SB 740, RELATING TO NATIVE HAWAIIAN BENEFICIARIES

February 2, 2023

Aloha Chair Shimabukuro, Vice Chair Fevella, and members of the Committee:

The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands (DHHL) submits testimony in support of this measure which requires DHHL to digitize its applicant, beneficiary, and lessee records by creating an interactive digital database software program to be completed and available for use no later than July 1, 2024.

DHHL's Application Waitlists alphabetically or by island is available on DHHL's website. To modernize the DHHL information systems, DHHL recommends that a consultant be hired to assist in taking inventory of the needs and wants of all the information systems. DHHL would then create a phased implementation plan, ensuring integration between systems. This will create a clear IT roadmap to follow. This initial consultant cost is estimated at \$100,000 to \$200,000 and will take up to one year to complete once awarded.

Thereafter, Phase I of the implementation plan is expected to include some of the client services applications (which replaces the legacy Applicant/Lessee System and Mortgage Loan System) and if possible, a Land Inventory upon which all the other systems should be based on. DHHL wants to ensure that it creates an integrated information system and not just stand-alone applications or systems. It is estimated that Phase 1 will cost \$3,000,000 due to the highly customized nature of the applications that need to be integrated. The estimated time frame is 2 to 4 years and will require intensive staff involvement. Additional staff is likely necessary in order to sufficiently maintain each module of the new system, but such personnel needs have not been assessed. DHHL expects that recommendations as to the number of support personnel will be part of consultant's function in assisting DHHL formulate its implementation plan.

This bill should be amended to provide adequate time and funding for development of a phased implementation plan detailing the next steps and additional funding, personnel, and time required.
