of trustees of the office of Hawaiian affairs; One Person from a nonprofit advocacy organization that focuses on cannabis decriminalization or correctional justice reform to be appointed by the governor. One Person from the public appointed by the governor; and

Two persons from the public, one each to be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives and president of the senate.

The member representing the public health sector or the public, or the member's immediate family, may not have a financial interest in the cannabis industry or liquor industry.

The bill proposes four types of commercial licenses for cannabis Cultivation, retail, testing, and dual use. I think consideration for consumption, tourism, and delivery should also be considered.

Chapter A-7 Pilot period

This gives our eight dispensary license holders an indefinite hold on our cannabis market. The current license holders have had the market to themselves for long enough. And according to their data, only 25% of patients purchase cannabis from them. Why grant them exclusive control

over a market? Instead, open it up immediately, allowing people to apply and create more diversity.

Section 9

It doesn't make sense and is honestly horrific to me.

To the Hawaii State Legislature,

I strongly OPPOSE bill SB 669 Relating to Cannabis.

However, I agree we should release people from Hawaii prisons who are strictly serving time for use of marijuana. Hawaii State should keep use strictly for medicinal purposes only.

My reasons for opposition is as a mother, US Citizen, native Hawaiian, and Hawaii Homeowner.

Consideration needs to be given for those in society who do not smoke nor like the pungent smell or want second hand smoke to effect their employment. I currently have neighbors that enjoy partaking in its consumption, perpetually, and careless about their neighbors but I do not personally agree with it or like the smell coming into my house. It's not something that kids should be used to smelling or seeing people doing as they grow to mimic those around them. Further, although an 18yr old is validated as an adult we know that they are still developing as a young adolescent thru 25yrs old when their brains become fully developed. As such, the impulsive, risk-taking nature that comes with ages 18-25 includes reckless behavior, potential increase in DUIs. Cannabis (Marijuana) use causes memory loss and degradation of IQs in adolescents. This is not the bright, healthy future I want for our youth in this state. We have many degenerate people here living by a moral subjectivism mentality adding to the degradation of moral uprightness and nobility in our culture. Instead of looking at a pure business tax revenue perspective or the money also look at the cause and effect of opening this revolving door in our culture & society. We also know marijuana is a depressant meaning it doesn't inspire people to work hard and get active or be productive. It slows people down physically, mentally and psychologically often causing emotional, mental and eating issues.

To add, the on-going debate and study related to whether marijuana is a gateway drug for other substances. According to NIH National Institute of Drug Abuse, "Some research suggests that marijuana use is likely to precede use of other licit and illicit substances.⁴⁵ and the development of addiction to other substances. For instance, a study using longitudinal data from the National Epidemiological Study of Alcohol Use and Related Disorders found that adults who reported marijuana use during the first wave of the survey were more likely than adults who did not use marijuana to develop an alcohol use disorder within 3 years; people who used marijuana and already had an alcohol use disorder at the outset were at greater risk of their alcohol use disorder worsening.⁴⁶ Marijuana use is also linked to other substance use disorders including

nicotine addiction. Early exposure to cannabinoids in adolescent rodents decreases the reactivity of brain dopamine reward centers later in adulthood.47 To the extent that these findings generalize to humans, this could help explain the increased vulnerability for addiction to other substances of misuse later in life that most epidemiological studies have reported for people who begin marijuana use early in life.48 It is also consistent with animal experiments showing THC's ability to "prime" the brain for enhanced responses to other drugs. 49 For example, rats previously administered THC show heightened behavioral response not only when further exposed to THC but also when exposed to other drugs such as morphine—a phenomenon called cross-sensitization.50 These findings are consistent with the idea of marijuana as a "gateway drug." However, the majority of people who use marijuana do not go on to use other, "harder" substances. Also, cross-sensitization is not unique to marijuana. Alcohol and nicotine also prime the brain for a heightened response to other drugs51 and are, like marijuana, also typically used before a person progresses to other, more harmful substances. It is important to note that other factors besides biological mechanisms, such as a person's social environment, are also critical in a person's risk for drug use. An alternative to the gateway-drug hypothesis is that people who are more vulnerable to drug-taking are simply more likely to start with readily available substances such as marijuana, tobacco, or alcohol, and their subsequent social interactions with others who use drugs increases their chances of trying other drugs."

The bill sited other states that have went ahead and legalized cannabis / marijuana for recreational use but have you done research on the rise of hospitalizations and ER visits or long term impacts of its use and the public studies on how people have committed suicide due to psychosis. One condition coming to the forefront called, Cannabinoid Hyperemesis Syndrome (CHS) which is **a condition that leads to repeated and severe bouts of vomiting**. It is rare and only occurs in daily long-term users of marijuana. Marijuana has several active substances. These include THC and related chemicals. These substances bind to molecules found in the brain.

According to an Observation Study, Acute Illness of Cannabis Use by Route Exposure, from Annals of Internal Medicine, "There were 9973 visits with an ICD-9-CM or ICD-10-CM code for cannabis use. Of these, 2567 (25.7%) visits were at least partially attributable to cannabis, and 238 of those (9.3%) were related to edible cannabis. Visits attributable to inhaled cannabis were more likely to be for cannabinoid hyperemesis syndrome (18.0% vs. 8.4%), and visits attributable to edible cannabis were more likely to be due to acute psychiatric symptoms (18.0% vs. 10.9%), intoxication (48% vs. 28%), and cardiovascular symptoms (8.0% vs. 3.1%). Edible products accounted for 10.7% of cannabis-attributable visits between 2014 and 2016 but represented only 0.32% of total cannabis sales in Colorado (in kilograms of tetrahydrocannabinol) during that period.

I wish I had the time to unpack this more but again I STRONGLY OPPOSE SB 669.
