A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATIONAL HEALTH SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that all medication
- 2 requests to be administered by school health assistants are
- 3 currently reviewed and must be approved by department of health
- 4 public health nurses. This process ensures that a health care
- 5 professional has reviewed the medication request and determined
- 6 that it is safe and appropriate for a student to receive
- 7 treatment. For example, some medications would be best
- 8 administered before or after school and other medications may
- 9 not be allowed if a school health assistant is not qualified to
- 10 assess the need for as-needed medication. Medication
- 11 administration is part of the medication management process and
- 12 requires clinical supervision by a health care professional,
- 13 including a registered nurse, advanced practice registered
- 14 nurse, physician assistant, or physician, to ensure the health
- 15 and safety of students if unlicensed assistive personnel, such
- 16 as school health assistants, are utilized.

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1	The legislature further finds that some schools have a
2	registered nurse, advanced practice registered nurse, or other
3	specialized health care provider on campus through written
4	agreements with the department of education. Partnerships with
5	federally qualified health centers and the university of Hawaii
6	at Manoa Nancy Atmospera-Walch school of nursing have greatly
7	improved access to health services for students at school and
8	through telehealth. Student care would be more efficient,
9	accessible, and safe if the administration of medication could
10	be performed with the approval of a health care professional
11	within the department of education, department of health, or a
12	health care service pursuant to a written agreement with the
13	department of education. The existing law prevents health care
14	professionals who are already on campus or in the school
15	community from performing the function of medication approval.
16	The purpose of this Act is to:
17	(1) Update the term "school health aides" to "school
18	health assistants" to reflect updated job titles at
19	the department of education; and
20	(2) Allow administration of medications by school health
21	assistants at school with the approval of a health

1	care professional within the department of education,
2	the department of health, or a health care service
3	pursuant to a written agreement with the department of
4	education.
5	SECTION 2. Section 88-21, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6	amended by amending the definition of "year round school
7	employee" to read as follows:
8	""Year round school employee": any teacher, school
9	administrator, school health [aide,] assistant, educational
10	assistant, school security attendant, or other salaried ten-
11	month department of education employee working in a public
12	school operating under a single-track restructured instructional
13	schedule."
14	SECTION 3. Section 302A-708, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15	amended to read as follows:
16	"[+]§302A-708 Career development opportunities.[+] The
17	department [of education] shall provide career pathways
18	development and training opportunities to all school health
19	[aides] assistants in the school health services field and other
20	fields within the department [of education] to ensure the

1	opportunity for continued employment with the department (OF		
2	education]."		
3	SECTION 4. Section 302A-853, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
4	amended to read as follows:		
5	" §30	2A-853 Administration of medication. (a) School	
6	health [aides] assistants may assist students by administering		
7	oral, nasal, and topical medication, and in emergency		
8	situation	s, other premeasured medication[+], including but not	
9	limited t	o auto-injectable epinephrine for anaphylaxis,	
10	bronchodi	lators for asthma, and seizure rescue medication for	
11	seizure d	isorders; provided that:	
12	(1)	If the student receiving the medication is a minor, a	
13		parent or guardian requests and authorizes the	
14		administration of medication;	
15	(2)	The medication has been prescribed by a licensed	
16		physician, as defined in section 334-1, or by a	
17		practitioner with prescriptive authority;	
18	(3)	The administration of the medication is with the	
19		approval of [the department of health; and] a health	
20		care professional within the department, the	
21		department of health, or a health care service as	

1		defined in section 323D-2 pursuant to a written
2		agreement with the department; and
3	(4)	The administration of the medication is necessary for
4		the health of the student and for the student's
5		attendance at school.
6	(b)	For purposes of this section, "health care
7	profession	nal" means a physician, surgeon, and other individuals
8	licensed	pursuant to chapter 453 and nurses licensed pursuant to
9	chapter 4	57. "
10	SECTION 5. Section 302A-854, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
11	amended to read as follows:	
12	"§302A-854 School health [aides;] assistants;	
13	compensat:	ion. All full-time school health [aides] assistants
14	employed :	in the department shall be employed and have their
15	compensation fixed in accordance with chapter 76 and the	
16	appropriate collective bargaining agreement, executive order,	
17	executive directive, or rule."	
18	SECT	ION 6. Section 457-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
19	amended to	o read as follows:
20	"§45"	7-13 Exceptions. This chapter does not prohibit:
21	(1)	The furnishing of nursing assistance in an emergency;

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1	(2)	The practice of nursing that is incidental to the
2		program of study engaged in by students enrolled in
3		nursing education programs accredited by the board;
4	(3)	The practice of nursing under a nonrenewable permit
5		by:
6		(A) A graduate of; or
7		(B) An applicant who has provided proof that the
8		applicant has completed the entire educational
9		curriculum required for graduation for a nursing
10		license from,
11		a school that is in or under the jurisdiction of the
12		United States, a territory, or a foreign jurisdiction,
13		and whose accreditation is recognized by the board;
14		provided that following completion of subparagraph (A)
15		or (B), the candidate takes the first licensing
16		examination scheduled by any board of nursing
17		recognized by the board and has submitted to the board
18		an application for a license to practice nursing in
19		the State; [and] provided further that the permit
20		shall be valid for three months or until the results

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1		of the licensing examination are received by the
2		board;
3	(4)	The practice of any legally qualified nurse of another
4		state who is employed by the United States or any
5		bureau, division, or agency thereof, while in the
6		discharge of the nurse's official duties;
7	(5)	The practice of nursing in connection with healing by
8		prayer or spiritual means alone in accordance with the
9		tenets and practice of any well recognized church or
10		religious denomination $[\tau]$; provided that no person
11		practicing such nursing claims to practice as a
12		registered nurse or a licensed practical nurse; or
13	(6)	The administration of oral and topical medication and
14		in emergency situations, other premeasured medication,
15		by school health [aides] assistants as provided in
16		section 302A-853."

Report Title:

Educational Health Services; Medication Administration; School Health Assistants; Exceptions

Description:

Replaces the term "school health aides" with "school health assistants" to reflect recent changes to the job title. Authorizes the administration of medication to public school students by school health assistants with the approval of a health care professional within the Department of Education, the Department of Health, or a health care service pursuant to a written agreement with the Department of Education.
