A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to protect the
2	environment and reduce costs to taxpayers by establishing a zero
3	waste initiative and packaging reduction and reuse program, with
4	participation and funding from large producers of consumer
5	packaged goods. The program shall be developed through:
6	(1) An implementation plan that:
7	(A) Requires the department of health, with the
8	assistance from each county, to develop an
9	assessment of statewide needs to determine
10	resources required to reduce packaging waste by
11	seventy per cent from the baseline amount, with
12	priority on waste prevention through eliminating
13	unnecessary packaging and switching to reusable
14	packaging systems;
15	(B) Establishes an advisory council composed of
16	relevant stakeholders that will advise the
17	department of health on how to structure a

1		producer-funded packaging reduction and reuse
2		program; and
3	(C)	Requires the department of health to develop the
4		packaging waste reduction and reuse program; and
5	(2) A pa	cking waste reduction and reuse plan and program
6	that	::
7	(A)	Develops a packaging waste reduction and reuse
8		program implementation plan by December 31, 2025,
9		including decisions on producer funding after
10		public process; and
1	(B)	Beginning July 1, 2026, implements a packaging
12		waste reduction and reuse plan funded in whole or
13		in part by producers.
14	SECTION 2	C. Chapter 342G, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15	amended by add	ling a new part to be appropriately designated and
16	to read as fol	lows:

19	§342G-A	Definitions . Whenever used in this part, unless a
20	different mean	ning clearly appears from the context:

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2 council established pursuant to section 342G-C. 3 "Baseline amount" means the weight and number of items of 4 packaging waste each county determines was sent to its 5 landfills, a power plant that burns municipal solid waste as a 6 fuel, or both, during calendar year 2024. 7 "Brand" means a name, symbol, word, or mark that identifies 8 a product, rather than its components, and attributes the 9 product to the owner of the brand. 10 "Consumer packaged goods" means a product that is sold 11 quickly and at a relatively low cost, such as prepared food and beverages in food service, packaged foods, non-deposit 12 13 beverages, household cleaning products, toiletries, personal

"Advisory council" means the packaging waste advisory

3	"Packaging reduction" means the reduction of the weight and
4	number of items of packaging used to provide products for
5	consumption.
6	"Person" means any individual, partnership, firm,
7	association, public or private corporation, limited liability
8	company, not-for-profit organization, public benefit
9	corporation, public authority, federal agency, the State or any
10	of its political subdivisions, trust, estate, or any other legal
11	entity.
12	"Producer", with respect to packaging material, means:
13	(1) Any person, except for the State or any of its
14	political subdivisions, that manufactures or uses in a
15	commercial enterprise, sells, offers for sale, or
16	distributes the packaging material in the State under
17	the brand of the manufacturer;
18	(2) An entity that is not the manufacturer of the
19	packaging material but is the owner or licensee of a
20	trademark under which the covered product is used in

commercial enterprise, sold, offered for sale, or

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1		distributed in the State, whether or not the trademark
2		is registered; or
3	(3)	An entity that imports the packaging material into the
4		United States or the State for use in a commercial
5		enterprise, sale, offer for sale, or distribution in
6		the State.
7	"Ret	urnable" means that a product can be conveniently
8	returned	after use to a reuse or return system.
9	"Reu	sable packaging" means a product or packaging that is:
10	(1)	Reusable, refillable, or returnable;
11	(2)	Non-toxic;
12	(3)	Safe for washing and sanitizing according to
13		applicable state food safety laws; and
14	(4)	Part of a system that achieves multiple cycles of use,
15		equitable access, and reduce waste.
16	"Reu	se and refill" means the return of packaging back into
17	the econo	mic stream for use in the same kind of application
18	intended	for the original packaging, without changing the
19	original	composition or purpose of the product or the components
20	thereof.	

1	"Zero waste" means the conservation of all resources by
2	means of responsible production, consumption, reuse, and
3	recovery of products, packaging, and materials without burning
4	and with no discharges to land, water, or air that threaten th
5	environment or human health.
6	§342G-B Hawaii zero waste initiative program. (a) Ther
7	is established within the department a Hawaii zero waste
8	initiative program to manage the State's transition from a
9	linear economy that disposes of solid waste, often after only
10	single-use, to a circular economy that prioritizes reducing an
11	reusing much of the State's solid waste. The zero waste
12	initiative program shall design, implement, and administer
13	activities that include:
14	(1) Strategic partnerships for the research, development
15	testing, certification, and deployment of reusable
16	packaging technologies;
17	(2) Engineering and economic evaluations of Hawaii's
18	potential for near-term project opportunities for the
19	State's zero waste resources;

1	(3)	A statewide zero waste public education and outreach
2		plan to be developed in coordination with the
3		University of Hawaii;
4	(4)	Promotion of Hawaii's reusable packaging resources to
5		potential partners and investors; and
6	(5)	A plan, to be implemented from 2026 to 2029, to assist
7		the State and each county in transitioning toward zero
8		waste.
9	(b)	Before the initiation of any activities authorized
10	under sub	section (a), the department shall develop a plan of
11	action to	effectively prioritize and focus efforts consistent
12	with the	State's zero waste programs and objectives.
13	(c)	The department shall submit a report to the
14	legislatu	re no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
15	each regu	lar session on the status and progress of new and
16	existing	zero waste initiatives. The report shall also include:
17	(1)	The spending plan of the Hawaii zero waste initiative
18		program;
19	(2)	All expenditures of funds available for zero waste

initiatives; and

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1	(3) The targeted markets of the expenditures, including
2	reasons for selecting those markets, the persons to be
3	served, specific objectives of the program, and
4	program expenditures, including measurable outcomes.
5	§342G-C Packaging waste advisory council; duties;
6	established. (a) On or before January 1, 2024, the department
7	shall establish a packaging waste advisory council, which shall
8	advise the department on the needs assessment pursuant to
9	section 342G-D and packaging waste reduction and reuse plan
10	pursuant to section 342G-F.
11	(b) The advisory council shall:
12	(1) Provide recommendations to the department on how best
13	to achieve a seventy per cent reduction in packaging
14	waste sent to landfills or incinerated;
15	(2) Advise the department in the development of a
16	producer-funded packaging waste reduction and reuse
17	program that addresses the following:
18	(A) The types of materials being used for packaging
19	by product, products eligible for reuse and
20	refill, and products targeted for waste reduction
21	and diversion;

1	(B)	The costs to transition to systems that reduce
2		waste or encourage reusable packaging and the
3		portion of those costs that will be covered by
4		producers;
5	(C)	The programs and infrastructure that are needed
6		in Hawaii to divert packaging waste from
7		landfilling and incineration and the costs of
8		developing and running those waste diversion
9		programs;
10	(D)	The needs and costs to improve Hawaii's packaging
11		materials collection systems and sorting and
12		processing facilities, including the portion of
13		the costs that will be covered by producers;
14	(E)	The size of producers to be included as "covered
15		producers" engaged in the program;
16	(F)	The metrics that should be utilized to determine
17		the amount of fees collected from producers;
18	(G)	The metrics that should be used to determine the
19		baseline amount of packaging generated by each
20		producer and for subsequent reporting, noting
21		that weight alone shall not be considered a

1			sufficient metric since transitioning to single-
2			use plastic to meet the requirements of reduction
3			is not considered acceptable;
4		(H)	The covered products to include in the program;
5		(I)	The packaging material requirements that
6			producers shall follow and the timeline for
7			meeting such requirements;
8		(J)	The state and county staffing needs to support a
9			packaging reduction and reuse program;
10		(K)	The administrator of the program; and
11		(L)	The viable alternative packaging solutions for
12			locally made and imported products;
13	(3)	Be s	ubject to section 26-34; and
14	(4)	Perf	orm any relevant analysis and make appropriate
15		reco	mmendations for the legislature, department,
16		coun	ties, and other stakeholders in developing
17		crit	eria for reuse and refill programs.
18	The	advis	ory council's recommendations shall include how to
19	transitio	n eac	th county to develop and integrate new programming,
20	or expans	ion c	f existing programming, to achieve the goals of

1	the packa	ging waste reduction and reuse program to be developed
2	and imple	mented pursuant to section 342G-F.
3	(c)	The advisory council shall consist of the following
4	members:	
5	(1)	The director of health or the director's designee, who
6		shall serve as the chair of the advisory council;
7	(2)	The chairs of the standing committees in the senate
8		and the house of representatives with primary subject
9		matter jurisdiction over the environment or the
10		chairs' designees;
11	(3)	A representative from the city and county of Honolulu
12		department of environmental services with experience
. 13		in sustainable waste management;
14	(4)	A representative from the county of Maui department of
15		environmental management with experience in
16		sustainable waste management;
17	(5)	A representative from the county of Kauai department
18		of public works with experience in sustainable waste
19		management;

1	(6)	A representative from the county of Hawaii department
2		of environmental management with experience in
3		sustainable waste management;
4	(7)	One representative of community organizations in each
5		of the four counties that have focused on packaging
6		waste reduction, selected by the chair;
7	(8)	One expert in governmental activities regarding
8		programs to achieve packaging waste reduction
9		nationally and internationally, selected by the chair;
10	(9)	Three representatives of large producers of packaging
11		waste from consumer packaging goods in Hawaii,
12		selected by the chair;
13	(10)	One representative of Hawaii small businesses that
14		manufacture products in the State, selected by the
15		chair;
16	(11)	Two national experts in reusable packaging who are not
17		affiliated with any packaging producers in Hawaii,
18		selected by the chair; and
19	(12)	Two representatives from recycling and waste hauling
20		businesses working in Hawaii, selected by the chair.



- 1 (d) The members of the advisory council shall serve for
- 2 two-year terms and may be reappointed by the chair. The members
- 3 shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed by the
- 4 department for expenses, including travel expenses necessary for
- 5 the performance of their duties.
- **6** (e) The chair shall determine how often the advisory
- 7 council shall meet. The council meetings shall be open to the
- 8 public and are subject to chapter 92. The department shall
- 9 provide administrative support to the advisory council. The
- 10 department may hire a facilitator to administer the advisory
- 11 council.
- 12 §342G-D Needs assessment. (a) The department, with
- 13 assistance from each county and advice and input from the
- 14 advisory council, shall develop a statewide needs assessment,
- 15 which shall detail the resources needed to reduce packaging
- 16 waste from each respective county's baseline amount by seventy
- 17 per cent by 2030; provided that for a county with a population
- 18 greater than five hundred thousand:
- 19 (1) The needs assessment shall detail the resources needed
- 20 to reduce its packaging waste that the county sends to

1		a landfill or to a power plant that burns municipal
2		solid waste as a fuel; and
3	(2)	The county shall categorize its resource needs by
4		method of packaging waste disposal.
5	(b)	The department shall compile the needs assessments and
6	consolida	te them along with any recommendations made by the
7	counties	and work with the advisory council to develop an
8	implement	ation plan as described in section 342G-F; provided
9	that prio	rity shall be given to packaging reuse and refill
10	programs.	
11	§342	G-E Packaging waste special fund. (a) There is
12	establish	ed in the state treasury the packaging waste special
13	fund into	which shall be deposited:
14	(1)	All fees, payments, and penalties collected by the
15		department pursuant to this part;
16	(2)	Any appropriation by the legislature into the special
17		fund;
18	(3)	Any grant or donation made to the special fund; and
19	(4)	Any interest earned on the balance of the special

- 1 (b) The packaging waste special fund shall be administered
- 2 by the department.
- 3 §342G-F Packaging waste reduction and reuse plan and
- 4 program; implementation. (a) The department shall develop a
- 5 producer-funded waste reduction and reuse plan to achieve the
- 6 goal of a seventy per cent reduction of the amount of packaging
- 7 waste deposited in landfills or incinerated in the State by
- 8 2030. The plan shall:
- 9 (1) Determine what producers and products shall be
- 10 covered;
- 11 (2) How fees shall be set;
- 12 (3) How reduction shall be measured; and
- 13 (4) Reporting requirements for the producers;
- 14 provided that reduction shall not be measured by reducing the
- 15 weight of packaging as it is against the goals of the State to
- 16 increase the use of single-use plastics.
- 17 (b) By July 1, 2025, the department shall issue a draft
- 18 implementation plan designed to achieve a seventy per cent
- 19 reduction of packaging waste deposited in landfills or
- 20 incinerated in the State by 2030 for review and comment by the
- 21 advisory council. Within sixty calendar days after receiving



- 1 the draft plan, the advisory council shall provide
- 2 recommendations based on majority vote. Any advisory council
- 3 member who does not endorse the recommendations of the council
- 4 may submit a separate written recommendation to the department
- 5 reflecting a minority opinion. The department shall consider
- 6 the recommendations of the advisory council in developing the
- 7 final draft for public review. By December 31, 2025, the
- 8 department shall publish a final draft implementation plan for
- 9 public review and comment pursuant to chapter 91. The public
- 10 shall have ninety calendar days to provide written and oral
- 11 comment. The department shall consider public input in
- 12 developing a final plan.
- 13 (c) On or before July 1, 2026, the department shall
- 14 publish a final packaging waste reduction and reuse
- 15 implementation plan, including an implementation strategy
- 16 designed to achieve a seventy per cent reduction of packaging
- 17 waste deposited in landfills or incinerated in the State by
- 18 2030, with funding in whole or in part from covered producers
- 19 beginning on July 1, 2026.
- 20 §342G-G Hiring process initiation. The department and
- 21 counties shall hire contractors or employees in order to be



1 ready to implement the packaging waste reduction and reuse 2 program beginning July 1, 2026. 3 \$342G-H Rules. The department may adopt rules pursuant to 4 chapter 91 necessary to implement this part. 5 §342G-I Annual report. The department shall submit an 6 annual report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior 7 to the convening of each regular session, beginning one year 8 after the establishment of the packaging waste reduction and 9 reuse program. The report shall contain a summary of the 10 following: 11 (1)Progress made toward achieving the seventy per cent 12 packaging waste reduction goal, including the amount 13 of packaging eliminated by weight and number of items; 14 The needs assessments: (2) 15 (3) Moneys deposited into the packaging waste special 16 fund; 17 The use of any moneys from the packaging waste special (4)18 fund; and Any other findings and recommendations, including any 19 (5)

proposed legislation.

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§342G-J Applicability. This part shall not apply to any 1 2 material that is regulated by the department as a deposit beverage or used in the packaging of a product that is regulated 3 4 as a drug, medical device, or dietary supplement by the United 5 States Food and Drug Administration under the Federal Food, 6 Drug, and Cosmetic Act or the Dietary Supplement Health and Education Act of 1994." 7 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 8 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and 10 11 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 12 year 2024-2025 to be deposited into the packaging waste special 13 fund established pursuant to section 342G-E, Hawaii Revised 14 Statutes. 15 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the packaging waste special fund established pursuant to section 342G-E, 16 17 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the sum of \$ or so much 18 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the 19 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 20 2024-2025 for the department of health to fund contractors or

two full-time equivalent (2.0 FTE) permanent packing reduction

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- 1 coordinator positions; provided that one coordinator position
- 2 shall administer the packaging reduction program and assist the
- 3 counties and one coordinator position shall develop rules,
- 4 oversee and manage goals and objectives related to packaging
- 5 waste reduction, and develop reports.
- 6 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 7 of health for the purposes of this Act.
- 8 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the packaging
- 9 waste special fund established pursuant to section 342G-E,
- 10 Hawaii Revised Statutes, the sum of \$ or so much
- 11 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the
- 12 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 13 2024-2025 to fund and manage the packaging waste advisory
- 14 council established pursuant to section 342G-C, Hawaii Revised
- 15 Statutes, including any facilitator.
- 16 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 17 of health for the purposes of this Act.
- 18 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
