A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN EMERGENCY APPROPRIATION TO THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION FOR FOOD SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. This Act is recommended by the governor for
- 2 immediate passage in accordance with article VII, section 9, of
- 3 the Constitution of the State of Hawaii.
- 4 SECTION 2. The legislature finds that the department of
- 5 education is required to provide meal service for its students
- 6 and staff. The department provides approximately twenty
- 7 thousand school breakfasts and eighty thousand school lunches on
- 8 a daily basis to students and staff across the State. However,
- 9 the department of education has accumulated a deficit of more
- 10 than \$20,000,000 for its food service operations, which is
- 11 largely due to inflationary cost increases. In the 2022-2023
- 12 school year, more than eighty per cent of the department's food
- 13 costs increased by forty-two per cent, resulting in the need for
- 14 additional funds.
- 15 The legislature further finds that for many students, a
- 16 school meal is their only regular source of food for their
- 17 growing bodies and minds. School meals are required to follow

- 1 strict federal food safety and nutrition guidelines, which
- 2 ensure quality meals. The department of education plays a vital
- 3 role in the health and well-being of youth in the State's
- 4 communities.
- 5 The legislature also finds that while students and staff
- 6 are required to pay for their meals, Title I students are
- 7 provided meals free of charge. However, because school meals
- 8 are critical for student development, students are not denied
- 9 meals due to a lack of payment.
- 10 Therefore, the purpose of this Act is to make an emergency
- 11 appropriation to the department of education for its food
- 12 service fiscal deficit and to continue to provide public school
- 13 students with high-quality, nutritious meals.
- 14 SECTION 3. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of
- 15 the Constitution of the State of Hawaii and sections 37-91 and
- 16 37-93, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined
- 17 that the general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2023-
- 18 2024 has already been exceeded by \$1,033,839,854 or ten per
- 19 cent. The appropriations contained in this Act will cause the
- 20 state general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2023-2024
- 21 to be further exceeded by \$20,000,000 or one per cent. This

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- 1 declaration takes into account the additional general fund
- 2 appropriation(s) authorized for fiscal year 2023-2024 in this
- 3 Act only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund
- 4 expenditure ceiling are that:
- 5 (1) The appropriations made in this Act are necessary to
- 6 serve the public interest; and
- 7 (2) The appropriations made in this Act meet the needs
- 8 addressed by this Act.
- 9 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$20,000,000 or so
- 11 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 to
- 12 provide funding for the department of education to cover its
- 13 food service operations.
- 14 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 15 education for the purposes of this Act.
- 16 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
