SB 826 - RELATING TO THE SCHOOL FACILITIES AUTHORITY

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this measure, which transfers \$200,000,000 of general funds previously appropriated to the School Facilities Authority of the Department of Education to the school facilities special fund. The University of Hawai'i (UH) supports recent efforts to expand access to affordable and quality early care and education opportunities throughout the State. In collaboration with key stakeholders, including the School Facilities Authority, UH is working on expanding its availability and offerings of early learning programs on a number of its campuses. And while we are still developing how these facilities and programs can be sustained, we believe that State support of early childhood programs and facilities – wherever they may be located – are valuable to advancing educational development and learning for Hawai'i keiki.

Providing additional flexibility in the timeline will allow the School Facilities Authority to continue the construction, renovation, improvement and expansion of prekindergarten classrooms across the State. The measure could also contemplate enabling the School Facilities Authority to either contract, or transfer to, other state agencies appropriation in order to further accelerate the development of new facilities.

The Department of Budget and Finance (B&F) offers comments on this bill.

RELATING TO THE SCHOOL FACILITIES AUTHORITY

Senate Bill (S.B.) No. 826 amends Act 257, SLH 2022, by: 1) depositing the \$200,000,000 in general funds appropriated to the School Facilities Authority for pre-kindergarten facilities into the School Facilities Special Fund (SFSF) in FY 23; and 2) appropriating the same amount out of the SFSF in FY 23.

B&F would like to point out that S.B. No. 826 as drafted would adversely impact the State's efforts to meet federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) maintenance of effort (MOE) requirements in FY 23. State funds appropriated for pre-kindergarten facilities are not counted as support for elementary and secondary education in the ESSER MOE formula. Depositing the \$200,000,000 into the SFSF in FY 23 would increase the denominator, making it more difficult to meet the ESSER MOE requirement. Consequently, it is strongly recommended that the deposit be made in FY 24 instead.

B&F also notes that the present SFSF allowable uses may not accommodate all of the developing plans to increase pre-kindergarten classroom capacity. Amendments

to Section 302A-1706, HRS, "School facilities special fund" may be necessary if pre-kindergarten facility developments are being planned for non-school properties.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in **strong support of S.B. 826**, with a proposed technical amendment to deposit the monies in fiscal year 2024 instead of 2023 to ensure the State's federal maintenance of effort requirements are not impacted. S.B. 1023 transfers \$200 million of general funds previously appropriated to the School Facilities Authority of the Department of Education to the school facilities special fund.

The Legislature passed Act 257, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022 which appropriated \$200 million for fiscal year 2022 – 23 for the School Facilities Authority to expand access to pre-Kindergarten to eligible children in our state. The changes proposed in H.B. 960 make technical amendments to designate that the funds be deposited into the school facilities special fund, however we support an amendment to deposit the funds in fiscal year 2024

RE: SB 826, Relating to Early Learning

E ka Luna Hoʻomalu Dela Cruz, ka Hope Luna Hoʻomalu Keith-Agaran, a me nā lālā o ke Kōmike o nā Loaʻa a me nā Hoʻolilo o ka ʻAha Kenekoa, aloha kākou. My name is Dr. Waiʻaleʻale Sarsona, Vice President of Hiʻialo at Kamehameha Schools.

Kamehameha Schools <u>supports</u> SB 826, which transfers \$200,000,000 of general funds previously appropriated to the School Facilities Authority of the Department of Education to the school facilities special fund.

The enactment of Act 46 (2020) launched Hawai'i on a path forward to ensure that every threeand four-year-old has access to early learning by year 2032. Hawai'i is still recovering from the negative impacts of the pandemic in this sector, which resulted in the statewide decrease in capacity to provide childcare by 12%, including 2,850 fewer preschool seats. Our keiki cannot afford to lose any more.

Last session, and through Act 257 (2022), the Legislature made a significant advancement in ensuring that every three- and four-year-old has access to early learning by year 2032 by appropriating \$200 million to the School Facilities Authority (SFA) to expand access to pre-kindergarten to eligible children across the state. **SB826** will ensure a more expeditious expansion of pre-kindergarten throughout Hawai'i, which will support A.L.I.C.E. (Asset Limited Income Constrained and Employed) families and serve all keiki in need of early learning. **Please advance this measure.**
