### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STATE FIRE MARSHAL.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in the aftermath of 2 the Lahaina wildfire, six house of representatives interim working groups were established and charged with evaluating 3 4 specific topics related to the wildfire and making 5 recommendations for appropriate legislative action in the regular session of 2024. The wildfire prevention working group 6 7 was tasked to identify the causes of wildfires and preventative 8 action that may be taken to reduce the risk of wildfires 9 throughout the State.

The legislature further finds that Hawaii is the only state 10 11 without a state fire marshal. In 1979, the position of the 12 state fire marshal was abolished and replaced with the state 13 fire council. The state fire council is now composed of the 14 fire chiefs of the four counties, the state aircraft rescue 15 firefighting unit, and the state protections forester from the department of land and natural resources, division of forestry 16 and wildlife. 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employment. The state fire council has an office staff
consisting of two part-time administrative specialists. The
legislature further finds that rising global temperatures have
increased the risk of fires and dangerous weather conditions in
the State and as these risks increase, the State will be better
served by having a dedicated state fire marshal.

7 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to re-establish the 8 position of the state fire marshal by establishing the office of 9 the state fire marshal within the department of labor and 10 industrial relations, headed by the state fire marshal.

SECTION 2. Chapter 132, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated and to read as follows:

14 "§132- Office of the state fire marshal; established. There is established the office of the state fire marshal 15 (a) 16 within the department of labor and industrial relations. The 17 office shall be headed by a state fire marshal, who shall be 18 appointed by the state fire council to serve for a term of five 19 years. The appointment of the state fire marshal shall be made without regard to chapters 76 and 89, and shall not be subject 20 21 to the advice and consent of the senate. In the event of a

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1	vacancy, t	the state fire council shall meet expeditiously to
2	select and	appoint a new state fire marshal to serve the
3	remainder	of the unexpired term. The state fire marshal may
4	<u>hire staff</u>	as necessary.
5	(b)	The state fire marshal shall have the qualifications,

7	control ne	ecessary to successfully perform the duties of the
8	position.

19		code and submitting the proposed amendments to the

3	(6)	Reviewing the emergency resources that are available
4		in the State to be deployed to address fires;
5	(7)	Assessing whether the State would benefit from a
6		statewide public fire safety messaging program;
7	(8)	Assisting in the investigation of fires when requested
8		by a county;
9	(9)	Conducting inspections of state buildings and
10		facilities to ensure fire safety compliance;
11	(10)	Providing and coordinating public education and
12		awareness on fire safety;
13	(11)	Overseeing the training and certification of fire
14		inspectors and investigators in the State;
15	(12)	Maintaining records of all fires in the State,
16		including the causes and circumstances;
17	(13)	Assisting in the disbursement of federal grants for
18		structural fire protection purposes to the counties;
19		and
20	(14)	Performing other duties as necessary or delegated by
21		the state fire council.

5	SECTI	ON 3. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

11		safely the duties of the positions;
12	(24)	The sheriff;
13	(25)	A gender and other fairness coordinator hired by the
14		judiciary;
15	(26)	Positions in the Hawaii National Guard youth and adult
16		education programs;
17	(27)	In the state energy office in the department of
18		business, economic development, and tourism, all
19		energy program managers, energy program specialists,
20		energy program assistants, and energy analysts;

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1	(28)	Administrative appeals hearing officers in the
2		department of human services;
3	(29)	In the Med-QUEST division of the department of human
4		services, the division administrator, finance officer,
5		health care services branch administrator, medical
6		director, and clinical standards administrator;
7	(30)	In the director's office of the department of human

Section 132-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows: 5 In addition to adopting a state fire code pursuant to "(b) 6 section 132-3, the state fire council shall: 7 Administer the requirements for reduced ignition (1) propensity cigarettes, in accordance with chapter 8 9 132C; [and] Serve as a focal point through which all applications 10 (2) 11 to the federal government for federal grant assistance 12 for fire-related projects shall be made. Upon the receipt of any such federal grants, the state fire 13 14 council shall administer those federal grants [-]; 15 (3) Establish the terms of employment for the position of 16 the state fire marshal; and 17 (4) Appoint the state fire marshal." 18 SECTION 5. The state fire council shall submit a report of 19 its findings and recommendations, including any proposed 20 legislation, to the legislature by November 1, 2024. The report

21 shall include the following, at minimum:

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#### An organizational plan, including structure and 1 ~(1) personnel plan, for the office of the state fire 2 3 marshal; A description of the roles and division of (2) 4 responsibilities between the State and the counties, 5 6 and the office of the state fire marshal and the state 7 fire council, regarding fire prevention and response; 8 and 9 (3) Proposed operating budget for the office of the state 10 fire marshal. SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general 11 12 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$172,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for the 13 14 following: 15 \$120,000 for the establishment of one full-time (1) equivalent (1.00 FTE) permanent state fire marshal 16 17 position; \$40,000 for the establishment of one full-time 18 (2) equivalent (1.00 FTE) permanent position to support 19 20 the state fire marshal; and


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1	(3) \$12,000 for training, office supplies, rent, and other
2	operating and administrative costs to support the
3	state fire marshal,
4	in carrying out the purposes of this Act.
5	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
6	labor and industrial relations for the purposes of this Act.
7	SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
8	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
9	SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2024.
