A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DIGITAL EQUITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that digital equity
- 2 across the State and in every community is essential to the
- 3 well-being and economic realities of the State's residents. The
- 4 need for digital equity is significant, highlighted by the
- 5 devastating impacts of the recent coronavirus disease 2019
- 6 pandemic. The lack of digital equity has had a tremendously
- 7 negative effect in many areas, but particularly socio-
- 8 economically disadvantaged communities.
- 9 The legislature further finds that digital equity has meant
- 10 the difference between an employee being able to work remotely
- 11 or possibly facing unemployment. Additionally, digital literacy
- 12 and broadband access are critical tools for those seeking to
- 13 access social services such as unemployment claims, Supplemental
- 14 Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits, vital records, and
- 15 other essential government, educational, and medical services.
- 16 The legislature further finds that digital equity in the
- 17 State would enhance Hawaii's overall economic development,

- 1 education, health care, and emergency services. Making grants
- 2 available to achieve digital equity for disadvantaged
- 3 populations would move the State toward universal access to
- 4 broadband services.
- 5 The legislature strongly supports efforts to improve
- 6 digital equity for residents, consumers, and businesses across
- 7 the State.
- **8** The purpose of this Act is to identify and address any
- 9 remaining obstacles to digital equity in all areas of the State
- 10 by establishing the digital equity grant program to award grants
- 11 and create an environment in which all individuals and
- 12 communities in the State have the information technology
- 13 capacity needed for full participation in society, democracy,
- 14 and the economy.
- 15 SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
- 16 adding a new chapter to title 13 to be appropriately designated
- 17 and to read as follows:
- 18 "CHAPTER
- 19 DIGITAL EQUITY GRANT PROGRAM
- 20 § -1 Definitions. As used in this chapter:
- "Broadband" means high-speed internet.

1 "Covered household" means a family whose income for the 2 most recent full year is no more than two hundred per cent of 3 the federal poverty level. "Covered populations" means: 4 5 (1)Individuals who live in covered households; 6 (2) Individuals aged sixty years and older; 7 (3) Incarcerated individuals, other than individuals who are incarcerated in a federal correctional facility; (4) Veterans: 10 (5) Individuals with disabilities; 11 (6) Individuals with a language barrier, including 12 individuals who: 13 (A) Are English learners; and 14 (B) Have low levels of literacy; 15 (7) Individuals who are members of a racial or ethnic 16 minority group; 17 (8) Individuals who primarily reside in a rural area; and 18 Homeless or unsheltered individuals. (9) 19 "Department" means the department of business, economic 20 development, and tourism.

- 1 "Digital equity" means a condition in which all individuals
- 2 and communities have the information technology capacity needed
- 3 for full participation in society, democracy, and the economy.
- 4 "Digital equity services" means a service that increases
- 5 digital literacy and broadband access in covered populations.
- 6 "Office" means the department's Hawaii broadband and
- 7 digital equity office.
- 8 "Program" means the digital equity grant program
- 9 established by this chapter.
- 10 "Project" means a proposed digital equity project set forth
- 11 in an application for grant funding authorized by this chapter.
- 12 "Project area" means an area that is proposed to be covered
- 13 in an application for grant funding authorized by this chapter.
- 14 § -2 Digital equity grant program; establishment. There
- 15 is established a digital equity grant program which shall be
- 16 placed within the office for administrative purposes. The
- 17 office shall receive and review grant applications and may award
- 18 grants for eligible projects pursuant to the program.
- 19 § -3 Eligible projects. To be eligible for a grant, the
- 20 area to be served by the project shall include covered
- 21 populations on the date the application is submitted.

1	\$	-4 Applicant preference. In making awards, the office
2	shall giv	e preference to applicants that are non-governmental
3	entities	with demonstrated experience in providing digital
4	equity se	rvices to covered populations. Governmental agencies
5	may apply	and shall be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.
6	§	-5 Applications. (a) The office shall establish an
7	annual ti	me period during which it shall accept applications for
8	funding u	nder the program. The time period for submission shall
9	be no les	s than sixty days and no more than ninety days.
10	(b)	The form of the application shall be as prescribed by
11	the offic	e and shall include:
12	(1)	Evidence demonstrating the applicant's experience and
13		ability to plan, organize, staff, and deliver digital
14		equity services to covered populations within the
15		State;
16	(2)	A description of the project area and covered
17		population to be served;
18	(3)	A description of the project that is proposed to be
19		deployed, including specific goals to increase digital
20		literacy and broadband access, methods, metrics,
21		facilities, equipment, staff, and resources;

1	(4)	A plan to tailor public awareness and outreach to
2		include non-English speaking covered populations with
3		consideration for linguistic, cultural, generational,
4		and literacy challenges;
5	(5)	Evidence, including certification from the applicant,
6		demonstrating the nature of the current digital
7		inequity in the proposed project area and covered
8		population;
9	(6)	The number of people in each covered population that
10		would gain access to broadband service as a result of
11		the project;
12	(7)	The total cost and timeline for completion of the
13		project;
14	(8)	The amount of matching funds that the applicant
15		proposes to contribute and a certification that no
16		portion of the matching funds are derived from any
17		state government grant, loan, or subsidy;
18	(9)	Evidence demonstrating the economic feasibility of the
19		project;
20	(10)	A list of all expected government authorizations,
21		permits, and other approvals required for the project

1	and a timeline for the applicant's acquisition of the
2	approvals;
3	(11) A certification that no other federal or state program
4	provides funding that is available to the applicant
5	for the project; and
6	(12) Any other information deemed necessary by the office.
7	<pre>\$ -6 Review of applications; confidential treatment;</pre>
8	approval. (a) Within five business days following the deadline
9	to submit applications for the program, the office shall make
10	all the applications available for review in a publicly
11	available electronic file posted on the office's or department's
12	website.
13	(b) To the extent the information in an application or a
14	challenge to an application falls under one or more of the
15	exceptions to public disclosure in section 92F-13, the office
16	shall keep the information confidential upon request by:
17	(1) An applicant for confidential treatment of an
18	application, except that in no event shall a request
19	for confidentiality prevent the publicly available
20	portion of the application from including sufficient

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2		section $-5(b)(2)$ and $-5(b)(5)$; or
3	(2)	A challenging applicant for confidential treatment of
4		a challenge submitted pursuant to this section.
5	(c)	In reviewing applications and any challenge to an
6	applicati	on, the office shall review the proposed projects to
7	ensure th	at all awarded funds are used to deploy eligible
8	projects	under section -3.
9	(d)	The office shall award program grants based on a
10	scoring s	ystem that shall be released to the public at least
11	thirty da	ys prior to the first day of the time period for the
12	submissio	n of applications. The scoring system shall give the
13	highest w	eight or priority to the following:
14	(1)	Projects proposing to serve larger covered
15		populations, with consideration to projects proposing
16		to serve smaller, difficult to access, or neglected
17		covered populations;
18	(2)	Applicants with more experience and technical ability
19		to successfully deploy digital equity projects to
20		covered populations and more financial or other
21		resources available to assist the project;

evidence to demonstrate the requirements of

1	(3)	Projects for which fewer government funds and less
2		support are needed to deploy digital equity in an
3		economically feasible manner;
4	(4)	Projects with a higher amount of matching funds
5		proposed to be committed by the applicant;
6	(5)	Projects that do not duplicate any existing project in
7		the project area; and
8	(6)	Other factors the office determines to be reasonable,
9		appropriate, and consistent with the purpose of
10		facilitating the deployment of projects to covered
11		populations.
12	\$	-7 Hawaii broadband and digital equity office
13	authority	. The office may:
14	(1)	Consider an applicant's financial ability to complete
15		the project proposed in an application;
16	(2)	Make reasonable requests for information necessary for
17		the oversight and administration of any project funded
18		pursuant to this chapter;
19	(3)	Impose any new or additional regulatory requirements
20		on grant recipients, through grant agreements or any
21		other mechanism, in addition to the program

1		implementation rules expressly authorized by this
2		chapter;
3	(4)	Deny or cancel a project if the office finds the
4		project will impact federal funding opportunities; and
5	(5)	Following notice and an opportunity to cure, require
6		disgorgement of grant funds in response to an
7		applicant's pattern of failure to achieve digital
8		equity goals in accordance with the timelines and
9		milestones set forth in its application.
10	\$	-8 Rules. (a) The department shall adopt rules
11	pursuant	to chapter 91 to effectuate the purposes of this
12	chapter.	
13	(b)	The rules shall:
14	(1)	Include reasonable oversight and reporting provisions
15		to ensure that grant moneys are used as intended; and
16	(2)	Not impose any financial penalty or liquidated damages
17		provisions or provisions that are not reasonably
18		related to the deployment of programs in the State in
19		accordance with this chapter."
20	SECT	ION 3. Within six months after the effective date of
21	this Act,	the department of business, economic development, and

- 1 tourism shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 and
- 2 section -8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to implement the digital
- 3 equity grant program; provided that any rules adopted pursuant
- 4 to this section shall include rules regarding the submission,
- 5 review, and approval of applications; administration of the
- 6 projects funded; and grant agreements memorializing the award of
- 7 funds.
- **8** SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$5,000,000 or so much
- 10 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the
- 11 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 12 2024-2025 for the digital equity grant program established by
- 13 this Act.
- 14 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 15 of business, economic development, and tourism for the purposes
- 16 of this Act.
- 17 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000.
